#### **How to Care for a Christmas Tree**

By Maurice J. Hovland County Agent

How do you care for a Christmas continually. tree? What are the things that you should do?

Remember that most of the trees that are going to be sold as Christmas trees were cut quite early in the fall. They've already dried out house, where are you going to losomewhat. So when you get your tree home we suggest that you leave it outside as long as possible. Remember that as it warms up the tree is going to give off water, but there is no source of water within the tree; therefore, it's going to dry out and the needles fall off quite rapidly.

We find that the long-needled trees shed their needles much more slowly than the short-needled trees. Perhaps this fact will make up your mind as to whether or not you want a spruce or a pine






