## First of Three Oral Polio Clinics Will Be Held This Sunday

VACCINE TO BE DISTRIBUTED AT FIVE CENTERS IN COUNTY

Residents of Washington county were reminded this week by the West Bend Junior Chamber of Commerce, who arranged the clinics, that the first of three Sabin Oral polio vaccine clinics will be held this Sunday, Feb. 17, at five separate centers in the county.

Type I polio vaccine will be distributed Sunday at the following places: West Bend High school, Jackson grade school, Kewaskum High school, Newburg town hall and Sacred Heart church hall, Allenton. The time of all clinics is 10 a. m. to 5 p. m. with the one exception that the Allenton clinic will begin at 11 a. m.

The purpose of the clinics is twofold—to completely eradicate the threat of polio to our citizens and at the same time establish a long lasting immunity. All persons over six months of age are urged to take advantage of this opportunity, regardless of previous protection by the use of the Salk vaccine.

In answer to many questions the following list of questions and answers are provided for your study:

Q: What is Sabin polio vaccine?

A: The vaccine is odorless and tasteless. You drink it!

Q: Why is the oral vaccine being offered at this time?

A: This is a big chance to knock out polio in our area—a chance we cannot afford to lose.

Q: What are the advantages of oral polio vaccine over other types?

A: The ease with which the vaccine is given—by mouth instead of by injection needle. More important, you are also immune from being a carrier of the disease.

## Dr. Edwards Chairman Of Heart Fund Drive

AL G. HRON, ARNOLD PROST HEAD BUSINESS, RURAL SOLICITATION

The 1963 Heart Fund campaign officially opened on Friday, Feb. 1, when Kewaskum joined with cities and villages throughout Wisconsin and the nation in the annual Wisconsin Heart association fund drive, according to R. G. Edwards, M. D., who heads the campaign here.

Dr. Edwards called upon Kewaskum residents to support the Heart Fund drive with contributions and voluntary service "because the heart and blood vessel diseases are our nation's number 1 health enemy, causing more deaths each year than all other causes of death combined."

"More than 925,000 Americans died from the heart diseases during 1961," Dr. Edwards said, "and more than 10 million living Americans are afflicted."

"Your contributions to the Heart Fund provide the means to continue and expand the Heart association's program of research which is waging a constant battle to control the heart diseases," he said.

"A tentative state goal of \$616,000 has been set for the 1963 campaign by Wisconsin Heart association," Dr. Edwards said. "Half this money will be used to support heart research studies, not only in Wisconsin, but on a national level. The remainder will be used to continue W.H.A.'s programs of education and community service."

Solicitation of business places and rural areas surrounding Kewaskum started the Heart association's fund campaign.

The business solicitation division, headed by Al G. Hron, Kewaskum, will make its calls Feb. 12-25.

The rural division, under the leadership of Arnold Prost, Kewaskum, will solicit Feb. 12-22 in a five-mile radius outside the community limits by way of letter appeal. Please return your gift promptly.

"Business has a special responsibility in the fight against heart and circulatory diseases," Hron said. "Besides causing untold human suffering, the heart and blood vessel diseases are a serious threat to our community's economic welfare. They are responsible for the loss of 69,000,000 man-days of production each year throughout the nation. The estimated cost of this lost production is more than a billion dollars, he said.

"Every businessman has a vital stake in the fight against the heart diseases," Hron said. "I sincerely hope the business leaders in our community will recognize this fact and give generously. Their contributions make possible the Heart association's programs of research, education and community service," he said.

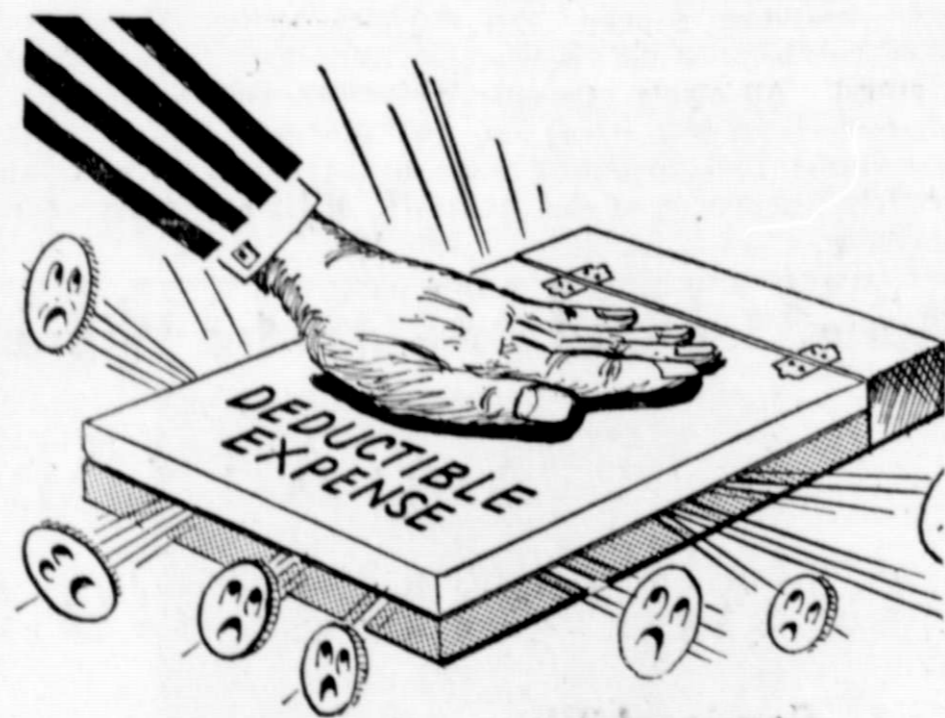

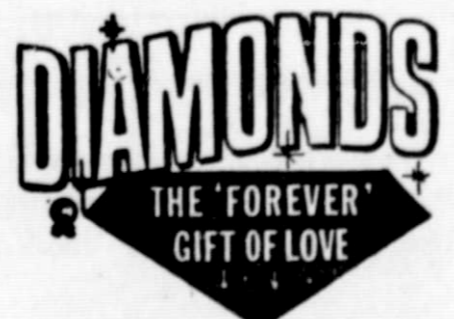

### Dog Owners Reminded To Get 1963 Licenses

All dog owners are reminded that a license for all dogs that are five months old, must be obtained from the local treasurers on or before Feb. 28, 1963. This license can be purchased at the same time that real estate taxes are paid. After that date, if no license is obtained, such dog owners will be reported to the District Attorney, as delinquent dog license owners. Thereafter, such dog owners, will be instructed to get a license from the County Clerk. An additional fee may be collected from every owner of a dog, who has failed to obtain a license prior to March 1. The license for a male dog or a spayed female is \$1.00. The license for a female dog is \$2.00. A kennel license costs \$20.00.

In 1962, 4762 dogs were licensed in Washington County, of which number 3765 dogs were males or spayed females, and 997 were females. In addition 10 kennel licenses were issued. The Town of Germantown reported 502 dogs licensed, which was the largest number licensed in any district.

The State Department of Agriculture does supply the dog tags, and a payment of 5% of the license money collected, is sent to this department. Any other expenses such as receipt books and other notices are paid from this fund. Local treasurers receive ten

cents per dog license issued. Likewise assessors receive fifteen cents per dog listed. Any surplus in the dog license fund in excess of \$1,000.00 at the end of the license year is apportioned to the taxing districts who have licensed dogs.

Dog damage payments are also paid out of this fund. Last year \$1086.90 was paid to persons who had suffered damage by stray dogs.

Q: Should people take the Sabin Oral vaccine if they have received Salk vaccine?

A: Yes! The fall-off rate of immunity from the Salk vaccine is rapid. Sabin vaccine confers greater immunity for a longer period of time, and also prevents the disease from being carried.

Q: Who should receive the Sabin vaccine?

## Local Chapter Plans Activities in Observance of National FFA Week

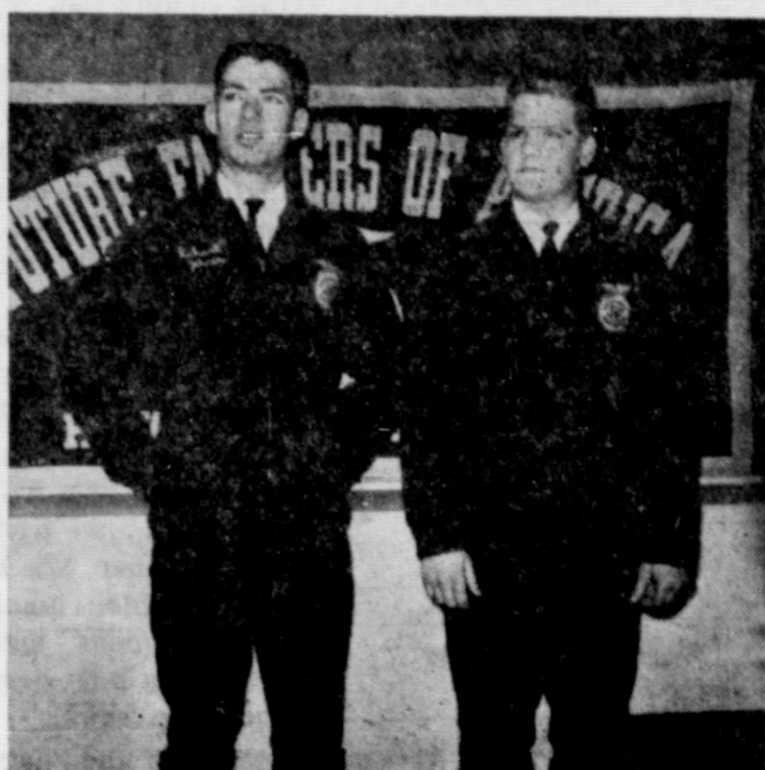


Vocational agriculture students of the Kewaskum High school will join Future Farmers of America members throughout the nation in activities to focus attention on the importance of agriculture during National FFA Week, Feb. 16-23.

"AGRICULTURE—Vital to America" is this year's FFA Week theme. The farm boys will undertake a campaign to inform the general public about the importance of the agriculture industry to America, and of the numerous and wide variety of opportunities that exist in this field for young men who have a background of farm experience and training.

We have such an abundance of food in America that people are taking farmers for granted. Actually, farming is our largest and most vital industry, and it is becoming increasingly important with our expanding population. In our area, particularly, most of the business and most of the jobs are basically dependent upon surrounding farms for their existence. Take away the farms, and for all practical purposes you would destroy the entire community.

Locally, members of the Kewaskum FFA chapter plan such things as window displays, program at Kiwanis meeting and other activities.



Membership in the FFA is made up of farm boys who are students of vocational agriculture in high school. The organization's activities are designed to help develop rural leadership and good citizenship, and to stimulate the boys to better achievement in their study and work toward successful establishment in farming or other agricultural occupations.

The Kewaskum FFA chapter has 71 members. Officers, shown in the left photo above (left to right) are: George Hiller, treasurer; Lee Schmidt, reporter; John Thorn, sentinel; Ken Metz, secretary; John Theusch, president; Russell Breit, vice-president.

The national Future Farmers organization has 383,000 members, with 9,000 local chapters in the 50 states and Puerto Rico.

Future Farmers choose the week of George Washington's birthday each year for the observance of National FFA Week. Although usually recognized as a Revolutionary War general and our first president, Washington's first love was the farm. He was one of the first in the nation to practice contour planting, crop rotations, fertilization and other soil conservation and improvement methods.

The Kewaskum chapter started in 1951 and has been participating in all phases of the FFA program of work. The state FFA recognizes outstanding individuals in the FFA program by confirming the Wisconsin Farmer degree. The award is based on leadership, co-operation, earnings and savings in his farming program, and for doing outstanding work in specific phases of his farm operation and FFA chapter.

This year the local chapter recommended two boys to the degree. Shown in the right photo above they are (left) Russell Breit, son of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Breit, R. 3, West Bend, and David Williams, R. 1, Allenton. If these two boys are selected by the state officers, they will represent the top 2% of state vo-ag boys.

The vo-ag boy takes his learning from the classroom to the farm where he applies his knowledge to projects as varied as the local agriculture. The most popular projects include swine, dairy, herd testing and field corn. This work is an integral part of FFA and classroom agriculture. This type of learning is stressed in the FFA motto, "Learning to Do, Doing to Learn, Earning to Live, Living to Serve."

In the event you know where the birds are located, and you are unable to feed them, kindly notify me and I will see that they are taken care of. Thank you.

This is the time of the year when dogs, not properly confined, raise havoc with the deer.

While we have not had the amount of snow we had the past few years, we have had lots of cold weather. We have also had a considerable number of deer killed by dogs and it now is evident dogs kill deer with or without deep snow.

Most of the dogs causing the difficulty are farm dogs, hunting dogs and just pet dogs.

We wish each of you could see a deer that had been attacked or killed by a dog. Not that a deer with its hind quarters half eaten (and sometimes still alive) is a

pleasant sight, but I believe if you could witness this you would be sure your dog was properly confined and not running deer.

Many times dogs are tracked home after running and killing deer. When the owner is confronted with the information he is amazed that his dog has done such a thing. He had no idea whatever that his dog was involved.

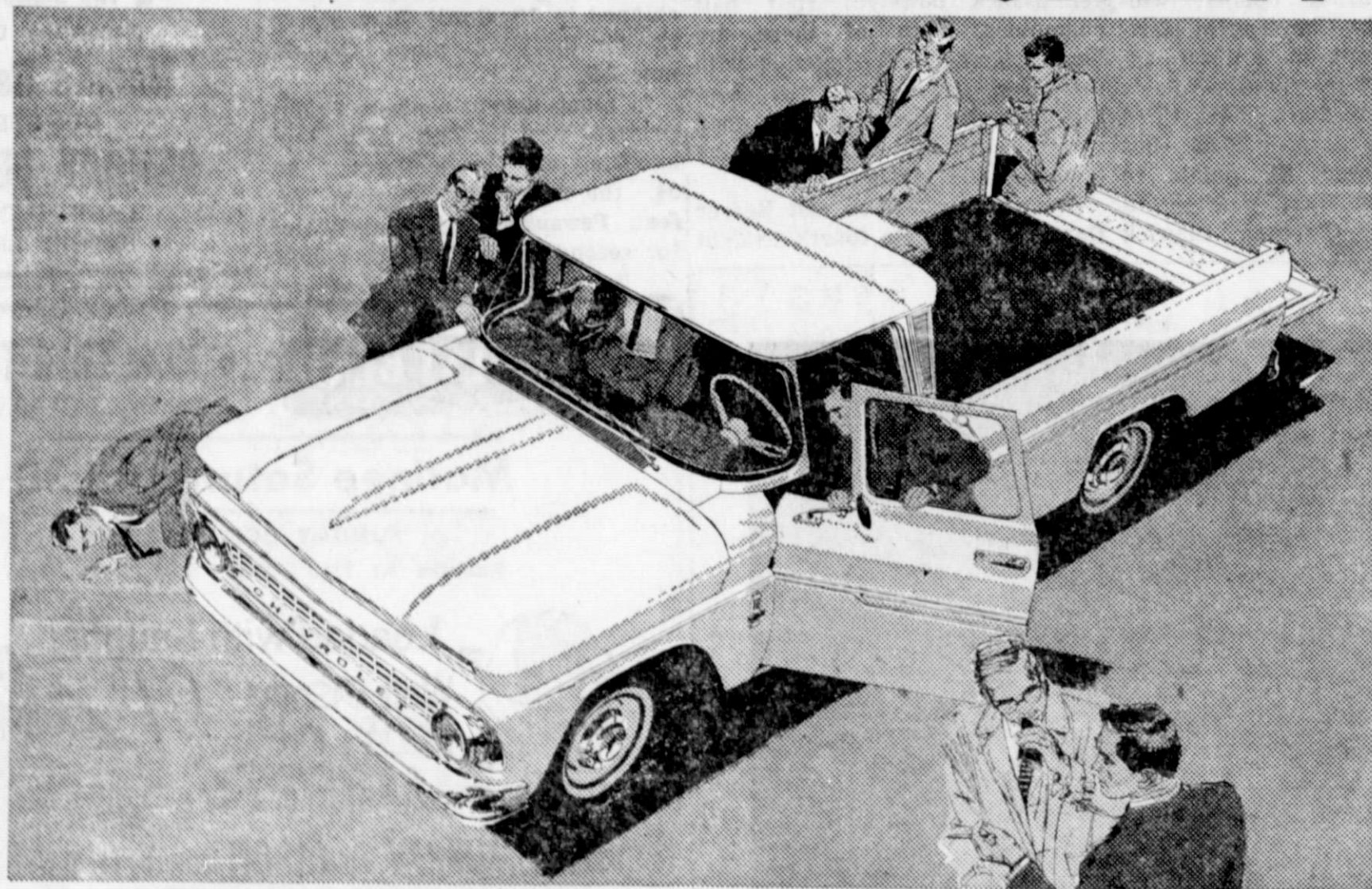

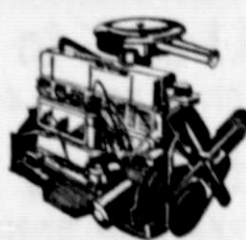
