## Contributions to Cancer Drive of \$8,760 Set Record

**\$365.78 COLLECTED HERE IN "NEIGHBOR" CAMPAIGN; LIST LOCAL CHAIRMEN**

The Washington county unit of the American Cancer society again received record breaking contributions during their 1963 Crusade, according to a report released this week by D. J. Kenny, unit chairman.

In making public a report of 1963 campaign results and volunteer worker activities, Kenny announced that county contributions reached the \$8,760.23 mark, 9 per cent ahead of last year's record high. More than 6,000 individual, business and industrial gifts were given for the continuation of cancer research, education and allied services.

As the Washington county unit topped the Crusade goal again this year, a trend continued that has seen county residents support the Cancer society year after year with record contributions. The 1960, 1961 and 1962 contributions were \$7,515, \$7,800 and \$8,037, respectively, with each figure topping the quota for that year's campaign.

An important phase of the Cancer Crusade, the Neighbor to Neighbor campaign, was directed in Washington county communities by the following chairmen:

Residents of Cedar Lake Home again volunteered their time for the big job of preparing direct mail materials and assembling supplies used in the Crusade.

Mark D. Rosenheimer of Kewaskum served as chairman of the direct mail part of the Crusade and R. C. Klein headed the Neighbor to Neighbor program.

Direct mail receipts from townships and villages amounted to \$1,619.16, businesses and industries added \$1,521.50 and memorial contributions amounted to \$576.24. Alfred Seefeldt was township chairman for the town of Kewaskum in the direct mail solicitation.

In the Neighbor to Neighbor campaign, West Bend residents contributed \$3,024.49, Hartford \$1,151.05, Kewaskum \$365.78, Germantown \$166.60, Jackson \$137.60 and Slinger \$197.81, bringing the record total amount given in the county to \$8,760.23.

Kenny pointed out that while the local Crusade has ended, the battle against cancer continues throughout the year. ## Tracks at Main St. Crossing Improved By Railroad Crew

The Chicago & North Western Railway company for the past month has been working on track changes at the Main street crossing in Kewaskum and it was expected to have the work completed by the end of this week.

The west side track switch has been moved from south of the street to north of the street and the east track has been cut off on both sides of the crossing, leaving only one track through the crossing, which is the main line. Formerly there were three tracks running through the crossing. The wig-wag warning signals have also been moved closer to this main track.

Although work on this project has been in progress for several weeks the main work was done this week, when the crossing on Main st. was torn up and closed to traffic. Hwy. 28 and Main st. traffic was detoured over Railroad st. and second st. to Fond du Lac ave. (Hwys. 45 and 28).

The railroad has spent considerable time and money on this project to give auto traffic a better crossing. Henry Abel, local section foreman, is in charge of making these complicated changes, along with crews from Eden and Jackson.

A crane was also brought into use to move rails and ties and other heavy equipment in improving the right-of-way.

## Century Honors to 117 at State Fair

**FIVE WASHINGTON COUNTY RESIDENTS TO RECEIVE CERTIFICATES**

One hundred seventeen families tracing their farm or home ownership to pioneer relatives of 100 or more years ago will be awarded century farm and home certificates by State Fair of Wisconsin and the Wisconsin Exposition Board during State Fair, Aug. 9-18.

The ceremony scheduled Tuesday, Aug. 13, on Recognition Day, will include an award to five Washington county residents, including James M. Fehring, Polk; Milton H. Mueller, Jackson; Geo. W. Nehrbass, Polk; Joseph J. Walton, Hartford, and John P. Werner, Wayne; also six from Fond du Lac county, including Ben and Frances Ablard, Ashford.

These century farm and home awards were begun in 1948 at the time of the 23 day Wisconsin Centennial State Fair. Honors this year will be given 113 families that trace their deeds and abstracts to blood relatives of 100 years or more, and to four family homes with the same century of ownership and occupancy by the family. The cumulative list, including 1963, holds 2,128 names.

## 9 Lutheran Groups Of Area Make State Fair Souvenir Cards

Nine Lutheran groups in the Kettle Moraine area have helped make the 42,000 souvenir cards which will be given away at the Lutheran booth at the Wisconsin State Fair, Aug. 9-10.

The participating groups are:

St. John's Ladies Guild, New Fane; Immanuel Ladies Aid, Town Scott; St. John's Mission Circle, Sherman Center; St. John's Ladies Aid, Fredonia; St. Paul Mission Circle, Cascade; Pilgrim Ladies Guild, West Bend; Emmanuel Ladies Aid, Adell; Immanuel Evening Guild, Town Scott; St. Stephen, Batavia. All are members of the South Wisconsin district of the Lutheran Women's Missionary League, one of the sponsors of the booth.

To prepare the cards, the leaguers encircled brick-shaped sugar cubes with a gospel message strip, covered them with a transparent plastic wrapping and stapled one on each card. The cards, which are imprinted with bible verses, carry out the theme of the booth—"The Sweetest Story Ever Told."

Other features of the booth are a dial-a-prayer telephone, a large display of free tracts, and a children's corner where parochial teachers periodically give Christian object lessons. Pastors and lay workers also are on hand to answer inquiries.

The booth, now in its third year at the fair, is located in the General Exhibits building. Because of its success in reaching the unchurched, the booth has served as a pattern for similar efforts across the nation. It is the subject of a sound track and slides distributed by Concordia Tract Mission, St. Louis, Mo. Co-sponsors with the LWML is the Milwaukee Federation of Lutheran Churches, Missouri Synod.

After the baby arrives—how to get a firm grip on the situation by using simple holds when bathing, feeding, or carrying the baby; how to become a quick-change artist.

As the baby grows up—how to guard against infection and communicable disease; how to give the baby a feeling of "belonging" and so help him be a happy, well-balanced individual.

Interested prospective grandparents are invited to accompany the mothers and fathers for they are potential baby-sitters and should be prepared to give the baby the healthy start that is his right.



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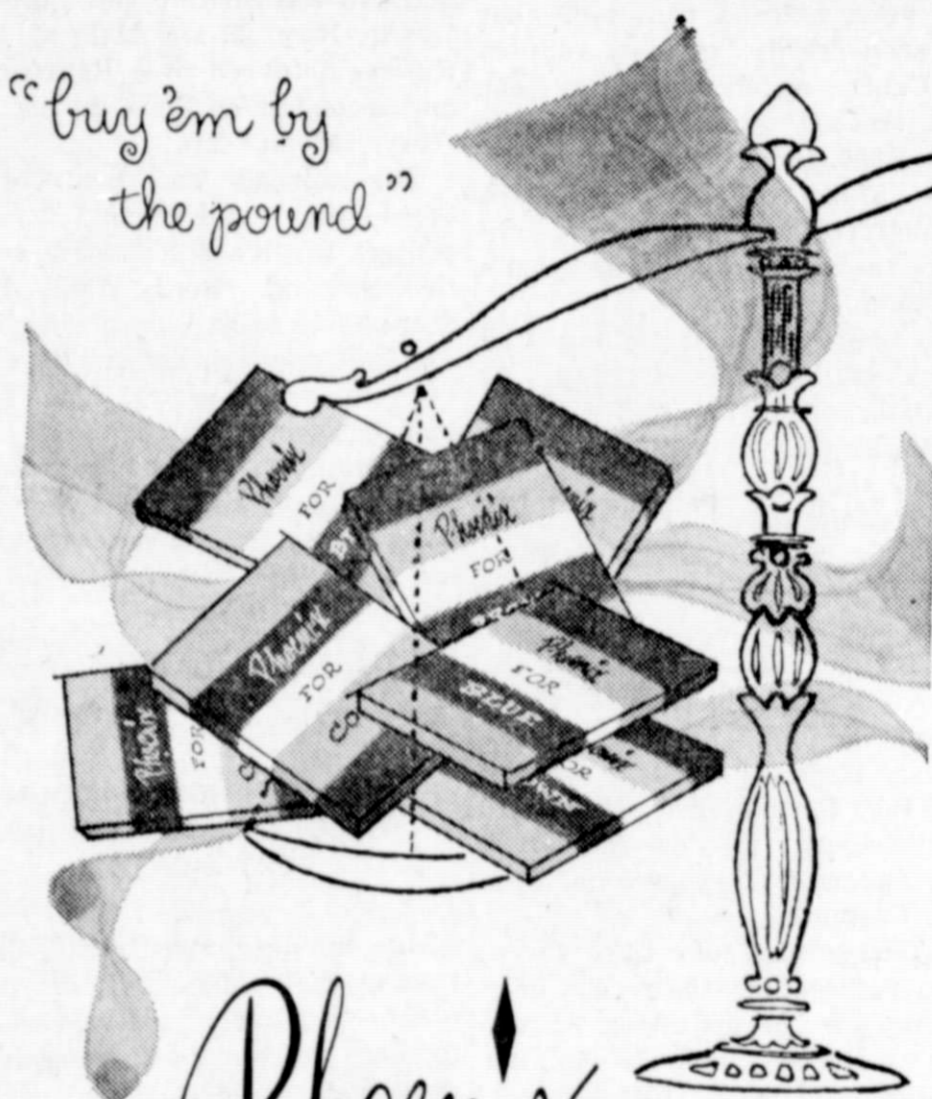
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## Lakes Team Wins Fourth Straight; Grafton Victim

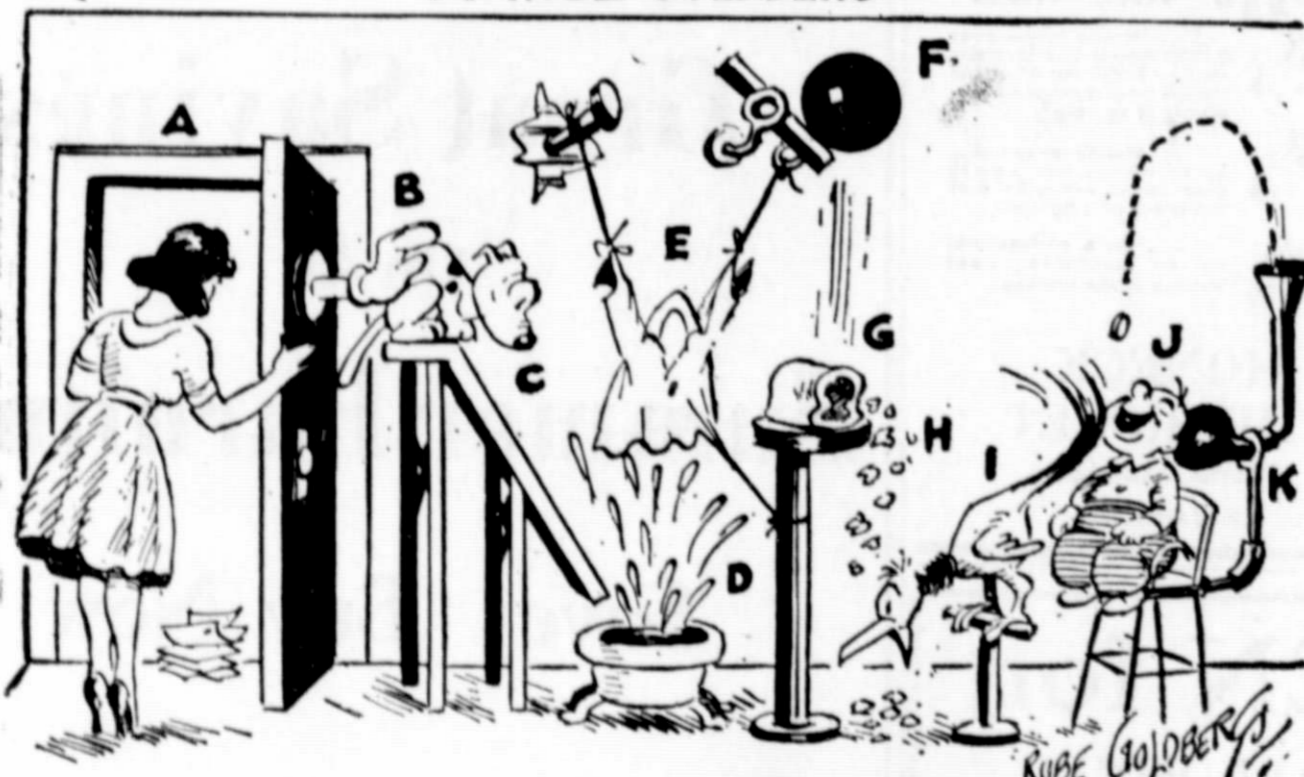

### RELEASE PHEASANTS AWAY FROM HIGHWAYS

Conservation clubs releasing pheasants for fall hunting should see that the birds are released as far as possible from federal, state and county trunk highways. Cool damp nights and warm days bring the birds out to the roads to dry off early in the morning. Far too many are hit and killed by cars and trucks.

Swallows are on the wires, young ducks are flying from lakes to rivers in the morning and evening hours, and a few Hungarian partridge are showing up in the stubble fields. In seven weeks the first hunting season will open. Fall is coming on fast.

There are more drownings at this time of the year than at any other time. Most drownings are due to carelessness, and could be prevented.

At this time of the year fishing usually slows down, especially during the heat of the day; most people turn to other forms of outdoor recreation.

For many this other recreation is swimming, water skiing or just pleasure boating. These activities are good wholesome recreation, but they do have their hazards. Persons who participate only for this short period of time

are not as proficient at it as those who take part in these activities all summer long. The hazards that go with all water sports are even greater for these persons.

If you are an amateur and are going to take up water skiing, be sure you get instructions and advice from someone who is proficient at it, knows the equipment necessary, and follow his advice to the letter. Also be sure you have a good competent person operating the boat, and preferably have two people in the boat—one operating the boat and one watching you, so that in case of an accident, the boat operator can be immediately informed.

If you are swimming, be sure you know the water you are swimming in so you don't step over a drop-off and get into difficulty. Don't trust your luck at swimming great distances. You may have been able to swim miles some time ago, but because you do not do a lot of it, you may not have the stamina now that you once had.

When Mom and Dad swim, the youngsters are sure to want to try it too. Teach them to swim as young as possible and give them the advantage of professional training where that is available. Teach them not to fear the water, but to respect it. While they are real young it is necessary to watch them at all times, as it is not necessary to be in deep water to drown.

We hope you can enjoy some of these other kinds of water recreation, but please be careful.

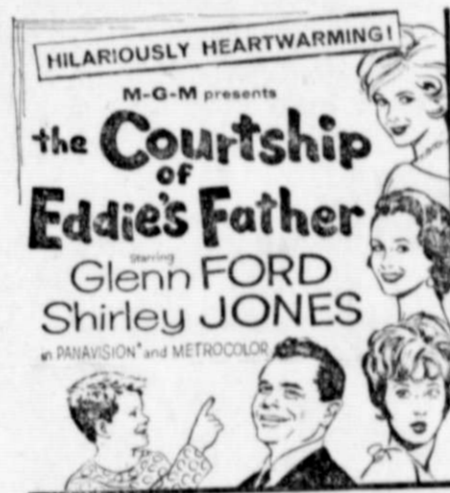

## COUNTY AGENT NEWS

By MAURICE J. HOVLAND  
Washington County Agent

### CORN APHIDS

Washington county agriculture has a new problem. Corn aphids were reported in the St. Lawrence area on July 31. Aphids are small green insect-like pests that appear in large clusters around the base of the tassel. "On fields of late corn which is just now starting to tassel, if large colonies of aphids are found on more than 10% of the stalks, then spraying will help—but it must be done immediately," states Ellsworth Fisher, University of Wisconsin entomologist. To control it 1/4 to 1/2 pound of parathion per acre. It must be applied by airplane.

Most farmers will ask: "What will this cost me per acre?" We cannot tell you since it depends on who does the spraying. Corn has a value of about \$120 per acre. If you increase the yield per acre of corn 3, 4, 5 or 8 bushels per acre or more, it probably will more than pay you to spray. Certainly aphids as thick as we have seen them will decrease the yield of corn. If you want to wait for diseases to infect these colonies, spraying will not be necessary. Naturally, you can expect a decrease in yield if you decide thus.

The decision on whether or not to spray is up to the individual. If you want more information we will gladly supply it to you.

### WHITE GRUBS

If you have a field in an area

that is not well-traveled, you may think pigs have been rooting in that area. This is not pigs, it is skunks. The favorite food of skunks is white grubs.

White grubs will cause problems this fall. Many people have called in to report that they are finding spots on their lawns which are turning brown. Perhaps you also have noticed this on your lawn. If you can pick up large clumps of grass merely by pulling on the grass, that is an indication of white grub injury. White grubs cut off the roots just below the surface of the ground. Unless you do something, you can expect the damage to increase. This is the season when grass needs especially good roots to furnish moisture to the plant. For control, we suggest chlordane, toxophene, aldrin, or dieldrin all will be very effective. Spray or sprinkle it on and thoroughly water so that the chemical is taken down into the ground where the white grubs feed.

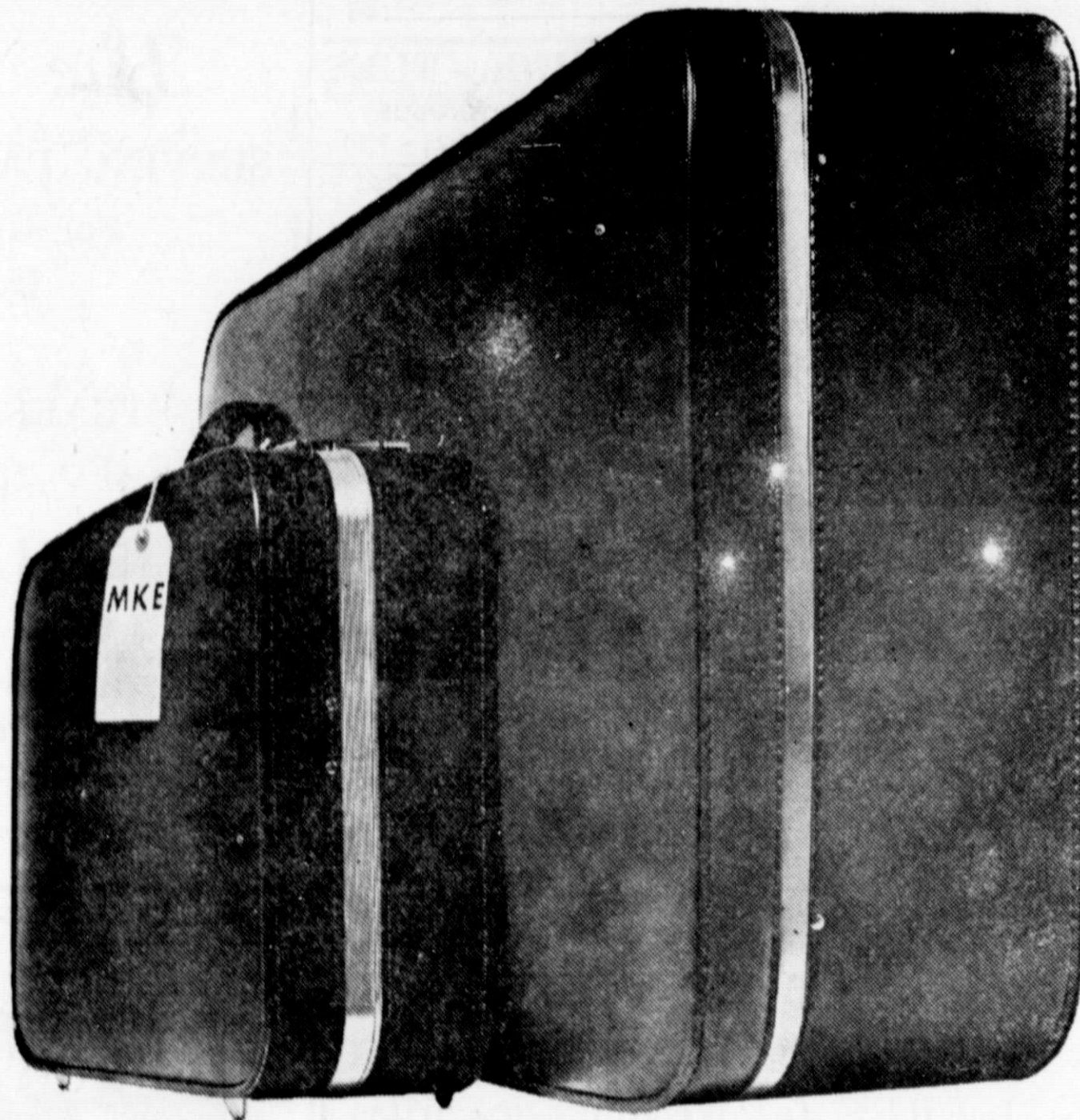

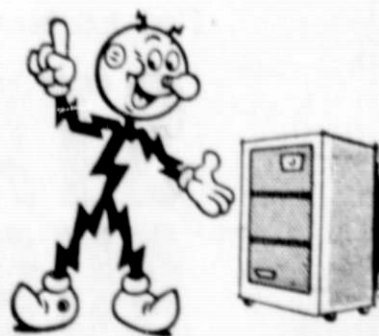
