## Scoutmaster "Mike" Gnacinski Is Awarded Coveted St. George Medal

ONE OF 10 IN ARCHDIOCESE, FIRST IN COUNTY HONORED; NAMED SCOUTMASTER FOR VALLEY FORGE JAMBOREE

Eugene "Mike" Gnacinski of Kewaskum, who has been a Scoutmaster here for 16 years, and Daniel Youra, 599 Western ave., Fond du Lac, who has given 12 years to Scouting in that city, were among Catholic Scout leaders awarded the coveted St. George medal at an archdiocesan dinner meeting in Fond du Lac Sunday night. "Mike" is the first resident of Washington county to receive this award.

More than 225 persons, including a number of priests from parishes throughout the archdiocese, attended the program at St. Mary's school gymnasium. At a business session, Al Meixensperger, Fond du Lac, was re-elected chairman of the archdiocesan Catholic committee on Scouting.

The St. George medal, hung on yellow and white ribbon, is awarded only for exceptional and long-standing service to Scouting. "The award seeks the man," said the Rev. William Knoernschild, Milwaukee, archdiocesan chaplain of Catholic Boy Scouting, in announcing the names of the 1964 recipients.

Others of the 10 recipients in the archdiocese to receive the award include Herman Brockhausen, Paul Ortman and Fred Olsen, all of West Allis; Mike Hannas, Burlington; Roman Renk and Arthur Mueller, Milwaukee; and Paul Salerno and Jack Sundee, both of Sheboygan.

Gnacinski, who has given 16 years as a Scouter here, just last week was named Scoutmaster for Badger Council Jamboree Troop 58, one of two which will travel to Valley Forge, Pa. this summer. This sixth National Jamboree will be held July 17-23.

Youra, whose entire family is involved in Scouting in one way or another, now is Cubmaster of Pack 14 at Sacred Heart church, Fond du Lac, and is a committeeman for Troop 14. He previously was Cubmaster of the pack at Franklin school and Scoutmaster for St. Mary's Troop 15. He was a Star Scout as a youth in Two Rivers.

This, the ninth annual presentation dinner, was the first held outside of the city of Milwaukee but the attendance was "the largest we ever have had," according to Father Knoernschild.

Those who attended heard a challenge from the Rev. John Endejan, native of Fond du Lac, and now archdiocesan CYO director. "I challenge you as we honor you here tonight," he told the award winners, "to rededicate yourselves to the job of attracting more lay people to our programs for youth." Father Endejan is a former Eagle Scout. He spoke on "Scouting from the Viewpoint of a Priest."

## Grass Fire Burns Over 50-Acre Area

A serious and dangerous grass fire Sunday afternoon burned over more than 50 acres of grass, marsh land and wooded area near the junction of Hwy. 28 and Kettle Moraine Drive about two miles east of Kewaskum.

Fanned by a high wind, the crackling flames spread rapidly, leaped high into the air and sent up billowing clouds of smoke. The wind, out of the southeast, kept the smoke close to the ground and blew it into the faces of firemen, blinding and choking the fire fighters. A pile of old tires dumped in the marsh burned and gave off heavy, black smoke. The smoke could be smelled and seen from this village.

Most of the marsh area burned over is owned by Mr. and Mrs. Walter Dei, west of their home on Kettle Moraine Drive. The remainder, mostly high woods, now state owned, is on the former Louis Backhaus farm. The fire started on the northeast end of the marsh near the highways and raced southwest through the marsh, over hills and into the woods, covering a large area.

The Kewaskum fire department was summoned about 2:20 p. m. and spent more than two hours fighting the furious blaze. As fast as firemen could extinguish the flames in one place they broke out at another point. Finally a radio call was placed to the fire station, where fireman Marvin Schaefer was standing by in case the tank truck was needed, to bring out the village grader. The grader was used to dig a wide furrow, about the width of a country road, into the ground ahead of the onrushing flames all around the south end of the marsh and this stopped the main fire at this point. The firemen, who had been working in teams at various spots, were then able to combine their efforts in putting out the minor blazes still burning at different points.

The Wisconsin Conservation Department fire fighting equipment and men from Mauthe lake, several of them from this village, were fighting a similar fire northwest of New Prospect at the same time. Later they arrived at the local blaze, shortly before the Kewaskum department pulled out, and helped finish the job of putting out the fire. Refreshments were served to the firemen at the scene and later at the fire station.

The Kewaskum firemen also answered a grass fire call late Saturday morning to the George Lendved farm one mile east of New Fane. A small area of grass burned over and no damage resulted.

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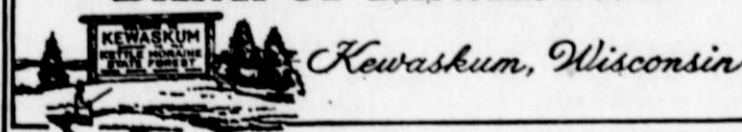

## Looking Thru the Field Glasses...

### FOX BOUNTY—HOW THE PROGRAM WILL WORK

(Continued)

For each year of the current biennium, \$180,000 was originally budgeted for state bounty payments. It is proposed that this money be used on a non-lapsing basis to set up a county fish and game fund.

This money would be made available to counties for eligible fish or game projects on an equal matching basis. Amounts of state money available to each county would be determined on the basis of the relationship that the gross area of the county bears to the total gross area of the state.

An example: Lincoln county wants to build a series of grouse walking trails on their county forest to improve grouse hunting. Lincoln county has an area of 9,171 square miles which is 1.65 percent of the total area of the state. Their share of the county fish and game fund would be 1.65 percent of \$180,000 or \$2,970. The county would appropriate an equal amount for matching, making a total for the project of \$5,940, or would commit themselves to use of their equipment and personnel in the amount of \$2,970. The project would be planned jointly by the department representative and an appropriate committee of the county board.

When the project is complete, it may be found that total expenditures run to \$5,000 or \$940 less than the amount available. The remaining \$470 of the state money would be available to Lincoln county for additional projects.

OTHER PROVISIONS WOULD:

1. Make the county board the administering body.
2. Permit counties to make all or a portion of their contribution through use of county equipment or personnel.
3. Provide state personnel free of charge for planning and other assistance with the projects.
4. Allow counties to participate in other county programs.
5. Make all projects subject to the approval of the Conservation Commission, and subject to audit by the state.
6. Disqualify public, propagation, surveys, land purchase and hiring of additional department personnel since present programs are adequate in these areas.

**ELIGIBLE PROJECTS WOULD INCLUDE:** Shooting ranges for gun safety training. Establishing food patches. Educational programs. Seeding millet on waterfowl areas. Building brush piles for rabbits. Stream improvement. Building waterfowl impoundments. Stream fencing. Roadside hedgrows management or establishment.

#### Season on Game Fish

The season on most species of game fish opens at 12:01 a. m., Saturday, May 9, in all inland waters of the state.

This includes black bass (both large and smallmouth—south of Hwy. 64), walleye and sauger pike, northern pike, muskellunge and trout.

Trout fishermen will probably outnumber other fishermen, especially in this area; and because of the more liberal seasons on the Wolf and Fox rivers, most fisher-

men have already tried their luck at the other species.

Because of the almost complete lack of rain this spring, the streams are low and clear and the trout will scare easily.

The early birds will have the best catches. Once the crowd is present on the streams, the trout will spook and be much harder to catch.

A few words of warning. Be sure you have a current fishing license. While the bag limit on trout is 10, no more than 5 may be rainbows.

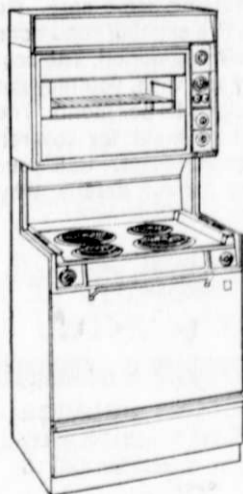

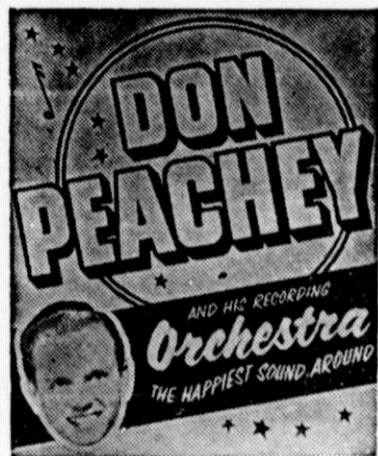
#### TREES TO PLANT ARRIVE

#### CHECK YOUR SHRUBS

Check your shrubs for any winter injury. If there is winter injury, you will find that portions of the plant are very brown. As they begin to grow, this portion will begin to die away and the needles will turn brown and fall off.

Prune off the parts that are apparently damaged. Incidentally, this is a good time to prune evergreens to shape them the way you want them to grow. We suggest you burn all of the refuse.

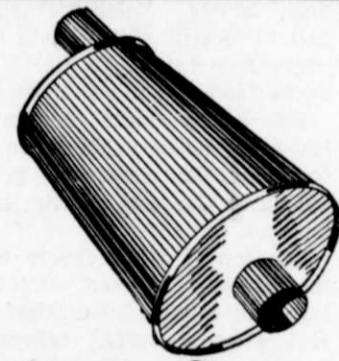
The Washington County Dairy Herd Improvement association recently announced the new officers who will guide the association for the coming year.
