## Seek Bids Here For Elementary School Addition

Sealed bids will be received by the Joint School District No. 1 of the village of Kewaskum, towns of Kewaskum and Barton, Washington county, and towns of Ashford and Auburn, Fond du Lac county, until 8 p. m. on Nov. 20 for the construction of an addition to the Kewaskum elementary school building.

Bids are advertised on another page of this issue and will be accepted at the school cafeteria. Bids will be opened publicly by the school board.

At a meeting last week, the board approved plans and specifications for the new structure and established a tentative bond schedule which it hopes to have available Dec. 1. Bonds will come due every six months.

Bids will be received on general construction, heating and ventilat ing, plumbing and drainage, and electrical work. The contract documents, including plans and specifications, are on file and may be examined at the office of the principal, Richard Zarling; at the office of the architect, Lawrence E. Bray, Inc., Sheboygan, and at the following exchanges: Milwaukee Builders, Dodge-Milwaukee, Green Bay, Fond du Lac, and Fox Valley. They may be obtained from the architect by depositing \$25 for each set.

A certified check or bank draft made payable to Joint School District No. 1 in an amount of not less than 5% of the maximum bid. or a bid bond of at least 5% and not to exceed 10% of the maximum bid, shall accompany each bid as a guarantee that, if the bid is accepted, the bidder will execute and file the proposed contract and bond within 10 days after award of the contract. A surety bond of 100% of the contract price will be required of the successful contractor.

## 2nd Immunization Injections to Be Given Here Nov. 5

The second phase of the immunization program for Washington county school children will be held next Tuesday, Nov. 5, according to an announcment made this week by the office of the county health nurse.

Physicians of West Bend, Jack son and Kewaskum will give immunizations in their offices from approximately 4 to 5 p. m. Dr. R. G. Edwards of Kewaskum will give the injections in his office from 3:30 to 5:30 p. m. on Tuesday. In Allenton, however, the immunizations will be administered on Thursday, Nov. 7, and Drs. F. I. Bush and R. D. Gibson of West Bend will administer injections on Tuesday, Nov. 12. Fifty cents will be collected at the time the injection is given.

These immunizations offer protection against diphtheria, tet anus, and whooping cough, and parents are urged to take advantage of this program.

The purpose of the American Forage Alliance, according to Teweles, is to provide farmers with the information and technical service that will be required to increase beef and dairy production by almost 50% within the next ten years to meet the food requirements of an expanding population.

A Washington county highway worker was struck and fatally injured Tuesday afternoon by a truck on Hwy. 41 just north of Hwy. 144 near Slinger. It was the third traffic fatality on county highways in less than a week.





## Looking Thru the Field Glasses . . .

## 13 DEER KILLED IN COUNTY; DEER HUNTING TIPS GIVEN

Fourteen deer were killed in Washington county the week of Oct. 20 thru 27; eight hit by cars, one killed by another buck, two shot by rabbit and squirrel hunters and three legal kills by bow and arrow hunters.

Hunters who have been able to hunt for grouse, pheasant and squirrels have had fair to good luck the past week. Best hunting was when wet or at least when a heavy dew was on the ground.

Many hunters fail to get a deer each season for reasons that could be avoided with just a little preparation.

It is not unusual to see a hunter with a new rifle and scope sight costing several hundred dollars who has not spent the time or cost of a few shells to sight in the rifle and fire a few practice shots. It also is not unusual to see hunters decked out in new hunting clothes of great value and hunting with an old beat-up gun he has never shot before, the hunter not being sure it will fire or what would happen if it did-

If you are going to hunt deer this fall, I would recommend you do the following:

(1) Check over the gun you plan on using this deer season to see that the parts are all there and the screws are tight. If you plan on a new sight, get it now and avoid the rush at your local gunsmith. This will also give you time to sight it in and practice with it The same applies to the purchase of a new gun.

(3) Before you leave for the range, see to it that you have adequate targets and some thumb tacks. Be sure you have the same weight ammunition that you will use during the deer season. This is important as, for example, if you sight your .30-06 in with 150

(4) The distance you sight the gun in for is up to the individual. However, as most of the deer in Wisconsin are killed at a range of 50 yards or less, sighting your rifle in for 100 yards is very satisfactory for the average rifle of the 30.30 type. When sighted in for 100 yards, the bullets will hit approximately 3" high at 50 yards and 3" low at 150 yards.

(5) If you plan on using a shotgun and slugs, keep in mind the fact that inexpensive, simple-toinstall, and removable (do it yourself) sights are available for most pump action and automatic shotguns. These sights will improve your slug-shooting a great deal. With or without sights, start your sighting in at 25 yards. Then move back to 50 and then to 80 or 100 yards. Eighty yards is about the normal accurate limit of a shotgun slug.


