## Kewaskum Public Schools to Open Sept. 3 With Staff of 43 Teachers

### Seven New Teachers Added to Staff in High School, Grades

UPPER CLASSMEN IN HIGH SCHOOL TO REPORT DAY LATER, SEPT. 4

The Kewaskum Elementary school for all grades, kindergarten through eighth, will open on Tuesday, Sept. 3, at 9:00 a. m. Incoming freshmen and transfer students will report to the high school on Tuesday, Sept. 3, at 9:00 a. m. All other high school students (sophomores, juniors and seniors) will report for the first time on Wednesday, Sept. 4, at the usual time of 8:15 a. m.

The cafeteria in both the grade and high schools will be open for the first time on Wednesday, Sept. 4. Grade and high school youngsters reporting on Tuesday will have to bring their own lunches for that day and will have to be able to provide money for their lunch tickets for the balance of the week which will be 75c. All students reporting for the first time on Wednesday and who wish to eat in the high school cafeteria Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, should report to the school office immediately upon arrival Wednesday morning to purchase their lunch tickets. WEEKLY LUNCH TICKETS FOR THE BALANCE OF THE SCHOOL YEAR MUST BE PURCHASED ON FRIDAY OF THE PRECEDING WEEK.

Buses will make their usual runs as they did during the first semester of last year beginning on Tuesday, Sept. 3, the only difference being that on this first day of school they will be running one-half hour later than on subsequent days.

It is the hope of the administration that parents will insist that their children will be in regular attendance. It is only through regular attendance that children maintain a high interest in school and school activities. Regular attendance invariably reflects a higher degree of academic performance.

Parents of children who will be attending kindergarten and who have not registered for them are asked to do so in the grade school office on Wednesday, Aug. 28. Parents of kindergarten youngsters will be informed which session their children will be assigned to attend.

Kindergarten and both sections of grades one and two will be housed in the new grade school building. All other grade school students will be housed in the upper elementary building.

## Soft Drink, Coin Laundry Machines Are Looted Here

An outdoor soft drink vending machine at Honeck Chevrolet, Inc. and three vending machines containing soft drinks, candy and cigarettes at the Ours Coin Laundry were looted by thieves sometime early last Saturday morning, estimated to be between 3 and 5 a. m.

The thieves apparently forced open the coin boxes on the machines or removed them completely to take the money and then replaced them so that the thefts would not be noticed immediately. At the Ours laundry, open 24 hours a day, approximately \$21.75 was taken, while at Honeck Chevrolet only from \$2.50 to \$3.00 was obtained as the machine had just been emptied the day before.

The same morning a break-in at the Regner city park bathhouse in West Bend was reported. There thieves forced open a cigarette machine and obtained between \$18 and \$22. A window was broken to gain entrance.

The thefts are linked with a series of forcible entries in vending machines in the Washington county area the past week. Outdoor soft drink vending machines were also looted in West Bend and Newburg early last Wednesday morning and others were "hit" at Germantown and Menomonee Falls.

Local and county police investigated the lootings and are on the lookout for the thieves.

## Buswell Completes UW Teacher Course In Driver Education

WILL CONDUCT DRIVER TRAINING COURSE IN LOCAL HIGH SCHOOL

Eighteen Wisconsin high school teachers completed Friday the eight-week teacher preparation course in driver education at the University of Wisconsin at Madison.

Completion of the course enables the teachers to apply for a teaching certificate in driver education. All of the teachers expect to be conducting such courses in state high schools this fall.

Each teacher attended the summer course with the aid of a scholarship from the Allstate Foundation.

The summer course, taught by Prof. C. F. Damron, director of the university's safety education program, deals with purposes, content and method of developing driver education programs.

Driver education is taught in a growing number of Wisconsin schools to teenagers just entering the legal driving age. Instruction includes classroom lectures and behind-the-wheel practice.

Wisconsin requires driver education teachers to have six semester hours of credit in safety education, Prof. Damron said.

Teachers awarded certificates included Earl A. Buswell, Kewaskum.

## Sportsmen's Club To Release 1,300 Pheasants Sunday

CLUB NOW HAS ITS LARGEST MEMBERSHIP OF 170; 43 ATTEND LAST MEETING

Forty-three members, the largest number ever to attend a meeting of the Kettle Moraine Sportsmen's association of Kewaskum, were present at the last meeting of the club held on Tuesday evening, Aug. 13, at the Legion clubhouse. The association now has grown to 170 members, the largest number on record for the club.

This Sunday, Aug. 25, between the hours of 7:30 and 11:30 a. m., club members will release the pheasants that were raised in their brooder house and pens this summer. Approximately 1,300 birds or more will be distributed to individual members in equal numbers to be released at a spot of their choice. Members should bring their own containers to pick up their pheasants. Game Manager Armin Schwengel of Washington county will be present to supervise the planting of the birds.

Out of the original 1,400 day-old chicks received by the club from the conservation department, the club lost less than 100 birds in the raising process. This is a very good average. The caretakers did an excellent job of raising the pheasants, which now are 11 weeks old and very healthy.

The club wishes to thank everyone who donated time and material and helped with the work on the new brooder house and pens.

All members are asked to turn out for a "clean-up" party of the pens and brooder house on Tuesday, Sept. 3.

## 25 Years Ago

Aug. 19, 1938

Victor E. Victoreen, 47, president of the Wisconsin Butter Exchange, Inc., Milwaukee, was fatally injured when he lost control of his auto just north of the Light-house ballroom on Hwy. 55, four miles south of Kewaskum. During a light rain, his car skidded off the road and overturned in a ditch. He suffered a crushed chest, punctured lung and severe head injury and was taken to the West Bend hospital by a passing motorist, Kilian Felix of St. Kilian, where he died about an hour later. Three companions in the car escaped with bruises.

Mr. and Mrs. Henry Kirchner, Jr. and daughter moved from Wayne into the Mrs. Rob. Backhaus flat on 2nd st. Mr. Kirchner until recently operated the Wayne tavern and now has employment at the West Bend Aluminum Co. Mr. Abel of Slinger, who formerly was a tavernkeeper in Elmore, will take over the Wayne tavern.

Mr. and Mrs. Henry Kirchner, Sr. and son, who for many years operated a tavern at Myra, moved to this village. Mr. Kirchner has taken over the Archway Cafe. Lester Dreher, who conducted the Archway for the past two years, has again gone into the cattle business, and the family has moved into the Jacob Schlosser home. The Archway, at the intersection of Fond du Lac ave. and Main st., is a new structure erected just over two years ago by the owner, Walter Schneider.

At a special meeting of the village board, the members passed a motion to install new ornamental

street lighting on Main st. and Fond du Lac ave. The new standards will replace the suspended street lights now in use. Bids will be opened and work is expected to begin in September. Cables for the new lights were already laid in 1930 at the time Main st. was paved. A total of 26 light standards will be installed with an additional six to be placed on the Milwaukee river bridge. On Fond du Lac ave. the standards will occupy both sides of the street as far south as the Honeck garage and north to Val Peters' harness shop. The entire Main st. will have lights. All lights will remain on until midnight when those on one side of the street will go out. The cost of the project will amount to approximately \$3,500.

### FIFTY YEARS AGO

Burglars broke into the local post office during Tuesday night and escaped with a team of horses and rig which they stole from the Grell & Wollensak creamery barn. The team was found at Calvary cemetery at Fond du Lac early Wednesday morning. The horses were tired and jaded and bore the marks of a hard night drive. They were found abandoned by one of the men employed at the creamery. Marshal Geo. F. Brandt, Deputy Sheriff Wm. Schultz and S. C. Wollensak, owner of the team, autoed to Fond du Lac to claim the team.

Four alleged safe blowers suspected of attempting to rob the post office at Kewaskum Tuesday night were taken off a passenger train at Forest Park, Ill. The suspects resisted arrest and the struggle that ensued caused a small panic among the women pas-

sengers. Arrested were William "Bid" Houlihan, 50, Chicago; William "Baily" Burns, 25, 22 E. 18th st.; Daniel Murphy, 58, Alhambra hotel, and James Moore, 30, Kansas City.

Sunday afternoon during the absence of Chas. Raether and his family, living two miles north of this village, Mr. Raether's farm residence was entered and several articles stolen. The burglars entered the house through the basement door. They made their getaway with a new coat, three rings, a watch, revolver and several small articles.

### Completes Course At California U.

Announcement was received from Edward P. Coleman, professor of engineering at the University of California, that John P. ### Local UW Student Gaining Experience In Surveying Camp

Theodore W. Meilahn, R. 2, Kewaskum, is among 37 civil engineering students of the University of Wisconsin, Madison, who are gaining practical "down to earth" experience this summer in the second of two surveying camps in the heart of the Chequamegon National Forest in Wisconsin's Bayfield county.

The civil engineering students, under the guidance of their teachers, are going to school in the

second of two six-week sessions at a summer surveying camp in the Namekagon lake and river country near Cable and Grandview in Bayfield county. The first six-week camp session ran through July 20. The second session runs through Aug. 31.

The engineering students apply theoretical knowledge they have learned in UW engineering classrooms during the regular school year to actual surveying work in the field at the summer camp sessions. Prof. Eldon C. Wagner, of the UW civil engineering department, explains. The students' work at camp included computation, mapmaking and report writing, with consideration given to problems in topographic and hydrographic surveys, triangulation, route surveys, stream flow measurement, analysis or waterpower sites and railway problems, he said.

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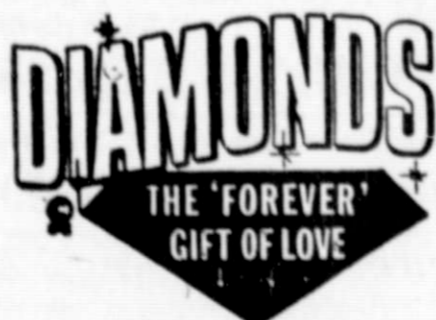

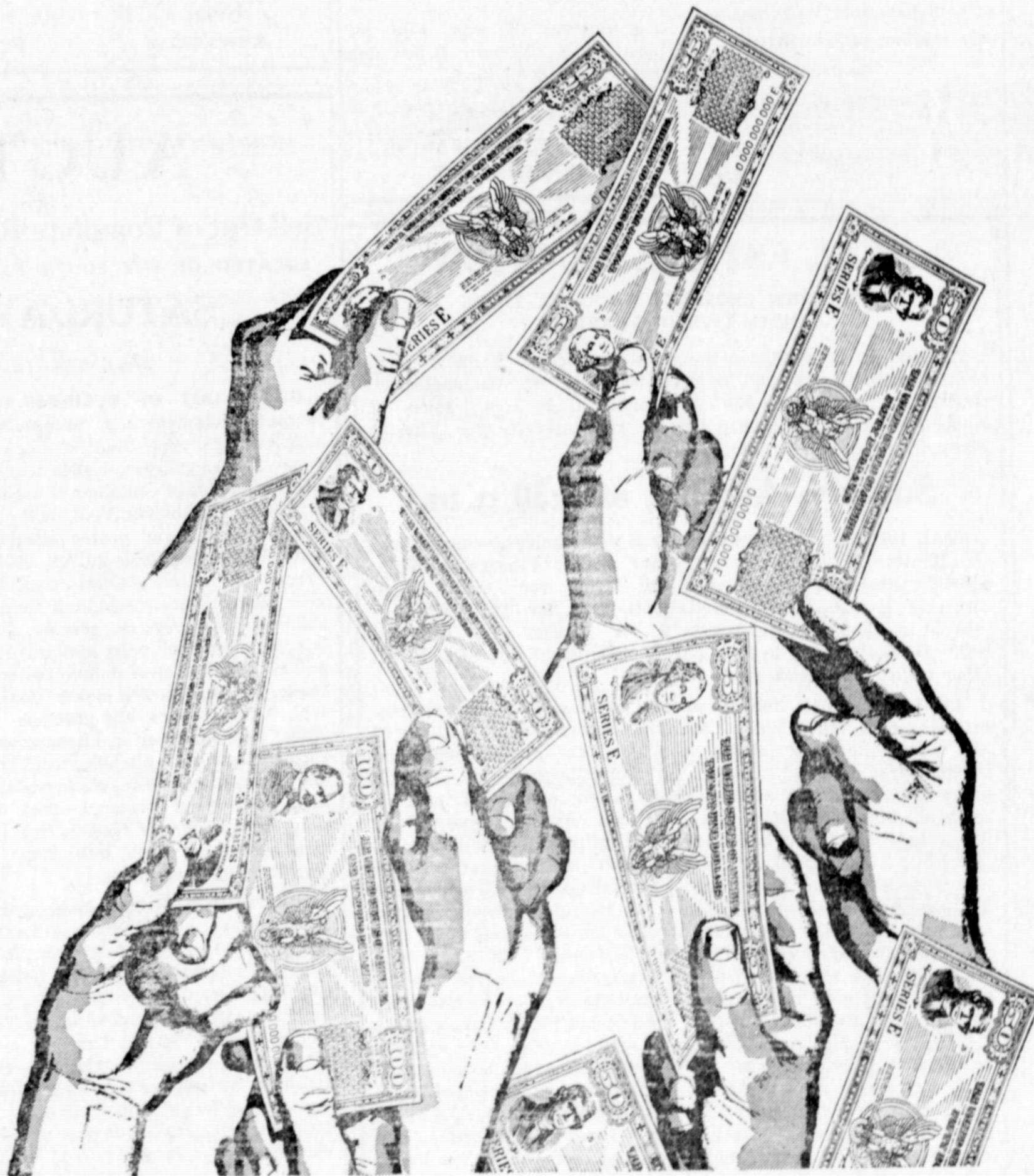

Early Sunday morning the Milwaukee river, pot holes with water and the various canning factory lagoons were loaded with bluewing teal, wigeon and woodduck. This is the start of the fall migration. In the 1890's and the early 1900's the teal season opened on Horicon marsh at the various hunt clubs on Aug. 15.
