Local Firemen To Take State **Training Course**

TEN WEEKS INSTRUCTION COURSE TO BEGIN MONDAY, MAY 11, AT FIRE STATION

Chief Armin Oppermann of the Kewaskum Fire Department announced today that the members of the department will begin a 10week standard firemanship training course given by the State Board of Vocational and Adult Education. This instruction will bring to the firemen the latest techniques of firefighting. Included are such subjects as ventilation, overhauling, fire stream practices, pump operation, rescue practices, use of fire department tools, ladder practices, forcible entry, salvage and knot tying.

The instructor for the course is Walt. Roelse of Sheboygan. Classes will be held every other week at the Kewaskum fire station, starting Monday, May 11 at 7:30 o'clock.

The course is part of the fire service training program of the State Board of Vocational and Adult Education.

8 Persons Hurt, Auto Burns in 3-Car Collision

KEWASKUM FIREMEN AND AMBULANCE ARE CALLED TO SCENE SUNDAY NIGHT

Eight persons were injured and one auto was destroyed by fire in a three car collision at the intersection of Hwys. 41 and 28 about seven miles west of Kewaskum at approximately 9:22 p. m. Sunday.

The crash occurred when a car driven by Paul Zingsheim, 68, of Theresa and an auto operated by Margaret Mary Flood, 19, of Caledonia, collided as Zingsheim attempted to cross the northbound lane of traffic traveling west. The Flood vehicle swerved, but the vehicles collided, and the Flood car careened into the southbound lane of traffic where it was struck by a southbound auto driven by Lois A. Klein, 35, of Milwaukee.

The Flood car, a 1961 model, caught fire and was destroyed. The Kewaskum fire department was summoned and extinguished the blaze but the fire had gained too much headway to save the vehicle. The firemen's ambulance was also summoned at the same time and removed several of the most seriously injured victims to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend. The sounding of the fire siren, and fire trucks and ambulance leaving at one time stirred up much excitement and attracted many spectators, who chased the fire vehicles, making it hazardous for and delaying some of the firemen in reaching the scene of the

Injured in the crash were Catherine Zingsheim, 60, Theresa, bumps, bruises to hands and face; Zingsheim, head injury and face cuts; Margaret Flood, bruises; Sharon Dreikosen, 20, Wauwatosa, multiple fractures, cuts and bruises; Faye T. Kamenuck, 18. Wauwatosa, cut on left leg; Lois A. Klein, 35, Milwaukee, bumps, bruises; Donald Klein, 37, Milwaukee, severe head and internal injuries; Margie A. Klein, 13, Milwaukee, left leg cut. Lois, Donald and Margie Klein and Miss Dreikosen were removed to the hospital in the firemen's ambulance.






