## Kiwanis Club Honors Outstanding Conservation Farmers



In observance of the fifth annual Farm-City Week, Mr. and Mrs. Orville Kern and Mr. and Mrs. Arvin Murre of rural Kewaskum were presented the agriculture-conservation plaques for their outstanding job in soil conservation by the Kewaskum Kiwanis club at their meeting Monday evening.

The awards were presented by Walter Wesenberg, president of the Kiwanis club, after Harold Ryan, soil conservation agent of

Washington county, enumerated the accomplishments in conservation that each of the families had carried out.

The type of conservation programs carried out by these two farmers were as follows:

Arvin Murre—1. Basic conservation plan (a) 70 acres contour strips, (b) 50 acre improved woodlot, (c) renovated old blue grass pastures, (d) constructed grass waterways, (f) stockwatering and

wildlife.

Orville Kern—1. Basic conservation plan on farm; 2. 45 acres contour strips; 3. 12 acre improved woodlot; 4. 1 acre tree planting; 5. Constructed grass waterways.

All recipients of awards for the preceding four years were also invited to Monday's meeting. They are: 1958 — Edmund Thull and Louis Opgenorth; 1959 — Edgar Miske and Roman Foerster; 1960 — Allen Reindl and Edward Hawig;

1961—Ray Schaefer and Lee Becker.

The speaker for the program was Milton Bliss of the Office of Information, Soil Conservation Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

## 36 Deer Are Killed, 54 Registered in County

### FEW KEWASKUM HUNTERS ARE SUCCESSFUL IN NORTH WOODS

With tabulations being incomplete of deer registered in Washington county, Edmund Weber, sheriff's department radio operator, reported that up to Wednesday morning after four days of hunting in the nine-day season, 54 deer had been registered at the various checking points in the county.

Weber indicated that the figures from the outlying checking points may not be up to date and that further registrations may have occurred. At least 36 of the deer registered in the county were shot in the county, according to Weber.

The Statesman office learned of very few Kewaskum hunters who bagged a buck in this area. The first one to be reported was a large 10 or 12 point buck killed by Rob "Woody" Schultz near Kewaskum shortly after the season opened Saturday. Some of the deer shot by local hunters were killed in Fond du Lac and other surrounding counties and were registered there.

A few scattered reports of deer killed by local hunters in the north woods were heard but most of them were unsuccessful. However, many hunters had not yet returned

home at this writing. Some hunters reported seeing many does in the north and said the hunting was poor because of high grass, dryness and a lack of snow. While this is being written we see an occasional car pass through with deer on it.

The usual humorous stories also came back from the north woods with the hunters, like one hunter being successful and yet unsuccessful. He shot a big buck, then got hungry and decided to eat first before tracking the animal. When he returned for the deer another hunter had his tag on it and was dressing it out. Another hunter lost his coat in an odd manner and came home without it. Then he remembered where he left it, placed a call up north, and now it is being shipped home. But you'll have to contact the hunters for more details on these tales.

All deer hunters who got their buck, hereabouts or in the north, are invited to let the Statesman know about it and we'll be glad to print it next week.

## Local Deer Hunter Accidentally Shot

Doyle Esterline of 1217 Meadow Lane, Kewaskum, an employee of Honeck Chevrolet, Inc., was accidentally shot in the legs by another hunter from South Milwaukee while deer hunting in the Tomah area on the opening day of the season Saturday.

It was reported that Esterline was struck by the bullet when the other hunter fired at a deer. He was shot in the left thigh, the bullet passing through the flesh and grazing his right leg. The bullet tore a hole in Esterline's leg about the size of a small orange and the wound required the taking of about 100 stitches. Twelve stitches were required to close the gash in his right leg which the shot grazed. Esterline was hunting with two companions when he was struck by the bullet which was fired from an Italian make deer rifle.

The wounded man was transported by ambulance to a Tomah hospital, where he was a patient until Tuesday when he was transferred to St. Joseph's Community hospital in West Bend.

## Perkins Family, Three Others Hurt in Crash

Six persons were injured at 12:20 p. m. Saturday on Hwy. 45 about 200 feet north of County Trunk Hwy. D, several miles south of Kewaskum, when a pickup truck operated by Alfred C. Voigt, 28, of R. 1, Kewaskum, and a car driven by Donald W. Holzemer, 18, of Kenosha collided. The investigating officer reported the Voigt truck, traveling north on the highway, made a left turn in front of the southbound Holzemer auto. Holzemer swerved his car in an attempt to avoid the crash. Both vehicles were wrecked.

Injured were William C. Voigt, R. 2, Kewaskum bruises and face cuts; Holzemer, head lacerations and mild concussion; Peter L. Couelli, 19, bruises and nose bleed; Marvin Perkins, 24, Kewaskum, two slipped disks, fractured ribs and bruises; his wife, Shirley Perkins, 22, Kewaskum, bruises, head and right arm injuries, and their daughter, Denise Perkins, 2, Kewaskum, face cuts and bruises. Mr. and Mrs. Perkins and infant daughter were passengers in Holzemer's car.

All of the injured were removed to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend. Mr. and Mrs. Perkins will be confined to the hospital indefinitely. Denise has already been released.

### DEER SEASON ENDS

The deer season closed south of Highway 60 last Sunday at sundown. The number of hunters working that area in the two day season was less than anticipated in Washington and Ozaukee counties. The kill was about equally divided between bucks and does.

The season north of Highway 60 will close Sunday, Nov. 25, at 4:26 p. m. Registration stations south of Highway 60 closed Monday evening. Deer killed north of 60 may be registered at the office of the Ozaukee county sheriff, Hartford police station and the Washington county sheriff's office. These stations will remain open until Monday evening, Nov. 26.

The only time it is legal to hunt with slugs in a shotgun is during the deer season. After the deer season is closed, individuals found hunting for any game with slugs in their gun are subject to a fine.

With the end of the deer season this week end, the major hunting seasons will be over. There are, however, hunting opportunities still available for those of you who have not had your fill.

The ruffed grouse season is open

through Dec. 16 in a large area in the southwestern part of the state.

The squirrel season is open in the entire state through Jan. 31, 1963.

The rabbit season is open in the entire state through Jan. 31, 1963.

The raccoon season in the entire state is open through Dec. 31, 1962.

Be sure and study your small game hunting pamphlet for the boundaries if you are going to hunt ruffed grouse.

For you bow and arrow hunters, all counties are open for bow and arrow deer hunting from Dec. 1 through 31.

The hunting of deer with bow and arrow will be allowed on Horicon Marsh during the December

bow and arrow season in those areas designated by posted notices of the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife. No special permits will be required, but hunting licenses and deer tag as required by the statutes are necessary.

There will be no gun deer hunt or pheasant hunt on the Horicon National Wildlife Refuge this year.

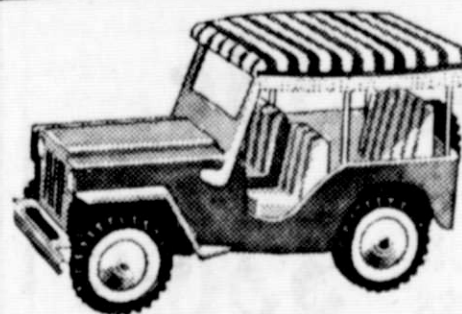

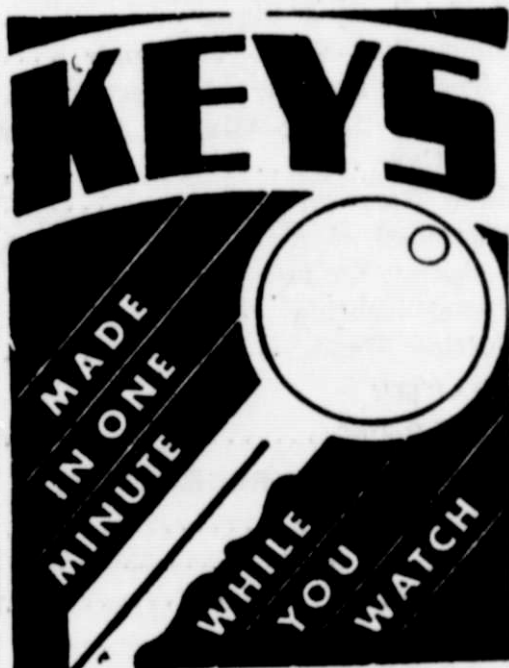

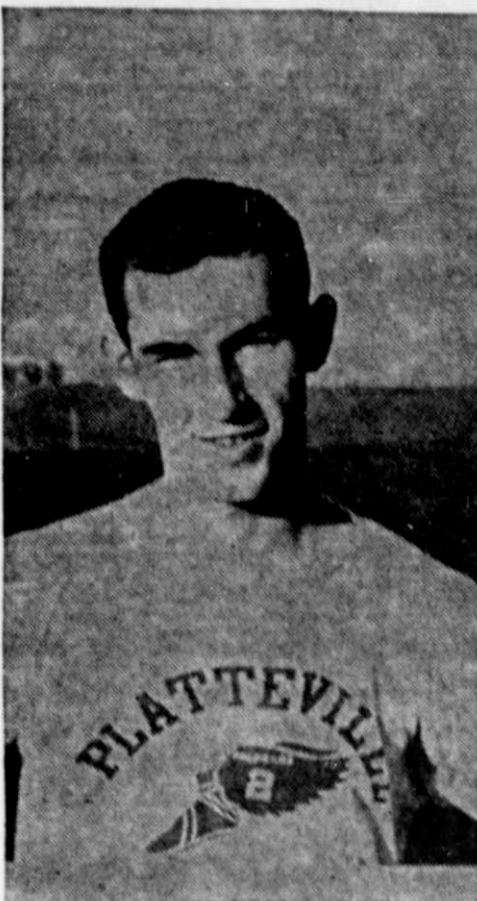
Next Tuesday the Indians will entertain Rosendale in another non-loop tuneup contest and will open conference play at Grafton next Friday, Nov. 30.

#### TREE ORDER BLANKS ARE NOW AVAILABLE

Tree order blanks are available. If you want trees from the Wisconsin Conservation Department you may get them by writing to the county agent's office, the forester's office, the soil conservation office. These offices are located in the court house annex, West Bend. You indicate on the blank which trees you want—send the blank and a money order to the Conservation Department or to the forester and this will be properly processed.

Next spring when the trees are lifted a truck will go to Wisconsin Rapids from West Bend and pick up all tree orders for Washington county which have been previously ordered. The cost is nominal. They will be brought back to the extension office and may be picked up there. By so doing you will be getting trees the day after they are lifted, which makes it a very desirable situation.

We have 25,000 acres of land in Washington county that should be planted to trees. At the present time, we probably have between 3 and 4 thousand acres planted. If you need information on which trees to plant, our district forester Jerry Best, will be very happy to give you this information.

## Early Mailing for Christmas Urged By Postmaster

**SHOULD MAIL GIFT PARCELS FOR DISTANT STATES WEEK OF DEC. 3-8**

Postmaster Harry E. Koch announced this week the mail early campaign for the not too distant Christmas season.

Patrons are urged to mail gift parcels for distant states during the week of Dec 3-8, to insure delivery before Christmas. Gift parcels for local and nearby areas should be mailed not later than Dec. 12.

Greeting cards for distant states should be mailed not later than Dec. 10, and greeting cards for local delivery not later than Dec. 15 in order to assure delivery by Christmas Day.

Postmaster Koch further stated that surface mail for Alaska and Hawaii, not prepaid at the first-class rate, should be mailed not later than Dec. 1.

There will be no delivery of Christmas cards and letter mail, no dispatches of mail either incoming or outgoing, no lock box service or rural delivery on Dec. 25.

Greeting cards prepaid at the first-class rate may be sealed and contain written messages. Other advantages of the use of first-class mail are: Priority of dispatch and delivery, forwarding without additional charge, and return to sender at no additional cost provided the return address is shown on the envelope.

"Do not open until Christmas" is permitted and the combination service allowing enclosure of writ-

ten matter when properly endorsed to that effect and upon payment of proper postage. The advantages of special delivery and special handling are that special delivery articles will be delivered on the day of arrival at destination if they arrive prior to 11:00 p. m., or local closing time. Also special delivery articles will be delivered on Christmas Day and on Sundays. Special handling will insure priority dispatch and transportation to the office of address.

Postmaster Koch also stated the use of airmail for gift parcels and greeting cards for distant points during the last week before Christmas. Use delivery zone numbers when possible. The separation of greeting cards into LOCAL and OUT OF TOWN bundles is an advantage to move the mail more efficiently. These labels will be available at the post office and a supply to each patron on the rural route will be delivered by the rural carrier. If you do not receive these labels or need additional, be

sure and contact your rural carrier for he will be carrying a surplus supply.

It is important that letters and parcels contain a complete and legible address. Every year there is a great volume of mail that is undeliverable due to illegible and incomplete addresses.

Employees at the Kewaskum post office wish you a Very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year. Your co-operation during the Christmas season of 1961 was greatly appreciated.

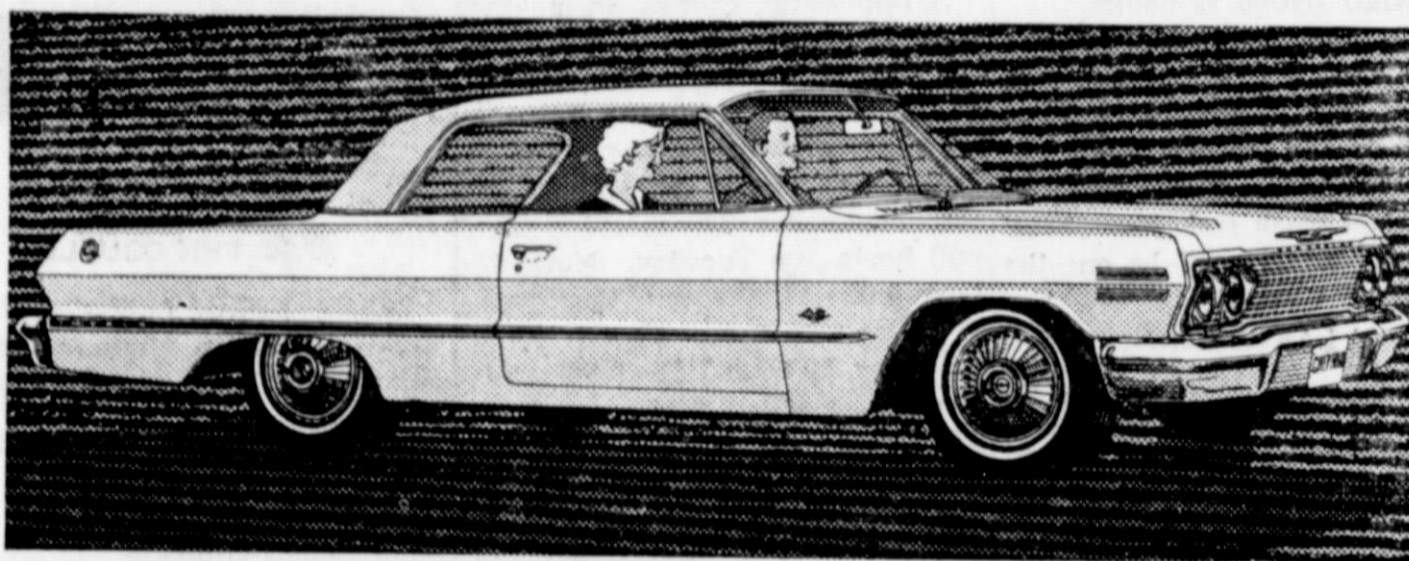

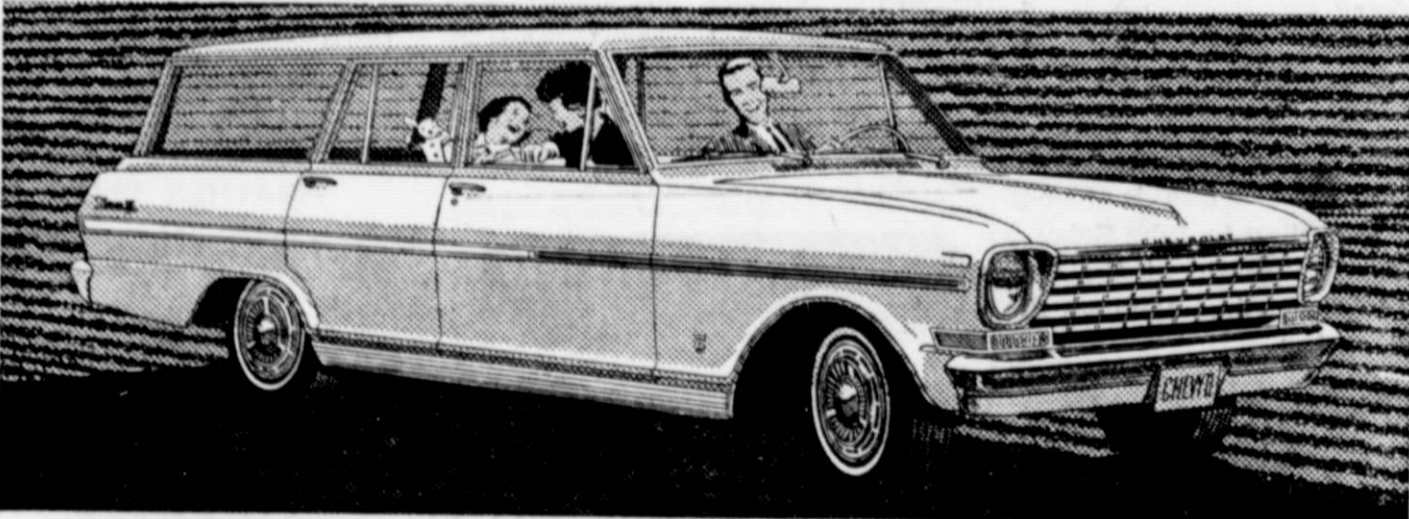

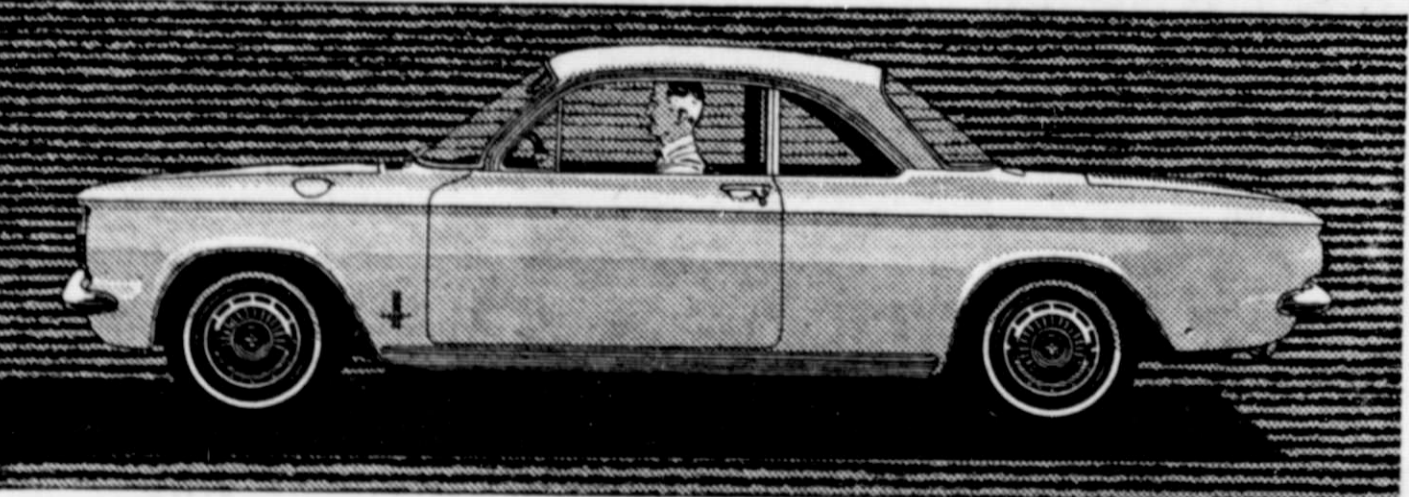
