Dist. Atty. Richard T. Becker Appoints Kozina Assistant

Washington county District Attorney Richard T. Becker has announced the appointment of Attorney John V. Kozina as assistant district attorney. Mr. Kozina will assume the newly created position on the first Monday in January.

Mr. Becker, who was recently re-elected, indicated that the assistant is needed because of the growth of the county and the large volume of traffic cases handled by his office. The county board, recognizing this need, authorized the appointment of the assistant at its annual session in November. Under state law, the district attorney appoints his assistants.

Mr. Becker indicated that he has known Mr. Kozina for several years and believes that he is very well qualified to serve in the position. Kozina, 29, is a 1960 graduate of the Marquette Law school and is a partner in the law firm of Kauth & Kozina of West Bend. He was in the navy prior to attending law school. He is presently the secretary of the Washington County Bar association.

Mr. Becker announced that commencing Jan. 7, the district attorney's office will be open from 9:00 a. m. to 4:00 p. m. every day, except Thursday, when it will close at noon. The office is in room 109 of the new courthouse.

Firemen Elect, Assistant Chief Stellpflug Resigns

At the regular monthly meeting of the Kewaskum Fire Department last Thursday, the last of the year, officers were elected for the coming year and other business disposed of.

Assistant Chief John Stellpflug, a faithful and hard working member of the volunteer department for many years, turned in his resignation. John will be leaving the department and village in the near future to enter into business at New Holstein.

Due to Stellpflug's resignation, other officers moved up in office. Former Foreman William Martin was elected assistant chief to succeed him. Former Assistant Foreman Bob Ours was elected captain (replacing the office of foreman) to succeed Martin. Ollie Staehler, Jr. was elected lieutenant (formerly assistant foreman) to succeed Ours. Secretary George Koerble and Treasurer Harry Koch were re-elected. The fire chief is not elected by the department, being appointed by the village board upon recommendation of the department.

In a newly created office, Marvin Martin was appointed as first aid leader by Chief Armin Oppermann and will hold the rank of lieutenant.

Other business transacted included the reading by the chief of the specifications for the new fire truck to be purchased next year. New by-laws were adopted by the department. It was voted to hold the annual firemen's party on the first Saturday night in January, the 5th, and a refreshment and food committee was appointed for this affair. Teams, captains and members of the five teams which will bowl in the Badger Firemen's association tournament at Germantown in January were read. Cities awarded the Badger Firemen's events during the next year were announced. These include the annual tournament, banquet, bowling tournament and meeting. Other business was discussed and the usual lunch and refreshments followed the meeting.

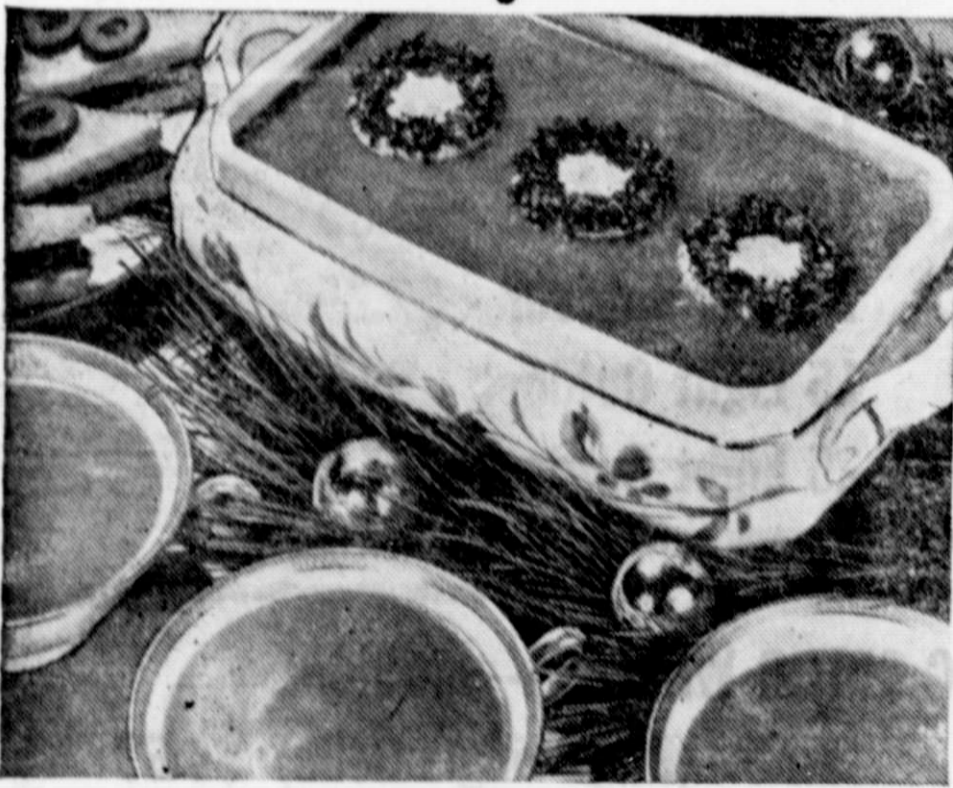

How to Care for a Christmas Tree

By Maurice J. Hovland

How do you care for a Christmas tree? What are the things that you should do?

Remember that most of the trees that are going to be sold as Christmas trees were cut quite early in the fall. They've already dried out somewhat. So when you get your tree home we suggest that you leave it outside as long as possible. Remember that as it warms up the tree is going to give off water, but there is no source of water within the tree; therefore, it's going to dry out and the needles fall off quite rapidly.

We find that the long-needled trees shed their needles much more slowly than the short-needled trees. Perhaps this fact will make up your mind as to whether or not you want a spruce or a pine

as your Christmas tree. At any rate — choose the tree you want — take it home — leave it outside until you're ready to trim it. Then take it inside and give it a good drink of water when you put it in the holder, and keep watering it continually.

Many people today are applying a fireproofing substance on the tree. This, too, helps to eliminate some of the loss of water of the tree. When you get the tree in the house, where are you going to locate it? Whatever you do, don't locate it anywhere near a fireplace. Also, we don't recommend that you locate it right next to a register or radiator. Get it into the coolest corner of the house. And remember, as this tree dries out, it can

get so dry that even a spark might be able to set it on fire. Even a string of lights could become hot enough so that the tree could burn.

Whatever you do, don't let anything happen that will destroy the joy of your Christmas, simply by not following good procedures with caring for your tree at this Christmas season.

CARE ON THE ICE, BOUNTYING A FOX, ICE FISHING SHANTIES

As this is written, the ice has started to form on the lakes and streams in this vicinity. Children wish to go skating and their fathers ice fishing. They should be very careful, running streams and deepwater spring fed lakes freeze slowly.

The 1962 fishing regulations are in effect until Dec. 31. The 1963 issue of the resident fishing license will be available with the new regulations prior to the new year. Fishing for trout is permitted at Big Cedar and Friess lakes. Wallace lake, however, is closed.

There seems to be some misunderstanding of the manner in which a person may bounty a fox. The party who wishes to bounty a fox must be a licensed hunter or trapper, he or she must have killed the animal, and not attempt to bounty it for another. The animal must be brought in for bounty within five days after killing. In the event one wishes to mount the animal, do not bother to bring it in. In order to issue a bounty certificate the county clerk must remove both ears. Read the fine print before you sign the bounty affidavit.

Remember the tough time you had getting your ice fishing shanty off the lake last year?

We hope when you put your shanty on the ice this year, you will remember these experiences from past years and not let them happen again this year.

We suggest that when you feel you may not use your shanty regularly, you remove it from the ice, or at least move it near shore. Also, when the weather man forecasts a big snow storm, arrange to get your shanty near shore so it can be removed if necessary.

Each year when the time for removing shanties comes, some re-

main on the lake, arrests are necessary and we hear all kinds of excuses, and get many complaints. Boaters and property owners along the lakes don't appreciate these shanties left on the ice; when the ice melts, this debris is a real hazard to boating; and if it drifts to shore, the property owner has a real mess.

Remember if you put a shanty out this year, it is your responsibility to remove it from the ice by March 5, regardless of what conditions exist on that date.

Another word of caution, each fish shanty must have the name and address of the owner or occupant painted on the outside thereof, in such a manner as to be readily seen and read at all times. This must be on the structure itself and not just on a piece of paper or board attached to the structure.

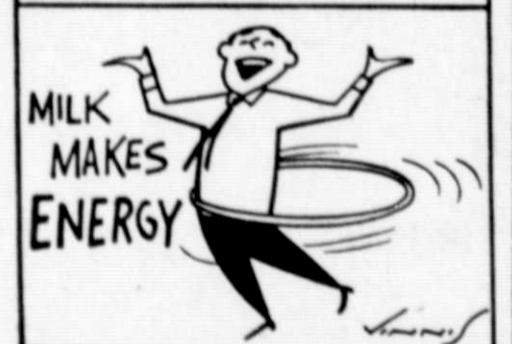
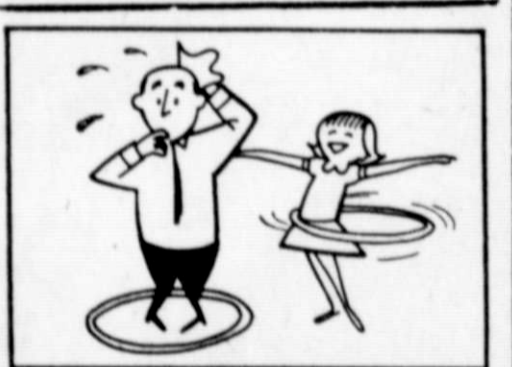

the Little Ten conference, paced the Lithias scoring with 19 points, followed by Bob Giombetti with 17. Pieper made all three of his baskets in the deciding final period.

In other contests over the week end Watertown with Schultz & Company (big Rube, former MU star that is) drubbed Hustisford, 93-50; Beaver Dam sneaked past Horicon, 79-74, and Mayville shaded Cedarburg in overtime, 70-68.

The first place tie will be broken and the lead will be at stake this Saturday night when Kewaskum plays at Menomonee Falls. Both hold 3-0 records. This should be quite a battle and one of the toughest on the Chevs' schedule this season. Kewaskum will have to play better basketball than they did at West Bend to win this one. Other games Saturday are Mayville at Hustisford and West Bend at Watertown. Horicon is at Cedarburg Sunday.

year. On June first I was promoted to airman second class which was a very pleasant boost not only to my morale but also to the pay check that I receive every fifteenth and last of each month. I think that this fact was underlined during the recent Cuban situation. 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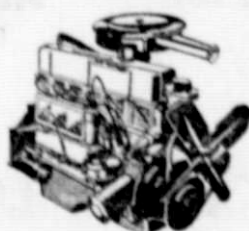
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
