## Kewaskum Mutual Insurance Co. Merged Into Integrity Mutual

### Home Office Is Leased By Regal Ware, Inc.

**ORGANIZED IN 1901, CO. WAS IN BUSINESS HERE 62 YEARS; BOB SCHMIDT TO BE EMPLOYED BY INTEGRITY**

Robert Schmidt, secretary of the Kewaskum Mutual Insurance company, announced that the company had effected a merger with Integrity Mutual Insurance company of Appleton, Wis. at a meeting of the board of directors held on Dec. 27. The merger, effective Jan. 1, 1964, has been approved by the Wisconsin Insurance Department with the surviving company to be Integrity Mutual Insurance company. All assets and liabilities are assumed by Integrity Mutual.

Integrity Mutual Insurance company, organized in 1933, has assets of \$2,700,000 and a policyholders surplus of approximately \$875,000. The company writes city and farm fire, extended coverage, other allied lines, homeowners, workmen's compensation, liability and auto liability, and physical damage insurance.

All policies are issued on a non-assessable basis, and all policies of Kewaskum Mutual Insurance company are automatically assumed by Integrity Mutual for the term of the policies. The company is managed by Franklin C. Jesse.

The Kewaskum Mutual Fire Insurance company of Washington county was organized on Aug. 7, 1901. The company commenced business on Oct. 26, 1901.

The first board of directors consisted of Adolph Rosenheimer, Augustus C. Koch, Henry J. Ebenreiter, Nicholas J. Mertes, Joseph Schmidt, David Rosenheimer, Peter Klumb, Henry Opgenorth, John Rosenheimer, John W. Gehl and Dr. Henry Blank.

The first officers were Adolph Rosenheimer, president; A. G. Koch, vice-president; Joseph Schmidt, secretary, and Peter Klumb, treasurer.

The first policyholders were Peter Klumb, Henry Opgenorth, Merten & Grau, John Duernberger, John Wiskirchen, Joseph Schmidt, L. Rosenehimer Malt & Grain Co. per Ad. Rosenheimer, sec. and treas., M. and A. Rosenheimer, Adolph Rosenehimer, John P. Klein, A. A. Perschbacher, John Tiss, Julius Ichkstad, H. J. Lay, John Lohr, Jacob Ziegler, Adam Kuehlthau Sr., F. J. Lambeck, A. Heilmann, C. E. Krahn, Nic. J. Mertes, Nicholas Rimmel, Mrs. P. Wunderle, H. W. Krahn, J. J. Ebenreiter, Chas. Miller, Nic. Marx, David Rosenheimer, John Cuth, Neu, Endres & Goetz, John W. Gehl, C. F. Lohr, the Heppe Cash Store Co., C. J. Heppe, president, Jacob Frank, N. N. Gehl, Henry Blank, John Rosenheimer, John M. Ockenfels, Jos. Grittner, Moritz Rosenheimer, Jos. P. Schaezner.

At first the company limited business to surrounding counties

of Washington county, plus Manitowoc county, and no risk over \$2,000 was accepted. Later, in 1903, the company commenced to write business throughout the state. The name was changed to Kewaskum Limited Mutual Insurance company in 1918 and was subsequently changed to Kewaskum Mutual Fire Insurance company. The word "Fire" was deleted in 1951. Policies were issued on an assessable basis until 1949. However, from records available, no assessment was ever levied.

A. L. Rosenehimer was president of the company from 1901-1940. He was succeeded by L. P. Rosenheimer (1940-1953), who was succeeded by M. W. Rosenheimer (1953-1963). He resigned in July, 1963 and was succeeded by Edward E. Miller.

Vice-presidents were A. G. Koch (1901-1913), N. J. Mertes (1913-1933), L. P. Rosenheimer (1933-1940), M. W. Rosenheimer (1940-1953), P. J. Haug (1953-1956), T. R. Schmidt (1956-1959), August E. Koch (1959-1963), who resigned in August, 1963, and was succeeded by Carl F. Schaefer.

Secretaries and general managers were Joseph Schmidt (1901-1924) Theodore R. Schmidt (1924-1957) and manager until his death Jan. 19, 1959, Robert W. Schmidt (since 1957) and has been manager of the company since 1959.

Treasurers were Peter Klumb (1901-1903), David Rosenheimer (1903-1906), L. P. Rosenheimer (1906-1933), Arthur W. Koch (1933-1942). The offices of secretary and treasurer were combined in 1942.

Other directors through the years were John Tiss, Jacob Schlosser, John Brunner and George Schmidt. Present directors are August E. Koch, Ralph Marx, Edward E. Miller, Carl F. Schaefer and Robert W. Schmidt.

The company was managed for 37 years by Theodore R. Schmidt, long active in not only local insurance activities, but as an organizer and secretary of many state and national mutual insurance organizations. Miss Edna C. Schmidt was a faithful employee for over 50 years; the exact number of years is unknown as she received wages for a few years from her father Joseph Schmidt.

The original home office was the living room of the Eagle Hotel, the hotel and tavern operated by Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Schmidt. The old Eagle Hotel was located at the site of the present Yoost Meat Market, Bunkelman Floor Covering and Marlin Schneider tavern. The office was later moved to the second floor of the present Bank of Kewaskum building. The company then purchased the former Farmers and Merchants bank, just north of the Corner Drug Store. They moved into their new home office on Main st. in 1954. This building has been leased to Regal Ware, Inc. of Kewaskum for additional office space.

The Kewaskum Chevrolets got back on the losing track here Saturday night when they lost a Land o' Lakes contest to Mayville, 102-91, in another high scoring game.

Kewaskum held Mayville to a 23-22 advantage in the first quarter but fell well behind by half-time, 50-38, with a weak second period. The visitors increased their lead slightly to 74-60, at the end of the third quarter. The Chevs outscored them, 31-28, in the final stanza, which still left them 11 points behind at the final horn.

Kewaskum's failure to stop Mayville's two sharpshooting forwards, Lechner and Marks, cost them the ball game. The hot Lechner paced his team and copped scoring honors with 32 points, followed by Marks with 20. The two big scorers for the losers were Otto Ramthun with 25 points and Don Meisenheimer with 23. Ramthun scored 16 of his points in the third quarter.

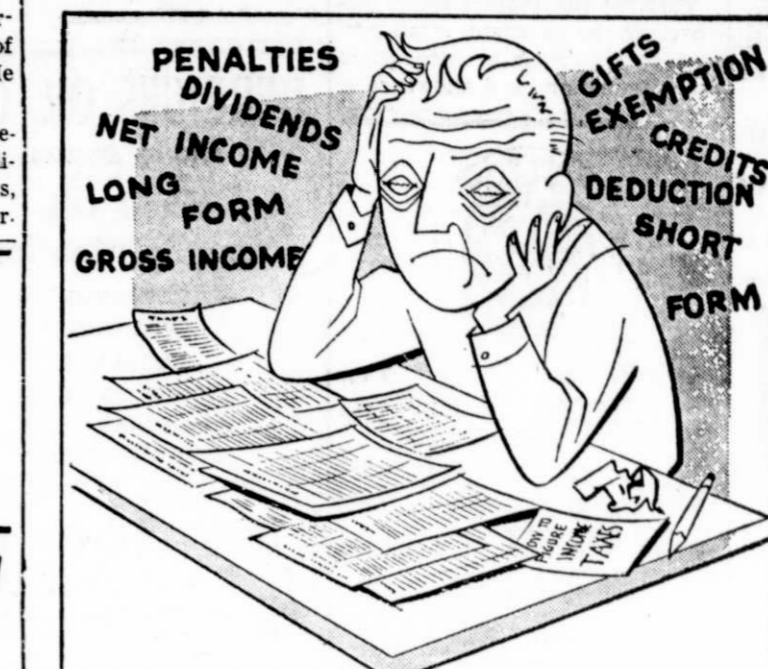
