Centennial Is Observed by St. Matthias Parish

T. AUBURN CHURCH MARKS 100 YEARS; WAS FORMER MISSION OF KEWASKUM

St. Matthias Catholic parish in the town of Auburn, located on County Trunk S near New Fane within the Kettle Moraine state forest, celebrated the centennial of its founding on Monday, July 29, at a solemn High Mass at 10 a. m. The Rev. Walter N. Morgan is pastor of the congregation.

The celebration also served as a proper observance for the recent remodeling of the structure for the 45 homeowners in the area who belong to the parish.

The Mass was sung by the Rev. Elroy Pesch, O.F.M., Cap., the first "priest-son" of the parish, who was ordained earlier this year. A former pastor, the Rev. Linus Garity, current pastor of St. Matthew's in Milwaukee, served as deacon, with the Rev. Walter Wagner, O.F.M., Cap. of Holy Cross monastery, Mt. Calvary, as sub-deacon.

The Most Rev. William E. Cousins, archbishop of the Milwaukee diocese, assisted in Cappa Magna and preached the sermon. His assistants were the Rev. Warren Schmitt, Campbellsport; the Rev. John Reichel, St. Kilian; the Rev. Matthew Urban, St. Michaels, and the Rev. Ralph Fliss, Milwaukee.

The Most Rev. Alphonse Schladeweller, New Ulm, Minn., was guest of honor. His assistants included the Rev. LeRoy Dierbeck, Lomira, and the Rev. Joseph Mueller, Byron. The Rev. Charles Wester of St. Mary's parish, West Bend, was master of ceremonies, and the choir consisted of sisters from St. Joseph's convent in Campbellsport.

Dinner was served to more than 250 persons at St. Matthew's parish gymnasium in Campbellsport, with 65 priests and six monignors in attendance.

Land for St. Matthias church was purchased in 1859, with construction getting underway in 1861. The parish was dedicated on Trinity Sunday by Bishop Henni of Milwaukee, and the Rev. John Reindl of the former village of Barton was the first pastor, conducting services once a month. In 1868 the parish was made a mission to Holy Trinity church in Kewaskum. From 1877 to 1881, the parish was a mission of St. Michael's church, and after 1881 it became a mission of St. Matthew's parish in Campbellsport, with the Rev. Johann A. Bertram and Father Heller serving. Since 1907, it has been attended by the chaplains of St. Joseph's convent in Campbellsport. It was attended by various priests for a period of 10 years until the Rev. John Bertram became pastor, a post he held for 24 years. Father Bertram was largely responsible for the remodeling, supervising installation of new altars, pews and stations, colored windows, a new furnace and painting.

After Father Bertram retired in 1942, the parish was served by the Rev. Robert Schweizer, the Rev. Leonard Koehring, the Rev. H. W. Latenberg, the Rt. Rev. Msgr.

Man Badly Hurt In Field Accident

In serious condition at St. Agnes hospital, Fond du Lac, this week was Joseph Flitter, 55, of R. 3, Campbellsport, who was badly injured when dragged part way into a chopper wagon on the Flitter and Sons farm Saturday.

A neighbor, Leo Dieringer, who lives about two blocks away, heard Flitter's cries for help and rushed to his assistance.

Firemen summoned to the scene gave first aid and then took him to St. Agnes hospital in the firemen's ambulance.

Flitter, a prominent area farmer, suffered a severe head wound, a badly mangled right arm, and severe cuts and bruises over much of his body. He lost considerable skin and flesh in the machine, it was reported.

Flitter was working alone in the field on his farm when the mishap occurred. There was only speculation as to how he became entangled in the moving blades and was drawn into the machine.

The farmer was admitted to the hospital at 6:25 p. m. Saturday.

Mrs. William F. Schultz, nee Mary A. Schaefer, aged 82, of 117 Main st., Kewaskum, passed away on Monday evening, July 29, at her home following an illness of several years. For many years Mrs. Schultz and her late husband formerly owned and operated the Republican House hotel. During this time they became very well known and built up a wide reputation for their excellent food.

A resident of this village for the past 62 years, Mrs. Schultz was born on Sept. 5, 1880, at Brothertown, Wis., a daughter of the late William and Pauline Margritz Schaefer, and was a resident of Beechwood before coming to Kewaskum. Her marriage to Mr. Schultz took place on June 26, 1902, in Kewaskum. He preceded her in death on Jan. 2, 1937.

Two brothers, the late Louis and Arthur Schaefer, also predeceased her. The only survivors are nephews, nieces, other relatives and many friends.

Mrs. Schultz was a member of the Ladies' Guild of Peace United Church of Christ, an honorary member and former active member of the Kewaskum Woman's club, and a member of the Order of the Eastern Star.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Friday, Aug. 2, at Peace United Church of Christ, the Rev. C. F. Hammen officiating. Burial was in the parish cemetery. 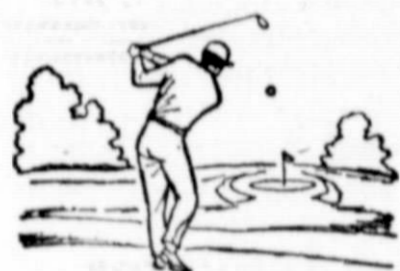
8th Annual Junior Open Golf Tournament Here Has 57 Entries; Winners Announced

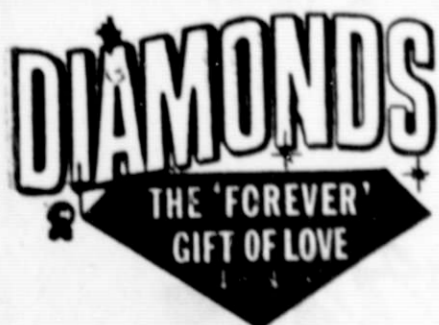

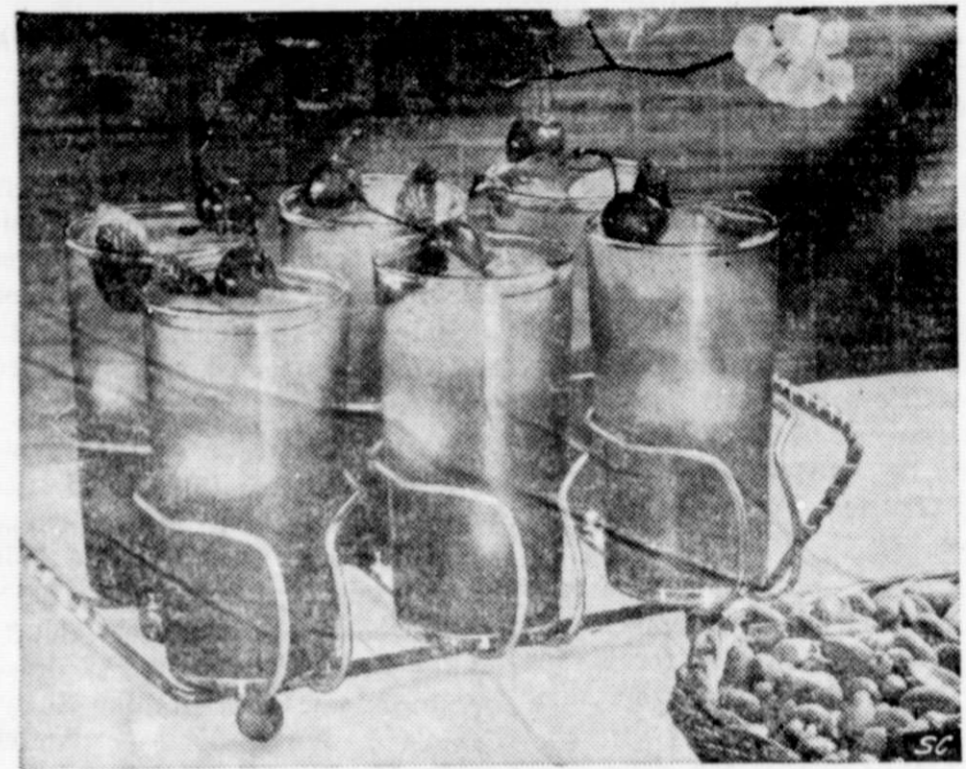

PHEASANTS RELEASED

The Hartford Community Conservation Club, Inc. released the pheasants that were furnished by the state game farm at Poynette and raised by the club. The birds

were released in the towns of Hartford, Erin, Addison and Polk in Washington county and the towns of Herman and Rubicon in Dodge county. The city of Hartford has the largest number of members. However, each township has many members, and the areas planted are where most members hunt. The members were informed of the Wisconsin Conservation Department ruling that birds were not to be released on posted land or lands that would be posted this fall.

A doe deer was killed Friday night on Highway 33 just west of the village of Newburg. A vehicle operated by a Port Washington man was towed to a garage.

The following information is for the owner or operator of a boat who might become involved in an accident: "If the boating accident results in death or injury to any person or total property damage in excess of \$100.00, every operator of a boat involved in such accident shall, as soon as possible, give notice of the accident to a conservation warden or local law enforcement officer and shall within 10 days after the accident, file a written report thereof with the commission on the form prescribed by it."

During August pleasure boaters outnumber fishermen on most waters. Fishermen are present

however in fair numbers during the morning and evening hours and have every right to be there.

Complaints from fishermen and other users of small boats increase at this time of the year. Most complaints are concerned about large, fast pleasure boats, sometimes large groups of them, creating hazardous wakes and much discomfort to the occupants of the smaller boats.

The law is plain that the operator of a boat is liable for any damage caused to the person or property of another by the wake or wash from such boat.

Another section of the law prohibits a boat from anchoring so as to prevent, impede or interfere with the safe passage of another boat.

It is apparent that a situation could develop where the fishermen would condemn the pleasure boater for creating a hazardous wake. The pleasure boater would condemn the fishermen for anchoring in a channel and the battle would be on. Some one could get hurt either physically, financially or both and in the end, no one would accomplish anything.

We believe the only answer is good judgment by all parties and it is going to be necessary for all persons using the water to "give a little." The fishermen should leave an opening for pleasure boats to pass through. An entire

channel should never be blocked. By the same token, pleasure boaters should respect the rights of fishermen and other small craft and should, at all times, when approaching them, slow their boat down a sufficient distance away so the boat flattens out well and leaves as little wake or wash as is possible.

Surely there are sufficient water areas available so everybody can enjoy their favorite water sport, but everyone must "give a little" and recognize the rights of others to use of the water, too.
