Kewaskum to Hold Annual Dairy Day Program Saturday, April 4

ALL FREE EVENT FEATURES ENTERTAINMENT, DISPLAYS, DEMONSTRATIONS, PRIZES, QUEEN CROWNING, LUNCH

Next Saturday, April 4, is the date of Kewaskum's big sixth annual Dairy Day event sponsored by the Kewaskum Business association in the high school gymnasium, cafeteria and agriculture rooms. The entire program, which begins at 11 a. m. and continues throughout the day and evening, is all free, including a luncheon.

Arrangements for the event are now completed, spaces for the merchants' displays in the gymnasium have been allotted, posters announcing the event have been distributed, and advertising by the local businessmen for the affair will be found on the inside pages of this issue.

The features of this year's show are many and include the giving of numerous valuable merchandise prizes, beautiful and interesting displays and souvenirs given by the merchants, free noon dairy luncheon, crowning of the Dairy Day queen, food demonstrations for women, informative movies for men, movies for the children, presenting of conservation awards, and entertainment which includes Bob Neller and "Reggie"—the world's most complicated ventriloquist dummy, a talent show, the high school band and chorus.

The eight high school girls selected as candidates for "Dairy Queen" are Kristine Westerman, Jean Heisdorf, Joyce Schultz, Janet Breit, Elaine Vetter, Corrine Reysen, Phyllis Theusch and Karen Krahn. The candidates, representing each class, are required to live on a farm and are selected by the FFA of the school. "Penny-a-vote" is the novel way the queen will be selected. Visitors to the event will pass a special election table on which eight boxes will be placed. Each box will be identified with one of the queen candidates. The box containing the greatest number of pennies at the ballot closing will be declared winner. The total pennies will go to the high school's AFS club.

The Business association will be assisted in sponsoring the event by Roy Esser, high school agriculture instructor, and the FFA boys and FHA girls of the school. There will be a continuous program and the Business association extends a cordial welcome to all area residents to attend.

August Buss, Aged 95 Dies

RETIRED SECTION FOREMAN AND HONORARY FIREMAN ONE OF OLDEST RESIDENTS

August Buss, one of the oldest and better known residents of Kewaskum, died at the age of 95 years and five months on Saturday, March 21, at the Waldo Nursing Home, where he had been a resident since breaking his hip in a fall seven months ago.

A retired section foreman for the Chicago and North Western Railway here, he had worked for the railroad 37 years. Mr. Buss was an honorary member of the Kewaskum Fire Department and a member of the GUG society and Modern Woodmen of America camp of Kewaskum many years.

Born Oct. 20, 1868, at Plantico, Pommeran, Germany, he came to the United States with his parents when a young boy. The family settled near New Fane and also lived at Cascade for several years before coming to Kewaskum. Mr. Buss was a resident of this village many years.

He was married to Clara Staeger on Oct. 13, 1901, in St. Lucas Lutheran church, Kewaskum. His wife preceded him in death on May 30, 1960. Surviving are one son, Walter A. Buss, of Kewaskum; a sister, Mrs. Mathilda Ulrich of Cascade, and a brother, Louis Buss of Sheboygan. Five brothers and three sisters predeceased him.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Wednesday at Peace United Church of Christ, the Rev. Nuss officiating. Burial took place in the parish cemetery. Prior to the services friends called at Miller's Funeral Home from 2 p. m. Tuesday to 11 a. m. Wednesday and at the church from noon to the hour of services.

Officers of the Kewaskum Fire Department served as pallbearers, namely Armin Oppermann, chief, William Martin, George Koerble, Ollie Staehler, Lee Honeck and Harry Koch.



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Spring Snowstorm Batters This Area

Although it has been spring officially for one week, Old Man Winter got in one last good lick on Wednesday evening and Thursday morning of this week, when a howling, blowing snowstorm slugged this area and entire state. It was the third snowstorm in March after a winter of exceptionally little snow.

The total snowfall measured about six inches but winds with gusts up to 40 miles an hour piled the snow into drifts and once more covered the ground which had been bare as the result of all previous snow melting. The storm slowed and tied up traffic and another snow emergency was ordered with county and village plows busy plowing once more. Shovelers got a good workout. Because of the blowing, blinding snow most of the night shift employees at Regal Ware, Inc. from out of town left for their homes early at around 8 p. m. Snow covered roads were slippery and hazardous driving warnings were out. Numerous minor accidents were reported in surrounding areas because of the poor visibility and slippery highways.

The storm was followed by clear but quite cold weather Thursday and Friday with a warming trend predicted for the Easter week end.

SWINE BREEDERS TO MEET

The Washington County Swine Breeders association has set up a series of two meetings, the first of which will be Monday, March 30, 10:00 a. m., at John Youngbauer's swine barn in Boltonville.

Members of the association are bringing about five butcher hogs to be judged according to what they think the carcasses will develop. Fred Giesler of the University of Wisconsin will be with us to discuss these pigs, and make some determinations as to carcass value.

In the afternoon these pigs will be sent to Roy Gundrum at Slinger to be slaughtered and cooled.

On Tuesday afternoon, March 31, a second meeting will be held in the town of Polk town hall at Cedar Creek. Here the carcasses of the pigs will be reviewed and such things as depth of backfat, length of carcass and other observations will be discussed.

The swine breeders association invites all swine breeders of Washington county to participate in this program.

DAIRY CALF MEETING

The Wisconsin Feeder Pig Marketing Cooperative, which did about \$5½ million business last year, has organized a new service called the Dairy Calf Replacement Division. They are now trying to set up a collecting station at Watertown.

Washington county farmers who might be interested in selling their calves through this organization are invited to a meeting at John Youngbauer's swine barn at Boltonville on Thursday, April 2, at 8:00 p. m. Norval Dvorak, general manager of the co-op, will be there to discuss the dairy calf replacement program. When one realizes that hundreds of thousands of calves move from Wisconsin farms to other farms throughout the entire country, it stands to reason that we have a

reputation at stake. So far this reputation has not been too good. The Feeder Pig Marketing Cooperative Dairy Calf Division is pledged to the idea of doing a good job of marketing, proper representation, good grading, and paying the farmers the highest price available.

FARM AND HOME WEEK

Farm and Home Week 1964 is to be held at the University of Wisconsin, Madison, this year during spring vacation, which is the week after Easter—Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, April 1-2-3. Feel free to attend any of the sessions on the university campus that you wish. This will be an opportunity to learn new ideas and new ways of doing things on all farms.

This means, of course, that hook and line fishermen are restricted to two lines in the harbor and on the breakwater at Port Washington.

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
