Unexpected Deaths of Clifford M. Rose, Superintendent of Schools, and His Brother Leland M. Rose Occur Only Four Days Apart

Served As Head of Kewaskum Schools More Than 27 Years

WAS MEMBER OF NUMEROUS EDUCATIONAL, CIVIC AND CHURCH ORGANIZATIONS

This community was shocked the past week by the unexpected deaths of two prominent residents, Kewaskum Superintendent of Schools Clifford M. Rose, 63, and his brother, Leland M. Rose, 61, a former teacher in the school system, which occurred only four days apart.

Leland Martin Rose died early Saturday morning, Dec. 7, of a heart attack at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Albrecht, 1217 Fond du Lac ave., where he stayed. Clifford M. Rose, who resided at 114 Clinton st., passed away at Madison General hospital at about 12:30 p. m. on Wednesday, Dec. 11. He and Mrs. Rose were on their way back from Platteville, where they had attended burial services for his brother Leland Tuesday afternoon. They stayed overnight with friends in Madison. The next morning (Wednesday) Mr. Rose became ill and was taken to Madison General hospital, where everything possible was done to save his life but to no avail and he passed away early in the afternoon.

Clifford Rose grew up and spent his early days at Platteville, where he attended Platteville Normal school. He received his Bachelor of Education degree from Platteville and his master's degree from the University of Wisconsin, Madison. Mr. Rose spent his entire life as an educator. He taught at Barneveld, Darlington and Montfort before coming to Kewaskum in 1932. He became principal of Kewaskum High school in 1936 and for the past six years was superintendent of schools in Kewaskum. Mr. Rose had served as head of the Kewaskum school system for more than 27 years and was publicly honored on May 19, 1957 upon the completion of 25 years of service in the Kewaskum school systems.

Mr. Rose was a member of the Masonic Order, West Bend chapter; a past president of the Kiwanis Club of Kewaskum, of which organization he was still a member; a member of Peace United Church of Christ, former treasurer and past president of the congregation, sang in the church choir for 25 years and acted as soloist in the community for many years. He served as president and secretary of the Scenic Moraine conference, vice-president of the Northeastern Education association, and was a member of the National Education association, Wisconsin Education association, Kewaskum Education association, Wisconsin and National Association of Secondary School Principals, and the Wisconsin Association of Schools.

28, 1900 at Lancaster, Wis., a son of the late John and Edith Rowe Rose. His marriage to the former Maude Guertler of Galesville, Wis. took place on June 15, 1927 at Montfort, Wis. He is survived by his widow, a daughter Betty Ann (Mrs. John Heyde) of Milwaukee, a son Robert, who is attending the University of Virginia at Charlottesville, Va.; two grandchildren, a brother, J. Harold Rose of Whitefish Bay; one sister-in-law, two nieces and other relatives.

Friends may call at Miller's Funeral home after 4 p. m. Friday and at Peace United Church of Christ from 9 a. m. Saturday, Dec. 13, until the hour of services at 1:30 p. m. The Rev. C. F. Hammen will officiate and interment will be in Greenwood cemetery at Platteville. In lieu of flowers, the family would appreciate contributions toward the scholarship memorial.

Leland M. Rose was born July 5, 1902 at Platteville, a son of the late John and Edith Rowe Rose. He was raised in that city and graduated from Platteville Normal school in 1920. He graduated from the University of Wisconsin, Madison, and was a fraternal member of Delta Sigma Phi. He taught school at Orfordville, Wis. for two years and Stillmann Valley, Ill. for one year and then entered the contracting business with his father at Madison. Mr. Rose remained in that business from 1925 to 1942 and then came to Kewaskum and resumed teaching. He served as manual arts teacher at Kewaskum High school for 17 years, from 1942 to 1959, since when he has been semi-retired. Mr. Rose never married.

Surviving are one brother, J. Harold Rose of Whitefish Bay; two sisters-in-law, three nieces, one nephew, and other relatives.

Funeral services were held at 9 a. m. Tuesday, Dec. 10, at Miller's Funeral home, the Rev. C. F.

KEWASKUM PUPILS WIN IN ANNUAL CHRISTMAS DECORATING CONTEST

Miss Viola De Jong and Mrs. Dorothy Gresbach of the home service staff of the Electric Company are very pleased to announce that the annual cooky contest proved bigger and better than ever. There were 131 entries of three cookies per entry, with boys as well as girls participating. Miss De Jong originated the contest shortly after beginning to work for the Electric Company, and this is the tenth year the contest has been held.

First prize winners received a pair of dressing table lamps; second prize was an electric alarm clock with a luminous dial; while each honorable mention entry was awarded an aluminum cooky sheet donated by The West Bend Company.

The top winners by grades were as follows:

Fourth grade — Kay Strupp, 1047 Cedar st., West Bend. Her three cookies told a story of Christmas. Her reindeer had a brown coat of frosting colored with cocoa; Santa coming down the chimney looked properly fat and jolly, all done up in red and white frosting, and the round cooky, colored with green and red frosting looked just like a lovely ornament. Kay received the two pretty pink and white boudoir lamps for her efforts.

In the fifth grade, the lamp winner was Kay Heinecke, 802 High st., West Bend. Her blue and white angel with blonde curls looked good enough to eat. Then there was Santa coming down the red brick chimney to a green and silver cooky tree. Second prize went to Janice Kluever, 912 Green Tree rd., West Bend. Her three cookies, outlined with frosting, consisted of a full moon with laughing face and a quarter moon looking at a shining star.

Sixth grade champion was Jan Becker, W151 N8679 Marshall dr., Menomonee Falls. Jan had two cunning elves all dressed in bright red and green suits, getting ready to hang, a red, green and white

cooky ornament with a licorice string. Second place in 6th grade went to Joanne Ketter, 131 Martin st., Campbellsport, with a nursery rhyme illustration—Mary, a cunning little figure dressed in pale blue gown and hat, complete even to her long black pigtail, is followed by her coconut covered little lamb, and they are walking up the hill to the little red school house.

Seventh grade, Marilyn Reindl, 115 Clinton St., Kewaskum, topped this group, thus winning two lamps for her dressing table. One of her three cookies represented a Christmas package, white frosting covering looked like paper, then using a small paint brush, Marilyn applied red food coloring to paint on the pretty ribbon ties and bow. Another cooky frosted white was in the shape of a party cap. This she painted with blue food coloring, inscribing "Happy New Year" on it. Thirdly was a big round cooky made to represent a tree ornament with several

colored frostings applied. Kathryn Hansen, R. 2, Kewaskum, second runner-up in the 7th grade, used a patriotic motif. The Liberty Bell, American flag at half mast, and president's shield were done with expertly mixed frostings on cookies cut out with painstaking care. Kathryn achieved incredible reality with her efforts, using cooky dough and tinted frostings.

The eighth grade submitted only enough entries to warrant one prize. In this group Susie Montag, R. 3, Hartford, was the lucky girl. She entered a freckled-faced boy, dreaming of Christmas things, such as a brown Teddy bear, and a happy looking snowman who wears a black and red hat. The method Susie used to tint her

frosting covered cookies produced unusually accurate effects.

Space does not permit descriptions of all the honorable mention winners. The three judges commented on how difficult it was to make selections of top winners because there were so many decorated cookies that were outstanding in design and coloring. Credit should be given to the fine judges who gave a full morning of their time to select winning entries. The judges used a point system to reach an unanimous decision in each case. Judges were Miss Vivian Ray, home economist for The West Bend Company; Miss Kelma Ful-

ler, and Mrs. Barbara Shaw, former county home agent in Ozaukee county. These judges named the following honorable mention winners:

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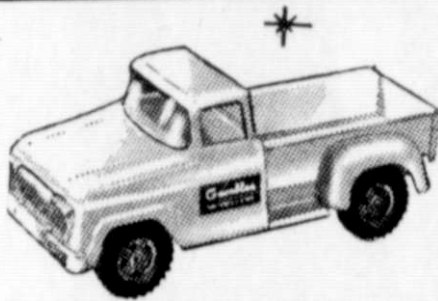
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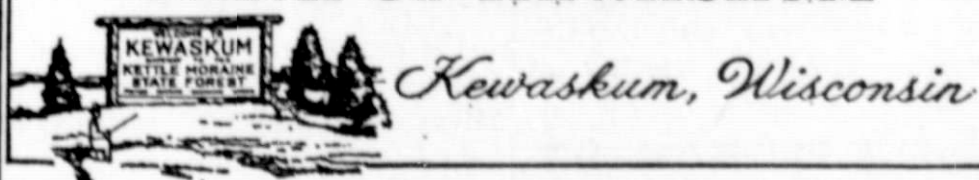
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Christmas Parties Held Over Week End

The Indians once again got peak production from Mike Coulter, who scored 28 points, high for the night and highest in the conference Friday, and Dan Survis, who finished with 18 points. Gary Spiel led Slinger with 20 points.

Numerous personal fouls were called in the game, 23 on the Indians and 20 on the Owls. Slinger

bested Kewaskum from the free throw line, 16-14. Pewaukee beat Campbellsport, 52-41, for its second win to gain a tie for the lead with Kewaskum. Grafton opened its season with a crushing win over Germantown, 93-52, and looms as a very strong contender. In the remaining game Random Lake edged North Fondy, 47-45, with 2 free throws by sophomore John Dunphy in the final 11 seconds.

This Friday the Indians were scheduled to play Campbellsport here but the game was indefinitely postponed due to the unexpected death of Superintendent of Schools Clifford M. Rose. The next game will be North Fondy here Friday, Dec. 20.

The County Farm Bureau is a locally operated organization, consisting of 611 farmers of Washington county. The Wisconsin membership in the State Farm Bureau is 23,100, and the American Farm Bureau Federation, headed by the very able Charles Shuman of Illinois, boasts 1,630,000 members. Farm Bureau is pledged to work for farmers. It is not a marketing or bargaining organization. It is a legislative organization and works for laws, rules and regulations that are in the best interest of farmers.

A year ago Farm Bureau was very active in the fight to get the new property taxation bill changed through the Wisconsin Legislature.

Of the many services that Farm Bureau performs for farmers, probably their insurance program is the most outstanding. Insurance is available of all kinds. This includes health insurance, life insurance, automobile insurance, farm protector insurance, fire,

wind, theft and liability.

Farm Bureau locally supports all local programs that affect farm people. The organization and the individual directors and members have been active in the county June Dairy Month program. They have supported 4-H club activities and recently helped send five Washington county 4-H club members to Washington, D. C. on a citizenship tour. The organization has worked closely with the county extension agents to promote local programs of interest to all.

Farm Bureau is operated in Washington county by a board of directors. The board of directors are:

The board of directors consists of one farmer from each township. This board then meets and elects their officers. At the present time the county chairman is Robert Held, Slinger. The vice-president is Carlton Martin and the secretary-treasurer Allen Batzler.

The insurance men are: Wesley Rosenthal, West Bend; Frank Thierfelder, Germantown; Jerome Held, Slinger.

The Farm Bureau membership

is \$15 per farm. This entitles the Farm Bureau member to all the benefits and privileges of the American Farm Bureau Federation. If you would like to discuss becoming a member of the Washington County Farm Bureau, see one of the directors. Should the director call on you, why not discuss the organization with him. The county office is located at the corner of 6th & Walnut, West Bend.

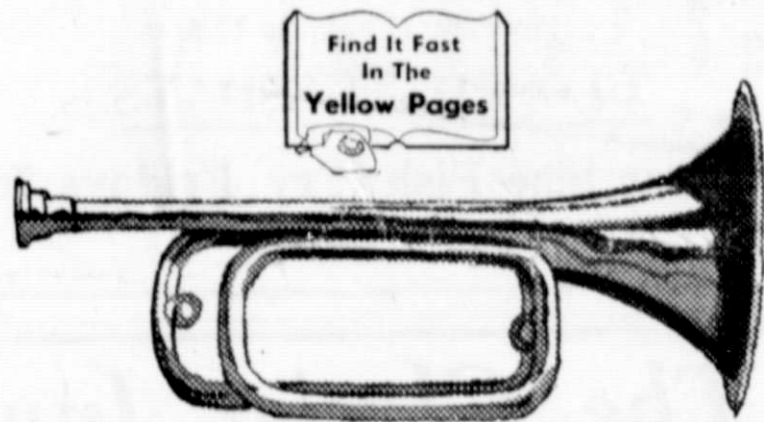

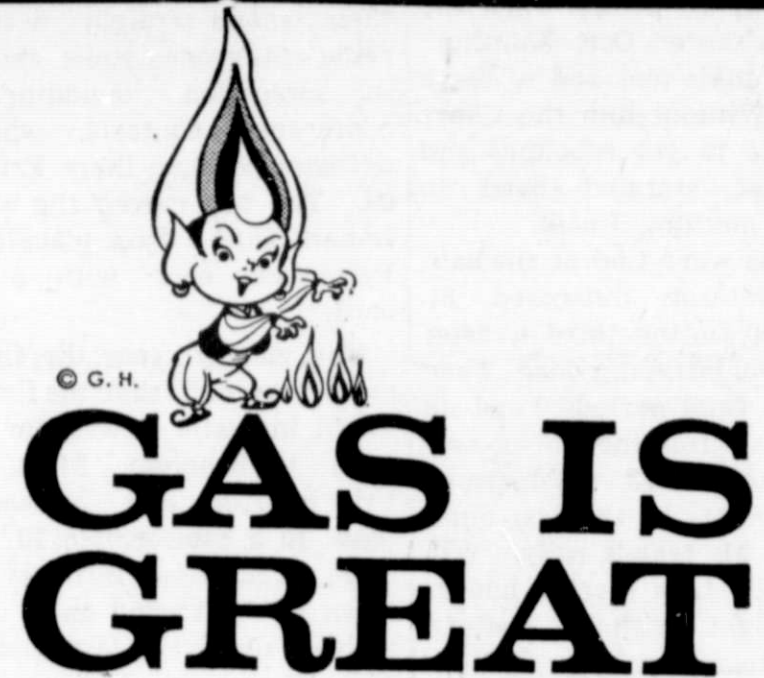

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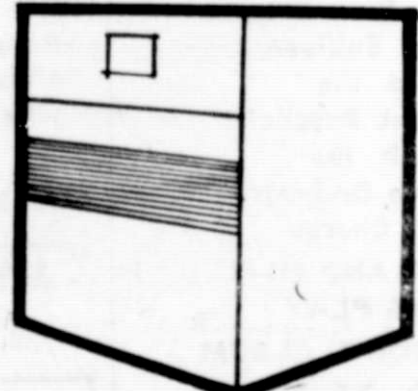
