PEACE CHURCH TO CELEBRATE 65TH ANNIVERSARY OF FOUNDING JUNE 23

The members of the congregation of Peace United Church of Christ will celebrate the sixty-fifth anniversary of the founding of their church on Sunday, June 23, with a religious service and a pot luck dinner at noon.

On June 2, 1898, first organizational steps were taken by nine men of the community. These nine men subsequently became the first council members or board of trustees of the new church. A constitution was adopted on June 6, 1898, and by November of that year land had been purchased and a church erected. Dedication services were held on Nov. 4.

Only one of the charter members of the church survives, Mrs. August (Caroline) Kirchner, who will be honored at the festivities on June 23. DIANN RAMEL RECEIVES STATE HOMEMAKER DEGREE

About 800 high school girls and their advisors were at the American Baptist Assembly, Green Lake, on June 3-6 for the 1963 annual state convention of the Future Homemakers of America. The FHA has more than 13,000 girls in 236 chapters in the state.

Judy Fickler, Lucille Kirchner, Rogene Klug and Claudia Oppermann were delegates of the Kewaskum chapter at the meeting. The girls were chaperoned by Mrs. Karl Fickler. The local delegates attended seven general meetings and social activities. Installation of new state officers concluded the convention.

On Thursday evening, June 6, Diann Ramel of the Kewaskum chapter received the state homemaker degree, the highest in FHA. She was accompanied by Green Lake by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Ramel, to attend a white dress dinner. Village Board Holds Hearing on Granting Of Liquor Licenses

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session with President Tessar presiding and all Board members present.

The minutes of the previous three meetings were accepted as presented upon motion by Trustee Merwin, seconded by Trustee Kral and duly carried.

First order of business was the public hearing on the applications for fermented malt beverage and intoxicating liquor licenses for the license period of July 1, 1963, through June 30, 1964. A total of ten applications had previously been filed. Written objections against the granting of licenses to two of the applicants were presented to the Board. The objections were taken under advisement and the public hearing was declared closed.

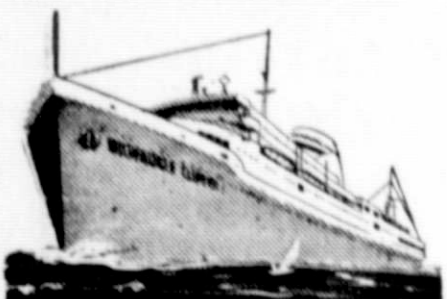

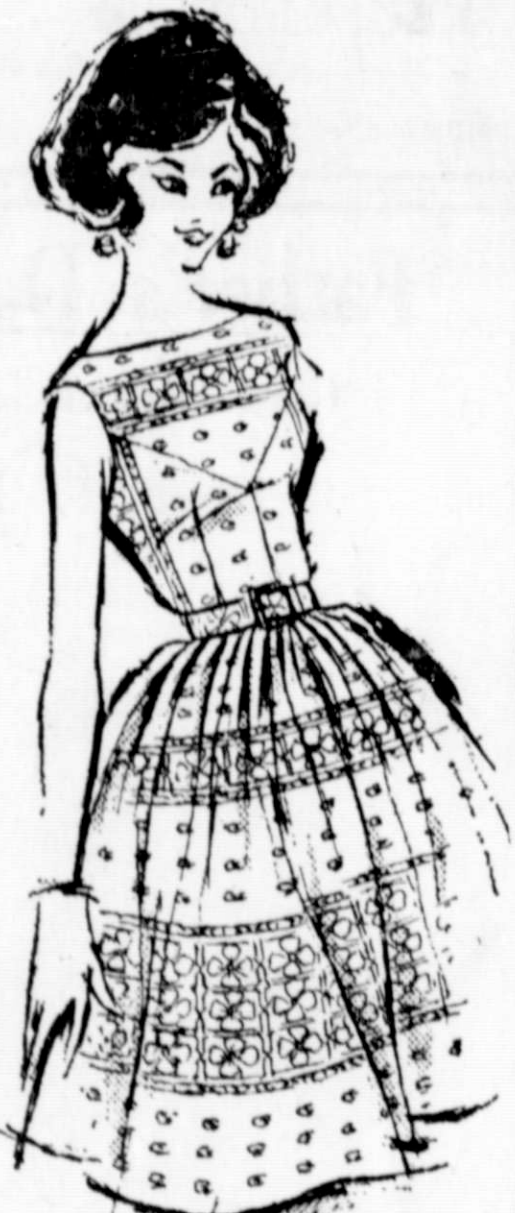

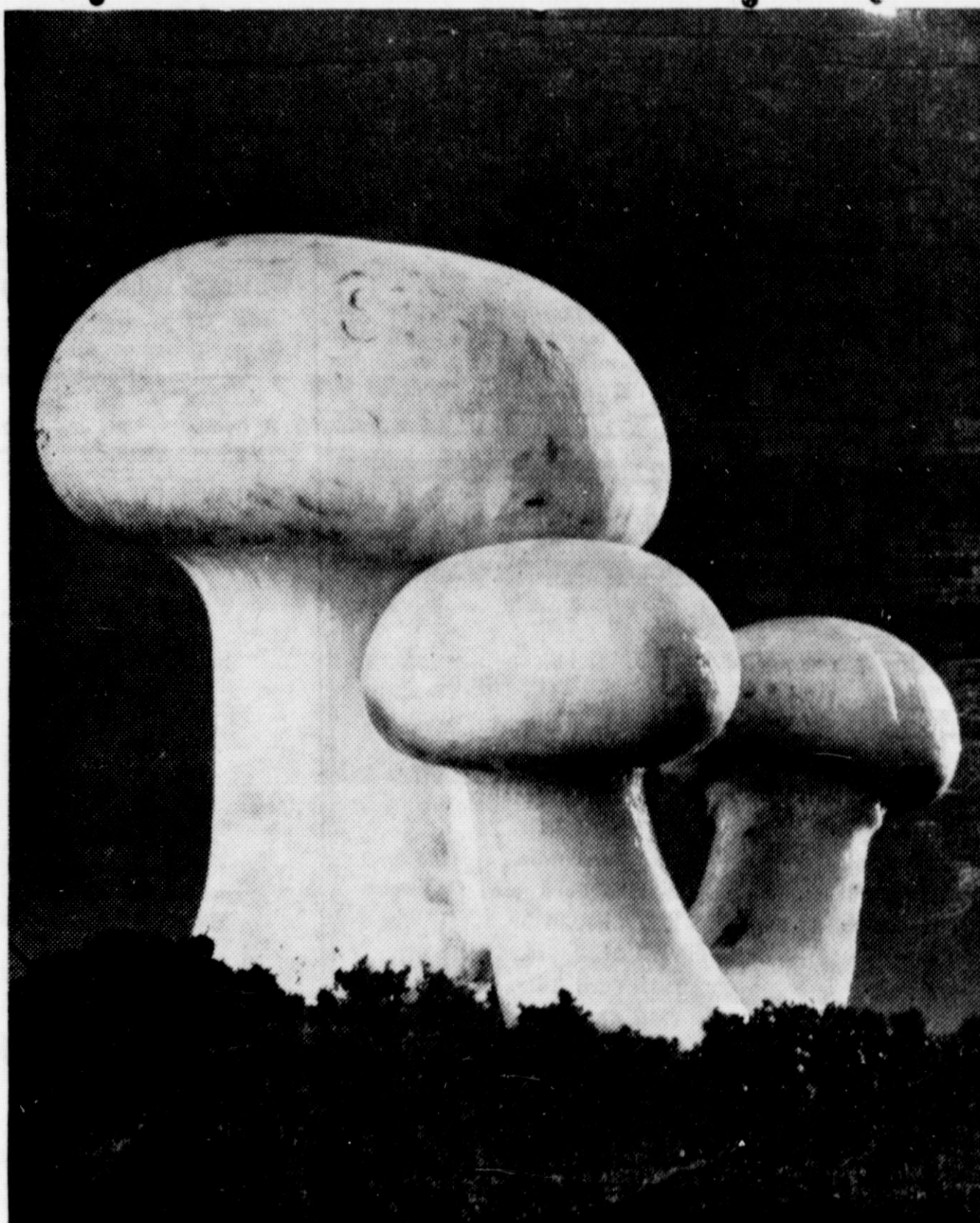

Last week a farmer came to my office to talk about the possibility of doing some changing on his farm. This was prompted because his young son has just graduated from high school. He was an FFA member and is now ready to assume part of the responsibilities of the farming operations. We think this father and son are doing the right thing by getting together on a partnership basis. We like to encourage more fathers and sons to do this.

Now that these sons are graduates from high school and probably from their ag department, it means that they are ready and able to assume some of the responsibilities. They are not just a hired man, they are a partially trained farmer. They have some ideas and these ideas need to be tried and tested on those farms. That they will all succeed, of course, is questionable. But that some of them will succeed is definite. How many of them succeed will depend strictly upon dad—how does he help this boy to de-

velop this idea and what is dad's attitude toward the new idea.

Many is the time when dad is going to make some sharp remarks about a new idea that his son has—the son is going to be crushed and take the attitude, well, if that's the way he feels about it, why should I even try to be a partner on this farm. The next thing we know this boy is going to be working some place else. On the other hand, if the father has an open mind toward this new idea and works along with the boy, they are going to emerge victorious on this farm with a real good operation. Therefore, fathers and sons, when the boy graduates from high school and is ready to become a partner in this farm, let's take him in. If he can go on to short course, this is to his advantage, also the advantage of the individual farmer.

But this is the time for fathers to make the decision on your farm. Does my son become a partner or a hired man? You will have a much better hired man if he is a partner, who helps make decisions, who signs his name on the mortgage if we need money to improve. And if you don't believe this is true, try and remember back when it became time for you to become a partner on your father's farm—wouldn't you have liked to been a major partner, not just a hired man?

TON OF CARP SPEARED; 15TH DEER IS KILLED

Fishing is picking up in the county. Bass are biting in most waters, a six and a seven pounder being taken at Friess lake. A few men with spears were able to take nearly a ton of carp at the inlet and outlet of Pike lake. Boys with bow and the arrows tipped with a spear are having fun shooting carp from bridges that cross the Milwaukee river.

A buck deer was killed by a car on US Hwy. 41 just north of 144 early Saturday evening. This is number fifteen of the car kills since January 1, 1963.

This is the time of the year when our state parks and forests are used most frequently by both Wisconsin residents and our visitors from other states. With the increased use of these facilities, it has been necessary to tighten regulations governing conduct and use of these areas. Here briefly are some of the regulations.

1. It is unlawful to destroy, mo-

lest or deface any natural growth or natural or archeologic features on any state property; to enter in any way, any building, installation or area that may be locked or closed to public use, or contrary to posted notice.

2. It is unlawful to destroy, molest, or remove the property of others.

3. It is unlawful for any person other than a permittee or licensee to scavenge golf balls on any golf course.

4. It is unlawful to discard or leave any refuse, sewage or other waste material on the ground, or in any building or installation, or in the water or on the ice of any lake or stream or to dispose of any such waste material in any manner except by burning or by placing in receptacles or other authorized location provided for such purposes.

5. It is unlawful to wash vehi-

cles or pets except at authorized locations in any public use area under the management, supervision and control of the Conservation Commission.

6. It is unlawful to wash any clothing except at authorized locations in any public use area.

7. It is unlawful to allow your pet to enter any public building or be upon any beach or lakeshore or in any lake or stream in any public use area. No person shall allow his pet to deprive or disrupt the enjoyment or use of any area by others. It looks like you will have to leave your pet at home.

Next week we will discuss other regulations governing the use of state parks, state forests, improved campsites and other public use areas.
