88 Seniors Will Graduate at High School Exercises June 5

35 EIGHTH GRADE GRADUATES WILL RECEIVE DIPLOMAS; SENIOR BANQUET HELD

Eighty-eight members of the 1963 senior class of Kewaskum Community High school will receive their diplomas at commencement exercises to be held in the school auditorium next Wednesday evening, June 5, at 8 o'clock. The class is smaller by six students than last year's record breaking class of 94 graduates.

Allen Koepke, son of Mr. and Mrs. Carnel Koepke, R. 2, Kewaskum, is valedictorian of the class with the highest average of 95.30 for the four years of school. Ralph Albrecht son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Albrecht, Kewaskum, is salutatorian with an average of 93.42.

The new owners will change the name of the business to "The Glacier Inn." This name was selected by the Lynns because of the natural glacier terrain for which our Kettle Moraine State Park is famous and the proposed Ice Age National Park development now being promoted for the area.

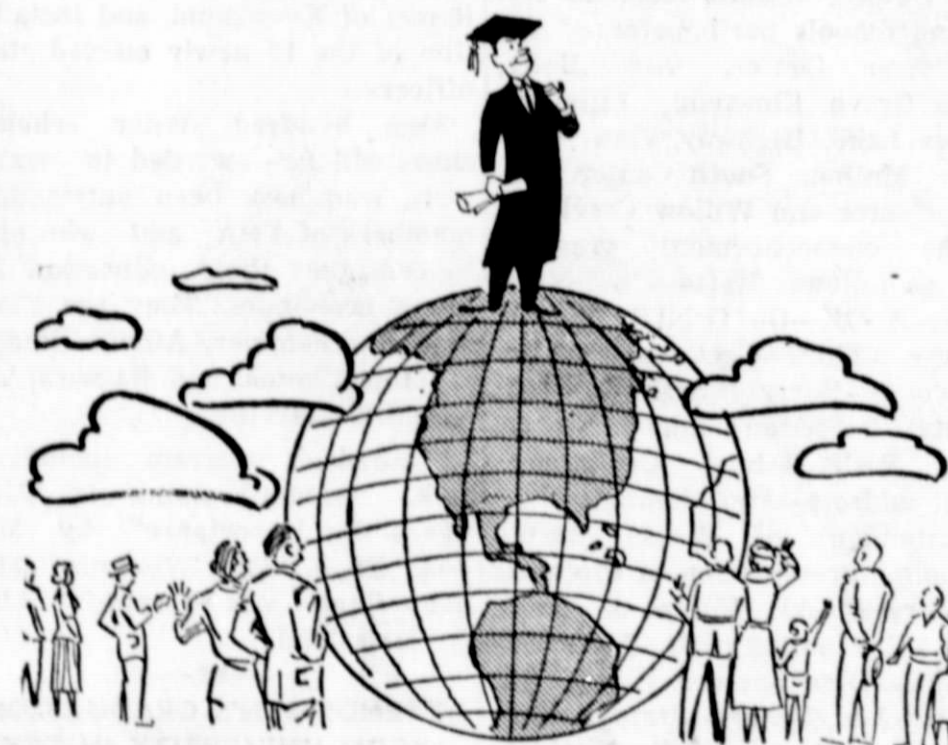
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\$440.30 CONTRIBUTED HERE IN CHRISTMAS SEAL SALE

A total of \$503,855.98 was contributed to the 1962 Christmas Seal campaign by Wisconsin residents, it was reported Friday by the Wisconsin Anti-Tuberculosis association. In Kewaskum, with Mrs. Harry E. Koch as seal sale manager, a total of \$440.30 was contributed.

The amount is \$3,538.13 more than was given in the 1961 campaign.

C. W. Kammeier, association executive secretary, described the gifts as "most welcome support for the WATA's new eradication program." He added that contributions from Wisconsin residents

have made it possible for the WATA to move forward toward its goal of wiping out TB in this state.

"Those who contributed so generously to the Christmas Seal campaign can be certain their gifts are being put to good use," said Kammeier.

In terms of involvement in fatal traffic accidents in Wisconsin last year, it appears that women were "more sinned against than sinning." Motor vehicle department records show that while less than ten per cent of the drivers involved in fatal accidents were women, 23 per cent of the persons killed in these accidents were of the female sex.

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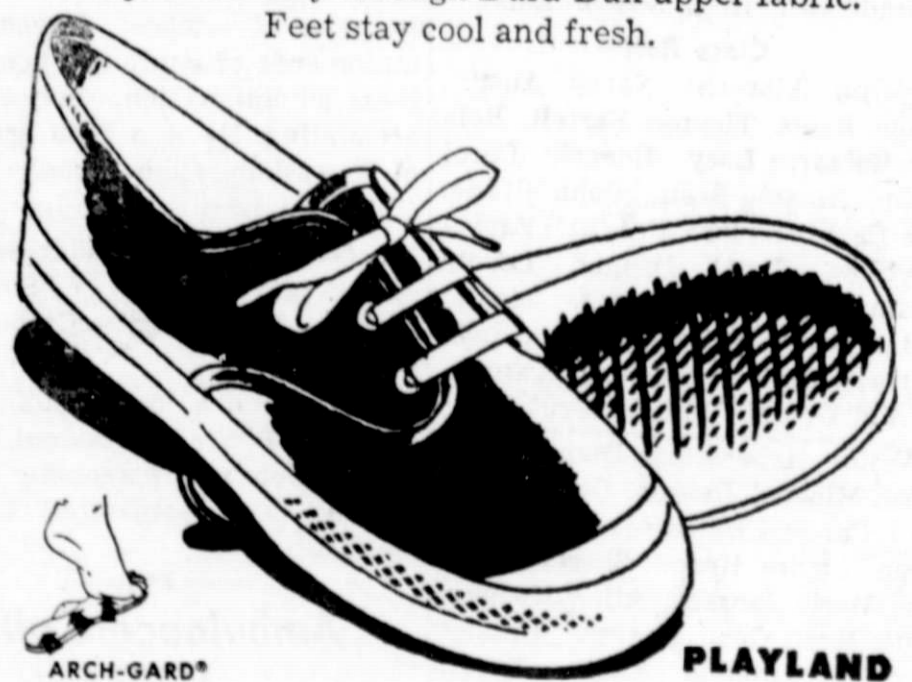
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Surprise Publishers On 25th Anniversary

Kewaskum District Advises Wayne to Build New School

**PROBLEM MUST BE SOLVED
WITHOUT HELP FROM
OTHER DISTRICTS**

A special board meeting of School District No. 1 of the town of Wayne was held on May 15, with all members present.

The board discussed meeting at Wayne on May 7 when an advisory vote was recorded against borrowing \$150,000.00 to build a new school. It was decided that the public should be given an opportunity to think about the matter and realize that other alternatives will not furnish an adequate education for the children of the district.

It was pointed out that at a meeting on May 13 at the Kewaskum High school, the Wayne school district was informed that the Kewaskum school district would not, in the foreseeable future, take in or consolidate with the Wayne district. The Kewaskum district suggested the Wayne district build a good school because there would always be a need for a central school in Wayne.

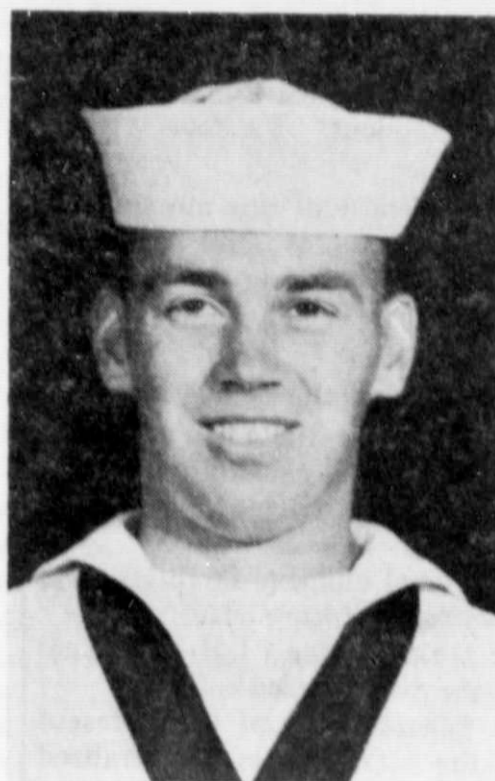
It appears that the school problem will have to be solved by the district itself without help from other districts, according to Harry Oelhafen, clerk of the district.

ATTENDS SHORT COURSE FOR SEWAGE PLANT OPERATORS

Armin Oppermann, Kewaskum, was among the record number of 185 sewage plant operators from cities and villages throughout Wisconsin who attended the 18th sewage works operators short course held recently on the University of Wisconsin campus at Madison.

The course was conducted by the staffs of the UW hydraulic and sanitary engineering laboratory, the State Laboratory of Hygiene, and the State Board of Health. It was sponsored by the League of Wisconsin Municipalities and the Conference of Wisconsin Sewerage Works Operators.

Such problems as sewage treatment, sewage plant performance and safety, sewage flow measurement, pumps, sludge digestion, sewer system maintenance, the interest of state and federal government in sewage treatment, and many others were considered during the short course which is designed particularly to assist operators in smaller communities.

Schoolboards of Kewaskum District Meet at High School

On Monday, May 13, a meeting of all schoolboards which comprise the Kewaskum Community High school district, was held in the high school. This meeting was called by the Washington county superintendent of schools, Harry Sheski.

The purpose of this meeting was to discuss topics and problems which are of concern to schoolboards.

The following agenda was followed during the discussion:

1. Area enrollment.
2. The school census.
3. School district and per pupil valuations.
4. School building facilities and needs in the future.
5. Kindergarten and other special services offered.
6. School lunch of the present and the possibility of a centralized program.
7. Pupil transportation.
8. District indebtedness.
9. Reorganization of districts and attitudes towards a K-12 plan, and attendance centers.
10. Tax base loss due to land purchases by the State Conservation Department.

This meeting was called on an informal basis, and all folks present exchanged ideas in that manner. This exchange was a very wholesome one and an atmosphere of congeniality prevailed throughout the meeting.

Many questions were asked about the manner in which a district handled certain problem situations.

One of the questions which evoked interest was that of attendance centers, if the area were to reorganize into the future into a

K-12 type of district.

There was unanimous agreement of all present that an elementary grade attendance center should be maintained in each of the present elementary districts. Such an attendance center might vary as to the number of grades which would be taught at the local level. Usually in K-12 districts the 7 and 8 grades are transported to a central school.

Raymond Lightfoot, county superintendent of schools in Sheboygan county, also attended. He discussed certain problems which pertain to large school district. He further stated that the present boards should make a thorough study before they give up the present system.

Others present were the principals of the Kewaskum schools, Mr. Rose and Mr. Zarling, and Mr. Kittelson of the Farmington township schools.

As a result of the meeting the several schoolboards are now more able to answer questions which might arise at their forthcoming annual meetings in July.

For Graduates: Summa Cum Laude Food

Here are two new recipes that will assure the hostess "highest praise" when she hails her graduates. Daisies and sweetheart roses with mortarboards set the traditional mood. Ice-cold Coke is the perfect accompaniment for the Daisy-Open Sandwich and Diploma Jelly Roll. Just follow these simple instructions for your very own Summa Cum Laude party.

Diploma Jelly Roll (Servings: 8)

- 6 eggs
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/2 cup sifted flour
- Confectioners' sugar
- 2/3 cup currant jelly

Be sure eggs are at room temperature. Place egg whites in a large bowl, yolks in a medium-sized bowl. Beat whites with rotary or electric beater until foamy; gradually beat in the sugar until a stiff, glossy meringue is formed. Add the salt and vanilla to the yolks and beat until thick and lemon colored. Carefully fold beaten yolks into meringue, using a cut and fold motion. Add the sifted flour in the same way, two tablespoons at a time. Line a jelly roll pan (10 x 16 x 1 in.) with oiled brown paper. Pour in the batter, spreading well into the corners. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) until cake springs back when touched with a finger and is golden brown. Remove from oven and turn out immediately upon a double layer of paper toweling that has been sprinkled with confectioners' sugar. Tear off the brown paper and cut a one-half inch strip from each



side of cake. Using paper as a lever roll up the cake from a long side. Leave rolled until cooled. In a bowl beat the currant jelly with fork or whisk until smooth. Just before serving unroll cake and spread with beaten jelly. Roll up, dust with confectioners' sugar, decorate with two eighteen inch strips of ribbon in school colors. Slice to serve.

Daisy-Open Sandwich (Servings: 8)

- 2 round loaves white or rye bread
- 6 tablespoons soft butter or margarine
- 2 cans (4-1/2 oz. ea.) shrimp, chopped
- 1/4 cup mayonnaise, or salad dressing

- 2 cans (7 oz. ea.) pitted ripe olives, minced
- 6 hard-cooked eggs, peeled

Slice the bread crosswise; spread each slice with butter or margarine. Combine the chopped shrimp with half the mayonnaise, spread center of each slice with shrimp mixture. Mix the remaining mayonnaise with the minced ripe olives. Spread the remaining bread with the ripe olive mixture. Slice the hard-cooked eggs crosswise. Remove yolks. Cut the egg whites into petals. Arrange petals daisy-fashion over the black olives. Use some of the yolk for flower centers. Place on a plate. Garnish as desired. Cut into triangles and serve.

VOTE 9-DAY DEER SEASON IN COUNTY

Warm weather the past week end brought out large numbers of fishermen. Night fishing for wall-eyed pike continues good at Pike lake; some trout taken at Wallace lake; fair fishing for bluegills at Big and Little Cedar; a few bass taken at Dricken's lake.

A doe deer was killed on Highway 83 Saturday night. The operator of a Dodge truck had to have it towed to a garage. A buck deer was killed early Monday morning a mile west of Willow Creek on a town road. There was only slight damage to a car operated by a lady on her way to work.

The state-wide meeting of the Wisconsin Conservation Congress was held at Eau Claire this past Friday and Saturday. Washington county was represented by delegates elected in April. The group voted 47 to 3 to have a deer season from Nov. 23 to Dec. 1, 1963, for a group of east-central counties which include Washington and Ozaukee. The first two days would allow hunters to take any deer, the last seven days bucks only.

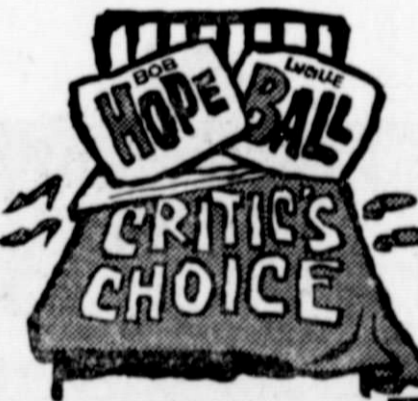
Stop and think before you dump those unused minnows overboard. If you can't save them for your next fishing trip, take them home for the cat. If you have no cat, bury them in your garden because minnows make wonderful fertilizer.

Why? Dumping minnows overboard always runs the risk of introducing exotic or undesired fish. Lakes poisoned and stocked with trout can be spoiled quickly by competing minnows. How serious it would be to stock carp in a nice clear lake from the innocent contents of a minnow bucket!

Don't forget that stocking fish without a permit is illegal. It is

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also illegal to transport alive rough fish such as carp, dogfish, garfish, lawyers or ellpout, lamprey eels and smelt.

Deer are starting to move again. Three does were killed in the past ten days, one at Highway 41 and the Maple Road, another on Highway 45 near the West Bend - Barton Sportsman's club and the third at Highway 41 and CTH (H). All of the animals were killed in the nighttime.

One fisherman neglected to have his name and address on his minnow box, located in a stream in Dodge county and had to pay a fine for the violation.

WINS ACADEMIC HONORS AT INSTITUTE OF TECHNOLOGY

Frederick E. Domann, a graduate of Kewaskum High school, and currently enrolled in the technical engineering program of the Milwaukee Institute of Technology, received a special award for academic achievement in mathematics. 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Kiwanis Club Joins Program to Better Youths As Citizens

The Kiwanis club of Kewaskum, in cooperation with local school and youth officials, and the National Council on Crime and Delinquency, is spearheading a timely new program directed toward helping youngsters make better citizens of themselves. The program, called "You and the Law," is a series of educational devices designed to teach youngsters from the seventh through the twelfth grades the basic fundamentals and protections of the law, according to Dr. R. G. Edwards and Roger McKenna, co-chairmen of the vocational guidance committee of the Kiwanis club.

The program's aim is stated as "to help adolescents recognize the sometimes fine line between high spirits and a serious breach of the law. No one frowns on high spirits," it says, "but fun simply cannot encroach upon your neighbor's person or property without serious consequences."

In a booklet which the Kiwanis club is making available, through proper authorities, to youngsters of the community, the questions are posed: "This is a free country, isn't it? So why can't we do anything we feel like doing?" The booklet answers itself by saying, "Here are the answers: We could if each of us lived entirely alone, but this is not possible. America is a land of freedom; freedom to do as we wish and go where we will—but only if we do not trespass on the rights of others. At this point freedom ends."

The booklet will be supplemented by school assemblies, Boy Scout, Girl Scout, Key club, and other youth group meetings devoted to the subject; field trips to courts, the viewing of films, and discussions on the law, on delinquency, and on rights and responsibilities, moderated by teachers and other youth leaders.

The idea of the program, "You and the Law," was originally conceived and developed by the Westchester, New York Citizens committee—an affiliate of the National Council—several years ago. As a result of the program, and other practical steps in prevention, youthful delinquency was substantially reduced there and the project was widely acclaimed.

When it was decided to make a national project of "You and the

Law," the National Council on Crime and Delinquency asked Kiwanis International—long a leader in service to youth—to act as co-sponsors. The project, which is being carried out in Kewaskum, is a part of this national joint effort.

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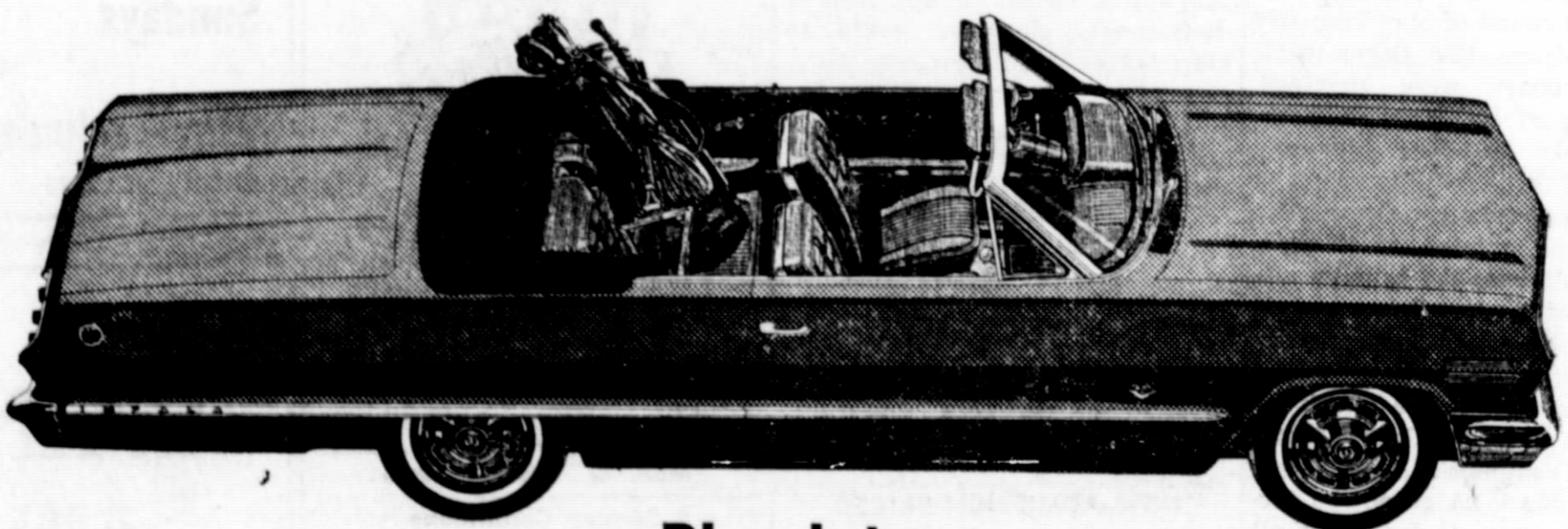
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
