Firemen's Picnic This Week End to Have Fine Parade

EVENT TO FEATURE FAMOUS MILWAUKEE BAND, FREE ENTERTAINMENT, MANY FLOATS, WATER FIGHTS

Kewaskum's annual firemen's picnic will be held this week end, Saturday evening, July 13, and Sunday afternoon and evening, July 14, in the village park. Always anxiously awaited by residents of this and surrounding areas, this year's picnic will be one of the finest ever held, especially the parade Sunday, which will be an excellent one with many floats entered.

A crowd pleasing attraction on Saturday evening will be music by a clown band which will mingle among the people and play at the stands. They will provide both entertainment and laughter. All of the many rides, refreshment, concession and amusement stands will be open.

The main feature on Sunday and of the entire picnic will be the big parade at 12:30 p. m. to start off the day's festivities. The parade will be a very colorful and long one with many, many units participating. Outstanding attractions will include the famous Milwaukee Continental Youth band and numerous floats, some of which have already been completed. The firemen's picnic is noted for its fine parades for a village of this size.

Other musical organizations in the parade will be the Kewaskum Community High school band, the popular Blue Echoes orchestra of here, which has just made its first recording and will advertise it on a float, and other musical units. All businessmen are urged to enter floats and quite a few have already announced they will do so to assure a large number of very attractive ones. There will be many visiting units of firemen and Legionnaires from neighboring towns in the parade as well as comedy entries, old cars, numerous horses, children's specialties, scouts, 4-H clubs, organizations, and many, many other groups. Over \$100 in prize money will be awarded to the best floats, children's specialties and other units in the line of march. All children in the parade will be given free tickets good in trade in the park.

The Milwaukee Continental Youth band, composed of 120 members between the ages of 14 and 21 years, has won state and national championships, represented Wisconsin in the Presidential Inaugural parade in Washington, D. C. in 1961, performed at the World's Fair in Seattle, Wash. in 1962 and perform at Disneyland in California on Aug. 9 of this year.

Campbellsport Youth in Near Drowning Here

Eugene Waldschmidt, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Waldschmidt of R. 1, Campbellsport, had a narrow escape from drowning while swimming at the village park beach at about 11 a. m. Thursday, July 11, with two of his brothers, Paul, 14 and Allen, 12.

The brothers were at the beach for swimming lessons, Paul said, when he and his brothers decided to see if they could make it to the raft, which is located about three-quarters distance across the river from the beach.

After they had passed the safety bobbers, Allen, the youngest, said he turned back because the water was getting to deep for him. Paul and Eugene kept proceeding toward the raft when they stepped off of a ledge into deeper water. Neither of the boys are good swimmers, according to Paul, who said he kept his head and started to swim, making it safely to the raft. However, Gene became excited and began struggling in the water, tiring himself rapidly.

Gene went under twice before Allen Becker, the lifeguard on duty, could reach him. Fortunately Becker, who was giving swimming lessons, was at the end of the pier extending into the water and was near the sinking youth. When Becker heard someone call that a swimmer was in trouble he saw the youth floundering in the water and dove after Waldschmidt and succeeded in pulling him on to the raft, which was closer than the beach.

After he got him on the raft, Becker noticed that the youth was conscious. He then asked him if he wanted to try and reach the beach and Gene stated that he did. When he got the youth near the beach Waldschmidt suddenly became limp and seemed to go into a state of shock of semi-consciousness. Becker than summoned Ralph Albrecht, the second lifeguard on duty, to help bring Gene onto the beach.

Police Officer Marriner Frank arrived at the scene moments after Waldschmidt was brought out of the water. He reported that the youth appeared to be conscious and coherent and was able to move his eyes in different directions. The officer said that Gene's neck hurt and he felt "woozy." The firemen's ambulance was summoned and attendants removed the youth to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, where he was still a patient Thursday afternoon.
