Tax Rate of \$30 Per Thousand Is Levied By Village Board Rate Up \$1; Extend Where Your 1963 Tax Dollar Goes

Regular Meeting December 3, 1962
The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session with President Reigle presiding and all Board members present.

The minutes of the previous two meetings were approved as presented upon motion by Trustee Merwin, seconded by Trustee Geidel and duly carried.

The first order of business was the public hearing on the proposed 1963 budget. There were no appearances at the hearing. Two changes were made on the published budget. The Public Library appropriation was increased from \$2,200.00 to \$2,500.00. The Refuse and Garbage appropriation was decreased from \$7,461.44 to \$7,141.44. Since there were no objections to the budget as proposed, the hearing was declared closed.

The following three resolutions were introduced by Trustee Tessar, Chairman of the Administration Committee:

RESOLUTION NO. 62-6

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, that there be and hereby are levied, the following taxes for the year ending December 31, 1962, upon all real and personal property according to the assessment roll of the current year:

ICE FISHING WEATHER GOOD; LICENSES EXPIRE

This past week end the weather was very favorable for the ice fisherman, and there was a fair number on the lakes to enjoy their sport. However, the fish did not co-operate too well. A few twenty to twenty-four inch northern were taken on the north end of the big lake, panfish on the south end of Little Cedar and walleyes and panfish at Pike lake. Fishermen and skaters should be careful on spring fed deep water lakes; the ice is very thin in some places.

The 1963 fishing license and the 1963 fishing regulations are now available at all license depots in Washington county. Pick up your copy of the regulations when you buy the license, then read it.

There are certain individuals who in my opinion should never be allowed to hunt deer. I refer to the person who shoots a deer, hangs it in the garage, barn or machine shed, fails to remove the hide or cut up the meat. The venison spoils, the brave hunter in the dead of night dumps the carcass at the side of the road because he is ashamed to appear at the town dump with it.

Be sure you get your new fishing license before you fish after Dec. 31. All 1962 fishing licenses

expire on that date. Sportsmen licenses are good until Aug. 31, however.

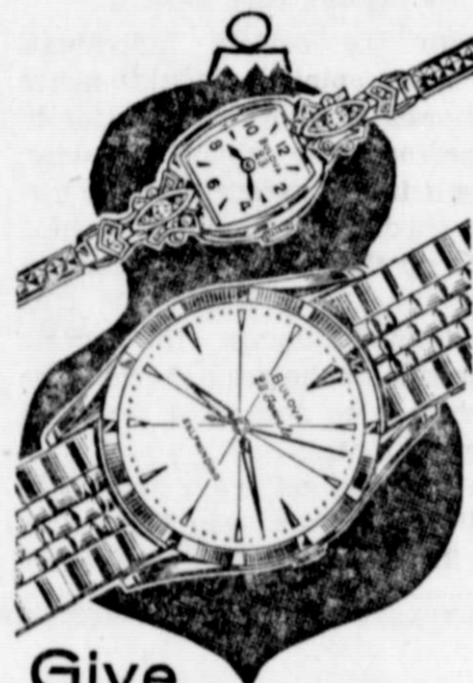

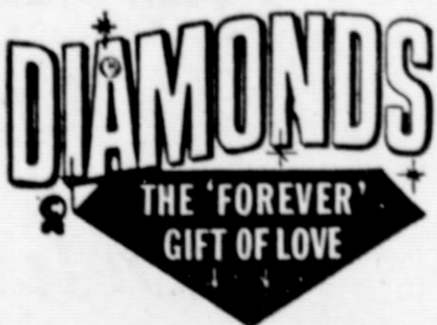

16 points.

At Campbellsport the Bells kept pace with the Indians pretty well in the first half, trailing 18-10 at the quarter and 37-30 at the intermission. Then Kewaskum turned on a 40-point assault in the final two periods to turn the game into a rout. The victors outscored the Bells in the third quarter, 20-10, and even worse in the final period, 20-6, to bring the final count to 77-46 for an easy win. Koepke again led the winners with 19 points, while Karl Ketter topped the losers with a 16-point effort. Campbellsport had 26 personals called against them and the Indians only 17. As a result Kewaskum outscored them on free throws, 23 to 12.

In other tilts Friday North Fondy shaded Random Lake, 44-41, Grafton bested Germantown, 49-40, and Pewaukee snowed under Campbellsport, 70-28. In other contests Tuesday Grafton won its fourth straight to take over first place, downing Pewaukee in a close one, 52-50, in Pewaukee's first loss; Random Lake lost its fourth in a row, 66-49, to Germantown, and

Slinger nosed out North Fondy, 51-49.

These were the last games until after the holidays. Kewaskum will resume action on Jan. 2, entertaining Lomira in a non-conference tilt, and then will return to loop play Jan. 4 at North Fondy.
