Find Weather Balloon On R. Schleif Farm

Roger Schleif found a weather balloon Wednesday in a field on his farm on County Trunk V north of Kewaskum. He called the Statesman office Wednesday afternoon to report finding the object and then brought it in Thursday morning for examination. It is a box type object of light material containing much mechanism and wiring with attached parachute and balloon (which had burst).

A letter was attached to the box saying that the instrument is used to measure ozone in the air at various heights from the ground. It was sent aloft from Bedford, Mass. and drifted all the way to the Schleif farm before falling to the ground. The letter requested that the finder remove the parachute, put the instrument in a cardboard box and mail it to Air Force Research, Cambridge Laboratory, CRZH LG, Hanscom Field, Bedford, Mass.

Schleif reported that he would mail the instrument back to its source at the address listed.

2 LOCAL STUDENTS AWARDED GOLD

MEDALS IN STATE SPEECH CONTEST

More than 600 high school students out of an original 1,450 entrants in the annual State Spring Speech contest were awarded gold medals Saturday, Apr. 27, by the Wisconsin High School Forensic association (WHSFA) on the Madison campus of the University of Wisconsin.

The largest contest to date included representatives from 360 Wisconsin high schools and climaxed successive elimination events held throughout the state

since last February.

Frederick E. Haug, executive secretary of WHSFR (an affiliate of the University of Wisconsin Extension Division), officiated during the day-long sessions. The 62 judges were selected from the faculties of the UW at Madison, the UW-Milwaukee, Marquette university, and the Wisconsin state colleges.

Participants rated "A" received gold medals; "B" and "C" certificates of achievement.

Nine different speaking events included declamation, original oratory, non-original oratory, extemporaneous speaking, interpretative reading of poetry, four minute speech, play reading, public address, and interpretative reading of prose.

Two Kewaskum Community High school students were rated "A" and awarded gold medals in original oratory. They are Georgia Malamaki, AFS student from Greece, and Mariel Seefeldt.

25 Years Ago

April 29, 1938

William A. "Bill" Chandler, head basketball coach at Marquette university, Milwaukee, was the principal speaker at the annual Kewaskum High school basketball banquet held at the Republican House. Chandler is one of the nation's outstanding coaches.

Release of \$75,000 by the state for the beginning of the long time task of creating one of the most unusual parks and forests in America, the Kettle Moraine region, which extends through Washington and five surrounding counties, was announced in Madison. Several crews are already at work, some of them in Fond du Lac county, preparing the outline of the vast area which eventually will become one of the leading recreation centers in the country. The state conservation department expects to acquire most of the land needed for the forest at about \$20 an acre.

A transaction was completed in which William A. Backhaus of the town of Auburn, residing near Gage school, purchased the residence owned by Wm. F. Backus on West Water st. The house contains a double flat, the Edmond Buslaff family occupying the upstairs. Wm. Backus will remain in the lower flat until June when he will leave for Cedarburg to live with his son, Dr. A. D. Backus,

and family. The new owner will continue to operate his farm this summer and take possession of the local residence later.

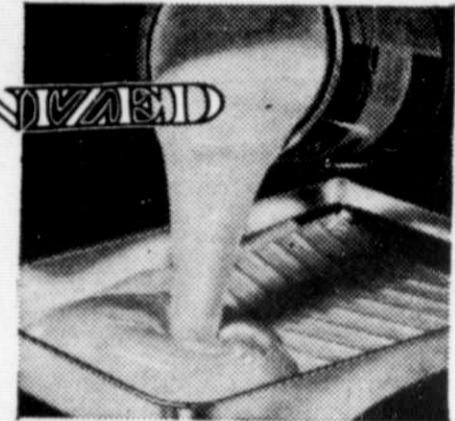

FISHING SEASON OPENS SATURDAY

In the event weather conditions are good a large number of fishermen should be on our lakes and streams this Saturday, May 4. Trout were planted in Wallace lake on March 8 of this year. A planting was also made at the Alenton creek on April 24.

Walleyed pike fishing should be good at Little Cedar and Pike lakes, bass at Big Cedar, Lake Five and Friess lakes. Northerns will be taken on the Milwaukee river, Big Cedar, Leow's lake and the Oconomowoc river.

The season for crawfish is open all year except in Manitowoc county. The open season for taking frogs is from May 4 to Dec. 31.

The season on most species of game fish open at 12:01 a. m. Saturday, May 4, in the inland waters south of Highway 64.

This includes black bass (both large and smallmouth), walleye and sauger pike, northern pike, muskellunge, and trout.

Trout fishermen will probably outnumber other fishermen, especially in this area; and because of the more liberal seasons on the Wolf and Fox rivers, most fishermen have already tried their luck at the other species.

Because of the almost complete lack of rain this spring, the streams are low and clear and the trout will scare easily.

The early birds will have the

best catches. Once the crowd is present on the streams, the trout will spook and be much harder to catch.

A few words of warning. Be sure you have a current fishing license. While the bag limit on trout is 10, no more than 5 may be rainbows.

If you use a boat, be sure it has been registered for the new numbering period, and be sure you have the new certificate of number available for inspection, and also be sure you have a coast guard approved life preserver for each person in the boat.

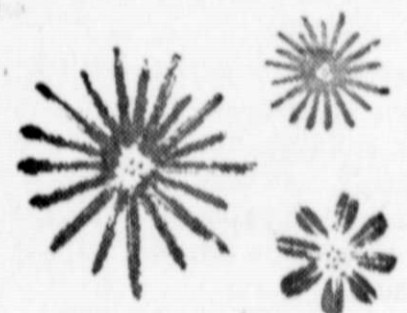

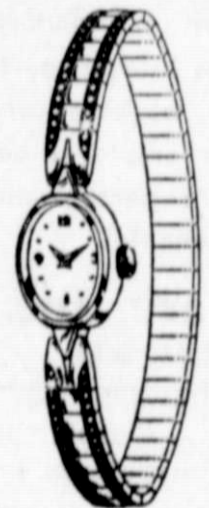

The Braves' next home opponents, the San Francisco Giants, haven't fared much better, losing 128 times.
