How Low Can You Go? 31 Degrees Below Zero Here

Like the words in the popular Limbo dance song ask, "How low can you go?" That is what we were wondering of the thermometer Tuesday morning when temperatures in the area dropped to 31 degrees below zero and possibly lower.

The severe cold wave followed a 4 to 6 inch blanket of fresh snow on Friday and Saturday, which kept village and county crews busy opening highways and streets. By Sunday temperatures had dropped below zero and by Monday night they had dipped to 20 to 22 below. The climax in cold weather was reached early Tuesday morning when the mercury dipped to an unofficial 31 degrees below zero. Some residents reported readings of -34 and -36 and others even below these figures. This is almost unbearably cold. It was the second coldest weather ever recorded and the lowest ever for a Jan. 15. Black River Falls, Wis., with a -50 reading, reported the lowest temperature in the state and nation. It was 20 some degrees below zero again on Wednesday morning before the bitter cold began moving out and on Thursday a change in the wind brought the mercury up over the zero mark again. The highest reading on Tuesday was approximately -10 degrees.

This second coldest wave in history turned the state into a nightmare of stalled automobiles, overworked heating plants and frost-bitten noses and hands. Local filling stations were kept busy constantly towing, pushing and starting cars Tuesday, when the temperature dropped to within one or two degrees of the lowest ever recorded on Jan. 9, 1875.

Much of the old warm clothing worn in the horse and sleigh days was taken out of moth balls as the people forgot about style and wore anything in an attempt to keep warm. Still they shivered. Hope you didn't forget to cover your tomato plants. Oh, yes, Chief Pledl reports that the ice on the river is now safe.

Power Squadron Plans Activities for Year; Local Man Commander

PILOTING COURSE OFFERED
UNDER LEADERSHIP OF
HENRY ROSENHEIMER

At a recent educational conference held by the Fond du Lac Power Squadron, educational accomplishments and aims were discussed and a 1963 program was established under the leadership of squadron commander, Henry Rosenheimer, Kewaskum, and educational officer, R. E. Ackley.

The Fond du Lac squadron is one of 300 of the United States Power Squadrons, a national, non-profit organization dedicated to increasing safety and enjoyment of boating through education. This organization conducts free boating classes for the public and advanced courses to members to increase their skill and knowledge in boating and their ability to teach others.

This year will be the eighth year of squadron educational work in this area. In previous years, advanced courses were conducted for members in seamanship, advanced piloting, navigation, engine maintenance and weather in addition to the free piloting course conducted for the public each winter.

The 1963 program includes advanced courses in seamanship, junior navigation and elements of teaching, to be announced to members, with preparation on the part of one member for teaching the recently-introduced marine electronics course.

This year's free piloting course will be held on Wednesdays from 7 p. m. to 9 p. m. at the Fond du Lac Vocational school, 52 South Portland street, with registration and the first meeting on Jan. 23. The piloting course has been newly revised to meet the specific requirements of small boatmen in this area.

Course material and instruction are furnished by the United States Power Squadrons without obligation of any kind on the part of any student.

All persons interested in furthering their knowledge and enjoyment of boating are urged to attend these classes.

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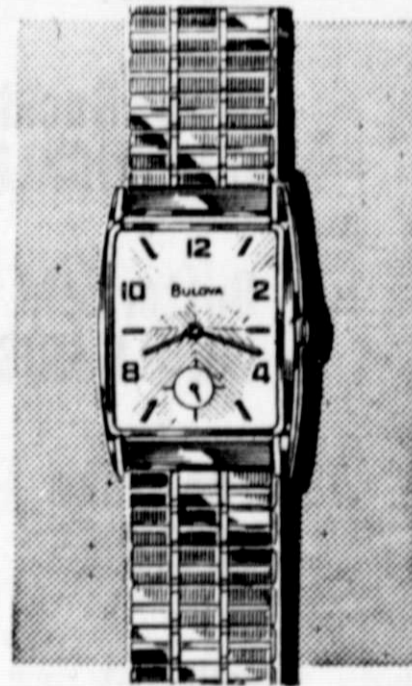

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**406 Needy Children
Of County Are Given
Happier Christmas**

**KEWASKUM ORGANIZATIONS,
INDIVIDUALS HELP
AID FAMILIES**

Robert G. Hintz, director of the Washington County Public Welfare Department, reports that 406 children of 107 needy families in Washington county were given a happier Christmas season because of the thoughtfulness and generosity of organizations and individuals throughout Washington county. Sixteen elderly families were also given help.

The welfare department acted as a liaison between needy families and organizations who wished to help needy children enjoy a full Christmas. By acting as a sort of clearing center, the department was able to prevent any overabundance of gifts being given to families, while needy children of other families experienced the bleakness of an empty Christmas. Mr. Hintz stated that the spirit in which 31 organizations in the county responded to this project was truly a reflection of the Christmas tradition of the season. Those organizations participating were:

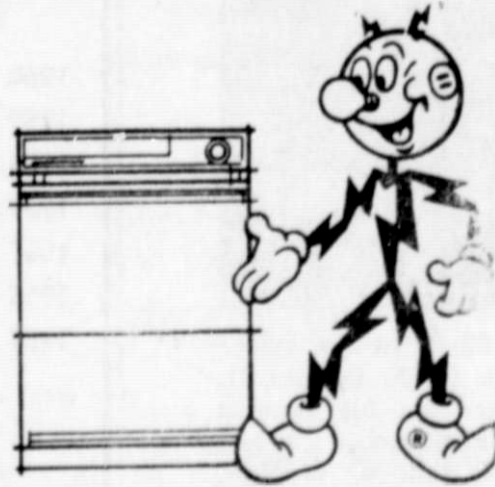

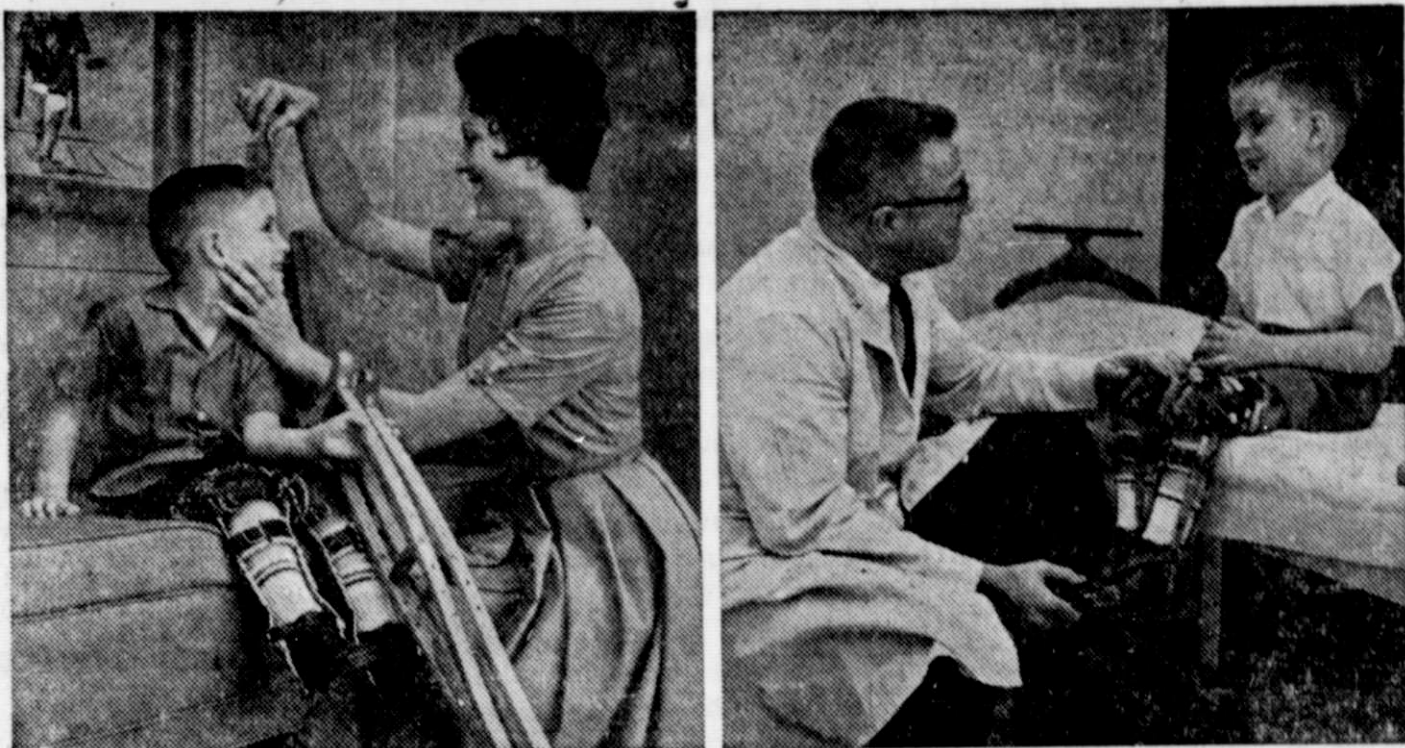

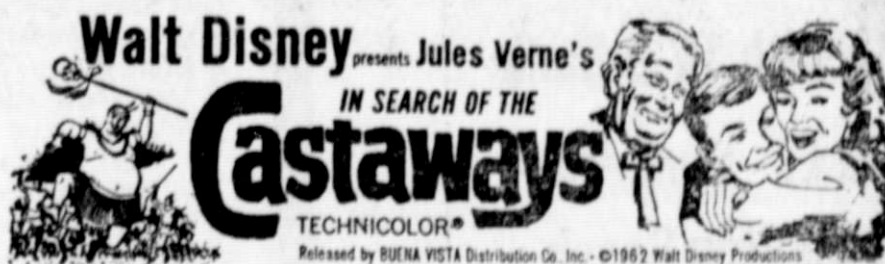

Looking Thru the Field Glasses . . .

LONG BOW, ARROW SEASON; 1,502 DEER REGISTERED

The bow and arrow deer hunter had a very long season, in fact he or she had three seasons, the first from Sept. 22 thru Nov. 13. Then if they wished they could hunt during the gun season, Nov. 17 thru 25. The late bow and arrow season was from Dec. 1 thru Dec. 31.

The bow and arrow hunters registered 959 animals in the early 53 day season and 543 in the month of December. Figures are not available for the bow and arrow kill in the gun season.

As a matter of interest, there were 311 animals registered in Juneau county, 208 in Vilas, 85 in Dodge and 3 in Washington county.

Wanted---Fishermen to Catch Winnebago Perch

Wanted experienced fishermen to harvest perch from Lake Winnebago. At present Lake Winnebago supports a large population of perch between 9 and 11 inches, but as yet no ice fishermen have found a successful method of harvesting these perch on a somewhat continuous basis. Oh, a few are caught here and there, but larger quantities of these fish should be harvested before they die a natural death and no angler will benefit.

inches are already 4 and 5 year old fish and the probability of them being around next winter is very slim. They should, however, furnish good fishing during the summer of 1963. Perch are a relatively short-lived fish. Seldom is one caught which is more than 7 years old. In Lake Mendota few live beyond 5 years.

The growth rate of these perch in Lake Winnebago has been exceptionally good with most fish weighing over one-half pound. Food seems to be no problem for the perch. A recent study showed that the perch were feeding mainly on snails, clams and lake fly larvae (redworms). All of these items are abundant in Lake Winnebago. The trick to catching these perch might be in offering them a bait that looks like a snail or clam, instead of using the ever popular small minnow or wiggler as bait.

Many Wisconsin farmers now have as many as half a dozen batteries to take care of—on tractors, self-propelled machinery and the like—says Orrin Berge, farm engineer at the University of Wisconsin.

SCHOWALTER NAMED TO ASSEMBLY COMMITTEES

Assemblyman Elmer J. Schowalter (R-Jackson) has been appointed to the assembly insurance and banking committee for the 1963 session of the state legislature. Schowalter was also named to the revision committee and to the engrossed bills committee, legislative procedure committees.

The legislative committee appointments were announced by Assembly Speaker Robert Haase (R-Marinette) who was elected to the post when the legislature convened last week.

Appointments were announced on the first day of the session to speed legislative action. More than 70 bills were introduced in the first week. CYNTHIA POSEY AWARDED SOPHOMORE HONORS AT UW

Mrs. Cynthia L. Posey, daughter of Mrs. Edith Landmann, 1458 Park View drive, Kewaskum, is among 87 students of the University of Wisconsin, Madison, who have been awarded sophomore honors for excellence of work in their studies in the university's College of Letters and Science.

Dean Edwin Young of the college, in announcing the names of the 87 letters and science students, pointed out that to be awarded sophomore honors a student must take a minimum of 20 of his 58 underclass credits in honors courses at the UW, with at least three honors credits in the humanities, three in social studies, and three in the physical or biological sciences and earn a grade of A or B in them. He must also maintain a general grade-point average of at least B or 3.0. A is the perfect grade and a grade point average of 4.00 would mean per-

fect grades in all studies. Eligibility for sophomore honors is computed on the basis of the cumulative grade point average at the end of the semester, in which a student earns his 58th credit toward graduation.

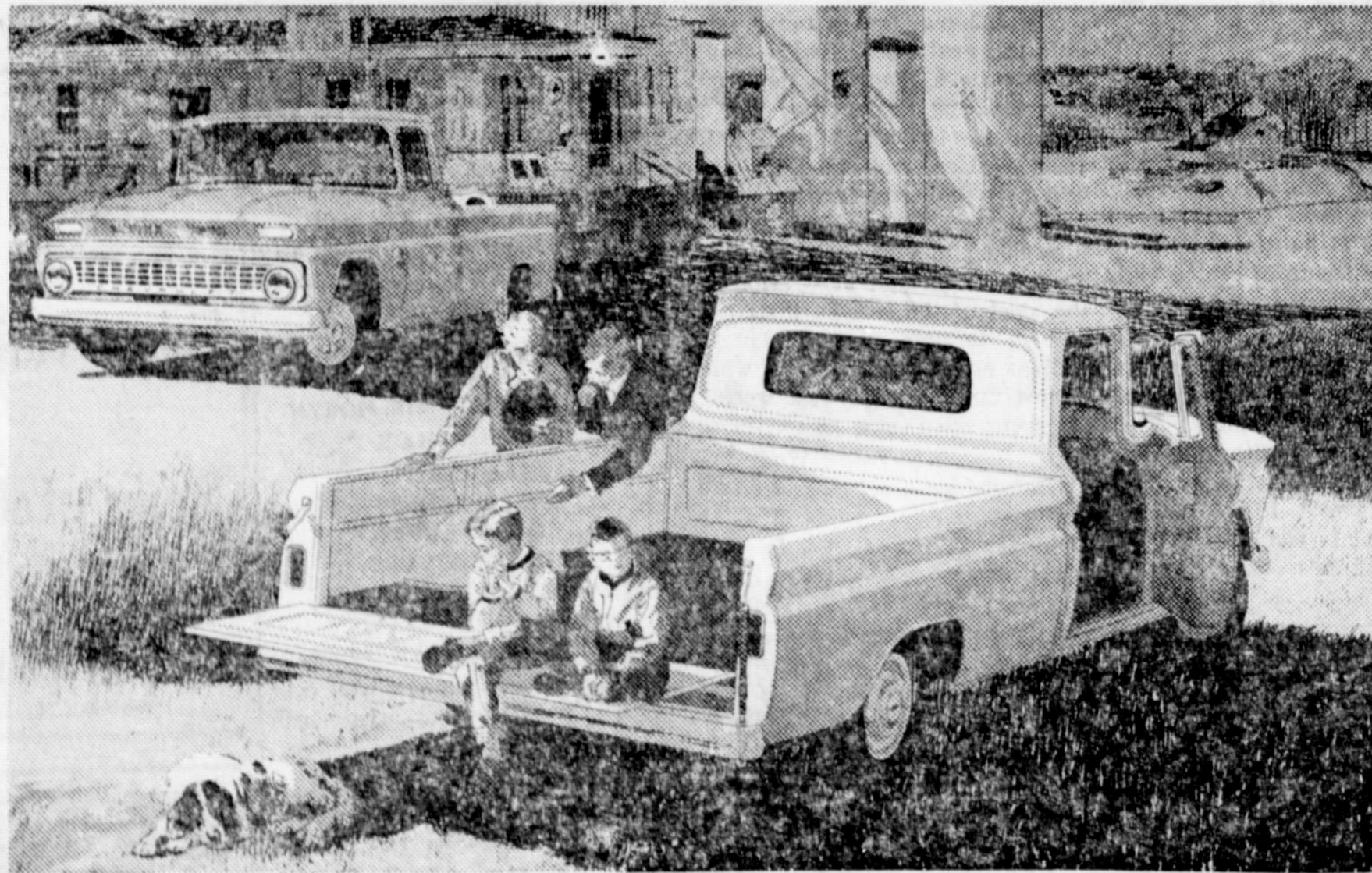
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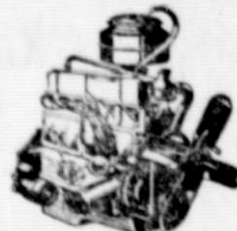
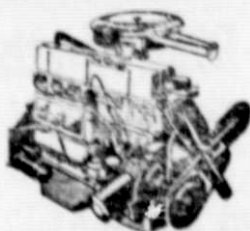
