Wigwam Remodels, Adds Carry-Out Center and Recreation Building

SIX AUTOMATIC ARCHERY LANES & PRO SHOP, POOL TABLES TO BE INSTALLED

The Wigwam Restaurant and Drive-In on Fond du Lac ave. has completed remodeling of its interior to provide faster and more efficient service and has added a carry-out center on the north side of the building.

The carry-out center will cater to the younger trade and feature food at reduced prices. Starting on Saturday, May 9, (see ad on another page) the carry-out will be open with hamburgers selling for 15 cents, meats 20 cents and French fries 15 cents. Pizza is served every day at the Wigwam after 4 p. m.

At the rear of the Wigwam toward the northwest a large building is under construction which will house a recreation center will feature six automatic archery lanes and a pro shop, pool tables and space for dancing. The archery lanes will be designed to operate similar to bowling alleys with regular leagues being formed. The lanes will be open winter and summer. The recreation center has been planned with the idea of providing the younger set of the area with recreation and a place to go for enjoyment.

More information and details regarding the recreation center and additions to Wigwam services will follow at a later date.

Local Firemen To Take State Training Course

TEN WEEKS INSTRUCTION COURSE TO BEGIN MONDAY, MAY 11, AT FIRE STATION

Chief Armin Oppermann of the Kewaskum Fire Department announced today that the members of the department will begin a 10-week standard firemanship training course given by the State Board of Vocational and Adult Education. This instruction will bring to the firemen the latest techniques of firefighting. Included are such subjects as ventilation, overhauling, fire stream practices, pump operation, rescue practices, use of fire department tools, ladder practices, forcible entry, salvage and knot tying.

The instructor for the course is Walt Roelse of Sheboygan. Classes will be held every other week at the Kewaskum fire station, starting Monday, May 11 at 7:30 o'clock.

The course is part of the fire service training program of the State Board of Vocational and Adult Education.

William E. Clark, supervisor of fire service training, said, "We are glad to be able to help Kewaskum by giving this course. The fact that they requested the training shows they are alert to the fact that firemanship has grown to be complex and technical. The days are gone when firemen went to a fire and merely squirted water. Knowledge of advanced techniques is resulting in better firemanship which means better fire protection with attendant benefits of a lesser loss of life. The men taking this course are doing so on their own valuable time in order that they may improve their knowledge and serve the community better."

C. L. Greiber, state director of vocational and adult education, noted that a well trained fireman is an asset to his department and his community, but a poorly trained fireman can be a tragic liability. "Rapidly advancing technology of our age brings many improvements in living, but with many of these come new or increased hazards. It is essential that our firemen learn to cope with these hazards through systematic training," the state director said.

Kindergarten Registration Here May 11-12

This year's annual "round-up" for the parents of prospective kindergarten pupils for beginning 1st graders will be held during the day on Monday, May 11, and Tuesday, May 12, from 9:00 a. m. - 12:00 noon, and 1:00 to 3:00 p. m. in the elementary school office.

To be eligible for enrollment in kindergarten, children must have attained their fifth birthday prior to Sept. 1, 1964, and for 1st grade they must have attained their sixth birthday prior to Sept. 1, 1964, unless they completed kindergarten at the close of this year. Evidence of date of birth, either a birth certificate or a baptismal certificate, must be brought to the office at the time of enrolling.

Parents will be asked to register their children for next year's term and to fill out the child's health record. If you know of any new families that have children eligible for kindergarten, please pass this information on to them.

Supervising Principal Richard E. Zarling would like to impress upon you the importance of registering your child on either of these two days to insure you the best chance of having your child in the section you prefer (a. m. or p. m.) or first grade so that the school may plan for them.

8 Persons Hurt, Auto Burns in 3-Car Collision

KEWASKUM FIREMEN AND AMBULANCE ARE CALLED TO SCENE SUNDAY NIGHT

Eight persons were injured and one auto was destroyed by fire in a three car collision at the intersection of Hwys. 41 and 28 about seven miles west of Kewaskum at approximately 9:22 p. m. Sunday.

The crash occurred when a car driven by Paul Zingsheim, 68, of Theresa and an auto operated by Margaret Mary Flood, 19, of Caledonia, collided as Zingsheim attempted to cross the northbound lane of traffic traveling west. The Flood vehicle swerved, but the vehicles collided, and the Flood car careened into the southbound lane of traffic where it was struck by a southbound auto driven by Lois A. Klein, 35, of Milwaukee.

The Flood car, a 1961 model, caught fire and was destroyed. The Kewaskum fire department was summoned and extinguished the blaze but the fire had gained too much headway to save the vehicle. The firemen's ambulance was also summoned at the same time and removed several of the most seriously injured victims to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend. The sounding of the fire siren, and fire trucks and ambulance leaving at one time stirred up much excitement and attracted many spectators, who chased the fire vehicles, making it hazardous for and delaying some of the firemen in reaching the scene of the crash.

Injured in the crash were Catherine Zingsheim, 60, Theresa, bumps, bruises to hands and face; Zingsheim, head injury and face cuts; Margaret Flood, bruises; Sharon Dreikosen, 20, Wauwatosa, multiple fractures, cuts and bruises; Faye T. Kamenuck, 18, Wauwatosa, cut on left leg; Lois A. Klein, 35, Milwaukee, bumps, bruises; Donald Klein, 37, Milwaukee, severe head and internal injuries; Margie A. Klein, 13, Milwaukee, left leg cut. Lois, Donald and Margie Klein and Miss Dreikosen were removed to the hospital in the firemen's ambulance.

Car Rams Parked Vehicle

Coulter Pitches, Bats Indians to Two Victories

BLASTS 2 HOMERS IN WINS OVER N. FONDY'S DEFENDING CHAMPS AND GERMANTOWN

Thanks to the pitching and hitting of Mike Coulter, the Kewaskum Indians won their first two baseball games in the Scenic Moraine conference and took over first place in the circuit the past week.

Back-to-back homers by Bob Miller and Coulter gave Kewaskum a 2-1 verdict over defending champion North Fondy last Thursday in the season opener played here. Two other opening games were postponed, Germantown's visit to Random Lake and the Campbellsport-Slinger tilt.

Coulter's round tripper broke a 1-1 tie and presented the Indian pitcher with a well-deserved victory. He struck out eight and walked five while allowing only two hits—singles by the Orioles' Harry Sass and Rod Kresal. Coulter's opponent, Don Lamb, surrendered five hits, including two by M. Schmidt. Fondy took a 1-0 lead in the first inning but Kewaskum's two homers in their half of the fifth inning iced the victory.

On Monday the Indians won again, nipping Germantown, 6-4, as Coulter unloaded a two-run wallop in a decisive four-run fifth inning. Kewaskum collected seven hits, including three by Jerry Melius and two by Justman. Gordon Swinehart lashed out two safeties for the losers.

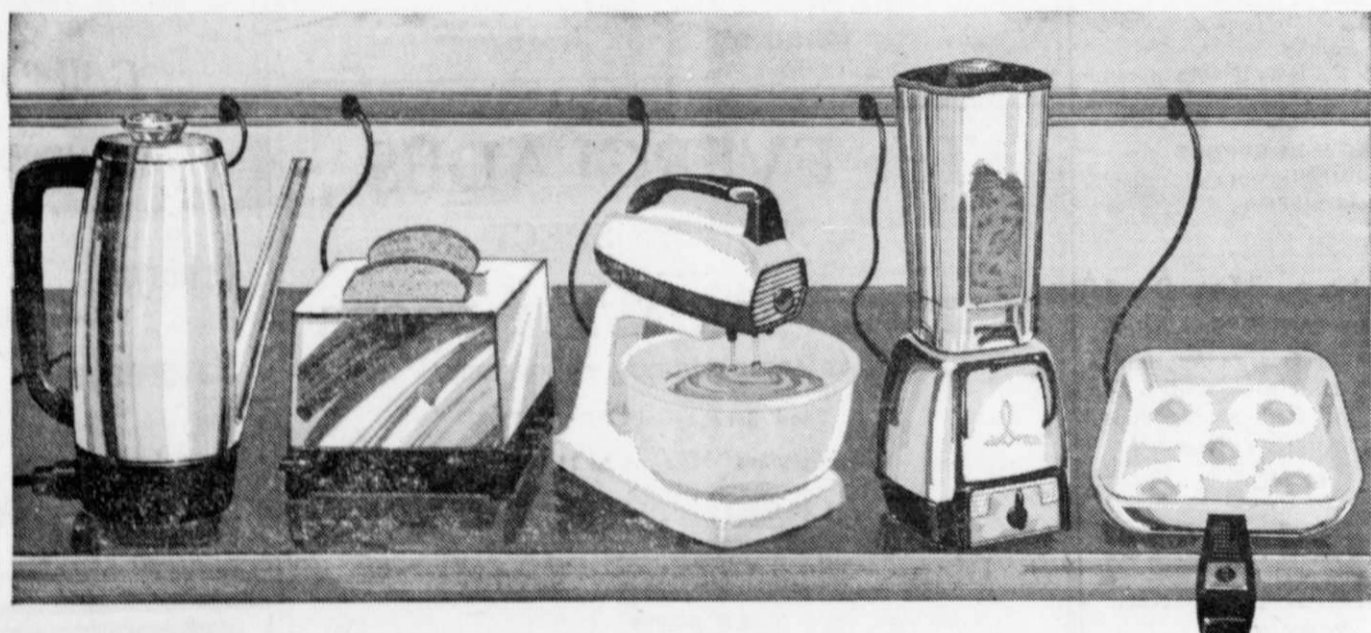
