Sabin Oral Polio Vaccine Clinic to Be Held Here Feb. 17

IMMUNIZATION AGAINST 3 TYPES PLANNED AT FIVE CENTERS IN COUNTY

Kewaskum is one of five immunization centers selected by the West Bend Junior Chamber of Commerce for a Sabin oral polio vaccine clinic, Richard Goeden, chairman, informed the Statesman this week.

On Sunday, Feb. 17, from 10 a. m. to 5 p. m. at the Kewaskum High school the Type I vaccine will be available to all citizens of this area. This vaccine program, which is given orally, has been approved by the medical staff of St. Joseph's hospital in West Bend. It also complies with the latest recommendations of the Wisconsin State Board of Health and the surgeon-general's office.

Rolland Glass is chairman of the Kewaskum clinics. A Type II vaccine clinic is scheduled for March 31 and a Type III clinic for May 26.

The purpose of the clinics is twofold. First to completely eradicate the threat of polio to our citizens and at the same time establish a long lasting immunity, making unnecessary the need for "booster shots." In order to accomplish this goal, all residents over six months of age are urged to take advantage of this opportunity, regardless of previous protection by the Salk vaccine.

Other immunization centers announced by Goeden, Jaycee chairman of this project, are the following:

West Bend—High school gym.
Jackson—Jackson grade school.
Newburg—Town hall.

Allenton—Sacred Heart church hall.

The time and dates are the same at all five locations, including Kewaskum.

To cover costs, the donation will be 25 cents per person for each immunization. Their will be no charge for persons who cannot afford it. Special "curb service" will be available for invalids and other car patients.

Available locally are informative flyers answering questions concerning this Oral Polio program. Dr. R. G. Edwards gives his full support to this program. He, along with other area doctors, will help with the immunization clinics.

The Jaycees pointed out that this is strictly a community health project. No profit is anticipated. Any funds over and above the costs will be turned over to a medical fund agreed on by the doctors and the Jaycees. The Jaycees, doctors and other personnel will be donating their services to conduct the various clinics.

Following is an article pertaining to Chief of Police Geo. F. Brandt of an incident which occurred in Kewaskum 25 years ago, in 1912, which we are reprinting from Sunday's Milwaukee Journal: "Whenever Police Chief George F. Brandt opens his mail and finds a new reward poster, he sighs and thinks of the May day in 1912 when he had 'the handcuffs on \$10,000' and didn't know it. The chief was on the trail of a farmer's stolen horse and wagon. He found them abandoned on the outskirts of Kewaskum. Probing beneath a blanket in the rig, he discovered a set of burglar tools and dynamite. Chief Brandt decided somebody would return for the tools and dynamite. He was right. The chief had not been hiding long near the rig when three rough-looking men showed up and started to climb into it. He arrested them and they were later sentenced to 2 1/2 years in the state prison at Waupun. It was learned that they planned to rob the Kewaskum bank. The men served their time but on their release from prison they were met at the gates by two Missouri police officials, who returned the trio to

that state to face a murder charge. There was a \$10,000 reward out for the arrest of the men but Chief Brandt never got any of it. He has been chief here for 35 years and in that time the buggy thieves have been the most valuable men to somebody else he has arrested."

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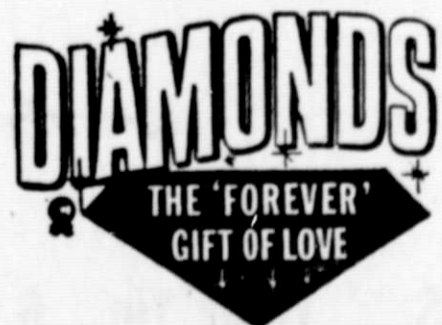

Our Police Chief Says

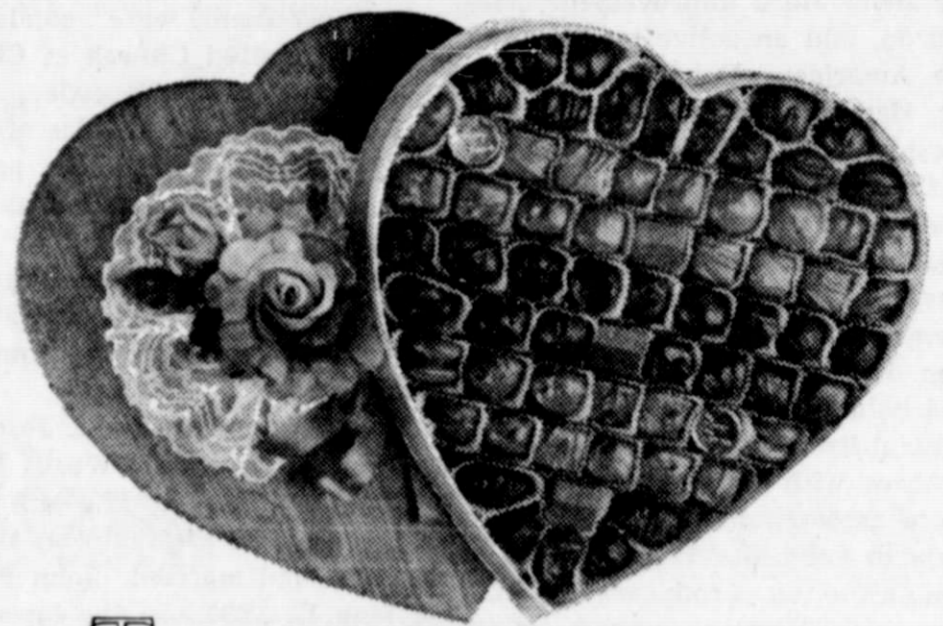

NEED SPECIAL LICENSE FOR STURGEON SPEARING

A sturgeon spearing season which requires a special license costing \$2.50 will be held on Lake Winnebago, Little Lake Butte des Morts and connecting waters downstream to the uppermost dam in the city of Appleton from Feb. 9 to March 1. Special regulations applying to this season will be issued with the license. This type of license will be available at the various depots at Oshkosh, Fond du Lac and resorts on the east and west shores of Lake Winnebago.

On Sunday, Feb. 10, there will be three fisherees in Washington county, one at the north end of Big Cedar, another on the West end of Friess lake and the third at Bark lake. With a possible chance of warmer weather, there should be large crowds on hand to increase the number of fish taken.

For the benefit of individuals who have recently moved to Washington county and wish to contact the local warden, my address is 503 South 8th ave., West Bend. Telephone Federal 4-3254.

Our Madison office advises that the re-registration of boats is proceeding, but at a snail's pace. They are receiving about 2,000 applications a week, while they should be receiving about 4,000 per week to complete the job by April 1.
