## Priest and State Agree On Exchange of 120 Acre Camp Land Near Dundee

The long-standing dispute between the Wisconsin Conservation Department and a Catholic priest who operates a boys' camp near Dundee in Fond du Lac county apparently is over.

Terms of a compromise which will see the two parties exchange about 120 acres of land have been worked out although papers have not been signed.

John Beale, assistant conservation director, announced Tuesday that the Rev. Joseph A. Fischer, pastor of Our Lady of Good Hope church, Milwaukee, would get a 120-acre site west of Dundee with lake frontage but did not specify the lake. The priest, with the help of volunteers, has operated a camp on a 123-acre site at Crooked lake in the middle of the Kettle Moraine state forest which the state hopes to make a wilderness preserve.

The two parties involved have been at odds over the matter for many months. The state had started condemnation proceedings to acquire the land which brought thousands of protests from interested persons.

A mediator in the dispute said that the state has agreed to bulldoze portions of the new lake-front area to make suitable sites for cabins and will extend a road into the property. The pie-shaped land, with the tip on 200 feet of lake frontage, is ideal for a camp, he said. The lake is spring fed and the property is surrounded by state lands ideal for boys' camping activities. It is a few miles from Fr. Fischer's present 123-acre camp.

"It's a straight exchange of properties, but we have agreed to make certain improvements to make it comparable to the place he has," Beale said. Father Fischer said Tuesday night that no agreement has been signed for the exchange but that he was confident the exchange would be made. He said he was waiting to get more details on what the state will do to prepare the property for the camp and expected further word about Thursday or Friday.

Five cabins at the present camp will be moved to the new site. Atty. Jerris Leonard, 9240 N. Sleepy Hollow lane, Fox Point, who served as a mediator in the dispute, said. He said it was too early to determine if the new location would be ready for camping next year. Father Fischer need not move his camp until the new site is prepared for him.

First reports of the condemnation action stirred thousands of protests to Gov. Nelson. The priest built his modest youth camp with the help of volunteers. Last summer he operated a 10 week session for scouts, orphans and underprivileged children.

**Village Gets \$1,944.77  
Share of Gas Co. Taxes****TOTAL OF \$59,462.86 PAID  
TO COUNTY AREAS**

Sixteen Wisconsin counties and 110 communities received Milwaukee Gas Light Company ad valorem tax payments for 1962. Ad valorem taxes, paid annually by the Gas company on utility property, totaled \$3,120,250 in 1962.

Ad valorem taxes are assessed by the state on the company's utility plant in lieu of local assessments on real estate and personal property. This system simplifies the collection of taxes on Gas company facilities which extend into

a large number of Wisconsin taxing districts.

Distributed by the state, the tax money is divided into three categories. The largest share, 65 per cent, is returned to the local community where the property is located. The county receives 20 per cent, and the state retains the remaining 15 per cent. The 110 communities received a total of \$2,028,162, the 16 counties \$624,050, and the state \$468,037.

The \$59,462.86 paid to Washington county was divided as follows:

Cities—West Bend, \$19,499.17; Hartford, \$6,025.43.

Villages—Germantown, \$1,752.34; Kewaskum, \$1,944.77; Slinger, \$1,626.21; Jackson, \$708.88.

Towns—Germantown, \$9,135.37; Polk, \$5,590.35; Hartford, \$3,843.

91; Trenton, \$2,247.35; Jackson, \$2,198.95; West Bend, \$2,097.07; Barton, \$1,561.11; Kewaskum, \$1,231.95.

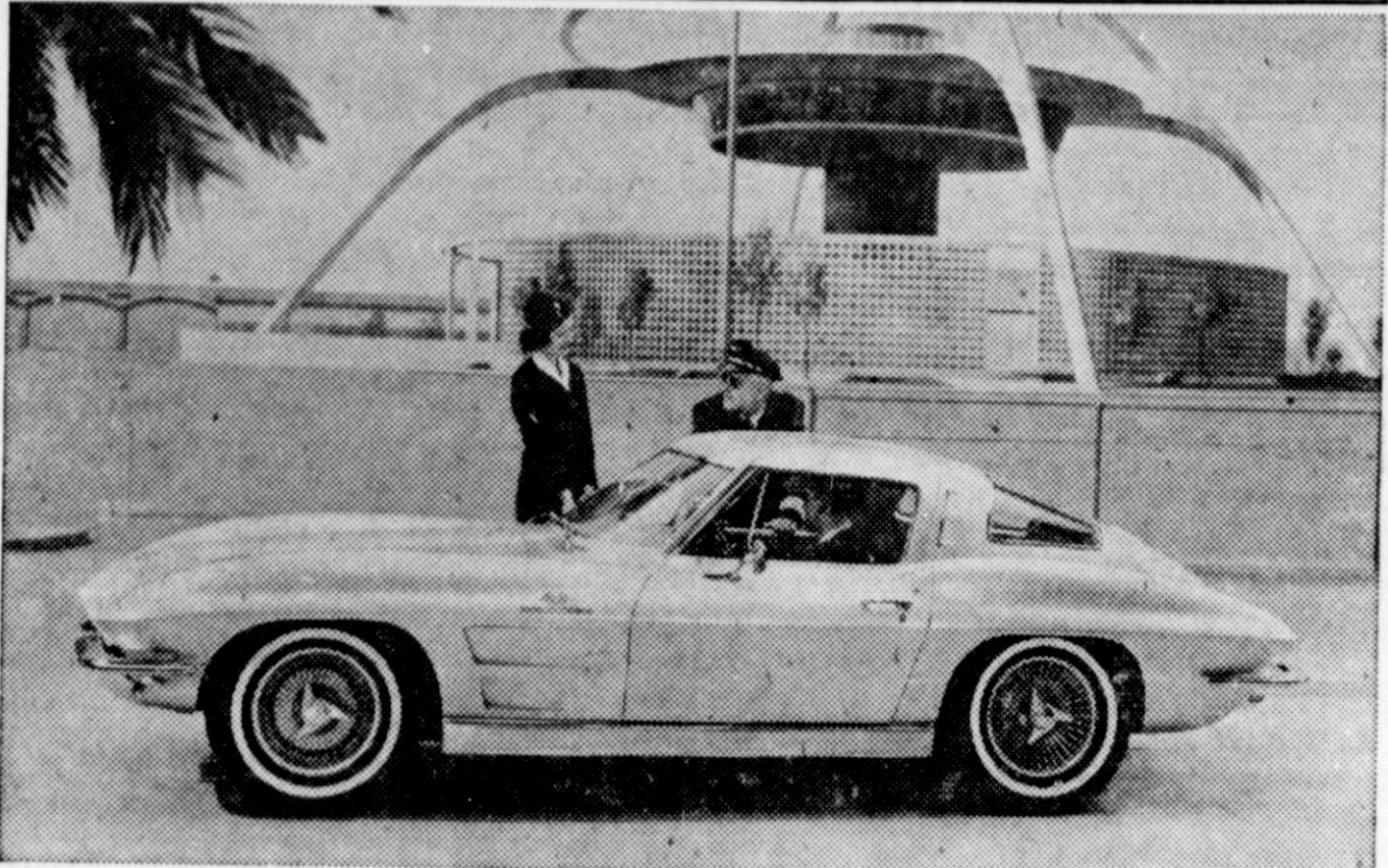

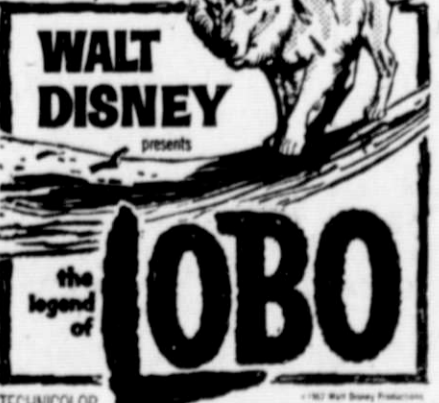

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### Meeting Held By County School Board Directors

The directors of the Washington County School Board association met in the courthouse annex at West Bend Monday, Nov. 26.

The business topics which they discussed were: 1. Legislative proposals; 2. Civil Defense; 3. Spring convention.

The directors are concerned with the continued loss of the tax base by land purchases of the State Conservation Department and other agencies whose property is tax exempt.

They are also concerned about proper care for students in emergency situations, especially during sporadic attacks by an enemy nation.

The perennial problem of school attendance by foster children placed in receiving homes of this county was considered. The state pays the tuition for such non-resident pupils who attend high school but not for those who attend the elementary schools. Most of these children come from the Milwaukee area.

The spring convention will be held at the Lincoln school in Hartford on Thursday, March 28, at 8:00 p. m. The directors plan to have an expert speak on insurance and finance at this meeting.

The directors discussed at some length the policy which could be followed during emergency situations. Their conclusion seemed to be that each school district would have to evaluate its facilities and formulate its own policy. All agreed that pupils should be returned to their homes and families, if possible.

The next meeting date was not set. The chairman is to call the next meeting at his discretion, according to Stanley Linstedt, president of the School Board association.

#### COUNTY RESIDENTS KILL 46 OF DEER REGISTERED

Of the odd deer registered in Washington county in the past gun season, forty-eight were killed by residents of Washington county, seventeen by residents of Dodge, four Fond du Lac, three Ozaukee and two Sheboygan.

Since the season closed there have been five car kills, one on CTH (E) east of Hwy. 83 about a week ago. Four were hit Friday night and early Saturday morning, one in the Kewaskum swamp, another east of the West Bend airport and two on Hwy. 41 between Hwys. 144 and 60.

The bow and arrow season open-

ed statewide on Dec. 1. Two Milwaukee hunters killed deer in the county, one in the Jackson swamp and the other in the town of Polk.

An article in the Milwaukee Journal indicates that many chefs advise: "It is always a good idea to marinate venison as, although some consider its meat superior to all other game, one never knows under what conditions it was killed. Age, fatigue and fear at the time of its death all play an important role in determining the flavor and quality of the meat."

The practice of placing sand on the ice of our lakes to provide a swimming beach is growing by leaps and bounds.

The law allows such sand blanket only after a permit has been issued by the Public Service Commission.

Too many people are placing

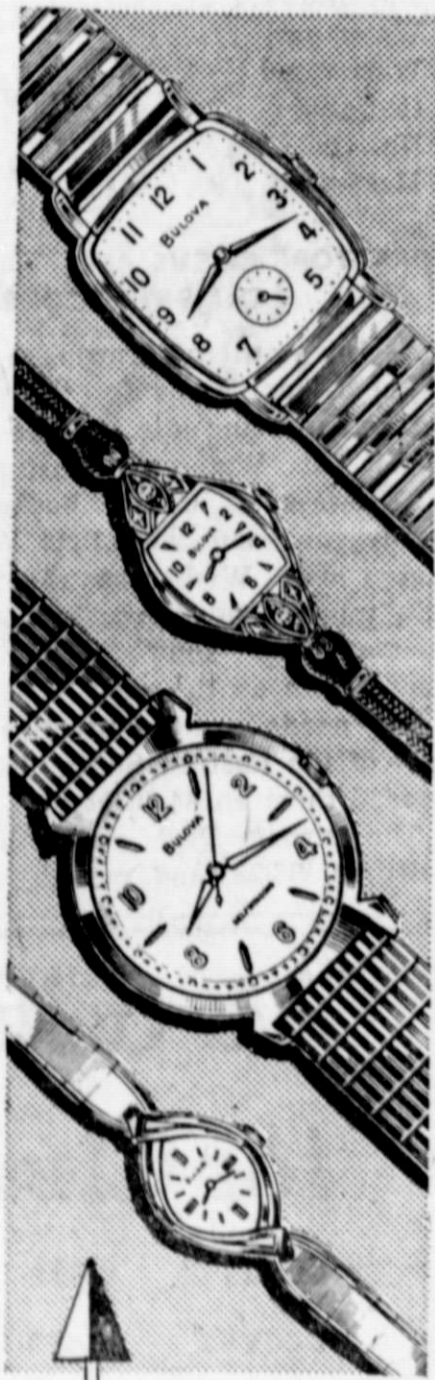
the sand on the ice and then applying for such a permit. This is very definitely an illegal practice and you will be prosecuted for it.

All shade trees except evergreens can be safely pruned in winter, says George Ziegler, landscape specialist at the University of Wisconsin.

Riding horses are becoming more popular in Wisconsin. Nearly 3,000 4-H members in 46 counties carried the horse project in 1962.

Don't mulch spring bulbs that you plant this fall until the ground has frozen, warns Lou Berninger, flower specialist at the University of Wisconsin. Wait until mice have found their winter homes elsewhere.

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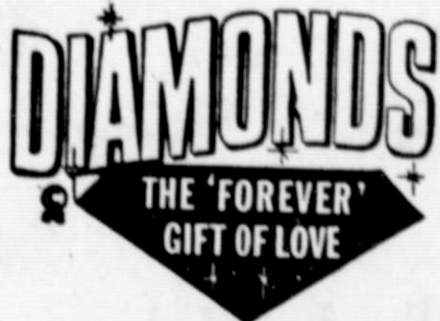
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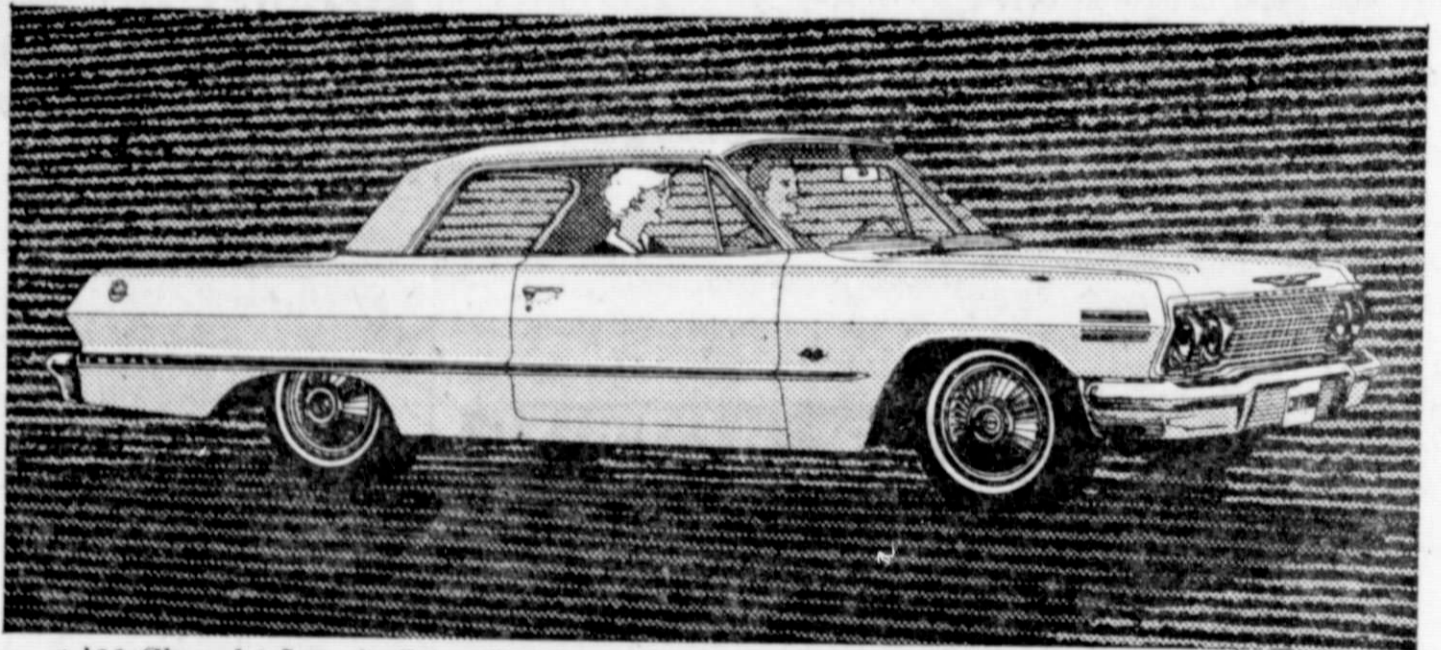


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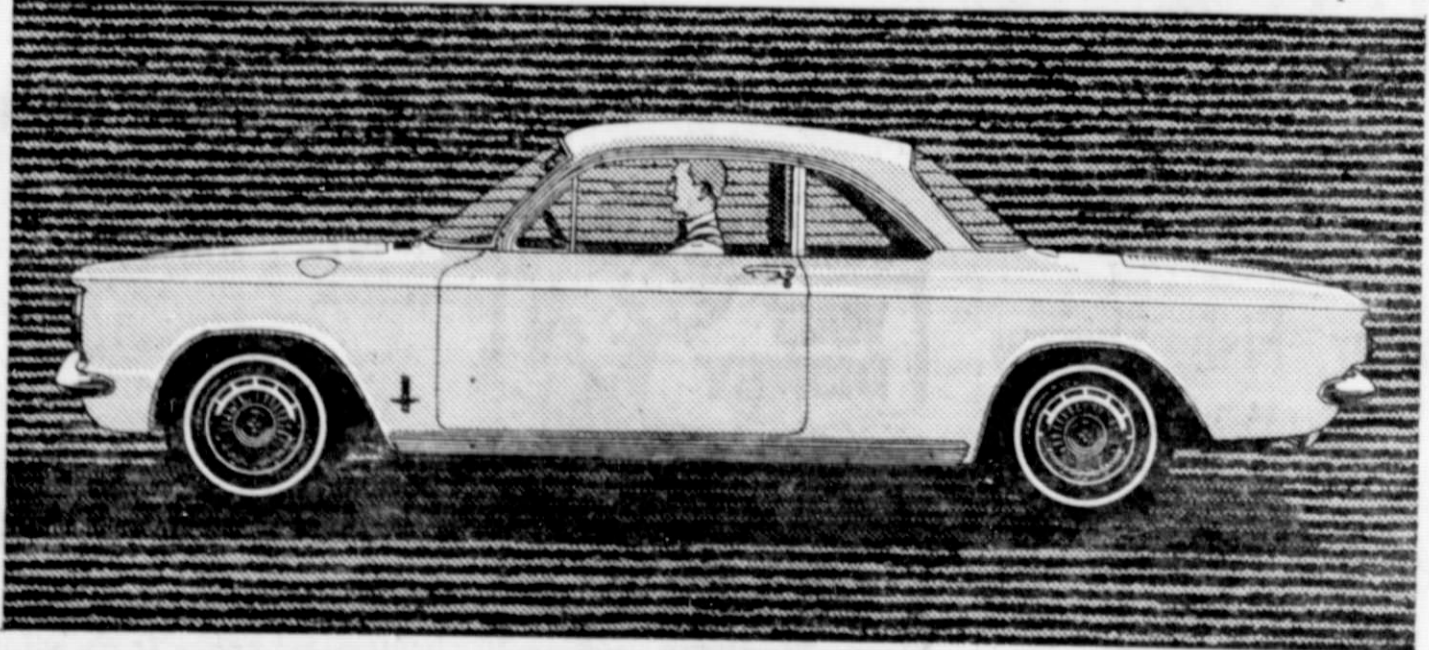
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
