Mrs. Jack Tessar to Preside at State VFW Auxiliary Convention

The 38th annual auxiliary convention of the Wisconsin Department of the Veterans of Foreign Wars will be held in Kenosha June 26-29. Mrs. Jack J. Tessar, Kewaskum, state auxiliary president, will preside at convention sessions in Kenosha's Mary B. Bradford high school.

Mrs. Gib Sauer and Mrs. Lorina Petermann, Mrs. Tessar's twin sister, will serve the department president as personal pages during the convention. Mrs. Sauer is chairman of all convention pages.

Announcement of the winner of the second annual \$300 practical nursing scholarship will be made by Mrs. Arnold Korth, West Bend, at Thursday's session. This scholarship is offered for use in a state school of nursing to a Wisconsin woman between the ages of 18 and 45 who can submit in 200 words or less her reasons for entering the profession.

Winners of the 28th annual high school writing contest will receive state awards totaling \$225 and silver medals for their essays on "What I Can Do for My Country." A \$100 cash award will go to Miss Julia Sahr, Eau Claire, who placed first in a field of 28 state finalists. Miss Bonnie Erdman, Portage, will receive \$75 for her second place entry, and a \$50 award will go to Miss Joyce Zaladonis, Prairie du Chien. Jane Fobian, Milwaukee, and Patricia J. Uhler, La Crosse, were named for honorable mention. Forty Wisconsin high schools participated in this year's program. Mrs. Basil Lee, Elk Mound, will present the awards.

Representing the national organization will be Mrs. Joseph Mann, Harper Woods, Mich., a past national president, during whose term of office in 1947-48 the auxiliary's cancer aid and research fund was established. Since its inception the project has provided more than \$800,000 to cancer research institutions. During the current fiscal period the fund has paid over \$125,000 to auxiliary members suffering with cancer, of which \$8,100 has been given to 43 Wisconsin members.

Mayor Eugene Hammond will receive an American flag for Kenosha's city hall from Mrs. Harlan Hebbe, Wausau, state patriotic instructor.

Registration will begin Wednesday at the Dayton Hotel, where a council of administration meeting is scheduled for 7 o'clock that night. Election of officers is scheduled for Friday morning, followed by an afternoon tea for "Pink Ladies," the more than 400 auxiliary volunteer workers in Wisconsin's three V. A. hospitals and the G. A. R. home at King. Other convention activities include awards for meritorious service in membership, hospital volunteer work, public relations and community service. A memorial service, state officers' luncheon, past district presidents club dinner and 25-year club breakfast are on the agenda.

A joint banquet, parade and musical competition will conclude the four-day conclave.

The first Bike-O-Rama sponsored by the Kewaskum 4-H'ers, with the cooperation of the Kewaskum police department, will be held on Saturday, June 29, on the west parking lot of the high school starting at 10 a. m.

Four members of the Kewaskum Future Farmers of America chapter attended the 34th annual state FFA convention at the American Baptist Assembly, Green Lake, June 10-11-12. Lee Schmidt and Harold Krueger attended as chapter delegates while Russell Breit and David Williams were recipients of the Wisconsin Farmer degree. The Wisconsin farmer degree is given to the top 2% of the FFA boys in the state who have excelled in FFA activities, leadership, scholarship and developed and carried out an outstanding farming program.

The program started with the official opening ceremony followed by the business of the state association. Upon petition by the Kewaskum Woman's club, the village of Kewaskum has proclaimed "Make Freedom Ring Time" on July 4. Governor Reynolds had earlier proclaimed it state-wide. Locally church bells will be heard for four minutes, beginning at one p. m.

As the great chorus of bells swells across the land, it will be heard by families at home, on the lakeshore, in the mountains, wherever Americans gather on the Fourth. 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Sisters at Mt. Calvary Announce \$200,000 Fund Raising Campaign for Construction Of Needed Nursing and Retirement Home

LLOYD HRON CHAIRMAN FOR KEWASKUM AREA; FR. BUDDÉ AMONG PRIESTS SERVING THE PROJECT

MOUNT CALVARY, WISCONSIN—A fund-raising campaign to raise a minimum of \$200,000 was announced today by Mother Mary Rose, S.S.C.K., Mother Superior of the Sister-Servants of Christ the King. The campaign will be an all out effort to raise funds for the construction of a nursing and retirement home to be built by the Sisters at Mt. Calvary. Project Villa Loretto, as the fund campaign is called, will be a highly organized effort conducted throughout some 18 communities in the general area of Mt. Calvary.

In announcing the project, Mother Mary Rose, S.S.C.K., stated "research has indicated to us that a Catholic nursing and retirement home is desperately needed in this area and that there is a strong field of support for our capital undertaking. We launch our fund-raising effort with the knowledge that great numbers of people understand and appreciate the needs of our senior citizens. Many persons have already indicated they wish to help."

General chairman of the campaign is Dr. Gerald Haskett of Fond du Lac and his associates are Albert Karst of Mt. Calvary and Joseph Kovacs and William Sanders of Fond du Lac.

A committee for the solicitation of advance special gifts has been formed and has begun work. This committee composed of the chairmen and associate chairmen of the various other campaign committees has met at Mt. Calvary on three occasions and is now actively engaged in its work.

For purposes of organization the project will be divided into four campaign regions. Mt. Calvary, Dotyville, Armstrong, St. Cloud, St. Joe, St. Peter, Johnsbury and Marytown will form one region and Fond du Lac and North Fond du Lac will form another. Campbellsport, Kewaskum and St. Michael form the third region with Chilton, Charlesburg, Jericho, New Holstein and St. Anna forming the fourth. The entire effort is scheduled to be completed by Aug. 16.

Priest moderators serving the program are: Rev. Ephrem Hertel, O.F.M. Cap., pastor of Holy Cross parish, Mt. Calvary; Rev. Raymond L. Fox, pastor of Sacred Heart parish, Fond du Lac; Rev. Henry Maurer, pastor of St. Mary's parish, Fond du Lac; Rev. Joseph Morissette, O.M.I., pastor of St. Louis parish, Fond du Lac; Rev. Walter Tuschel, pastor of Holy Trinity parish, Jericho; and Rev. John Budde, pastor of Holy Trinity parish in Kewaskum.

The new Villa Loretto, Nursing and Retirement Home, will ultimately cost in excess of a million dollars and will be built in two

stages. The first stage of construction will get underway in the spring of 1964. When completed the home will have a capacity of 108 beds. Following the first stage of construction, capacity will be 50 beds. It will be located on a 120 acre site on the northern outskirts of Mount Calvary.

Preliminary organization of the various campaign committees is now underway. Chairman of the business and industry committee is Raymond Commo with George Andrew and Donald Kronforst as associates, all of Fond du Lac. General solicitation chairman is John Korb, Fond du Lac.

Mt. Calvary regional chairman is Kenneth Sippel of Mt. Calvary with Dr. J. F. Miller, Mt. Calvary, Raymond Wagner, Mt. Calvary, and Ambrose Feldner, St. Cloud, as first associates. Regional chairman for Fond du Lac is Roger Sukawaty, Fond du Lac. Chairman for the Chilton and New Holstein area is Orville Kestell, New Holstein. Associate chairman for the Kewaskum area is Lloyd Hron, Kewaskum. Associate chairmen of the memorial gifts committee are Joseph Donohue and George McCormick of Fond du Lac.

L. Rosenheimer Is Charter Member Of Forage Alliance

L. Rosenheimer of Kewaskum has been accepted as a charter member of the American Forage Alliance, an organization dedicated to the improvement of forage crop production on American farms. The announcement was made in Milwaukee this week by L. William Teweles, president of the group.

The purpose of the American Forage Alliance, according to Teweles, is to provide farmers with the information and technical service that will be required to increase beef and dairy production by almost 50% within the next ten years to meet the food requirements of an expanding population.

At the same time, Teweles said, the AFA will provide the farm

supply dealer with a program of employee training and education that will enable him to increase the services that he now gives the farmers of the community. Regular sessions of an American Forage Alliance school will be conducted at the Milwaukee headquarters.

Teweles described the organization of the alliance as a "grass roots" movement brought about by continued demands of farm supply dealers in an 8-state area for a means of providing more rapid communication of research and product development progress to the farmers of their communities. Seed breeders, agronomists and specialists in other fields of agriculture are associate members of the American Forage Alliance and plans are now underway to establish individual farmer memberships.

Here are a few of the violations most frequently noted. Numbers on sailboats below the water line. Numbers placed on the bow of a boat incorrectly. The following is the correct spacing, WS 3896 BD. Failure to transfer the certificate of registration when the boat is sold. Failure to notify the Wisconsin Conservation Department within 15 days after a boat has been

destroyed or abandoned. Failure to know or respect the red and white flag of a skin diver, which indicates that some one is below the surface of the water. One boy was nearly hit by a motor boat on Pike lake while skin diving a short time ago.
