Kewaskum Post Office ZIP Code Number Is 53040

EVERYONE WILL USE CODE NUMBER TO SPEED MAIL EFFECTIVE JULY 1

Our five-digit ZIP Code is 53040, Postmaster Harry E. Koch announced today.

"Everyone in Kewaskum will use this ZIP Code on all their correspondence to speed mail deliveries and reduce the chance of mis-sent mail," Postmaster Koch said.

ZIP Code, the Post Office Department's revolutionary new system of improved mail dispatch and delivery, goes into effect nationally on July 1.

Postmaster Koch stressed the importance of all citizens of Kewaskum learning this village's ZIP Code and using it in their return address on all correspondence. In answering mail, he said, ZIP Codes taken from return addresses on incoming mail should be used.

"The ZIP Code is literally the last word in mail addressing," Mr. Koch said. "It should follow the city and state in addresses."

He cited this example of the proper use of ZIP Code:

The new ZIP Code plan, Mr. Koch said, for the first time will permit the Post Office Department to short-cut repeated address reading.

"The address on mail must often be read as many as eight or ten times by postal employees, to get it to the proper destination," Mr. Koch said. "Each handling slows the process of mail dispatch and adds to the opportunity for human error."

"With ZIP Code, a clerk needs only to glance at the code to know immediately to what national area, state and post office the letter is destined, and to speed it on its way, cutting up to 24 hours off the time between deposit and delivery."

Mr. Koch said that when ZIP Code is in full swing, the United States will have "the most modern system of mail distribution and delivery in existence."

The instrumental, "Moonride," by the Blue Echoes is the featured side of the record. "What I Say," the singing version by Dave Sutton (Skrentny), which was originally recorded by Jerry Lee Lewis, was chosen by the band for the reverse side.

The local band has become very popular the past couple of years and is completely booked for the summer months on every Wednesday, Friday and Saturday, except for a few open dates.

The future plans of the Blue Echoes, if their initial recording is a hit, will be another record this fall, also a TV appearance on "Twelve to Twenty," Channel 6, later in the year.

Members of the band and the instruments they play are as follows: Dave Skrentny, guitar and singer; Larry Roesel, lead guitar; Leroy Schultz, bass guitar, and Homer Justman, drums. All members are from Kewaskum. The boys started playing in August of 1959 and are constantly progressing.

Typesetting Machine Is Installed

STATESMAN BUYS MODEL C, THREE MAGAZINE INTERTYPE

In spring the publishers purchased a Model C, three magazine intertype machine which was installed in the Statesman office some weeks ago. The new typesetter replaces the old Model Z intertype which was in operation many years and a Model L machine standing on the floor. Both of these machines were sold to the Smith Machine Co. of Waukesha.

The newly purchased intertype is a much later, faster model with three magazines of matrices and sets type up to an 18 point size. It is operated by electricity instead of gas. On the old machine we set small, 8 point type only and all other type had to be hand set. On the Model C we set 8, 14 and 18 point type, interchanging the magazines by just a few quick maneuvers at the front of the machine. Formerly we had to set all of the headings and almost all of the advertising copy by hand, nearly all of which is now done by machine, saving a great amount of time and work.

The machine has been in use for several weeks now but was not in full operation until this week. Three new fonts of matrices had to also be obtained for the machine. The 14 point came along with the machine but we had to purchase 8 and 18 point mats. The 18 point font was just received. Also linotype mechanics were needed to move the machines, set up the newly purchased one and make some adjustments, changes and additions to the machine.

Now the machine is all set for full operation. You see the new 18 point type face in the headings on this page and you will also note the new masthead at the top of the page. The 14 and 8 point faces are also seen throughout this issue. We are now also much better equipped to handle your job printing needs.

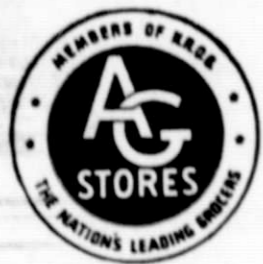

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Property Owners Should Check Assessment Now Before It's Too Late

They'll do it every time. There will always be some property owners who don't think of checking their assessments until they get their tax bills, then find they have been raised and it's way too late to appeal, and they feel doubly aggrieved.

Values are set as of May 1. Assessment rolls are now open for inspection or about to be. Boards of review will be sitting shortly. So the season for preparing any protests is right now, not next January.

One big trouble is that many people suppose their assessments are unchanged in the absence of notice to the contrary. Most municipalities usually do give notice, but no law requires it. The responsibility is with the property owner to look into the matter himself, and the well advised will inquire on their own initiative.

Town boards of review may meet either June 24 or July 8 this year. In all villages and cities except Milwaukee they will meet July 8. So the word is to check the assessment rolls timely and file written notice of appeal, if any, with the city, village or town clerk before it's too late.

It is not enough just to object. Owners who hope to prevail must be prepared to make a case, that similar properties are assessed lower, or that an improvement was overvalued, for instance. And don't plan to argue the tax rate with the review board; that's something else again.

Further appeal rights depend on having been to the review board first.

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Local Girls Back From Girls' State

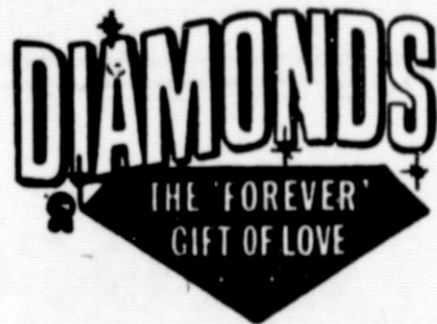
RUTH ANN WEDDIG, PATRICIA RILEY BOTH ELECTED TO OFFICE AT MADISON

4-H Club to Sponsor Bike-O-Rama June 29

The first Bike-O-Rama sponsored by the Kewaskum 4-H'ers, with the cooperation of the Kewaskum police department, will be held on Saturday, June 29, on the west parking lot of the high school starting at 10 a. m.

Any Kewaskum area youngsters between the ages of 9 and 14 may enter. 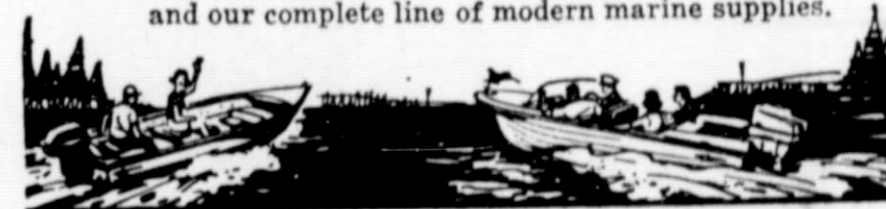

Bells Will Ring Locally, Across Land on July 4

"MAKE FREEDOM RING" TIME TO INAUGURATE GREAT NEW OBSERVANCE OF HOLIDAY

July 4, 1963 will inaugurate a great new national observance of American independence. Bells will peal simultaneously across the land—from churches, from government buildings, from college campuses, for four minutes beginning at 1 p. m., central daylight time. Governor Reynolds has decreed "Make Freedom Ring" time statewide. Upon petition of the Kewaskum Woman's club, the village board has proclaimed it locally and church bells will be rung at the appointed time.

The idea for an annual bell-ringing celebration on the Fourth, reminiscent of the joy that greeted the first anniversary of the Declaration of Independence at Philadelphia in 1777, was conceived by two men from Connecticut. Eric Hatch, a distinguished writer, is one; Eric Sloane, a meteorologist, artist and writer, the other.

After the signing of the Declaration of Independence in July of 1776, John Adams wrote "I am

apt to believe that it will be celebrated by succeeding generations as the great anniversary festival. It ought to be commemorated as the day of deliverance by solemn acts of devotion with pomp and parade, with shows, games, sports, guns, bells, bonfires and illuminations from one end of the continent to the other, from this time forward forevermore."

Perhaps a little of the noble grandeur that John Adams felt has been dulled in the hearts of the Americans by the passage of time. The Fourth of July has become more of a summer holiday than a patriotic festival and games and sports have taken over. Fireworks have disappeared from many observances.

This year's sound of bells across the nation should once again stimulate and intensify the patriotic and spiritual observance of our nation's birthday. The Liberty Bell rang for freedom, and the ringing of the bells in 1963 can remind us how precious freedom really is, not only to Americans, but to people everywhere.

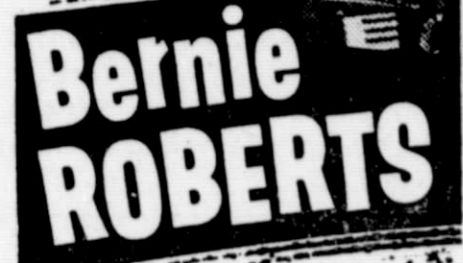
