## Dreher Family Safe Following Quake in Alaska; Home Damaged

"PATTY" LEAPS TO SAFETY FROM TRUCK, WIFE & SONS FLEE WHEN HOUSE SWAYS

Kewaskum and West Bend parents of Alaskan residents were informed the past week that their children were safe and had survived the severe earthquake which ravaged a good part of Anchorage and the surrounding area on Good Friday evening. More than 100 persons were dead, many hundreds missing and injured, and damage estimated at 350 million dollars in the quake disaster.

An account of the experiences in the earthquake of the Earl Dreher, Jr. family, formerly of this area, was received by Dreher's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Earl Dreher, Sr. of Kewaskum, and by Mrs. Dreher's folks, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Stowers of 866 Birchwood dr., West Bend. Mrs. Dreher is the former Blanche Stowers.

Mrs. Dreher, Jr. said at the time the first tremors were felt she was home with two sons, age 5 and 1, and the house started to sway. The fireplace broke up and started to fall. With difficulty, she picked up the small children and tucked them under each arm, fleeing from the house. The smaller boy received a slight bump on his head in their exit but it was not serious and the only injury.

Dreher, known as "Patty" to local residents, was driving a large truck in another part of Anchorage. The earth started to open near him and he leaped to safety. Before he was able to go home, he operated a large crane in rescue work. He did not know of his family's fate until some time later when he arrived home.

At present, the Dreher's are staying with a neighbor. In a letter Mrs. Dreher said that at the time there was no electricity and water was obtained by boiling snow.

Mr. and Mrs. Stowers were informed via a phone call on Tuesday morning from their daughter that the family was safe. She said that their home on the outskirts of Anchorage was damaged, but they were not certain as to the full extent of the damage. The Dreher's have resided in Anchorage for the past five years and "Patty" is a semi-truck driver there. The Stowers also received a brief letter from the Dreher's the same morning, confirming the fact that they were safe.

Several other West Bend parents were informed via phone call or letter that their sons and daughters in Alaska were safe. M/Sgt. John Thull, who was stationed near Anchorage with the U. S. Army, had not been heard from up until late Tuesday afternoon. He is a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Thull and prior to enlisting in the army had resided near Orchard Grove east of Kewaskum.

## Change School Entrance Age For Children

PUPILS ENTERING LOCAL ELEMENTARY SCHOOL MUST BE OF AGE BEFORE AUG. 31

In keeping in line with current educational practices, children entering the Kewaskum Elementary school in kindergarten in September must be five years old on or before Aug. 31, 1964, and those entering first grade must be six years old on or before Aug. 31, 1964.

Those children presently in kindergarten will be taken into first grade regardless of their date of birth.

The above decision was based on the aforementioned current practice being followed by more and more school systems and the recommendation of the supervising principal.

While this decision may disappoint some parents and children, it is the school's feeling that these "early age" pupils will be happier and more successful throughout their school years as a result of being more ready to start when they do.

Information as to the time and date of pre-registration of next year's kindergartners and first graders will be announced at a later date.

## First AFS Student Here Joins Peace Corps in Norway

Miss Walborg Pettersen, Kewaskum's first AFS student from Norway, informed her American parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles F. Miller, that she was one of twenty Norwegian young men and women

accepted in the Norwegian Peace Corps. After completing a two-month special school of instruction and training, she will leave for Uganda, East Africa, around the middle of June.

In her letter she said, "I will learn very, very much, and I think that it will be an even greater experience than the year in Kewaskum. Finally I have the chance to do my utmost and try to help people in another country."

Walborg will be the first graduate of Kewaskum Community High school to serve in the Peace Corps.

## Spring Election Will Be Held on Tuesday, April 7

VOTERS WILL DECIDE ON 3 TRUSTEES, COURT JUSTICE DELEGATES, REFERENDUMS

Spring election will be held next Tuesday, April 7, and interest is mounting as the day approaches, especially in the race for supreme court justice and national convention delegates as well as on the four referendum issues. Village voters will also name their choices for three trustee offices to be elected.

The polls in the village will be open from 9 a. m. to 6 p. m. and voting will be in the municipal building. Town of Kewaskum voters will cast their ballots at the Labor Center in Kewaskum. For the first time in many years, taverns may remain open in the village on election day if they desire, as the result of a change in the law.

In the village three trustees will be elected for two year terms to succeed Harold Degner, John Geidel and Arvin Merwin. Geidel and Merwin are candidates for re-election. Three other candidates are Paul Blumer, Carl Freehauf and Oscar Hirsig.

On the state level, Howard H. Boyle, Jr., Beaver Dam, is opposing the appointed incumbent, Horace W. Wilkie, for justice of the supreme court in what has proved to be a hotly contested race.

Four referendum issues will also be placed before the voters on the state level. The referendums include an amendment of the state constitution to increase the allowable state tax for forestry purposes from two-tenths to one-fourth of one mill on taxable property in the state; to adjust the basis of valuation of property for debt limit purposes to compensate for the reduction in the tax base when and if certain personal property is entirely eliminated from assessment and taxation; to amend the state constitution to permit the inclusion of several reasonably related items in a single proposition when submitted proposed constitutional amendments to the people, and the fourth referendum which would increase the gasoline tax 1 cent per gallon and other fuels to pay the principal and interest on money to be borrowed by a new state building corporation to speed up construction of Wisconsin state and interstate highways.

Voters will also be casting state ballots for Democratic or Republican presidential candidates. In this category the race between John W. Reynolds, governor, and George C. Wallace, Alabama governor, has created very much interest. The ballots also include a slate of delegates to the national Republican and Democratic conventions as well as the 6th District delegates to the convention. Richard Reigle of Kewaskum is one of the four district delegates listed on the ballot.

High school notes—Fred Buss didn't have an appetite after the North Fond du Lac game. He only had nine hamburgers and three bottles of soda.

Art J. Daley, in his column, "Spotlighting the Sport Situation," appearing daily in the Fond du Lac Commonwealth-Reporter paid a compliment to Paul Kral, Kewaskum High school's star basketball center following the game with North Fondy. Daley wrote "What Fond du Lac couldn't use with a few of those big boys from North Fondy and Kewaskum isn't even in the books . . . Paul Kral is without a doubt on a par or even better than anything in the Fox River Valley conference . . . although the type of ball handling is somewhat inferior to that in the Valley circuit, several of those big Tri-County cagers have all the makings of fine players . . . those boys are big . . . North Fondy's squad would probably outweigh the Fond du Lac Senior High school team from 10 to 20 pounds per man and that isn't even mentioning height."

The Fond du Lac Commercial college basketball team, which contains four Kewaskum players—Willard Bartelt, Harold Bartelt, Harry Koeh and Louis Bath, finished its season with 8 wins in 11 starts. Willard Bartelt led the squad in scoring with 87 points on 40 baskets and 7 free throws. Kewaskum High school was one of the teams to defeat the college squad.

Mike Klein of Wheat Basin, Mont. arrived at the home of his brother, Hubert Klein at St. Bridgets for a short visit after being gone from Wisconsin for the past 29 years. The brothers failed to see each other during all these years.

Fire destroyed an implement and machine shed on the Alvin Fa-



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ber farm two miles west of Wayne and three miles south of St. Kilian Sunday noon. About 75 chickens, a corn binder, plow and automobile were destroyed and the loss was estimated at \$1,000.

Adolph Wahlen of St. Kilian suffered severe lacerations to his left hand while operating a carrier when at work in the barn on his farm. A number of stitches were necessary to close the wound.

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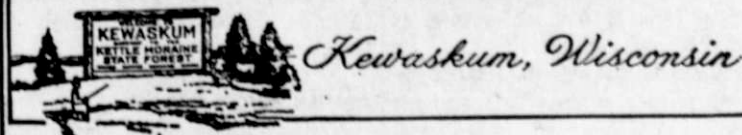

Letters to the Editor:

Wisconsin voters are going to have an opportunity on April 7th to fight smut and obscene literature when they vote for Mr. Howard H. Boyle Jr. rather than Mr. Horace W. Wilkie for the office of Justice of the Wis. Supreme Court.

The real issue is our Wis. Obscenity Laws. These laws were actually neutralized when the Supreme Court ruled in May 1963 in a 4-3 decision that the book TROPIC OF CANCER is not obscene.

Mr. Wilkie, who was appointed to his office, not elected, by you the people, was one of the justices who voted to permit this ill-famed book to be sold and circulated in Wis. However, a July 10, 1963 ruling on this same book by New York State's highest court labeled it obscene and described the book as "Dirt for dirt's sake and dirt for money's sake."

Mr. Boyle agrees with J. Edgar Hoover of the F.B.I. in his statement; "High in the ranks of contributors to juvenile delinquency are the vicious and unscrupulous peddlers, producers and printers of obscene literature. They are as responsible as the sex fiends they incite by their wares."

Mr. Boyle will work to reopen the door of justice on questions of obscenity. Pass the word. A vote for Boyle is a vote against smut.

### Car Strikes Parked Truck Here, Lumber Pierces Windshield

In a mishap which occurred at 3:50 a. m. Tuesday, an auto driven by John Wahnschaffe, 34, of 1145 Midland ave., crashed into the rear of a truck owned by the Barker Lumber Co. of Random Lake which was parked at the curb in front of the Alex Laubach home at 1246 Meadow Lane. Wahnschaffe was traveling north on Meadow Lane when his vehicle struck the parked truck, which was loaded with lumber. Some of the 2x4 sections of lumber on the truck pierced the windshield of Wahnschaffe's car and the body was also damaged as was the cab of the truck. Wahnschaffe fortunately escaped injury as the lumber did not crash through the windshield on the driver's side. Laubach is employed by the Barker Lumber Co.

Four teenagers were injured at 10:24 p. m. Tuesday when a car driven by Michael G. Heinen, 19, of R. 1, Kewaskum, apparently left the old Beaver Dam road on a curve about 2.5 miles west of West Bend. Injured were Heinen, who incurred a left shoulder injury and laceration to the left eye; Pamela Reiter, 15, West Bend, face lacerations, possible concussion and right leg injury; Rosemary Landrath, 17, injuries to right leg and right hand, and Bonnie L. Soyk, 15, West Bend, bruises and abrasions to the right thigh.

An auto driven by Frank Heisler, 46, of 276 So. Military rd., Fond du Lac, was damaged when it struck a doe deer on Hwy. 45 near the intersection with County Trunk W north of Waucousta Wednesday evening. Heisler, who was traveling north on his way home from work at Fairmont Foods in Kewaskum, struck the deer when it darted out in front of his car from a ditch alongside the highway. He was unable to see the animal in time to stop. The doe, which was carrying a fawn, was killed and had to be confiscated.

### County Agent News Notes

#### MEETING POSTPONED

The Washington County Farm Bureau announces that the Farm Bureau meeting scheduled for Tuesday night, March 31, at West Bend, was postponed.

Tony McCleary, the scheduled speaker, has been called to Washington for a special meeting, and was unable to attend the Washington county meeting.

The meeting will be rescheduled at a later date, according to the Farm Bureau office at West Bend.

#### GROWING SOYBEANS

In 16 years of extension work in the state of Wisconsin, this county agent this year has been asked about growing soybeans more often than in all the other years together. We don't know the exact reason for all this interest, but we pass this information along to those who want it.

If you are interested, we recommend three varieties. NORCHIEF is very early. It is adapted to 85 or 90-day corn maturity belts. It has a good yield, pods are low, and oil content of about 20%.

CHIPPEWA variety is early, is adapted to the 95 to 110-day corn maturity belts. It is high in yield, good height, and excellent lodging resistance. The seeds are round and yellow with a black spot. Oil content is about 20%.

The variety known as HAROSY 63 is late, is adapted to the 110 to 115-day corn belt.

Farmers in this area who want to grow soybeans will probably be most satisfied with the CHIPPEWA variety. Ask us for the circular on soybeans, if you would like further information.

#### DAMPING OFF

Damping off disease can take a heavy toll of seedlings started by home gardeners in flower pots, backyard hotbeds or cold frames.

Tomatoes, cabbage, pepper and similar plants can be affected by this disease. Damping off of seedling is caused by a fungus in the soil. Seeds can decay before they germinate and young plants may collapse and die.

Fungicides, such as thiram or captan, dusted on the seed will reduce injury caused by seed decay and damping off. The home gardener can treat small quantities of seed by tearing off a corner of the seed packet and placing a small quantity of fungicide in the packet. You can usually get enough fungicide into a seed packet by dipping the tip of the small blade of a pen knife in the fungicide and transferring as much dust as will stay on the tip to the seed packet. Insert the dust through the hole in the package, fold down the corner and shake the seed thoroughly.

Directions on the fungicide package will tell how much dust to use on large quantities of seed.

### Minutes of School Board Meeting

January 20, 1964

A joint meeting of the Boards of Education of the Kewaskum Elementary School, Jt. District No. 1 and Kewaskum Community High School, Jt. District No. 2 was held at the Kewaskum Community High School January 20th with all members present.

After the meeting was called to order, Mr. Riley called for nominations for Chairman of the group. He was unanimously elected Chairman and Paula Petri, Secretary.

Mr. Riley posed the following questions for discussion:

1. Shall we employ a Superintendent at this time?  
Who shall act in filling this position?  
Will it be a joint action or will we invite the Boards of other schools in the high school district and consult them?

11. Shall we think about integration at this time?  
Will it be by municipal action or the County School Committee?  
Would such action at this time have any effect on our present and future building programs?

111. What will we do about the applications to the Superintendent Mr. Riley has received?  
Shall we solicit others?

After a lengthy discussion, we

reached these conclusions.

- 1 Each district will operate with its own Principal and we will continue to work together in mutual interests as in the past.

- 11 We favor positive action toward integration for integration does upgrade the quality and standards of total education. Here Mr. Zarling told us of a meeting to be held on Friday, January 24th, of the school personnel of all the county schools to discuss and set certain standards of elementary education. By a vote of 8 to 1, the joint boards voted to continue to operate the schools with the two Principals and to work toward integration.

In discussing the bus accident of that afternoon, the following procedure was endorsed. The bus driver is to call the school and the school will call the police and a doctor and ambulance. The schools will call the parents of each of the children on the bus at

In discussing the school calendar, it was suggested that we try to incorporate a spring vacation in the 1964-1965 year.

## Looking Thru the Field Glasses...

### WILD DUCKS, SWAN APPEAR

Pike lake over the years has been the first to have open water each spring and the first to be ice free in the county. As soon as the ice disappears, the wild ducks and swan appear. This past week end there were over one hundred swan counted there, forty were counted at Big Cedar, twenty-five on the Milwaukee river in West Bend and a few on Gilbert's lake.

When the ice is gone on Lake Winnebago and southern Green Bay the birds will leave our county. These birds may have a hard time finding food on Green Bay. The water there is so low that two weeks ago one could drive on dry land from the west shore to the Long Tail light house.

### Members Will Be Elected at Conservation Hearing Apr. 20

At your Conservation Congress Hearing, Monday, April 20, 8:00 p. m., at the Moose Lodge, West Bend, you will be electing a regular member for three years and an alternate for 2 years to your County Conservation Congress committee.

Your County Conservation Congress committee is made up of 3 regular members and 2 alternates. Regular members are elected for a 3-year period, and their terms are staggered so one expires each year. Alternate members are elected for a term of two years and their terms are also staggered. In Washington county the regular member whose 3 yr. term expires is Roland Miller, the alternate whose 2 yr. term expires is Anthony M. Theisen.

In addition to the election of a regular and an alternate member, any vacancies which may exist at the present time will be filled. Election to the vacancies will be for the unexpired term whatever length it may be.

There are a few simple rules pertaining to the election of these committeemen. First of all, none of the five committeemen shall be from the same city, village, or civil township. This is to give as many localities as possible a member on this important committee.

The committeemen are to be elected by separate ballots, and at least two nominations from the floor are to be made for each position, and voting shall be done by written ballot. Any person participating in the voting for committeemen must be a legal voter and a resident of the county in which he is voting.

Other instructions on this election are as follows:

In order that the real interest of conservation be served, it is essential that you elect men as representatives of your County Con-

servation committee who have the following qualifications. They should be persons with a good knowledge of fish and game problems who are open-minded and should be able to view conservation matters on the basis of state-wide interest.

No person will be certified by the commission who:

(1) Employs political tactics in seeking election.

(2) Seeks election to further personal interest or interest contrary to the benefit of conservation.

(3) Has been convicted of a violation of the fish and game regulations during the past 5 years.

You have a busy, interesting and important evening in store for you at your Conservation Congress Hearing, Monday, April 20, 8:00 p. m., at the Moose Lodge, West Bend. ### Steinhilber Enters Race for Congress In Sixth District

Jack Steinhilber, Winnebago county district attorney, announced last week that he will seek the Republican nomination for Congressman from the Sixth District.
