Annual Meeting
July 22, 1963

The annual meeting was called to order by August Koch, president of the Board of Education with 60 electors being present.

August Koch called for nominations for chairman of the meeting. Francis Gilboy nominated August Koch. A motion was made by Walter Wesenberg, seconded by Charles Miller, to close nominations that an unanimous ballot be cast for August Koch. Motion carried.

The minutes of the last annual meeting of July 23, 1962 were read. A motion was made by Leo Bingen to accept the minutes as read. Seconded by George Eggert, Jr. Carried.

A motion was made by William Martin, seconded by Wayland Tesar, to dispense with the reading of the auditor's report, the clerk's report and the treasurer's report and accept them as printed. Carried.

A motion was made by Charles Miller, seconded by L. N. Peterson, authorizing the school board of Kewaskum Elementary School, Jt. Dist. No. 1 to submit to a vote of the electors of said school district for a referendum vote on borrowing money not to exceed \$250,000.00 for the purpose of building an addition to the present school building and the equipment for the same.

A motion was made by Albert Hron, Jr. to table Charles Miller's motion until after further discussion. Seconded by Fred Spoerl. Carried.

Charles Miller withdrew his motion. L. N. Peterson withdrew his second.

A motion was made by L. N. Peterson, seconded by Desmond Smith, authorizing the board to instruct the architect to complete plans and specifications and when completed to obtain bids. Motion carried.

A motion was made by L. N. Peterson, seconded by Roger Schleif, authorizing the board to submit to the electors a referendum to borrow a sum not to exceed \$250,000 for the purpose of a building addition and equipment.

Death of Mrs. George Reindl

Mrs. George Reindl, 79, nee Theresa Schedlo, of Clinton st., Kewaskum, a resident of the village for the past 20 years, passed away early Monday morning, July 22, at St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, following an illness of five weeks. She had been a patient at the hospital for three weeks.

She was born on Oct. 1, 1883, at St. Kilian, a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Anton Schedlo, and lived there until the time of her marriage to Mr. Reindl, which took place at St. Kilian on Nov. 9, 1910. The couple settled on the Reindl farm in the town of Kewaskum and resided there until 20 years ago when they retired and moved to this village. Her husband preceded her in death on Oct. 16, 1959, and a son, Prosper, died in 1937.

Surviving are two daughters and three sons, Linda (Mrs. Norbert Becker) of Milwaukee, Mrs. Bernetta Bruessel of Kewaskum, Gilbert, Allen and Roger Reindl, all of Kewaskum. She also leaves 19 grandchildren, eight great-grandchildren and other relatives and friends.

John T. Budde officiating. Msgr. John Grasser delivered the sermon and the Rev. Donald Berg was also present in the sanctuary. Burial took place in the new parish cemetery.

Dog Pack Causes Heavy Livestock, Poultry Losses

Farmers and other rural residents of the towns of Kewaskum and Farmington have suffered more than \$750 losses to livestock and poultry reported killed by what is believed to be a roving pack of dogs recently.

Chickens, geese, sheep and pigs have been killed by the dogs, according to reports filed with Anton P. Staral, county clerk, within the past three weeks. Some of the claims filed for dog damages include:

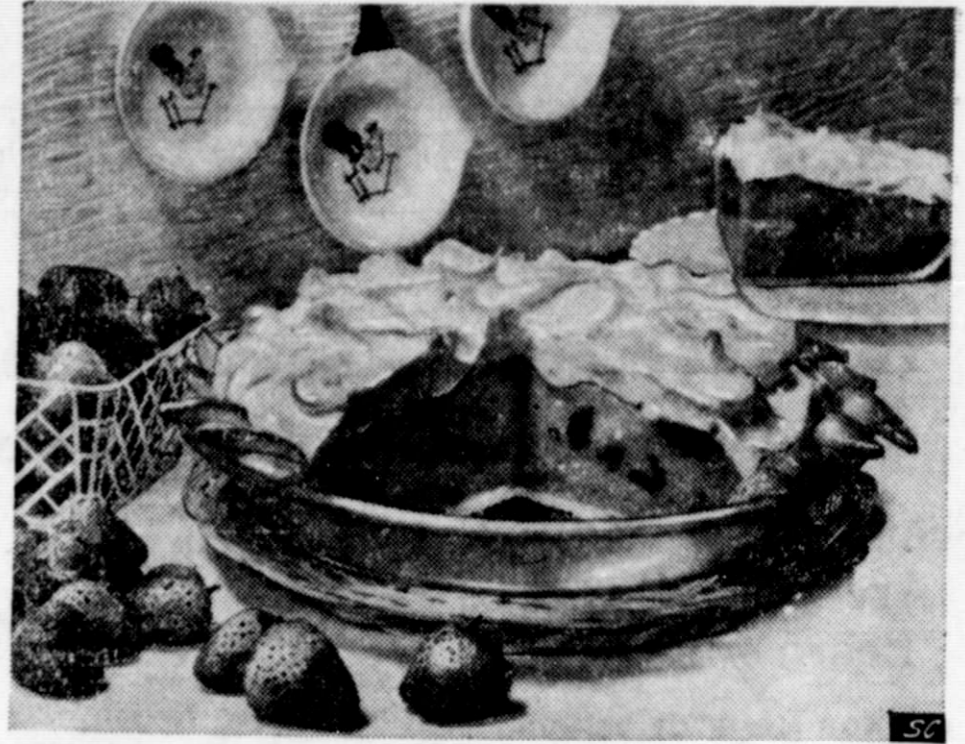

It's The Berries



This cool and irresistible pie is sure to win acclaim for its delicate fruit flavor and glamorous meringue topping. The easy to prepare strawberry-studded filling combines fruit flavor gelatin, ice cream, and frozen berries—fresh if you prefer. It's a light and creamy filling that teams well with either a flaky pastry shell or a no-bake pie shell prepared with flaked coconut or cookie crumbs.

Strawberry Alaska Pie

- 1 package (3 ounces) strawberry flavor gelatin
- 1-1/4 cups boiling berry juice plus water
- 1 pint vanilla ice cream
- 1 package (10 ounces) frozen strawberry halves, thawed and drained
- 1 8-inch pie shell
- 2 egg whites
- 4 tablespoons sugar

Dissolve gelatin in boiling liquid in 2-quart saucepan. Add ice cream by spoonfuls, stirring until melted. Then chill until very thick (15 to 20 minutes). Fold in drained strawberries. Spoon into pie shell. Chill until firm (20 to 30 minutes).

Beat egg whites until foamy throughout. Gradually add sugar beating after each addition until blended. Continue beating until meringue will stand in peaks. Spread over the pie filling, sealing meringue to edge of crust. Place under a pre-heated broiler until browned—about 3 minutes. Serve at once or store in refrigerator until serving time. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

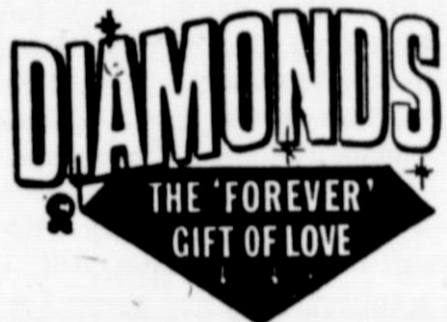

Looking Thru the Field Glasses . . .

BY BOB LAKE

Perch are biting very well at Port Washington; early risers seem to catch the most fish. Limits of large mouth bass are caught daily at Big Cedar lake. Successful fishermen are catching them on spinning tackle and artificial night crawlers.

Young ducks are trying their wings. Broods of pheasants and Hungarian partridge are showing up. Families of raccoon are moving thru the country side at night, and operators of poultry and game farms are having trouble with skunk and opossum trying to break in and steal the eggs or the young birds.

A large doe deer was killed this past week on Highway 175 just north of Slinger.

This is the time of the year when many of you are taking your vacations and many of you have guests from other states visiting you while on their vacations.

Many of these guests will no doubt be planning on going fishing, boating, water skiing or in some way making use of our many water areas and recreational opportunities.

We find that many of these people coming from other states are not aware of Wisconsin laws governing these activities and they soon find themselves in difficulty. We believe you have an obligation to properly advise these people, as we are sure you do not wish to have your friends and acquaintances spend part of their vacation in court.

If your guests are going to fish, please advise them that anyone 16 years of age or older must have a fishing license. If they are not residents of Wisconsin, their license must, of course, be a nonresident license. If your guest is a resident of Wisconsin—a resident license is proper, and if he is over 65 years of age and a resident of Wisconsin, he may get a free license.

If your friend is going to be using a boat, he should be advised that a coast guard approved life preserver must be in the boat and readily available for each person aboard. The boat must be registered and properly numbered if it is used with a motor or sail, and the certificate of number must be available on the boat for inspection at all times while it is being used. If the boat is used between sunset and sunrise, it must be equipped with proper lights and they must be used.

These are the regulations we are finding violated most frequently and in many cases it appears out of state people are not aware of them. If your guests are going to participate in water skiing or skin diving, there are regulations governing these activities which should be called to their attention.

We sincerely hope you will properly advise your friends and guests so their vacation and stay with you will be a pleasant one, and it will not be necessary to spend any of their time or money in court.

Your county agent went to see him the next morning in the hospital and this little boy began to cry. The Sister who was on the floor said, "he will be all right, he is not crying because the rib hurts, he is crying because his calf is going to be shown and he isn't going to show it."

There is another parallel this year. A young lad in St. Lawrence area has worked hard to prepare a calf to show; now he is suffering with an attack of appendicitis. At the last conversation with his dad it was still unknown if this boy would go to the hospital before or after the county fair.

We think of another young lad who was given the responsibility of the 4-H booth for his club. Some of the parents and leaders of the club thought they ought to forget it in 1963, but not this boy. He said, "we'll have a booth there regardless of what happens." With that kind of spirit how can he go wrong. It is this kind of spirit throughout all boys and girls that we think will lead to fine adults.

This is your invitation to come to the Washington county fair any time during the remaining days and see what these 1,000 4-H'ers and several hundred FFA and FHA members have done.

Come to the county fair and see the flower exhibits. On Saturday morning, July 27, the open class exhibits will be bringing their exhibits of flowers. If they repeat their past performance they will have a very beautiful flower show. It will be judged on Saturday afternoon by George Ziegler of our

university staff. Come and see this flower show, it will be a beauty.

Dutch Elm—Continuing Menace

Dutch Elm disease will destroy many trees in Washington county in 1963. It has already destroyed many in 1962. We can spray, we can cut down trees that are already infected, we can clean up and do many other things, but we can never possibly eliminate all of it. Remember, an elm tree lying on the ground, dead from Dutch Elm disease, still spreads the disease because the beetles emerge and spread the fungus to other trees.

Therefore, we suggest that you follow the sanitary procedures you can; this means getting rid of all elm wood by de-barking. Once

the bark is gone, the tree is no longer a problem. We have a reasonably good control system in the county. If you live in a city or village, there is a warden who will take samples of your suspected trees.

If you live in a township, you may or may not have an available warden. If you do, call him; if not, bring the sample in to the extension office and we will send it in for you to be tested. A sample includes a small branch of an infected tree. There should be about six to eight small branches that were recently killed, about the size of pencils. You will be informed if this is Dutch Elm disease or if it is not.
