Village Ballot To Have No Opposition

**ONLY 5 CANDIDATES FILE;
PRESIDENT REIGLE,
EBERLE RETIRE**

Friday, Mar. 15, at 5 p. m. was the deadline for filing nomination papers in the village of Kewaskum for the spring election on Tuesday, April 2. Only five candidates for office filed papers and all will be unopposed on the ballot.

Wayland D. Tessar, incumbent trustee, will be a candidate for village president to succeed James D. Reigle who will not seek re-election after holding office for several terms.

Three candidates filed papers for the three trustee offices to be elected. They are Cyril N. Wietor, incumbent, who will seek re-election, and two newcomers, Alfred "Fritz" Kral and Richard V. Reigle. The latter two will appear on the ballot to succeed Wayland Tessar, who will move up to the candidacy for president, and Joe Eberle, who is retiring after many years in office. The three remaining trustees hold over in office for another year.

The only other office to be elected will be supervisor and Elwyn M. Romaine will be unopposed for re-election.

Story of Glaciation In State Told to Club Members By Hummel

**CAMPBELLSPORT WOMAN'S
CLUB MEMBERS GUESTS;
OFFICERS RE-ELECTED**

"The Story of Glaciation in Wisconsin" was expertly told in words and pictures when Rober G. Hummel, a graduate forester of the University of Michigan, now with the Wisconsin Conservation Department at Mauthe lake, addressed a meeting of the Kewaskum Woman's club with the Campbellsport Woman's club as guests on Saturday, March 16.

Ten thousand years ago, the great glacier came creeping out of the Hudson Bay area, to cover Wisconsin with ice. "Visualize, if you will," said Mr. Hummel, "a sheet of ice thousands of feet in thickness, moving a few feet a year, and in so doing leaving its mark on Wisconsin landscape." There were two phases of the glaciers movement, he pointed out, erosional and depositional. As the giant ice mass gouged its way like a bulldozer it picked up debris of all sorts—gravel, sand and rocks. Embedded in the ice, it was carried southward to be deposited at the sides or front of the glacier.

Advancing in two lobes, the Lake Superior lobe gouged out the basins of Lakes Michigan and Superior while the Green Bay lobe moved to form Green Bay, Lake Winnebago and the Horicon Marsh. The two lobes moved alongside each other but at times pushed together. When the world warmed up and the monstrous ice withdrew—as recently as five thousand years ago, it left its imprint. The water from the melting glacier began forming streams which in time broke through the surface of the ice to eventually create the conical shaped "kames." Holy Hill and Dundee Hill are two examples. Sub-surface streams tunneling through the ice formed narrow, winding "eskers," a winding ridge across the countryside, "Parnell Esker," a few miles northeast of Kewaskum is one.

The numerous "kettles" were formed when huge chunks of ice fell from the retreating ice mass, were buried in the ground and later melted to leave the kettle-like holes. They have no inlet, no outlet. Some contain water while others do not.

Having painted a picture in the minds of his audience with his vivid and descriptive phrases, he augmented his story with the film, also entitled "Glaciation in Wisconsin." The film in color shows the beautiful terrain of what is now the Kettle Moraine country. Once a vast wasteland of white desolation, once abandoned, cold and dead with the only (Continued on page eight)

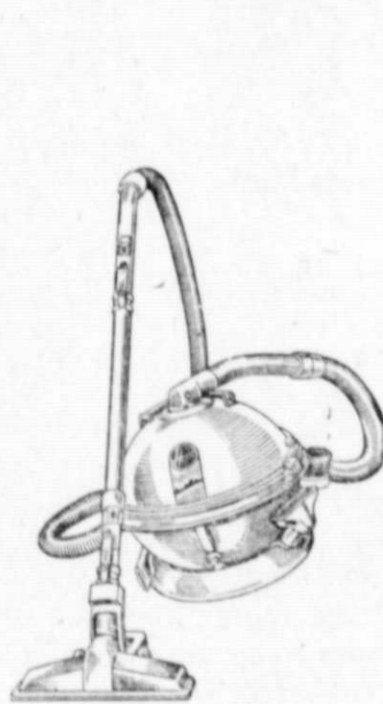

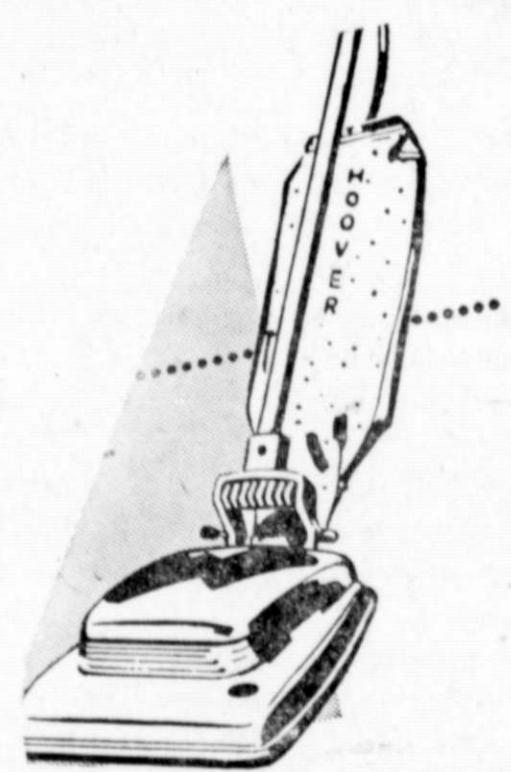

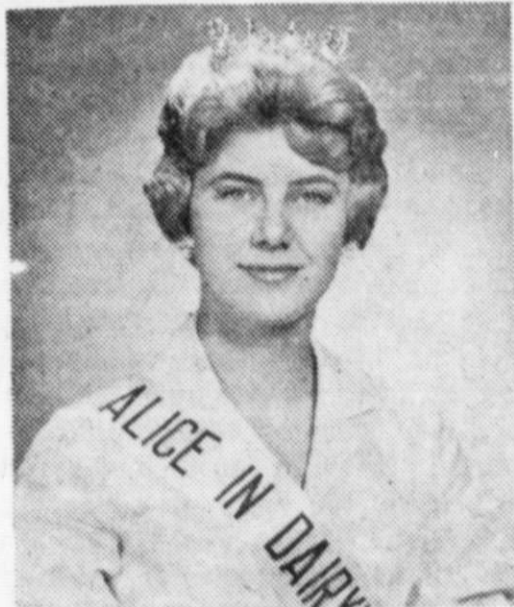

NEED SPECIAL PERMIT TO CHANGE COURSE OF STREAM

Changing the course of any navigable stream in Wisconsin requires a special permit from the Wisconsin Public Service Commission (PSC), State Office Bldg. Madison, Wisconsin.

Persons interested in ditching or dredging for flood control, drainage, or erosion control purposes should check the law before proceeding when properties are located on a stream.

The PSC may issue permits after review to determine whether public interest or riparian owners will be damaged. In all cases, a special hearing may be held on request of the conservation department.

Failure to comply with the law on changing the course of navigable streams can result in fines up to \$1,000 or six months in jail, or both. The PSC may also order illegal changes restored to their former condition and a fine of \$25 per day may be imposed for each day a violation exists.

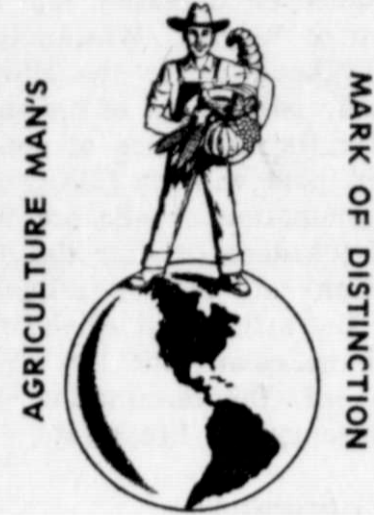
