To Honor Mrs. Tessar May 22 at Milwaukee Elks Club Luncheon

RETIRING STATE PRESIDENT
OF VFW AUXILIARY HAS
VISITED 70 WISCONSIN
CITIES, MANY STATES

Mrs. Jack J. Tessar, Kewaskum, state president of the Ladies Auxiliary to the Veterans of Foreign Wars, will be honored at a 12 o'clock luncheon Wednesday, May 22, at the Milwaukee Elks Club.

For 27 years the 33 Milwaukee county auxiliaries have honored department leaders at the termination of their administration. Mrs. Tessar will conclude her term of office at the Kenosha state convention June 26-29. Mrs. Jesse James, 3109A N. 28 St., is general chairman of this year's testimonial, which will be attended by 300 women from throughout the state.

Since assuming office last June 30 in Superior, Mrs. Tessar has visited seventy Wisconsin cities in the state's 10 congressional districts, participating in organizational and civic affairs. Her itinerary was curtailed because of a fractured right arm received in an automobile accident while enroute to Toledo, Ohio, last November to represent the department at a regional V. F. W. conference. Her out-of-state travels also included the 49th national auxiliary convention in Minneapolis and a national conference in Washington, D. C.

Distinguishing her year was the presentation of a \$3,000 ambulance, modified to accommodate wheel chair and litter patients, which Mrs. Tessar made March 18 to Madison V. A. hospital. Official visits to Wood and Tomah V. A. hospitals and the G. A. A. Home were included in her itinerary. An elementary school instructor in special education, Mrs. Tessar has continued an active interest in the educational field and in her church and women's club activities.

Following the luncheon Mrs. Tessar will depart for the V. F. W. National Home at Eaton Rapids, Mich., where she will present two \$300 scholarships in behalf of the state women's group, to two high school graduates of the home. Accompanying her will be Mrs. Charles Folman, Burlington, chief of staff; Mrs. Walter Bartz, Edgerton, First district president, and Mrs. Fabian Sonntag, Sheboygan, historian.

Oral Vaccine Will Be Given May 26 at Final Polio Clinics

Residents of the Kewaskum area and Washington county were reminded this week that the third and final round of oral polio clinics will be conducted on Sunday, May 26.

The West Bend clinic will begin at 10 a. m. and run until 5 p. m. The clinics at Jackson, Allenton, Newburg and Kewaskum will close at 3 p. m. The Allenton clinic will not get underway until 11 a. m. Those planning to take the Type III vaccine should be sure to attend the Sunday clinics, as no make-up clinics are planned.

The Washington county clinics have followed the standards set down by the Wisconsin state board of health, which recommends that individuals have at least two doses of Salk vaccine before receiving Type III oral vaccine. The last injection of Salk vaccine should have been given within one year before the May 26 oral clinic. Those having questions concerning the taking of the Type III vaccine are urged to consult their family doctor.

The sponsors of the Sabin oral clinics are the West Bend Junior Chamber of Commerce and the medical staff of St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend. They are hopeful of having upwards of 10,000 county residents on hand for the May 26 clinic.

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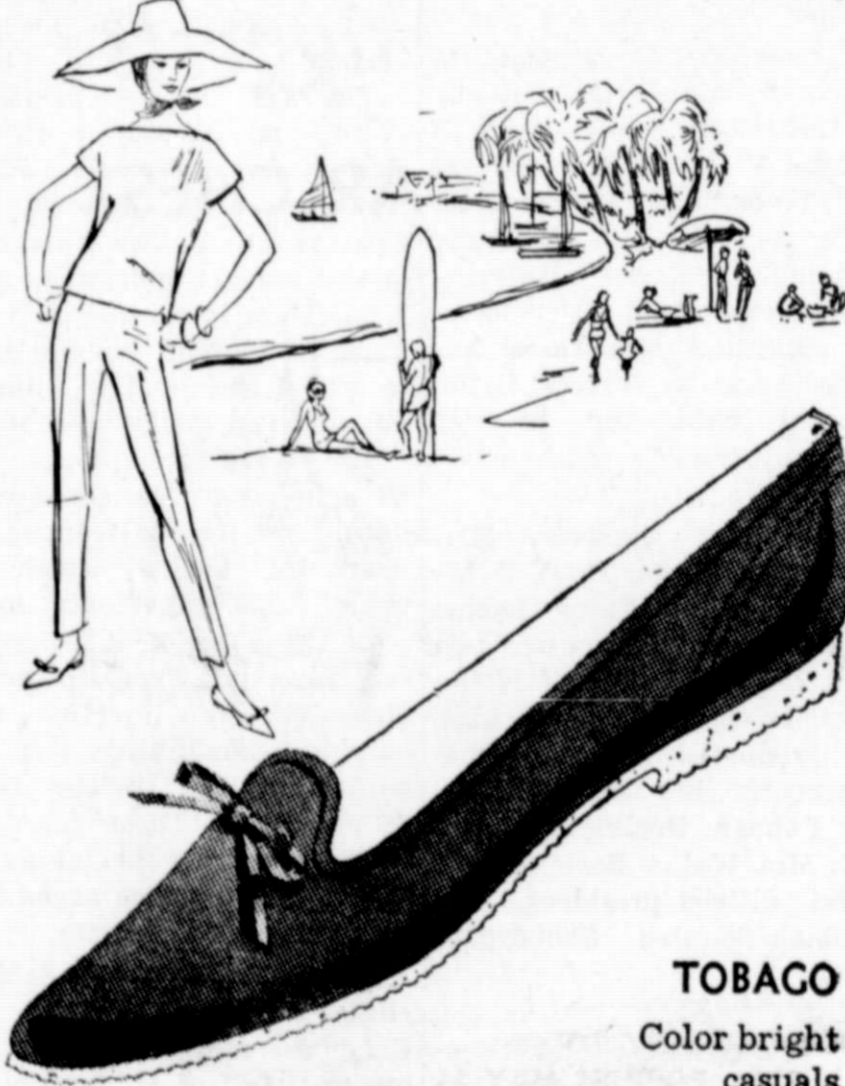
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Local Quartet To Sing in "Girl Crazy"

Transportation Study Survey Starts In County Next Week

70,000 HOUSEHOLDS WILL BE SENT QUESTIONNAIRES

During the week of May 20 every householder in Washington county (with the exception of the town and village of Germantown) will receive in the mail a questionnaire, addressed to them by name and address from the Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning commission. In all 70,000 households in southeastern Wisconsin will be sent questionnaires.

This questionnaire, which is completely confidential, will inquire principally as to the origin and destination of all travel made by all the persons in the household on the day specified. It is absolutely essential to the success of the study, which will cost about \$250,000.00 that the questionnaire be answered frankly and promptly and that it be returned to the SEWRPC for which purpose a postpaid envelope will be enclosed.

The town and village of Germantown because of their proximity to the Milwaukee metropolitan area will be surveyed on a selected basis by home interviewers and for this reason will be excluded from the mail survey.

The information collected will

be converted to data processing punch cards and will be used to develop a workable long range plan to guide the construction of highways in the southeastern Wisconsin region, and will make it possible to analyze the transportation problems of the area in great depth. The study will also furnish data needed to solve drainage, flood control, sewer, water supply, land use and other resource related problems.

"In the face of the tremendous population growth facing us in southeastern Wisconsin, good sound planning is imperative at this point," George C. Bortreau, Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission chairman, said. "And the success of the commission's transportation study is the first and most vital step in sound planning. We cannot plan without projection and we cannot project the area's future transportation needs without the full cooperation of the residents of southeastern Wisconsin."

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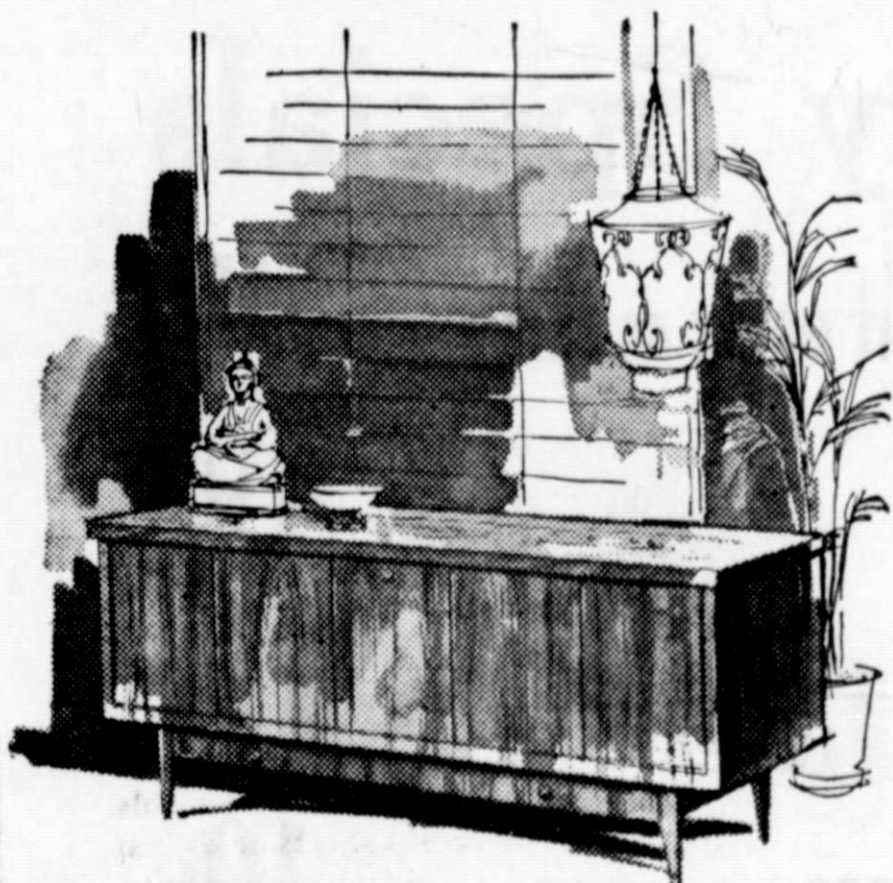
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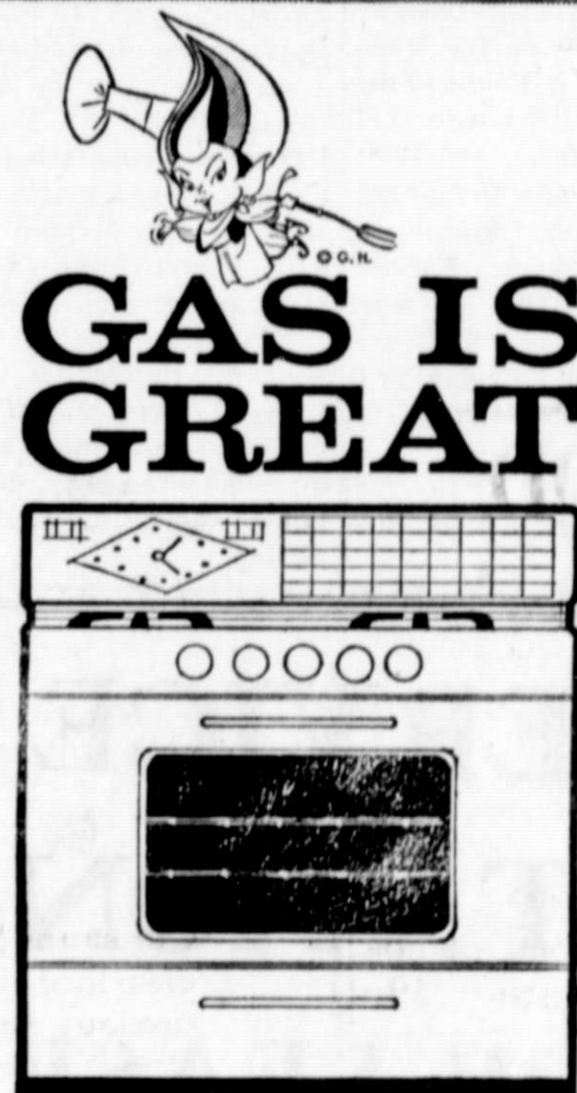

Close to 200 Attend Meeting Here of Recreation Group

Close to 200 persons attended the meeting of the Northern Kettle Moraine Recreation association Monday evening at Babe's Opera House in Kewaskum to promote "tourism" and recreation in this region. The meeting was one of several held by the group of 115 businessmen from the Kettle Moraine area.

Richard Edwards, Kewaskum, president of the association, opened the meeting, who turned it over to Robert Hummel, director of the Northern Kettle Moraine State Forest. He introduced the speaker of the evening, Roman Koenings, state superintendent of forests and parks.

Koenings, who has been with the State Conservation Commission for 17 years, discussed the development of the Kettle Moraine State Forest, taxes and tax problems concerning the Kettle Moraine area and the proposed Ice Age National Park. A question and answer period followed his talk.

Other public meetings have been held by the Northern Kettle Moraine Recreation association on deer, fish and wildlife management as well as water skiing and boating.

Care of Your Bicycle

1. **SADDLE**—Adjust to body and tighten all nuts.
2. **HANDLE GRIPS**—Replace worn handle grips. Cement them on tightly.
3. **WARNING DEVICE**—Be sure it works properly.
4. **HANDLE BARS**—Adjust to body. Tighten and keep stem well down in fork.
5. **FORK BEARINGS**—Lubricate
6. **LITE**—Must be visible for 500 feet.
7. **SPOKES**—Replace broken ones promptly.
8. **TIRES**—Inflate to correct air pressure. Remove imbedded metal, glass, cinders, etc.
9. **TIRE VALVE**—Inspect often for leaks.
10. **CRANK HANGER**—Keep clean and greased. If it wobbles, have serviceman make adjustments.
11. **PEDALS**—Lubricate and tighten pedal bearings and spindle. Replace worn pedal treads.
12. **CHAIN**—Check for damaged links. Secure snug fit. Clean and lubricate frequently.
13. **REFLECTOR or TAIL LITE**—Must be visible for 300 feet.
14. **COASTER BRAKE**—Does it brake evenly? Unless you're an expert, have it adjusted by a serviceman.
15. **WHEELS**—Eliminate wobble. Tighten nuts and oil bearings.

Rules of the Road

1. **Observe all Traffic Regulations**—red and green lights, one way streets, stop signs.
2. **Keep to the Right** and ride in a straight line. Always ride in single file.

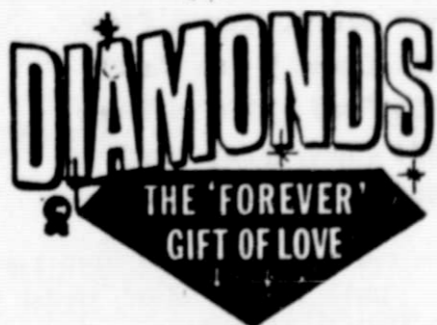

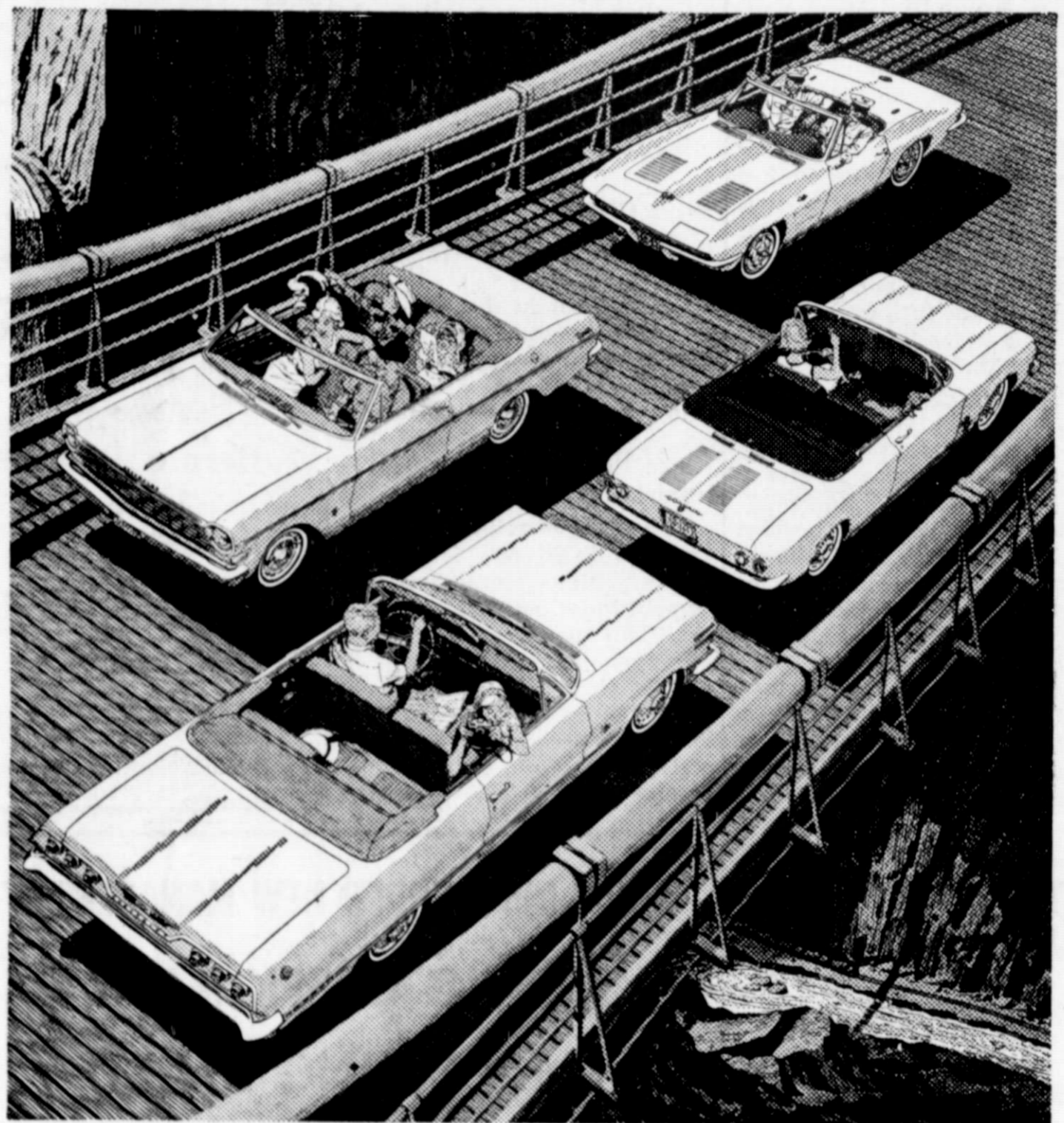
