Tax Rate of \$32 Per Thousand Is Levied By Village Board

Rate Up \$2 Over Last Year; Wage Schedule For Employees Set

Where Your 1964 Tax Dollar Goes

Regular Meeting
December 2, 1963

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session with President Tessar presiding and all board members present.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as presented upon motion by Trustee Merwin, seconded by Trustee Degner and duly carried.

The first order of business was the public hearing on the proposed budget for 1964. Mrs. Mary Miller appeared on behalf of the Library Committee and requested that the Public Library appropriation be increased from \$2,700.00 to \$3,000.00 and also that the wage rate should be \$1.50 per hour for the Chief Librarian, Mrs. Borche't. Two changes were made in the proposed budget. The Library appropriation was increased to \$3,000.00 and the Park appropriation was reduced to \$3,700.00. Since there were no objections to the budget as proposed, the budget hearing was declared closed.

RESOLUTION NO. 63-6

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, that there be and hereby are levied the following taxes for the year ending December 31, 1963, upon all real and personal property according to the Assessment Roll of the current year:

Local Driver Is Cleared By Jury In Traffic Death

A county court jury at West Bend Wednesday found Raymond Kirchner, 26, of R. 2, Kewaskum, innocent of negligent homicide in the death Oct. 29 of a Washington county highway worker.

Kirchner had been charged in the death of Reuben J. Eichstaedt, 48, of R. 1, Slinger. A milk truck driven by Kirchner struck and killed Eichstaedt while the latter was working with a highway crew on Hwy. 41 at the northern limits of Slinger.

The trial opened in Judge Robert J. Stoltz' court Monday and went to the jury shortly before noon Wednesday. The verdict was given at about 3 p. m. Kirchner had been free on \$300 bond and had requested the jury trial.

The prosecution alleged that he either failed to notice or ignored warning barricades and flagmen near the road crew.

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Yule Tree Set Up On Top of Large Hill in Village

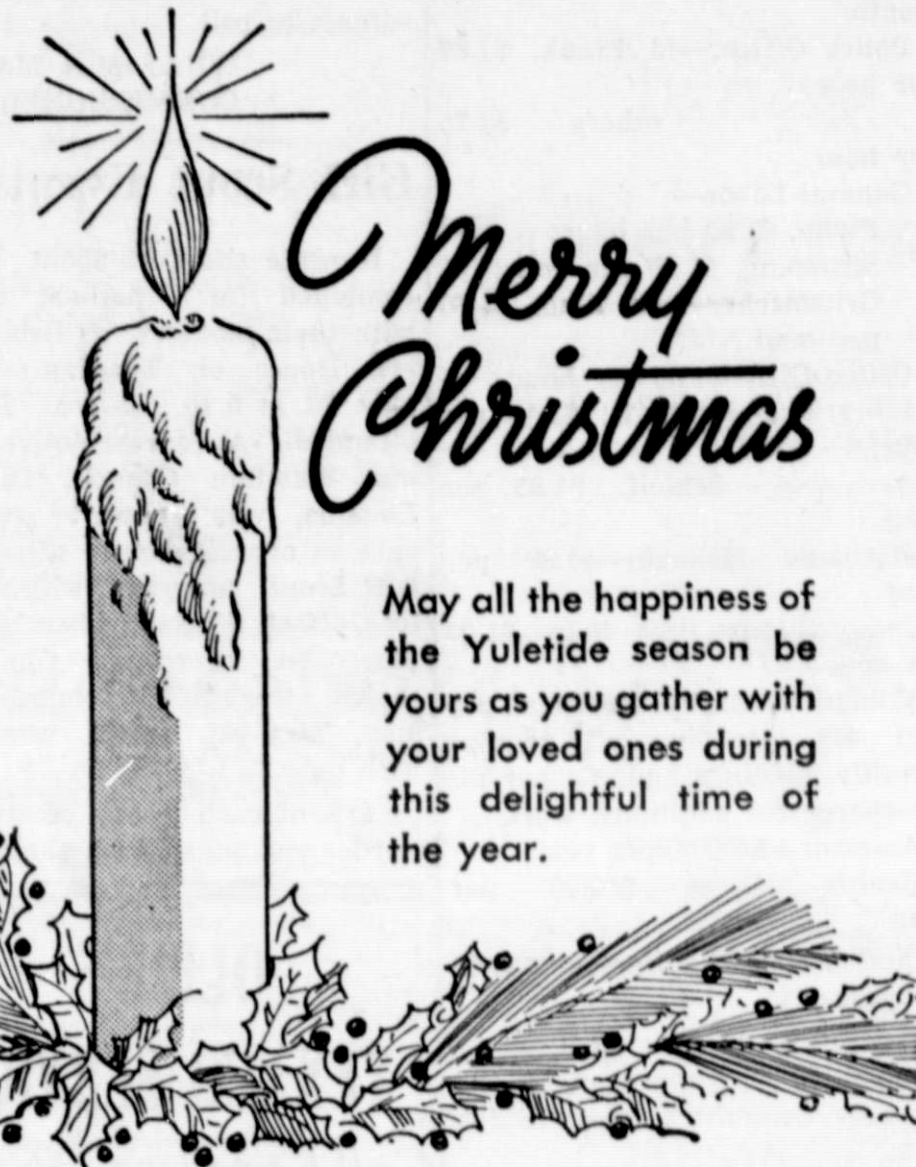
In addition to a large Christmas tree in front of the municipal building and the usual attractive street, show window and private home decorations, Kewaskum this year has been dressed up with another beautiful decoration to instill the holiday spirit.

A giant Christmas tree has been erected on top of the big hill at the east end of the village. The hill, now owned by Fred Fehlhaber, is familiarly known by the name of Keller's hill. It is the highest spot in Kewaskum and affords a view for many miles.

The tree, donated by Mr. and Mrs. Bob Ours, was cut from their property on First st. It is about 30 feet high and is illuminated with approximately 125 red and green lights. A large, brilliant lighted star tops the tree. The bright star in the east brings to mind the one sighted by the Three Wise Men on the eve of Christ's birth.

The tree was put up on the peak of the hill Saturday afternoon with the co-operation of the village and about 12 neighbors residing in the hill area. The men spent some effort in getting the tree, decorations, equipment for setting it up and themselves up the hill and back down on a cold, windy day. Several feet had to be cut off the bottom of the tree to keep it erect in the wind. Fehlhaber is furnishing the electricity for the tree.

The tree, when illuminated at night, is beautiful and can be seen for many miles around.

Our next meeting will be after the holidays, on Tuesday, Jan. 7,

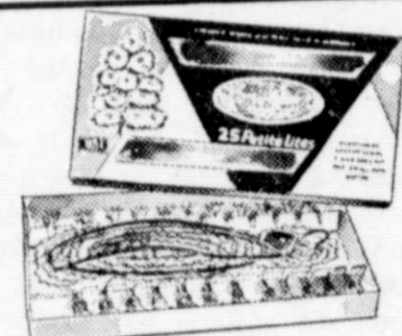

ICE FISHING UNDERWAY; LICENSES EXPIRE DEC. 31

Ice fishing has started on the smaller lakes in this county. Fishermen should be careful on the deep water spring fed lakes such as the south end of Big Cedar, Little Cedar except the kettle, the deeper parts of Silver and Pike lakes.

Ice fishing shanties are showing up on some of the lakes. A shanty must have the name and address

of the owner painted upon it. (Not painted on a board and the board nailed to the building).

A few northerns have been taken at Dricken's lake; evening fishing for walleyes has been excellent in shallow water at Pike lake.

Game farm, fur farm, deer farm, private fish hatchery and exhibitors licenses expire on Dec. 31 and should be renewed prior to that time. These licenses are required for raising or keeping pheasants, muskrats, mink, beaver, raccoon, otter, skunk, deer and other game birds and animals. A license fee of \$10.00 per year is required for a wildlife exhibit.

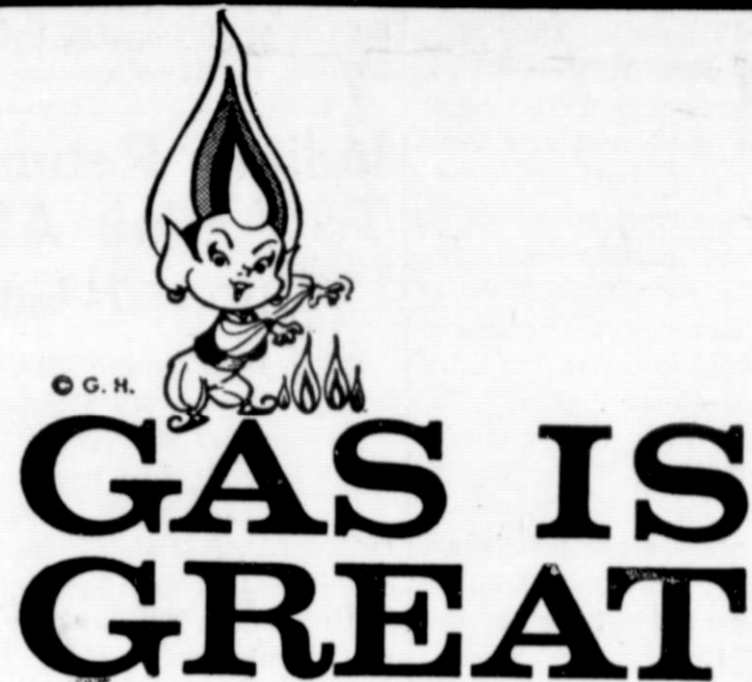

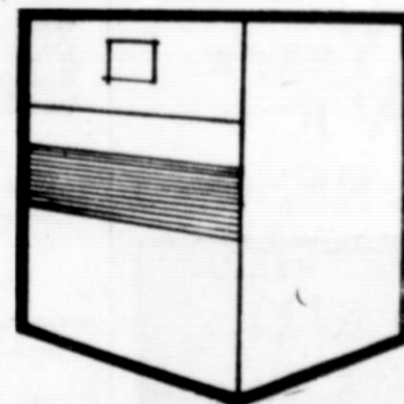
