Boy Injured When Bike Is Struck By Car

John Reigle, 8, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Reigle, 1251 Meadow Lane, Kewaskum, suffered a fractured left leg and gash on his forehead when the bicycle he was driving was struck by an auto driven by Rolland A. Glass, 27, of R. 2, Campbellsport, on Fond du Lac ave. at 8:07 p. m. Wednesday. The mishap occurred in front of the Honeck Chevrolet garage.

According to the accident report, Glass was traveling south on Fond du Lac ave. when the Reigle boy and a companion, Marvin Wahnschaffe, 10, of 1145 Midland ave., began crossing the street on their bikes. When the boys saw the car, Wahnschaffe turned his bicycle around and went back while Reigle proceeded to cross the street and Glass was unable to stop in time to avoid striking him. The Glass car showed skid marks for 10 feet in his attempt to stop. The car struck the rear of the bicycle. Neither vehicle was damaged.

West Bend Boy Struck By Local Driver's Car

The high winds of Monday were indirectly responsible for an injury in West Bend. Bruce Boettcher, 6, son of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Boettcher, 1735 Barton ave., was struck by a car as he ran into the street to retrieve a sand pail hurled there by the wind.

According to West Bend police, the accident occurred at approximately 5:25 p. m. just south of the Barton ave. bridge. Bruce entered the street from in front of a parked vehicle and was struck by a car driven by Marlene E. Garbisch, R. 1, Kewaskum. He suffered bruises and complained of stomach pains and was taken by ambulance to St. Joseph's Community hospital, where he was reported in very good condition Wednesday. The driver was not held.

Richfield Man Killed in Crash East of Village

Harold W. Sandberg, 37, of R. 1, Richfield, was fatally injured some time last Thursday night when his car apparently left a curve on County Trunk Highway HH while traveling north and struck a tree. Sandberg was reported thrown from the vehicle in the crash and suffered a head injury. The accident occurred about a quarter of a mile north of State Trunk Highway 28 about a mile east of St. Michaels.

Washington county coroner, Matt L. Goeden, Jr., said the mishap occurred about 1 a. m. Friday but Sandberg was not found until 6:30 a. m. in a roadside woods. The county sheriff's department said a motorist, not identified, was on his way to work and discovered the car and body. The vehicle apparently failed to negotiate a curve, went off the road, over a ditch and then struck a tree. The body was thrown a few feet from the car. Sandberg's body was removed to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, in the Kewaskum firemen's ambulance.

Sandberg's wife, Jeanette, 36, is a patient at St. Joseph's hospital in West Bend, where she was taken for medical attention April 6. Sandberg formerly resided in West Bend before moving to the rural Richfield address.

Sandberg's car was badly damaged in the crash. His death was the fifth in Washington county this year.

Funeral services for Sandberg were held at the Harder Funeral home, Milwaukee, at 1:15 on Tuesday, April 14, with interment in Pine Lawn cemetery. He leaves his wife, the former Jeanette Fiebrink, a step-daughter, his parents, three brothers, three sisters and his parents-in-law.

Pileup in Swamp

Three cars were damaged in a pileup on Hwy. 45 in the Kewaskum swamp area about two miles south of the village at 8:28 p. m. last Friday when a car stopped to avoid hitting a deer which ran onto the roadway. The deer was in a herd of several animals. A car driven by Dorothea L. Schwandt, 17, of Campbellsport, stopped behind the first auto when a following vehicle, driven by William J. Timken, 36, of Milwaukee, unable to stop in time, collided with the Schwandt auto. The Timken car was then struck by another following car operated by Robert A. Thelen, 23, of Campbellsport, which was also unable to stop. Injured was Clara Timken, 66, of West Bend, who suffered a possible neck injury.

Damage Caused By High Winds

61 MILE AN HOUR GUSTS OF HURRICANE VELOCITY; LIMB FALLS ACROSS AUTO

Hurricane force wind gusting to 81 miles an hour in the La Crosse area and to 61 miles an hour in the Kewaskum vicinity Monday pounded the state. Buildings were damaged, power and communications knocked out, trees felled, traffic endangered, 10 persons were injured in Wisconsin and other widespread damage was caused. The high wind continued on Tuesday and caused some further damage, although of lesser velocity than the day before.

In Kewaskum a large limb broke off of a tree in front of Holy Trinity school in one of the Monday afternoon gusts and fell on a parked car owned by Mrs. Harvey Jandre. Mrs. Jandre was not in the auto at the time. The top of the car was dented slightly and the body scratched. The fallen limb also partially blocked traffic on Main st. for a short time until village crews sawed it into pieces and hauled it away.

A number of trees were felled in the village by the wind and many, many smaller branches blown off trees and strewn about. Roofing and siding was blown off of many homes and business places and windows smashed. Rubbish cans, cartons and other small objects were scattered. Numerous hats and caps were blown off of people and tossed through the air. Walking was difficult as pedestrians leaned against the wind on an angle. The gusts rocked cars on their springs. Much other lesser damage was observed.

More serious damage was reported in other sections of the state. Four men were injured at DePere when winds pulled a tower section of a four-story building and dumped tons of debris through the roof of a paper-making plant. The winds touched off fires in some areas, one that destroyed a home near Portage. Some barns collapsed. Semi-trailer trucks were blown off highways on Ozaukee county and Milwaukee. A mobile home and truck towing it were flipped off a Dane county road. A ship was torn from its moorings in Lake Michigan at Milwaukee. A number of communities were without power or telephone service. Many roofs were damaged throughout the state. A Sheboygan mailman was severely injured when blown off a porch. Two Kenosha youths suffered possible fractures when they were knocked off their bicycles and pinned by a falling tree limb. There was countless other widespread damage. Hurricane winds are those over 75 miles an hour.

FIREMEN ANSWER GRASS FIRE CALL

The Kewaskum fire department answered a call to the Wayne Rimmel home about one mile south of the village at approximately 11 a. m. Saturday to extinguish a grass fire. No damage resulted.

School Seeks Bids for New Cinder Track

Appearing on page six of this issue is an advertisement for bids for the installation of a quarter mile cinder track with a 190-yard straight-away at Kewaskum Community High school. Bids will be accepted until 8 p. m. Monday, April 27.

The track will be 24 feet wide, except for 220 yards which will be 18 feet wide, and is to have steel edging and a base of approximately six inch washed stone with four inch coarse cinders and two inch blue-clay cinder mixture. Construction of the pole vault, high jump and broad jump pits and runway are to be included.

Included as a separate part of the bid is the installation of approximately 1,900 feet of five and six inch concrete drain tile and crushed stone backfill under the track area. Dirt removed is to be stockpiled on the school grounds.

Race Candidate For Congress on Democrat Ticket

CITES POOR ATTENDANCE RECORD OF OUR PRESENT INCUMBENT CONGRESSMAN

John Race, Fond du Lac, a member of the State Coordinating Committee for Higher Education, announced today he will be a candidate for Congress in the Sixth Congressional District on the Democratic ticket.

Race, who has been active in many local, state and political activities for many years, said he would campaign on the important issues facing the nation and expose the voting and attendance record of the present incumbent Congressman.

Race said, "the incumbent Congressman's 68% participation in roll call voting in the last session of Congress was the poorest of the ten Congressmen from Wisconsin, yet a few weeks ago the 6th District Congressman voted for a \$10,000 a year increase in his salary. If elected I will serve the district full time."

John Race was born in Fond du Lac, May 12, 1914. He graduated from Fond du Lac grade and high schools; also attended the University of Wisconsin. He is employed

as a specialist at Giddings & Lewis Machine Tool company, Fond du Lac, for 23 years.

He is a member of the State Coordinating Committee for Higher Education and is also a member of the Wisconsin State Board of Vocational & Adult Education. He was elected a Fond du Lac county board supervisor in '58, re-elected in 1960-62. Race is a member of the Fond du Lac District Comprehensive Mental Health Planning committee and is a director of Sheltered Workshop, Inc., Fond du Lac.

He has been chairman of the Fond du Lac county Democratic party (7th year); vice-chairman Sixth District Democratic party (4 years). He served as a member of the Health & Welfare Platform committee State Democratic Party and Elections Committee State Democratic Conventions (5 years); chairman, Fond du Lac County Proxmire for Senator Club in 1957-58. Race was a candidate for Congress of the Sixth Congressional District in 1962.

Race is married and has three daughters.

Local Allotment For Roads, Streets Totals to \$295.75

Payments were mailed in late March to every city, village and town in Wisconsin by the State Highway Commission under statutory allotment for improvements to local public roads and streets. The payments total \$6.2 million for 57,245 measured miles of town roads; 7,957 miles of city streets, and 2,222 miles of village streets.

A total of \$55,874.65 is being distributed in Washington county to the following municipalities: Cities of West Bend \$11,759.80 and Hartford \$2,769.00; villages of Germantown \$285.35, Jackson \$119.60, Kewaskum \$295.75, Slinger \$284.70. and 13 towns \$49,360.-45.

The present allotment is made for all local public roads and streets certified as being open and used for travel excepting state and county trunk highways and connecting streets.

In keeping with a policy initiated three years ago, approximately 1/5 of the counties are re-inventoried each year to determine the exact mileage open for public travel. Field forces of the State Highway Commission go over roads and streets with an odometer and check on conditions of all roads reported to be open to the public.

This re-inventory will now be a continuous process, so every five years an actual physical inspection will be made of the reported mileages in all counties.

The present allotment is the first portion of approximately \$40 million in highway user taxes collected by the state and returned to local municipal governments during the year. Separate allocations are made to county governments for highway purposes.

County Agent News Notes

By MAURICE J. HOVLAND
Washington County Agent

CRABGRASS ON LAWNS

Crabgrass is an annual grass which infests many lawns. The seed germinates in May and dies after the first frost. The crabgrass seedlings are light green with leaves wider than most turf grass. As the plant matures the stems grow longer and characteristic "finger branched" purplish flower heads develop.

There are three things to help you control crabgrass. First, good grass management. This means well fertilized lawns. We recommend using 10-10-10 at 10 lbs. per 1,000 square feet, or some other balanced fertilizer, with a generous application of nitrogen. Second, raise your lawn mower to cut the lawn about 2 inches high all during the growing season.

Third, apply one of the chemicals that is recommended today as a pre-emergence spray, before the seed germinates in the spring. This would be before May 15. For this, we hear most often about Zytren, Dacthal, Bandane and Treflan. Use according to the manufacturer's directions. Complete coverage of infested areas is essential. Areas treated with these sprays in the spring should not be seeded or over seeded until fall.

GRUBS IN STRAWBERRIES

You won't be uncovering your strawberries for a while, but when you do you will very likely have some white grub damage present, unless you took steps to control it last year with a rather strong soil insecticide.

In the fall, your plants probably looked to be in good condition and this spring they will begin to grow and blossom normally. As they set fruit and put great pressure on the root system, you might look out some morning to find the whole plantation looking wilted and sick. This is definitely grub damage.

It is possible there will be a great deal of it this year because of the heavy infestation of grubs last year. Be prepared for it if you grow strawberries. For more information, write us at Box 116, West Bend, or call FEderal 4-3491, ext. 63, and ask for the strawberry bulletins.

PRUNING GRAPES

Pruning grapes is even more of an art than pruning tree fruits and raspberries. To properly prune grapes, the vine should be cut drastically each year.

A grapevine will grow very rapidly after the plant has become established in the soil. It is not unusual for it to grow 20 feet in two different directions during one growing season. Without pruning, there will probably be fewer and seedier grapes.

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First, we should have a grape arbor, about 5 feet high, with two wires, one about 5 feet, and one about 2 feet off the ground.

As you prune, find four canes on the vine that are light-colored, indicating new wood that grew the previous year. Cut away most of the rest of the plant and save these four rapidly growing canes, four on each wire.

We cannot give detailed information here, so for further information on pruning and fertilizing, ask us for circular 539, "Growing Grapes in Wisconsin."

CONTROL OF MAPLE BLADDER-GALL MITE

Maple bladder-gall mites cause small wart-like galls on the upper leaf surfaces, appearing most commonly on silver and red maples. These galls are green in color when first formed, but gradually turn red and ultimately black.

The control for maple bladder-gall consists of using a dormant spray in April before the buds open. Use either liquid lime sulfur or 25% malathion. We would recommend using 11 gallons of lime sulfur in 100 gallons of water. If you use malathion, use 4 lbs. of 25% malathion in 100 gallons of water.

These mites can cause the tree to be a little unsightly later in the growing season, but they cause no particular damage to the tree itself.

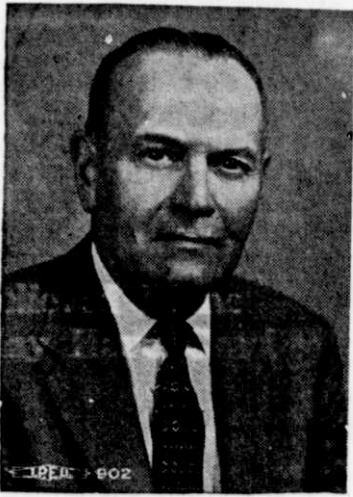

PERCH NETS REMOVED DURING CLOSED SEASON

Gill net operators removed their perch nets from the waters of Lake Michigan and Green Bay on April 9. They will start fishing again at the end of the closed season, May 19, in the waters of southern Green Bay and June 10 in the waters of northern Green Bay and Lake Michigan.

Hook and line fishing for perch in these waters is permitted during this period. However, there is a bag limit of 50 perch per person, and such fish shall not be sold, traded or bartered.

County Conservation Congress Hearing Monday

Monday, April 20, is the date you should have marked on your calendar to remind you to attend your County Conservation Congress hearing at the Moose Lodge, 18th ave. and Chestnut st., West Bend.

We have previously discussed the game questionnaire and the election of your Congress committee. The other item to be discussed is the fish questionnaire.

The fish questionnaire is some shorter than the one for game. It does, however, contain some interesting items as follows:

1. Extend the trout season closing to Sept. 15; presently it closes Sept. 7.
2. Close the game fish season Jan. 15; presently it closes Feb. 15.
3. A bag limit on pan fish of 25, 50 or 75.
4. A size limit of 13 inches on walleyes, and 22 inches on northern.
5. Allow the dip netting of fish in freeze-out waters.
6. Allow three lines for fishing state-wide.
7. Allow possession of 100 insect larvae for bait.

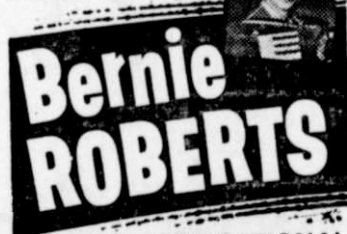

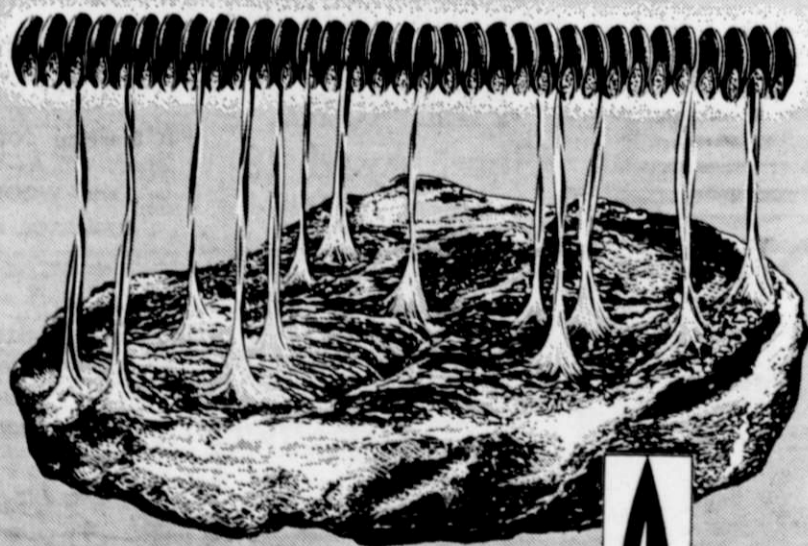
