Frederick Schroeder of West Bend attended the 16th annual convention of the National Association of Artificial Breeders in Los Angeles, Calif.

More than 500 conventioners gathered at the famed Ambassador Hotel for the annual four-day event, from Aug. 25 to 28.

Schroeder is associated with the East Central Breeders Co-op of Waupun, as secretary-treasurer of the board of directors.

The N.A.A.B. is composed of dairy and beef cattle artificial breeding organizations throughout the United States and Canada. More than 30,000 Holstein dairymen are currently using similarly distinctive prefixes in naming their home-bred cattle. The total is growing at the rate of 1,500 annually.

Since the average Holstein breeder derives 15 percent of his income from sales of registered breeding stock, the plan, which literally "trademarks" each animal throughout its lifetime, has unique advertising value.

Visits Farmco Mill And Research Farms

The research farm at Lexington, Ill., visited by the tour group, is one of seven large farms devoted to the research and testing of the Farmco feeding program. The farm at Lexington is used in the testing of beef and hog feed; other farms in the complex test feeds for other classes of livestock.

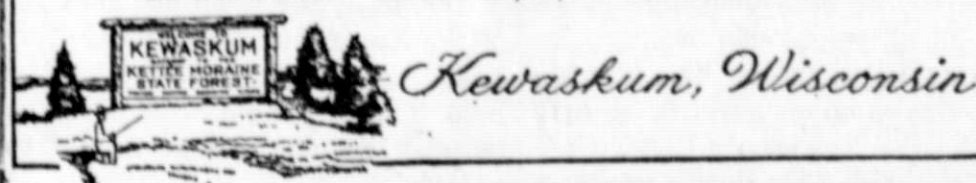

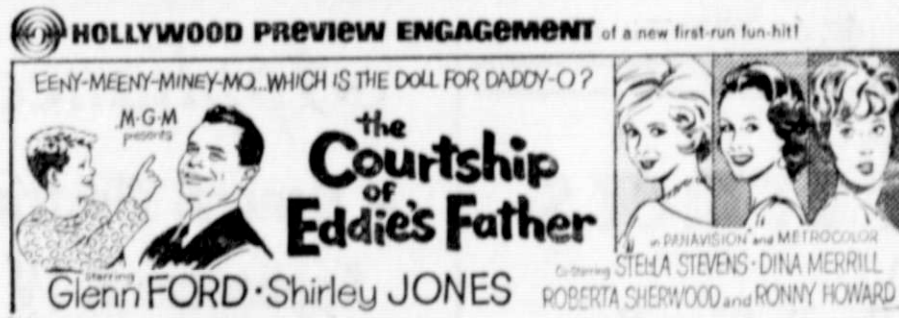
