## Fire Department's New \$28,000 Fire Engine Arrives Wednesday FWD Pumper to Be Put Into Service Within Next Week

Fire Chief Armin Oppermann and several members of the department were to Appleton on Wednesday to pick up and deliver the Kewaskum Fire Department's new fire engine-pumper, which was purchased at a cost of approximately \$28,000, including the equipment. About 50 per cent of the cost of the engine is being absorbed by the fire department itself.

The pumper, ordered by the department some months ago, is a Clintonville four-wheel drive and was purchased from the Boland Truck and Equipment company of Milwaukee. It is capable of pumping 1,000 gallons of water a minute.

The new pumper was to be tested this Friday by officials of the Boland company and the Wisconsin Rating Bureau. If they find the pumper and all apparatus in 100 per cent operating order, the fire engine will be put into service by the department within the next week or so as soon as all the equipment has been mounted onto it.

This pumper is the latest in fire fighting equipment. Local firemen are now well equipped to fight all kinds of fires. The new apparatus will be used at rural fires as well as all fires in the village for the present.

The fire engine will be displayed at an open house at the fire station on Sunday, Oct. 6, from 1 to 5 p. m. and the public is invited to come and see it. Coffee and doughnuts will be served. This date also marks the beginning of Fire Prevention Week.

A photo of the new pumper and complete details on the apparatus and equipment will appear in next week's issue of the Statesman.

You can purchase two and maybe three (depending on the number of people who sign up for an extinguisher during this time) extinguishers for what it would cost you for one extinguisher at the normal prices. It would be very appropriate to purchase one for use in the home, trailer, car and boat. Stop in during this week.

8,000 to 10,000 At Turkey Shoot, 492 Birds Taken

SHOOT IS MOST SUCCESSFUL HELD IN ELEVEN YEAR HISTORY OF EVENT

The 11th annual Live Turkey Shoot, sponsored by the Kiwanis club of Kewaskum as a community project, at the Bar-N Dude Ranch last Sunday easily outdid last year's shoot and was the most successful held in the 11 year history of this popular event. Each year the affair becomes bigger and better.

Thousands of persons, estimated between 8,000 and 10,000 visited the grounds throughout the day. More than 3,800 shooters participated in the Turkey Shoot event alone. This is 168 more than last year. A total of 492 turkeys, both live and frozen, 57 more than last year, were won by participants. Of this number, 312 live birds were taken on the rifle firing line and the remaining 180 frozen turkeys were bagged in the cross bow, deer rifle and pistol shot ranges.

Besides the above events, the activity was also brisk all day in the trap shooting, sausage shooting and trout pond events. The food stands served bratwurst, hot dogs and barbecued beef sandwiches to almost 4,000 persons and the latter two were sold completely out around 4 p. m. Countless thousands of bottles and cups of refreshments, boxes of popcorn and cotton candy were sold.

Profits from these Turkey Shoots are used for the Kiwanis club's work with the young people of the community, which includes Little League and Babe Ruth baseball programs, Camp Wawbeek, Boys' State and Girls' State activities, swimming beach and playground equipment at the village park, playground equipment at the grade school, tennis courts at the high school and many other projects.

Without the help of many, many people who are not Kiwanians it would be impossible for the club to sponsor a program of this size. The club wishes to publicly acknowledge and thank everyone who assisted before, during and after the shoot in making it a tremendous success.

BUILDING CONSTRUCTION MAY GET UNDERWAY BY NOV. 1

In a special referendum election held Tuesday in the grade school gymnasium, electors of the Kewaskum Elementary School Joint District No. 1 approved the issuance of \$250,000 in general obligation bonds for construction of an addition to the present elementary school building in the village.

The vote was 161 "yes" and 109 "no." Despite the fact that the project should have stirred up a great deal of interest because of its importance and cost, the vote was very light. Only 270 electors bothered to turn out and mark ballots out of a potential vote of approximately 1,500 in the school district. The weather was beautiful.

Plans for the new building addition would connect the present new primary building which contains the kindergarten and grades one and two and the former old high school building which houses the upper elementary grades and special education facilities.

The new addition, which will contain an estimated 16,000 or more square feet of floor space, will contain eight classrooms, a music room, office, teachers' room and lavatory facilities. It is hoped to begin construction on the new project by Nov. 1 of this year.

According to Richard Zaring, principal of the elementary school, the building program was undertaken because of the anticipated increase in enrollment next year and the steadily increasing demand for additional classrooms. The present elementary enrollment is 450 and it is estimated that the number of pupils will increase to 480 by next year.

The elementary school district serves the village of Kewaskum and the towns of Kewaskum and Barton in Washington county, and the towns of Ashford and Auburn in Fond du Lac county.

The election polls were open from 7 a. m. until 8 p. m. Tuesday, giving everyone an opportunity to vote. Because of the light vote, the tally of the referendum ballots was completed before 9 p. m.

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



### PARTRIDGE, WOODCOCK SEASON OPENS SATURDAY

The bow and arrow deer season opened this past Saturday. The usual number of hunters were on hand (the majority from Milwaukee). The largest group was at the Theresa public hunting grounds. A very nice six point buck was killed at the Dodge - Washington county line by Timothy G. Kuhns of Milwaukee.

The partridge and woodcock season will open state-wide at 5:51 a. m. Saturday, Sept. 28. Hunting license and copies of the regulations are available at all license depots in the county. There is a difference of one-half hour in the shooting hours of big game and small game. As an example, the bow and arrow deer hunter may shoot at 5:21 a. m. on Saturday, the gun partridge hunter 5:51 a. m.

The setline season closes on Sept. 30. Therefore, it is necessary that all setlines be removed from the water not later than one-half hour after sundown on that day.

Some people have the impression that it is permissible to leave an unbaited setline in and remove it at their convenience. This is not true. All setlines, whether baited or not, must be removed by one-half hour after sundown on Sept. 30.

As the hunting seasons approach, we get many questions relative to hunting. Here are answers to some of them.

To hunt you must have a hunting license. You cannot buy a hunting license until you are 12

yrs. of age. Between the ages of 12 and 16 yrs., you must hunt with a parent or guardian or someone 21 yrs. of age, designated by the parent or guardian.

You may use a 410 gauge shotgun to hunt any game where a larger shotgun may be used, except that it may not be used to hunt deer or bear.

You must report every hunting accident.

Any firearm carried in or on any automobile or vehicle must be unloaded and enclosed within a carrying case.

Any gun carried in a motor boat while the motor is running must be unloaded.

A 22 rim fire hand gun or a pellet gun of .177 caliber or larger may be used in the same manner for the same purpose and subject to the same restrictions as a 22 rim fire rifle. You may not use any other hand gun for hunting.

For the second straight week the Kewaskum Indians failed to hang onto an early lead and for the second straight time they were beaten by a narrow margin in Scenic Moraine conference football action. The score of last Friday's game at Germantown was 13-7.

Two interceptions by Bill Baudhuin and the defensive alertness of Roger Windorski, Ken Stuetgen and Don Timpel helped Germantown squeeze out the win. It was the second straight win for the predominately underclass Germantown squad and the second loss for Kewaskum's light but scrappy team.

Mike Coulter, running exceptionally well for the Indians in the first half, raced three yards a round end for the first touchdown

of the game and Bob Miller kicked the extra point.

Baudhuin, who completed five passes for 97 yards and threw well on a few others, tossed a touchdown pass to Terry Thorin in the second period, with the play covering 51 yards. Germantown went ahead to stay in the third quarter when Stuetgen plunged one yard for the TD and then ran the extra point.

Kewaskum's inability to hit on passes, connecting on only four of 18 for 26 yards, played a factor in the loss, along with two interceptions.


