In announcing the project, Mother Mary Rose, S.S.C.K., stated "research has indicated to us that a Catholic nursing and retirement home is desperately needed in this area and that there is a strong field of support for our capital undertaking. We launch our fundraising effort with the knowledge that great numbers of people understand and appreciate the needs of our senior citizens. Many persons have already indicated they wish to help."

General chairman of the cam paign is Dr. Gerald Haskett of Fond du Lac and his associates are Albert Karst of Mt. Calvary and Joseph Kovacs and William Sanders of Fond du Lac.

A committee for the solicitation of advance special gifts has been formed and has begun work. This committee composed of the chairmen and associate chairmen of the various other campaign committees has met at Mt. Calvary on three occasions and is now actively engaged in its work.

For purposes of organization the project will be divided into four campaign regions. Mt. 




