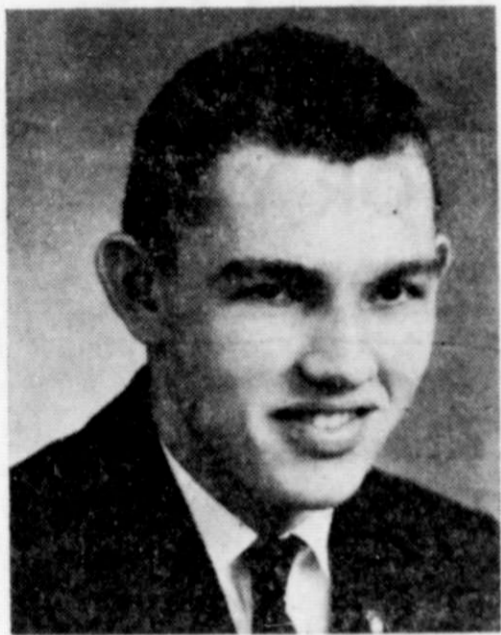

FORMER OPERATORS BUY GARAGE BUILDING SOUTH OF TOWN

Residents of Kewaskum and community will again have an opportunity to participate in the annual tribute to the nation's war dead at a Memorial Day observance sponsored by Robert G. Romaine Post No. 384 of The American Legion on Thursday morning, May 30.

The Memorial Day parade will begin promptly at 9:15 a. m. and will form at the high school grounds. Flags to all marching children participating will be distributed. The line of march will proceed south on Bilgo Lane to First st., then east to Park View dr., south to Main st., west on Main to Fond du Lac ave. and north on Fond du Lac to the Legion Memorial building, where services will be held immediately following the parade.

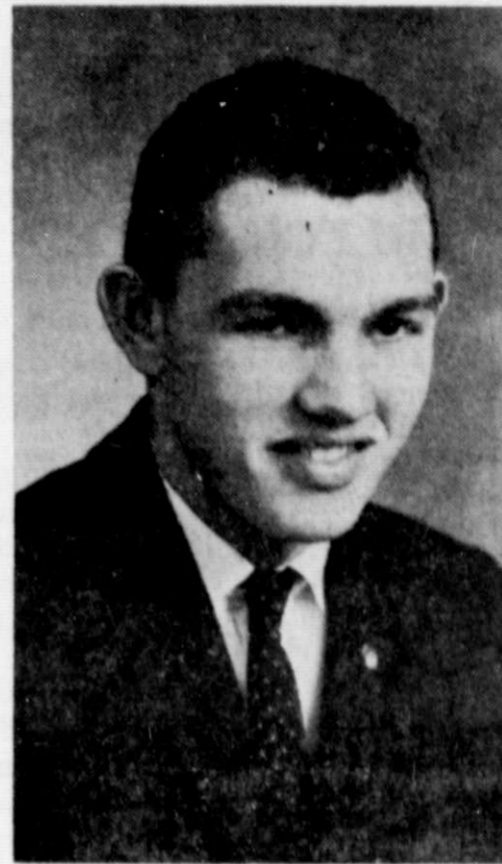
John's Barber Shop Sold to Oshkosh Man

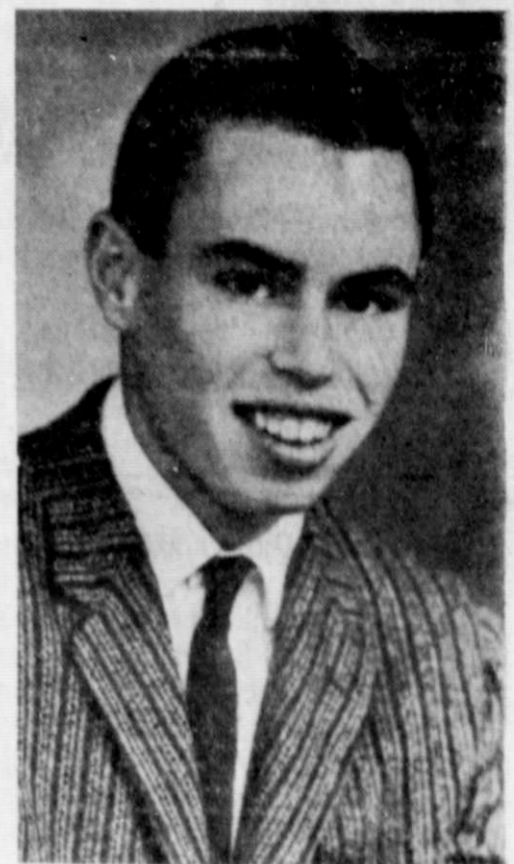

Wilmer Bleck, 42, Killed in Crash Near Here Sunday

EDEN MAN FATALLY INJURED WHEN AUTO ROLLS OVER; OTHER MISHAPS

The Sunday traffic death of a rural Eden resident near Kewaskum raised the Washington county death toll for 1963 to four. The victim was Wilmer Bleck, 42, of R. 1, Eden.

Bleck was fatally injured at approximately 7:10 p. m. Sunday about a mile south of Kewaskum on Hwy. 45 a short distance north of the intersection with Hwy. H. His car, proceeding south, apparently traveling at a high rate of speed, went out of control and careened down the highway from side to side, crossed the road, and ran along a ditch on the left side for some distance before it finally rolled over several times, traveling about 400 feet more while rolling, according to the sheriff's department report. The auto came to a stop on its wheels. Bleck was thrown clear of the vehicle before it stopped rolling.

Bleck, the driver, who was alone in the car, was pronounced

Funeral services were held at Immanuel United Church of Christ, West Bend, at 2 p. m. Wednesday, May 22, with Dr. H. W. Baumer officiating. Burial was in Washington County Memorial Park. Prior to the services the body was in state at the Schmidt Funeral home, West Bend.

Last of Oral Polio Clinics Set for Sunday

VACCINE WILL BE GIVEN AT KEWASKUM HIGH SCHOOL 10 A. M. TO 3 P. M.

The last phase of the oral polio clinics has been set for county-wide locations this Sunday, May 26. Type III oral polio vaccine will be distributed to county residents at the following clinics:

Allenton Sacred Heart church, 11 a. m. to 3 p. m.; Jackson school, 10 a. m. to 3 p. m.; Newburg town hall, 10 a. m. to 3 p. m.; Kewaskum High school, 10 a. m. to 3 p. m.; West Bend High school, 10 a. m. to 5 p. m.

Everyone who is eligible for the Type III oral polio vaccine is urged to attend one of the five locations on Sunday, as no makeup clinics are planned.

The Wisconsin State Board of Health has recommended that to take the Type III oral vaccine an individual should have had at least two doses of Salk vaccine, the last of which shall have been given within one year prior to May 26.

Questions on the taking of Type III vaccine will be answered by your family doctor. A doctor will be in attendance at Sunday's clinics to answer questions also.

A registration slip is printed in this week's Kewaskum Statesman and it is noted that if anyone under 21 wishes the vaccine they must have this slip signed by

their parents.

Almost 30,000 doses of Type I and Type II vaccine were given out on the two previous clinics in February and March. It is estimated that an additional 10,000 will attend the Type III clinics set for Sunday.

The cooperating medical staff of St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, has directed the medical aspects of the project and questions about the program are answered by a doctor in attendance at each clinic.

The co-sponsors of the Sabin Oral Sundays, or S. O. S. as they nicknamed the project, the West Bend Junior Chamber of Commerce, has received the Jaycee's state award for the best project of the year by a Jaycee group for their oral polio clinics.

For successful completion of the S. O. S. program make it a point to obtain the Type III vaccine this Sunday at the clinic nearest you.
