Regal Ware to Award \$1,000 In Scholarships to Local High School Seniors Each Year

Award May Continue Thru College at Value Of \$4,000 to Student

**AWARDS TO BE KNOWN AS
J. O. REIGLE SCHOLARSHIPS,
FIRM ANNOUNCES**

Kewaskum High school seniors, commencing with the class of 1963, will be eligible for scholarships totaling \$1,000 per year under a plan announced this week by Regal Ware, Inc. The new awards, to be known as the J. O. Reigle Scholarships, have been established by the firm to recognize the outstanding achievements of one or more students from each Kewaskum High school graduating class, and to assist them in obtaining college educations.

The scholarships will provide each of two students \$500.00 toward their first year's college expenses. It may then be continued each year for the remainder of a four year course if grades, activities and conduct meet the standards of the Scholarship committee. If only one student is selected from a class, the award will be \$1,000 per year. Thus, the new scholarships have a potential value of from \$2,000 to \$4,000 for the recipients.

Eligibility requirements are as follows:

1. Student must be a graduating senior.
2. Student must have attended Kewaskum High school for the two previous years.
3. Student must have a "B" average for the first 3½ years of high school work. (The Scholarship committee may, at its discretion, make an exception to this rule and choose a student with less than a "B" average).
4. Student must meet the entrance requirements of, and attend, a college or university recognized by the North Central association, or one of equally high scholastic standards.

Interested students who meet the qualifications may make application for the scholarships between April 1 and May 1. Selection of the winners will be made by the Scholarship committee, consisting of two representatives of the school administration and two representatives of Regal Ware, Inc. Presentation of the awards will be made at commencement exercises.

Sengpiel Dog Wins 8 Trophies, Prizes In National Show

Wisconsin dogs were among the 3,000 who competed under the huge roof of the Amphitheater at the Union Stock Yards in Chicago over the week end in the country's largest dog show. More than 100 entries were posted and put through their paces Saturday and Sunday which is sponsored annually by the International Kennel Club of Chicago.

Thousands of dollars in cash prizes and more than 1,000 trophies were awarded and Wisconsinites returned home with their share of the loot.

Loaded down with silver bowls, bronze medallions and ribbons were Ned and Jerry Sengpiel of Kewaskum, who won eight beautiful trophies and cash awards. Their Great Dane brindle bitch, Tig-Mer's Tiger Lilly, only 14 months old, was judged the best bitch and second best Great Dane out of an entry of 105 in the show.

From a first in the open class brindle bitch, she went to winner's bitch, best of winners and best of opposite sex, winning five points toward her championship.

The show brought together 113 breeds and their varieties. When the dogs were not in the show ring, spectators (about 40,000) crowded around the stalls where the animals were benched to ask questions and just look, some of them looking for pets of their own. Besides watching the judging and obedience contests, visitors saw whippet and afghan dogs sprint over a 200 yard dirt course. The indoor field trials were staged in an unusual manner. A 50,000 square foot area was converted with earth, trees and shrubs to provide hunting cover for game. The tank for water retrieving tests had live mallard ducks.

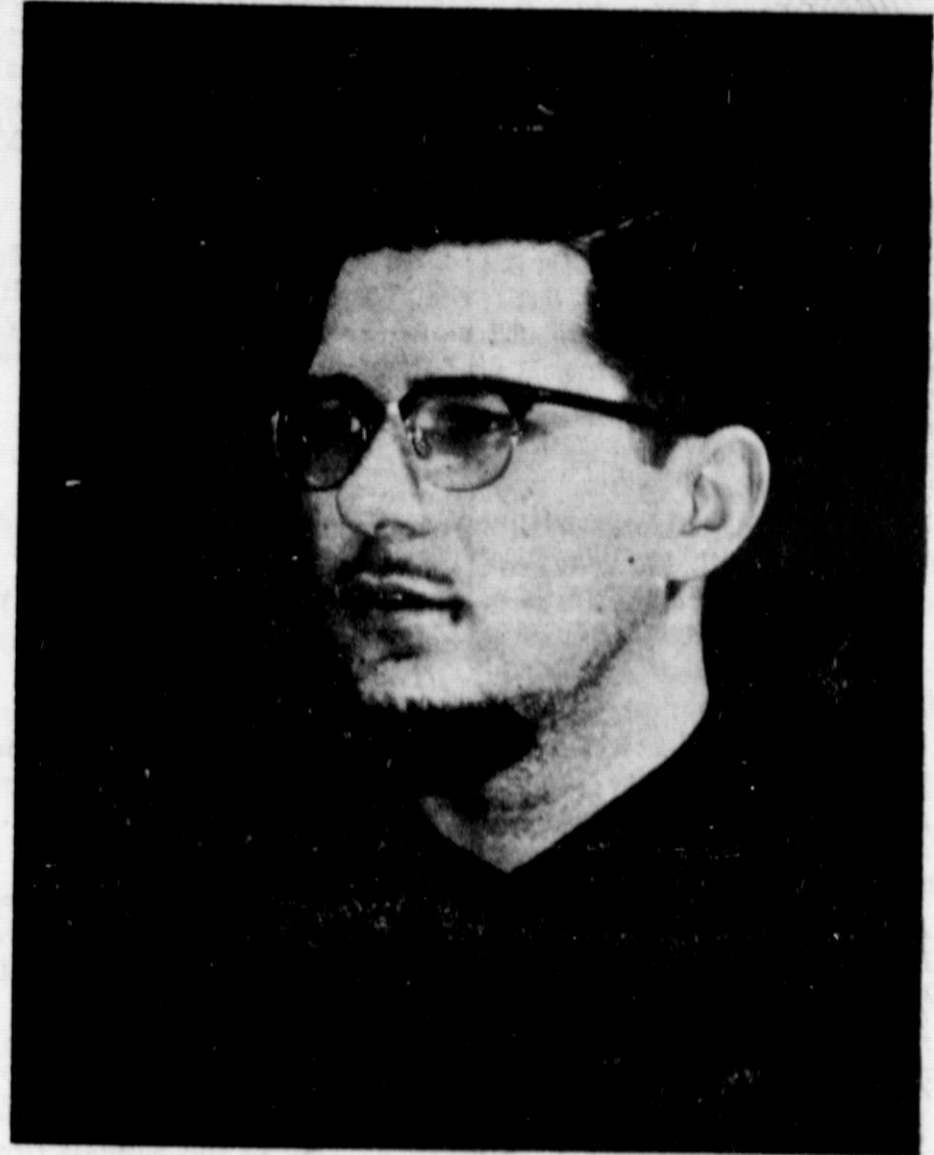

T. Auburn Capuchin To Be Ordained to Priesthood Apr. 20

**FR. PESCH IS FIRST PRIEST
TO BE ORDAINED FROM ST.
MATTHIAS PARISH**

On Saturday, April 20, at St. Mary's church, Marathon, Wis., a young man from this area will be ordained a priest of the Capuchin Franciscan Order by The Most Reverend John P. Treacy, bishop of La Crosse. He is Fr. Elroy (Ralph) Pesch, O. F. M., Cap., son of Mr. and Mrs. Elroy H. Pesch of R. 2, Campbellsport, town of Auburn.

Father Pesch attended East Valley grade school, town of Auburn. In 1950 he entered St. Lawrence seminary, Mt. Calvary. In the fall of 1954 he entered the Capuchin Franciscan Order, making his first year of novitiate at St. Bonaventure Friary in Detroit, Mich. After novitiate he attended college at St. Felix seminary in Huntington, Indiana, where he received a bachelor of arts degree in philosophy. He began his theology studies at St. Anthony's seminary in Marathon, Wis. in the fall of 1959. Fr. Pesch is the first

priest to be ordained from the St. Matthias mission church, town of Auburn.

Father Pesch will celebrate his first Solemn High Mass on Sunday, April 21, at 11:30 a. m. at Holy Trinity church, Kewaskum. Fr. Walter N. Morgan, pastor of St. Matthias parish, Auburn, will be the assistant priest. Fr. Salvatore Schlaefler, O. F. M., Cap., and Fr. Romuald Simon, O. F. M., Cap., both of whom are missionaries in Bluefields, Nicaragua, C. A., will be deacon and sub-deacon. Brother Isidore Herriges, O. F. M., Cap., will be master of ceremonies. The sermon will be preached by Fr. Edward Goeden, O. F. M., Cap., a native of West Bend and now professor at St. Mary's seminary, Crown Point, Ind.

Friends and relatives are invited to attend the open house reception to be held at Holy Trinity parish hall, Kewaskum, from 2:30 to 4:30 p. m., followed by Solemn Benediction at 4:30 p. m.

The newly ordained priest will return to St. Anthony seminary to finish his theology studies. He will then receive temporary assignment for the summer months. In September he will begin a year of pastoral training at St. Francis Friary, Milwaukee.

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Gunshot Wounds Fatal to Youth, Formerly of Here

Larry Lee Gibon, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leroy Gibon of Amberg, Wis. died Friday, March 29, in Marinette General hospital from accidental gunshot wounds received two days before at his home.

Now residing at Amberg, the Gibson family formerly lived on the former John Koepke farm on Hwy. 45 north of Kewaskum, until 1957. Larry attended the Gage school in the town of Auburn and often remarked that his favorite teacher through life was Mrs. Jack Tessar of Kewaskum, who taught at the school at that time, according to his father. The youth's sister, Georgia, graduated from Kewaskum High school and was a member of the queen's court for homecoming in 1957.

According to Larry's father, who was in Kewaskum Saturday and stopped at this office to report the tragedy, he found the boy lying wounded in the yard when he returned home. How the accident occurred could not be determined as there was no one present at the time. But Larry had been out shooting with the gun during the day. He had a wound in his back and another at the base of the skull. His father rushed him to the hospital but he never regained consciousness.

Larry was born Dec. 25, 1946 in Milwaukee. Surviving are his parents and two half-sisters, Mrs. Jeanne Murouski of Milwaukee and Mrs. Georgia Kunz of Boston, Mass. Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Tuesday, April 2, at the Morasky Funeral home at Wausauke. Burial was in the Amberg cemetery.

622 Persons Visit Historymobile Here

Historymobile II, the traveling museum of the State Historical Society of Wisconsin, is breaking all previous attendance records on its tour of the state this year.

As of March 10, after 188 days on the road, the unit had been visited by 208,792 people in 176 communities. Last year's attendance at the end of 188 days was 163,381. Last year's exhibit topped all previous records with an attendance of 199,346 in 223 communities. By the end of May of this year the unit will have visited 228 cities and villages in the state.

Historymobile II, a giant, new unit consisting of an International truck and a 12 by 52 foot Marshfield Homes trailer, both donated by their manufacturers and dealers, this year features the theme, "Newspapers Make History, 1833-1962." The tour is being financed by the Wisconsin (weekly) Press association and the daily newspapers of the state.

On its visit to Kewaskum recently, sponsored by the Kewaskum Statesman, Historymobile II was visited by 622 people, including 100 adults and 522 children.

CLUB TO SPONSOR GIRL AT GIRLS STATE; DELEGATES, COMMITTEES NAMED

The girls of the senior class, with their mothers, were honored guests of the Kewaskum Woman's club at its annual Senior Girls' Tea on Saturday, April 6, and heard Mrs. Kenneth Reed of Kenosha, a mother of four young boys and an officer in the state organization of Federated Women's Clubs, elaborate on an old adage, "never underestimate the power of a woman." Speaking of the united potential power of women, she stated, "if all women did their part, nothing would be impossible. Anything they would set out to do, could be accomplished," admitting "there is no fury like a woman's fury."

"I am thoroughly convinced," Mrs. Reed continued, "that participation in your community affairs is as important as your role as a homemaker." Simply put on the brakes, turn around and go down the single path to eternity, clutching a part of maturity as you continue," she admonished.

Though her message was serious in nature and directed primarily to the young women in her audience, her lively remarks were meaningful to all. Mrs. Reed interspersed her message with humor and her vivaciousness was apparent throughout.

MANY GAME BIRDS, ANIMALS KILLED IN WEST BEND FIRE

About nine days ago a grass fire started at the dump in the town of West Bend. The fire ran east to the next town road, (nearly a mile) before it was brought under control by the West Bend fire department. A considerable amount of grass and marsh land was burned. It is surprising the number of birds and animals that are lost from a fire. Individuals reported finding a dead deer, a large mink, three pheasants, two opossum and a skunk. It is hard to tell how much more wildlife perished that was not found. It sears their lungs and kills them at once. The hair, feathers or skin show very little indication of fire damage. You can imagine the loss in those large forest fires that occur in Canada and the western states each fall.

Must Report Boat Accidents

Section 30.67 of the Wisconsin Statutes requires the reporting of boating accidents. This is not a new law. It is part of the Wisconsin Boating Law which went into effect on April 1, 1960.

We have been patient indeed. Each year a great deal of correspondence has been written and numerous telephone calls have been made requesting these reports from individuals involved in boating accidents.

It is now necessary that we take a firm stand on this matter. This law will be enforced and arrests will be made when reports are not made in complete compliance with the law.
