## Record Crowd Attends Dairy Day; Judy Hohlweck Queen

### Close To 1,000 Served Free Noon Lunch; 50 Prizes Given Away

#### CAMPBELLSPORT LADY WINS CUSTARD PIE BAKING CONTEST

The fifth annual Dairy Day program sponsored by the Kewaskum Business association Saturday at the high school was the most successful held and was attended by a record crowd, not only from this community but many outlying areas, neighboring cities and surrounding counties.

The day's program got underway at 11 a. m. when the various booths and displays of the merchants and organizations opened. The entire program was all free, including the noon lunch, complete entertainment, valuable donated prizes given away and prize awards presented.

Almost 1,000 persons, the largest number ever, were served a free noon dairy lunch in the school cafeteria beginning at 11:30 a. m. Other events were held in the gym, agriculture rooms and corridors.

Following the serving of lunch, the afternoon program began at 1:15 p. m. with a concert by the high school band under the direction of Clyde A. Brehm as almost continuous entertainment was provided. Maurice Hovland, Washington county agent, introduced the Dairy Queen candidates, Alice in Dairyland, Miss Sylvia Lee, who spoke briefly; the featured speaker, Dr. Henry T. Scott, and gave a short talk himself. Roy Esser, agriculture instructor, served as master of ceremonies.

Dr. Scott, a renowned authority on food, nutrition and dairy foods, talked on the "Importance of Dairy Foods in Our Diet." Dairy products are the most important foods and the work of the dairy farmer is the most important work in the world was one of the opinions which Dr. Scott, from Madison, brought out. He added that dairy products are important to the daily diet because of their protein and calcium content. A good diet should be built around dairy foods with approximately 25 per cent of that diet using dairy foods, the speaker said. A warning against food fadists was also included in his speech and an explanation of the cholesterol problem given. He said that the body needs cholesterol, but that due to a malfunction in some bodies, an excess is produced, much the same as in diabetes and pernicious anemia. He included a request to the dairy producer to use the products which they produce.

Members of the Future Homemakers of America of the high school presented a food demonstration and style show in the cafeteria. The demonstration, "Stepping into Spring" included food hints and modeling of clothes which the girls had made. Miss Luella Leonhard, adviser, directed

Later in the evening one of the girls called us back to say they made it to Fond du Lac but their feet were too sore and they were too tired to make it back. So their girl friend drove to that city to pick them up and return them to Wauwatosa. But the girls insist they will try it again and make it both ways.

## No Opposition In Village In Spring Election Tuesday

#### SEVERAL CONTESTS IN TOWN OF KEWASKUM AROUSE MUCH INTEREST

In addition to casting ballots for a justice of the state supreme court and voting on three state referendum issues, voters will be casting ballots for village and township officials at the spring election next Tuesday, April 2.

Village polls in the municipal building will be open from 9 a. m. to 6 p. m. There will be no opposition for village offices but several newcomers will appear on the ballot, which could help bring out the voters. James D. Reigle, the incumbent village president, will not be a candidate for re-election. Wayland Tessar, incumbent trustee, is a candidate to succeed Reigle as president. Joe Eberle, veteran trustee, also is retiring from public office and will not be a candidate. This leaves Cyril N. Wietor as the only incumbent trustee seeking re-election. Other candidates for the office who are newcomers on the ballot are Richard V. Reigle and Alfred "Fritz" Kral. Elwyn M. Romaine is a candidate for re-election to the office of supervisor.

Voting hours in the town of Kewaskum will be from 9 a. m. to 5:30 p. m. at the Labor Center in the village, where the annual township meeting will also be held at 2 p. m. Opposition for every office except that of clerk has aroused considerable interest in the town and a good turnout of voters is anticipated.

Incumbent chairman Ed. J. Campbell will be opposed by Myron Belger and John Krautkramer, the latter a write-in candidate. Supervisor No. 1 Arnold Amerling will be opposed by Sylvester Fellenz. Supervisor No. 2 William Becker will be opposed by Thomas Rodenkirch. Clerk Alfred H. Seefeldt is unopposed. Forrest Brown and Florence Hansen will oppose each other for the office of treasurer to succeed Lloyd Schmidt, who is not a candidate for re-election. Donald Backhaus and Harold Bath are the candidates for assessor to succeed Roger Dobke, who is in military service.

Polls in the town of Wayne will be open from 9 a. m. to 5:30 p. m. with the annual meeting at 2 p. m. at Strobel's hall. All incumbent officers will be unopposed for re-election. They are John Oelhafen, chairman; Leo Zehren and Elmer Boettcher, supervisors; Paul Moritz, clerk; Ray Kudek, treasurer; Arnold Hawig, Jr., assessor.

In addition to voting for local officers, ballots will be cast to choose a supreme court justice. In this statewide race Harry E. Larsen and Bruce F. Beilfuss will seek election to the post. Beilfuss piled up an impressive number of votes to lead five candidates for the office in last month's primary election.

Three proposed amendments to the state constitution will also be decided by Wisconsin voters in referendums. The proposed amendments would raise the debt limits for certain local govern-

### Competes In FFA Sectional Public Speaking Contest

On Monday, Mar. 25, eight contestants competed in the sectional Future Farmer public speaking contest held at the high school in Whitewater. ### Course In Medical Self-Help For Women To Begin Here Apr. 4

What would you do if a person were injured during a disaster—manmade like war or natural like a tornado—and you couldn't get a doctor, as none were available?

Here is a program you will be interested in attending. It is called "Medical Self-Help" and is sponsored by the U. S. Public Health Service, American Red Cross, and the American Medical association, in cooperation with the Department of Defense, and the Office of Civil Defense.

The course covers eight sessions on such topics as shock, bleeding and bandaging, artificial respiration, fractures and splinting, transportation of the injured, burns, nursing care of sick and injured, infant and child care, emergency childbirth, radioactive fallout and shelter, hygiene, sanitation and vermin control, water and food.

A course in "Medical Self-Help" will begin on Thursday, April 4, at 8 o'clock in the American Legion clubhouse, with Mrs. Charles Gehrke of West Bend the instructor; and it is open to any interested women in the community. Call 626-2232 for registration. Do it today.

### Not Necessary To Have Taken Part In Type I Oral Clinic

#### NO PRIOR SALK PROTECTION REQUIRED FOR TYPE II VACCINE

It is hoped that the more than 15,000 people who took part in the first oral polio vaccine clinic will return to take the second step in the eradication of all types of polio in Washington county. Area residents are reminded that on March 31 the second Sabin oral Sunday will take place in five county locations. Location and time of the clinics are as follows:

West Bend High school gym, Kewaskum High school, Newburg town hall, Jackson school gym and Allenton Sacred Heart church hall. The time of all clinics is 10 a. m. to 5 p. m. with the exception of Allenton, which begins at 11 a. m.

This is the second phase of the oral polio vaccine program that is being sponsored by the medical staff of St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, and the West Bend Junior Chamber of Commerce. Profits above costs involved will be given to the hospital.

Anyone may take part in the Type II clinic. Type I vaccine may be taken by making arrangements with your own doctor at some time in the future if you have missed the first clinic and wish to make it up. This of course is recommended!

As was the case in the Type I clinics, no prior protection by means of the Salk vaccine injections is required to take part in the Type II clinics. It is also stated that all persons should take part in the Type II clinic, even if they have already taken the Salk program. This is because of the longer lasting protection of the oral vaccine, and the fact that it also eliminates the carrying of the disease. However, for Type III vaccine, to be distributed May 26, it is required to have had at least two Salk shots, the last one within a year. You are urged to take all three vaccines to be completely protected against the three types of polio.

The receiving of oral vaccine will not interfere with the giving of blood during the scheduled blood clinic in West Bend in April.

In order to speed up the process of registering for the drink of polio protection it is urged that if at all possible you fill out the form appearing on another page of this issue of the Statesman prior to attending the clinic. For those who cannot do this forms will again be available at the clinics.

A 25 cent drink donation is being asked of all those who take part in the program, however, no one will be turned away.

Theodore Holtebeck, 79, of 539 S. 6th ave., West Bend, former Washington county sheriff and member of the state assembly, died at St. Joseph's Community hospital on Thursday, Mar. 21, after a brief illness.

He was born in Norway on June 4, 1883 and came to this country in 1896, settling in Scandinavia, Wis. He lived there until his marriage to Clara Gunsten in Farmington, Waupaca county, on Sept. 28, 1910, following which the couple moved to West Bend, where he operated a barber shop on South Main st. for 25 years.

In 1916 Mr. Holtebeck was elected alderman of the second ward in West Bend, an office he held until 1924. He resigned at that time to become undersheriff for the late Sheriff Gust Benicke. Mr. Holtebeck was elected to serve as county sheriff in 1928 and re-elected in 1930. In 1934 he went into the insurance business in West Bend and was active in that capacity until the time of his death. He was again elected to serve as second ward alderman in 1936. In 1944 he was elected to the Wisconsin state assembly and served in the legislature for three terms until 1950.

He leaves his wife, a sister, a brother and other relatives. A child died in infancy.

Funeral services were held at Trinity Lutheran church, West Bend, at 2 p. m. Monday with the Rev. Christian Meyer officiating. Burial with Masonic graveside rites was in Union cemetery in that city.
