Stellpflug Meat Market Is Sold to Glen Rimmel

Former Owner to Open Supermarket At New Holstein

MARKET HERE OPERATED BY
STELLPLUG FAMILY
OVER 84 YEARS

Monday morning, Dec. 3, will end an 84 year tradition for the village of Kewaskum. At this time Glen A. Rimmel will assume ownership and operation of the Stellpflug Meat Market, which has been owned by the same family for more than 84 years.

Rimmel has purchased the market from Mr. and Mrs. John G. Stellpflug, who have owned it since January 1, 1948. Previous to 1948 the market was operated by the late Mr. and Mrs. John W. Stellpflug, parents of John G. Stellpflug, since June 1, 1913. Before that, from Aug. 1, 1879 to June of 1913, the market was owned by Mr. and Mrs. Peter Wunderle, parents of Mrs. John W. Stellpflug. There was a short period early in the century, after the death of Mr. Wunderle, that the market was leased to another party but ownership has been retained by the family since 1879.

Rimmel, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph J. Rimmel of Kewaskum, has been employed by the Stellpflugs for over six years. Although his immediate family has never been in the meat business, the Rimmel name is by no means strange to the business since several of his uncles have been in the meat business for many years. Glen is a graduate of Kewaskum Community High school and attended Oshkosh State college. Arvin Merwin, a former employee of Ours Dry Cleaners, and an uncle of Rimmel, will be employed by him at the meat market.

The Stellpflug family will, in the near future, move to New Holstein, Wis., where they will own and operate a Super Valu supermarket. Construction of the modern 5,400 square foot supermarket at the corner of Mason st. and Hwy. 57 in New Holstein, which was started late in September, is nearing completion and the tentative opening date will be early in January.

The store will be independently owned and operated by the Stellpflugs. General contractor of the building is E. H. Moldenhauer and Sons of Cedarburg. The store will be self-service in every department except meat which will be partially service and part self-service. Two 4-door upright freezers, a 2-door upright and 84 linear feet of conventional type refrigeration display cases will be used to display a full line of meats, fruits and vegetables, dairy products, frozen foods and ice cream.

Air conditioned throughout, the store will have two mechanized checkouts, a courtesy counter for check cashing, bottle returns, etc. and an automatic "out" door. A complete variety of nationally advertised brands will be offered as

The campaign will open early in December. Local managers, who donate their time and efforts as a civic service, administer the mailing of the seals and collection of contributions.

Eradication of TB in Wisconsin is the announced goal of WATA, and funds gained through the drive will be used to intensify chest x-rays and tuberculin skin testing in addition to normal TB control and educational programs, according to C. W. Kammeier, WATA executive secretary.

Of each dollar raised through the drive, 93½ cents remain in Wisconsin to support the eradication program on local and state levels. The balance supports the research and educational programs carried on by the National Tuberculosis association.

DEER REGISTRATIONS IN COUNTY TOTAL 82

County game warden Bob Lake announced Monday that deer registrations in Washington county for the nine-day season that ended Sunday evening totaled 82. The majority of them were killed in the county while the remainder were shot in Dodge, Ozaukee and Fond du Lac counties. Fifty-three of the deer were killed the first two days of the season, when any deer could be killed south of Hwy. 60. The kill was 64 bucks and 18 does.

The past week only two more hunters reported being successful in killing a deer. Gerald Thompson, Kewaskum, shot an 8-point buck in the vicinity of Waucousta the second day of the season, Nov. 18. Charles Stracka, Jr. of R. 2, Kewaskum, bagged a 195-pound buck in Bayfield county last Wednesday. Charles Sr. was not successful.

Sale of the Campbellsport News owned by Postmaster W. J. Sullivan to Harlow Roate of Appleton was announced. Mr. Sullivan purchased the paper May 1, 1910 and continued as its publisher until 1935 when he became postmaster. Since then it has been managed by M. R. Sloggy. The publication was founded in 1900 by C. R. Brough-

ton, editor of the Sheboygan Press and was known as the Twin Village News until the villages of Campbellsport and New Castle were incorporated in 1907.

Prosper W. Reindl, 26, owner of a grocery and electrical appliance store at Wayne, died at St. Agnes hospital, Fond du Lac, from injuries suffered in a 10-foot fall from a ladder. The funeral and burial took place at St. Bridgets.

82 DEER REGISTERED IN WASHINGTON COUNTY

When the deer season closed on Sunday evening, eighty-two deer had been registered in Washington county. The majority of them were killed in Washington county, the remainder in Dodge, Ozaukee and Fond du Lac counties. within twenty-four hours in the county of kill or any adjoining county.

The raccoon season continues thru Dec. 31. The law provides that these animals may be served in a public place, that the meat can be charged for or given away as free lunch during the open season. Those who plan to have such a lunch should do so before Dec. 31.

Duck hunters—have you removed your blind from the water? The law prohibits leaving any solid waste material on the water or ice. When you no longer have use for your blind, it becomes solid waste material and must be removed.

Most of the hunting seasons are now over and most sportsmen are either sitting by the fire watching

TV or many of the hardest ones are fishing.

We do, however, still have a few rabbit and squirrel hunters. These seasons are open through Jan. 31.

Each year we get complaints and make several arrests for the shooting of pheasants at this time of the year.

Everybody must agree that pheasant populations are low and the birds that have survived the hunting season should be kept for the spring breeding season. Predators and bad weather will no doubt take their toll before spring. These losses will be severe enough without man adding to them.

We sincerely hope that everyone will refrain from shooting pheasants during the closed season,

both so you do not get in trouble and to keep the birds for breeders in the spring.

We also sincerely hope that anyone who sees or has knowledge of illegal hunting gives the information to his local conservation warden at once. If you know the man's name that is, of course, important. If you do not know his name, get a good description of him—how he is dressed, approximate age, weight and height; the kind of gun he is using, if possible, and when a car is involved, be sure and get the correct license number. Then get this information to the nearest conservation warden immediately.

Does the above scene look familiar? Many motorists throughout the snowbelt areas of the country will face similar situations this winter. Snow, while it is very beautiful to behold, carries with it a constant threat to the motorist during the winter months. Dented fenders, late appointments, transportation at near standstill, not to mention the hundreds of thousands of dollars forfeited by industry and business because of the ravages of snow and ice. The results of a survey in New York City indicate that roads and streets kept free of ice and snow, thereby reducing traffic delays on the average of one hour per storm, mean a direct annual savings to the public of an estimated \$500,000,000. This savings is gleaned from these losses incurred when storms delay passenger traffic, truck shipments, refuse collection, fire protection, medical service and utility repairs.

To keep the snowbelt streets and roadways clear of ice and snow, over 2,000,000 tons of safety salt (rock salt) were used last year. Safety salt spread on city streets is the most economical means by

which passengers and pedestrians alike are protected from accidents. The Engineering Society of the City of Detroit has stated the following with regard to de-icing of winter streets: "It is the opinion of this committee that the continued use of rock salt is by far the best procedure and is in the best public interest."

It is startling indeed to note that more than 1700 persons are killed and an additional 174,000 injured on snowy and icy streets each year. An indirect result of accidents on hazardous streets is the continuing rise in auto insurance premiums.

Safety salt is an economical and efficient de-icer—one pound of salt will melt 46 pounds of ice at 30 degrees fahrenheit. Rock salt applied to icy streets quickly erodes the ice cover allowing vehicles to travel on considerably safer and sound pavement. Most city engineers prefer the use of safety salt to abrasives like sand or cinders because rock salt leaves no residue requiring clean up in the spring.
