Arnold Martin Dies Thursday

FORMER ASSISTANT FIRE CHIEF, VILLAGE OFFICIAL, BUSINESSMAN SUCCUMBS

Arnold W. Martin, 62, of Kewaskum, former assistant chief of the Kewaskum fire department, village official and businessman, passed away Thursday noon, March 19, at St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, following an illness of several days. He was taken to the hospital the same morning in the firemen's ambulance.

Mr. Martin had been associated with the Shell Oil company for about 35 years. He was bulk oil distributor for Shell in the village many years and was presently employed by the Hergiges Oil company, Shell distributor. He was a member of the Kewaskum fire department for 43 years and formerly served as assistant chief of the department for a number of years. He joined the department in 1921 and was the oldest active member of the organization. Mr. Martin also formerly served on the village board as a trustee for several terms.

He was a member of the Knights of Columbus, West Bend Council No. 1964; Modern Woodmen of America, Camp 2233 of Kewaskum; Holy Name society, Holy Trinity church, Kewaskum, and a former member of the Loyal Order of Moose, West Bend lodge.

A lifelong resident of Kewaskum, he was born on Dec. 11, 1901, and his marriage to the former Ruth Winkler took place in Holy Angels church, West Bend. She preceded him in death on Feb. 28, 1960.

Surviving are a daughter Mary (Mrs. Frank Krueger, Jr.) of Kewaskum; his aged mother, Mrs. Anna Martin, of Kewaskum; one sister, Lucina (Mrs. Edward Brandt) of Teaneck, New Jersey; one brother, William S. Martin, of Kewaskum; three grandchildren, and one son-in-law.

Semi-private visitation will be from 3 p. m. Sunday at Miller's Funeral home. Funeral services will be held at 9:30 a. m. Monday, March 23, at Holy Trinity church, the Rev. John T. Budde officiating. Burial will be in the new Holy Trinity cemetery.

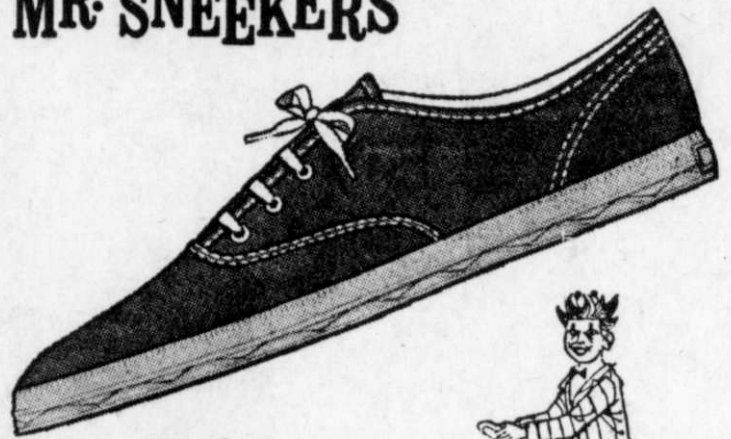
During our meeting Monday evening the kitchenettes on their spring outing. We were happy to accept.

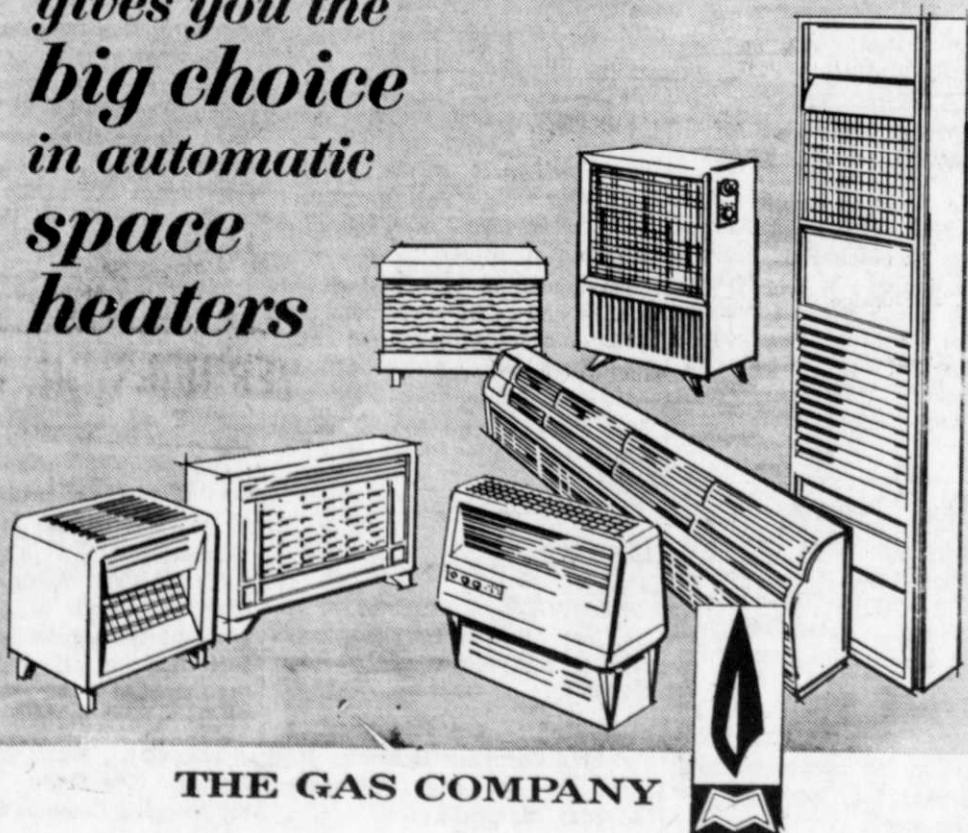

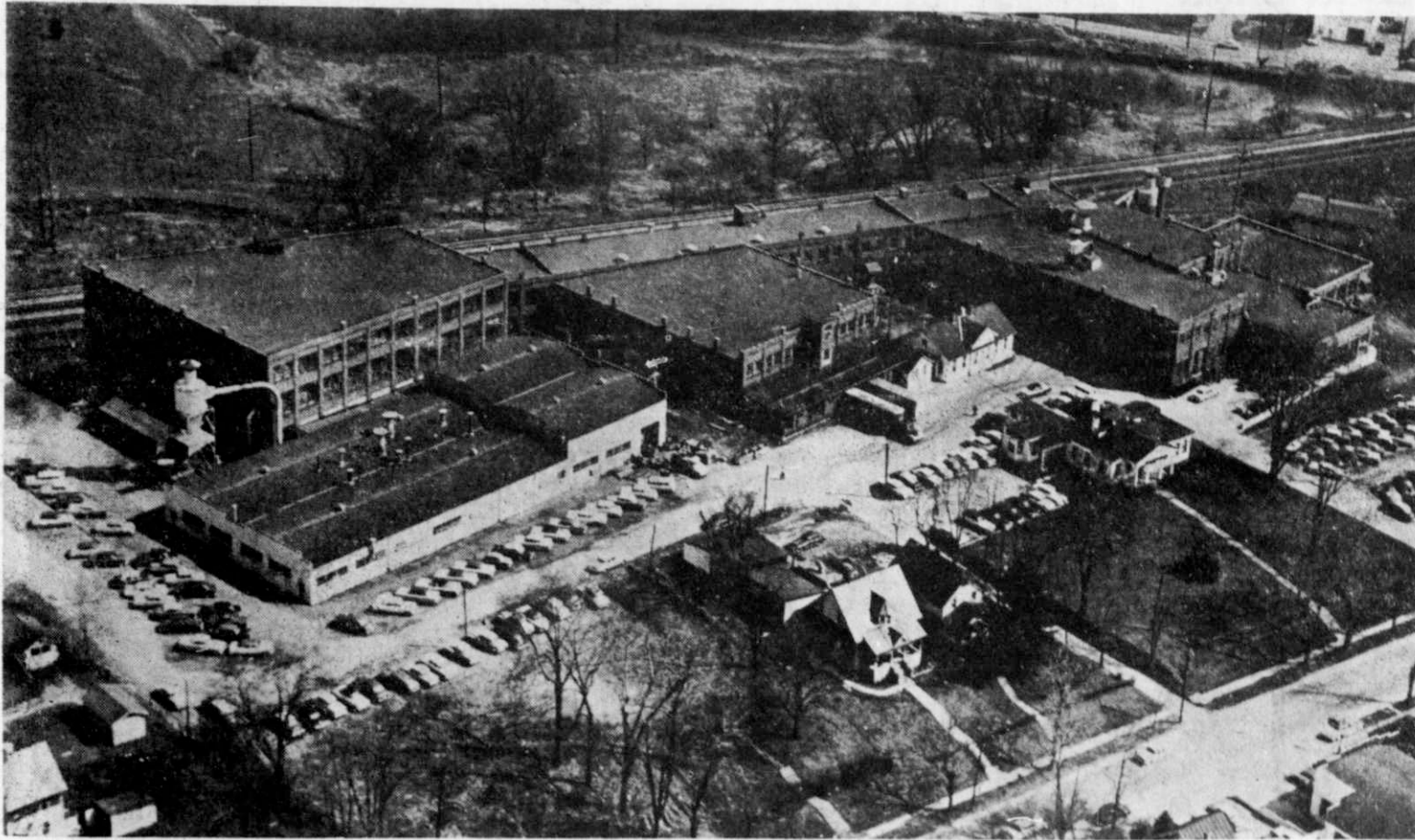

Four Vehicles In Local Crash

Four vehicles were involved in a chain reaction mishap on Fond du Lac ave. at about 8:15 p. m. last Friday. Involved in the crash were a truck driven by Floyd R. Klug, 30, R. 1, Mayville, and cars driven by Ruth Ann Weddig, 17, R. 3, Campbellsport, Diane Feiten, 27, R. 1, Kewaskum, and Bernard Kaehne, 30, Kewaskum. All of the drivers were alone in their vehicles. Miss Feiten stated she stopped at the intersection with Forest ave. to make a left turn. Kaehne and Klug stopped behind her. Miss Weddig said she had glanced into a store window and when she looked ahead again she saw the other vehicles stopped. She became excited and applied her brakes just before striking the Klug vehicle which was shoved into the Kaehne auto, which in turn crashed into Miss Feiten's car. Miss Weddig suffered lacerations on her nose, right foreleg and left hand and Klug received a bump on the forehead. All of the vehicles were damaged.

Edward E. DeTunq, 18, of West Bend, suffered lacerations above the left eye and on the right temple at 9:10 p. m. Sunday when he apparently lost control of his car on Hwy. 45 bridge just north of Kewaskum and it crashed into the railing on the right side of the structure, then skidded into the left hand railing. He was removed to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, in the firemen's ambulance.

County Agent News Notes

MASTITIS MEETING

The third of three meetings for 4-H club dairy members on controlling mastitis in dairy cattle will be held in the extension office on Tuesday, March 24, at 8:00 p. m.

We would like to have all dairy members in the West Bend area and their leaders attend this program. We will give out a check list for them to check their own herd, to see how many of the practices listed are being accomplished on their farm. We feel this is the best possible way of controlling mastitis—to do the things listed in the check list. One of these meetings was held at Colgate, and another at Slinger.

196 ATTEND BANQUET

Who would have thought that 196 people would attend the Dairy Herd Improvement association banquet last week? But such was the case. We give much credit to the board of directors for developing this program. We had a fine buffet dinner and a lot of good fellowship. This certainly indicates that our testing association members have a great deal of faith in the dairy industry.

The annual business meeting was conducted; Fred Schroeder and Ernie Kueffner were re-elected to the board of directors; and pictures of the 4-H club boys and girls who participated in State Fair last year were shown.

Anton Sendelbach, extension dairyman of the University of Wisconsin, talked about the importance of good testing techniques, and the importance of using the records once they are available.

Mrs. Arnold Rosenthal, Allenton, won a calf as a door prize. Ernie Kueffner said, "If anyone can identify the breed of this calf, we'll give him another one!" Imagine a calf with a white face like a Hereford, a dark color like an Angus, with enough red in it to be a Guernsey, with known parentage of Holstein!

Howard Voegeli, outstanding Brown Swiss breeder from Monticello, talked about the experience his family has had in choosing cow families in their herd. He told about one Brown Swiss heifer that didn't produce much as a 2-year-old, but as a 10-year-old she was making over 800 lbs. of butterfat. He also told about a 2-year-old heifer that made 450 lbs. of butterfat, but as lactations went on she actually went down-

hill, as did all the other members of her family. This tells us we must be concerned with cow families, and that records and testing are the only way to know what these families are doing and are capable of doing in the future.

RABBIT PEST OF WEEK

The pest of the week this week is the rabbit—the one that is gnawing on your new tulips.

The tulips and some of the other spring bulbs are beginning to emerge from the ground, and this is about the only food the rabbit can find now. While they might not normally eat your tulips, they are hungry enough now so that they will eat almost anything.

You might think you don't have any rabbit damage because you don't see any evidence. But they will eat off that tiny tulip so close to the ground that it never has a chance to get started.

The big question is "what to do?" You might try to trap them, although the success of this program has been anything but good. We think the best thing to do is buy some 2½-foot-high chicken wire, put some stakes in the ground, and fasten this wire around the stakes in such a manner that it completely encircles the tulip bed.

There is no actual spray to use for this purpose, unless you would apply a repellent. The only one we know of would be nicotine sulfate, which tastes so terrible that the rabbits might not eat it. But I wouldn't guarantee it in their present hungry state!

If the windshield wipers on your vehicle cannot clear the view for you without streaking, it's time to replace the blades with new ones, advises the motor vehicle department.

1,096 ILLEGALLY KILLED DEER ARE PICKED UP

Illegally killed and confiscated deer picked up by the conservation department during the nine-day season last fall numbered 1,096.

Of the total, 991 were does and fawns and only 105 adult bucks. The department salvaged 744 for sale with proceeds going to the conservation fund.

Dodge and Washington counties picked up 2 each, Fond du Lac 5, Ozaukee 6 and Sheboygan 9.

Possession of a spear around lakes or streams is prohibited until April 20. This includes guns as well as bow and arrows.

Boats Must Be Re-registered

Have you re-registered your boat for the new numbering period which started April 1, 1963?

As of this date there are a considerable number of boats that were registered for the initial numbering period (April 1, 1960 - March 31, 1963), but have not

been re-registered for the current period (April 1, 1963 - March 31, 1966).

The numbers assigned to a boat for the initial period are still available for that boat. However, if the boat is not re-registered for the current period on or before March 31, 1964, the numbers will be cancelled or issued to another boat.

This does not mean you can't register your boat after that date, but you must register it by then if you want the same number.

The fee for re-registration prior to March 31 is \$3.00 if still owned by the same person or \$4.00 if ownership has changed.

SAMUEL HARTER

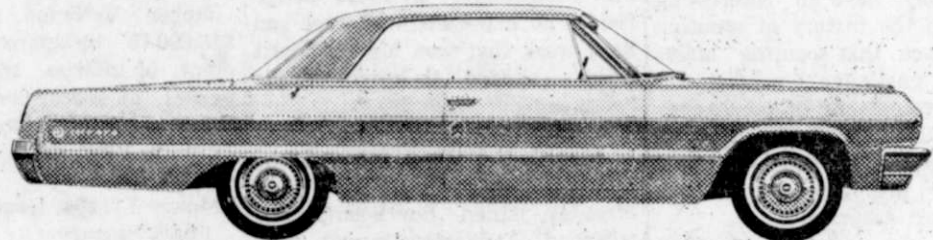

five years.

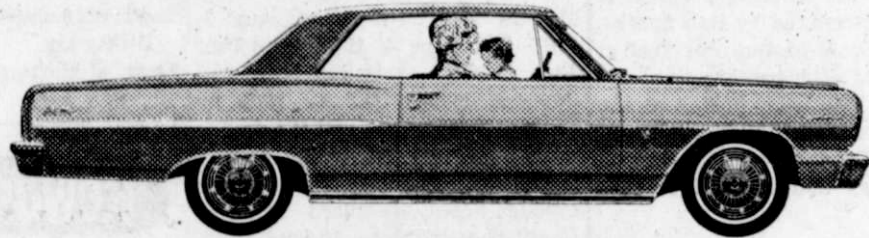

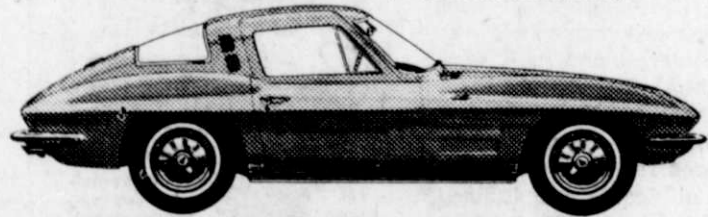
