Begin Swimming Instructions at Beach on June 22

REGISTER JUNE 20 FOR 2 CLASSES; ALLEN BECKER RETURNS AS INSTRUCTOR

Approved Red Cross swimming instructions will again be provided for the children of the village of Kewaskum at the beach area in the village park beginning on June 22.

The village is fortunate in again having Allen Becker as instructor. Allen will be assisted by Ralph Albrecht, who is now also a qualified instructor. Under this arrangement the village will be able to provide an expanded and improved program.

The swimming instruction program will be divided into two sessions. The first session will begin on June 22 and end July 17. The second session will begin on July 20 and end Aug. 14. Instructions will be given each morning, Monday through Friday. No other swimmers except those in the swimming classes will be allowed at the beach area while classes are in session.

The schedule of classes is as follows: 9:00-9:30, Beginner I; 9:30-10:00, Beginner II; 10:00-10:30, Beginner I; 10:30-11:00, Beginner II; 11:00-11:30, Intermediate. Registration will be held from 9:00 to 11:30 a. m. Saturday, June 20, in the council room of the municipal building. Children must be six years or older before they can be accepted into a class.

In the interest of safety, children under six years of age will not be allowed in any of the swimming area unless accompanied by and supervised by a parent. Children under six left in the care of a babysitter or older brother or sister will not be tolerated. Our instructors and lifeguards have a great responsibility and should not be expected to assume the role of a babysitter.

Supervised open swimming will be provided every afternoon and Saturdays and Sundays, according to William Martin, village commissioner.

Monday when she was struck by a car driven by Harold Meisenheimer, 58, of 113 Prospect st., Kewaskum, at the intersection of Main st. and Fond du Lac ave. Meisenheimer was westbound on Main st. and stopped for the Fond du Lac ave. arterial. The pedestrian began crossing the street on the crosswalk in front of the car just as Meisenheimer started to pull out onto the highway. He said he failed to see her in time and the auto struck her left leg.

Driver Course Completed by 41 Students

Announcement was made this week by Principal Ernest Mitchell that 41 students at Kewaskum Community High school have just completed a classroom course in driver education. Winds Cause Power Failure, Break Trees

Extremely high winds with gusts up to 50 miles per hour on Tuesday felled trees, downed wires and caused power failures in many areas. Rain and hail raked some communities but not locally. It was also the hottest day so far this year as temperatures reached 92 degrees.

In Kewaskum, almost the entire village was without electric power from approximately 7:15 until close to 8:15 p. m. when two electric lines whipped together due to high winds and knocked out the power when the wires burned out. The power failure occurred just east of the Milwaukee river south of Main st. The entire village except a small portion in the southwest corner of it was without light and power. Gas stations could not pump gasoline, electric clocks, including the Catholic church clock and the one in front of the bank stopped, and other electric equipment was inoperative as a result of the storm. Scattered reports of felled signs, broken tree branches and other damage were reported.

Ellsworth E. Medberry, youthful Fond du Lac slayer, was brought to Kewaskum Monday at 11 a. m. in a Fond du Lac squad car. He was in the custody of two sheriffs from Colorado. The youth is accused of slaying John F. Gray, 32, of Crystal Springs, Colo., soap salesman, when he gave him a lift while hitchhiking. Much publicity has been given the case in the daily papers. The sheriffs and their prisoner stopped at Joe Eberle's Beer Garden for lunch, allowing the prisoner to take off his handcuffs only long enough to eat, during which time he was covered with a gun. At noon they moved to the depot, causing no small amount of excitement in the village, being followed by many townspeople, especially school pupils. They boarded the 12:45 train to return the prisoner to Denver. Medberry did not confess to the murder, claiming he struck him over the head with his pistol butt and threw the body in sagebrush along the road. Gray's body with a bullet in his head, was found in a rural school garage and his car was found in Denver. Medberry hitchhiked back to Fond du Lac and was arrested at the home of his father-in-law.





Assemblyman of County, Elmer J. Schowalter Dies

SECOND STROKE PROVES FATAL TO HUSBAND OF FORMER KEWASKUM GIRL



Elmer J. Schowalter, 69, of the town of Jackson, a Republican, who was serving his fifth term as Washington county assemblyman, passed away Tuesday night, June 9, at St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, where he was confined since suffering a second stroke last week.

Mr. Schowalter was first elected to the state assembly in 1954 and was re-elected in 1956, 1958, 1960 and 1962. He suffered his first stroke in October of 1962, shortly before his last election, and had been recuperating since that time prior to his most recent stroke last Friday. Active in GOP county and state political circles, he did not intend to run again this fall.

A native of the town of Jackson, Mr. Schowalter was born on the family farm in that township which he continued to operate until it was taken over by his son Donald. He had been active in farm affairs up to the time he was originally stricken, continuing to operate the family dairy farm which the Schowalter family settled in 1843.

Mr. Schowalter was widely known for the animals he raised which included deer, buffalo, longhorn cattle, African mountain sheep and elk, on his farm at Jackson and another farm near Iron Mountain, Mich. He supplied many game farms, both private and public, with deer and other animals. Whitetail deer raised on his Jackson farm were used in the 1947 motion picture, "The Yearling." He has also provided deer for federal and state re-stocking programs since 1948. At Iron Mountain he raised buffalo, African mountain sheep, longhorn cattle and elk.

Mr. Schowalter was born on Oct. 12, 1894, and he resided in the town of Jackson all his life. He was married to Hulda Quandt of Kewaskum in November of 1922 in this village. The couple had two sons, one of whom died in infancy. The other, Donald, survives and operates the farm. Mrs. Schowalter died in 1932.

In addition to his activities as assemblyman, animal raiser and farm operator, Mr. Schowalter had previously served on the school board and was a former town assessor. He was a member of the church brotherhood of St. Peter's United Church of Christ of the town of Jackson and the Loyal Order of Moose.

Surviving, in addition to his son, are a daughter-in-law, five grandchildren and five brothers, Alwin of Jackson, Herbert and Norman of West Bend, Clarence of Beloit and Henry of West Bend.

The body is in state at the Woldt Funeral home at Jackson since 11 a. m. Friday and friends may call at St. Peter's United Church of Christ from noon until the time of services at 2 p. m. Saturday. The Rev. Ralph Schultz

will officiate and burial will be in the church cemetery.

Funeral services were held at the Techtman-Myrhum Funeral home, West Bend, at 1 p. m. Saturday, June 6, for Charles Plautz, 85, of R. 1, Kewaskum. The Rev. C. H. Meyer officiated and burial was in Graceland cemetery, Milwaukee. Friends called at the funeral home from 5 p. m. Friday.

Mr. Plautz died at St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, at 9:15 a. m. Wednesday, June 3, after a brief illness.

He was born at Milwaukee on March 7, 1879, and after his marriage to the former Emily Dippel in the Lutheran church at Dundee, farmed in Fond du Lac county for a number of years. Later he did carpenter and masonry work in the Milwaukee area. He had been a R. 1, Kewaskum, resident for the past seven years, living there with a son, Walter. His wife preceded him in death Jan. 7, 1953.

Surviving are the son mentioned above, three daughters, Mrs. Loretta Stanton of Chicago, Viola, (Mrs. Homer Harrison) of Milwaukee and Esther (Mrs. Jim Harrison) of Brookfield; seven grandchildren, nine great-grandchildren, a daughter-in-law, two sons-in-law, a brother-in-law and other relatives.



Looking Thru the Field Glasses...

By Bob Lake, Conservation Warden, Washington County

FISHING SLOWS, BIG ROCK BASS HITTING

Fishing in the county slowed some what in the past week. Bass continue to bite at Big Cedar. Crappies and a few northern at Little Cedar. Excellent fishing for large size rock bass from the piers at Pike lake. Waters cloudy and dropping rapidly.

Complaints are coming in from property owners on some of the lakes in Washington county that individuals are crossing their land or fishing from their pier without permission.

Public rights in navigable waters as quoted by the Wisconsin Public Service Commission are as follows: (The public has the right to use water up to the water. When the water recedes to low water mark, the rights of the public recede with the water, and when the water rises and extends to the ordinary high water mark, the public rights to use the water are extended accordingly. The public does not have the right to use a strip of land along the shore. A pier is private property, and permission should be obtained to use. In the event the pier is a menace to navigation the Public Service Commission may order it removed.

Park and Forest Regulations

This is the time of the year when our state parks and forests are used most frequently by both Wisconsin residents and our visitors from other states. With the increased use of these facilities, it has been necessary to tighten regulations governing conduct and use of these areas. Here briefly are some of the regulations.

1. It is unlawful to destroy, molest or deface any natural growth or natural or archeologic features or any state property; to enter in any way, any building, installation or area that may be locked or closed to public use, or contrary to posted notice.

2. It is unlawful to destroy, molest, or remove the property of others.

3. It is unlawful for any person other than a permittee or licensee to scavenge golf balls on any golf course.

4. It is unlawful to discard or leave any refuse, sewage or other waste material on the ground, or

in any building or installation, or in the water or on the ice of any lake or stream or to dispose of any such waste material in any manner except by burning or by placing in receptacles or other authorized location provided for such purposes.

5. It is unlawful to wash vehicles or pets except at authorized locations in any public use area under the management, supervision and control of the Conservation Commission.

6. It is unlawful to wash any clothing except at authorized locations in any public use area.

7. From May 15 to Sept. 15 it is unlawful to allow a dog or cat to enter any public building, or installation, or be upon any bathing beach or in any improved campsite or picnic area in any state park, state forest, fish hatchery, state recreation area or similar public use area.

We expect to have a great deal of Dutch elm disease in Washington county this year. If you live in one of the villages or cities, and are suspicious of a tree, please call one of the following Washington county Dutch elm disease wardens: Village of Germantown, Clarence Strack or F. W. Mehre; village of Jackson, Frederick Freehauf; village of Kewaskum, Roland Fledl; village of Slinger, Gerald Kienbaum; city of Hartford, Gordon Finck; city of West Bend, Walter Puestow.

If you live in a rural area, take a sample of the tree yourself and bring it in to our office. We will send it on to Madison for you.

Last week my son Jim came home from school and told us that the rumor was going around school that one man had used so many toothpicks that he had come down with Dutch elm disease. For a while we thought we ought to begin an investigation, but didn't know just where to start.

Seriously, though, the point is



that Dutch elm disease affects only elm trees—nothing else.

BIRDS IN STRAWBERRIES

How can you keep the robins, blackbirds and other birds away from your strawberry plantations? This can be quite a problem. The best thing for the small plantation would be to cover the area with cheesecloth. The berries will get enough sunlight to ripen properly even though they are covered.

If you have a large plantation you might like to set a carbide gun in the middle of the field. This gun is automatic and timed so that it explodes about every minute or so. This does a very effective job. Naturally it is an expense, but if you have a large plantation it may well worth the investment.

INGENUITY OF FARMERS

I have always been intrigued by the ingenuity of farmers. It seems that if they need an item and can't buy it, they simply make or build it. Last week Roger Liesener showed me two items he has devised. One was a truck which he remodeled into a chopper wagon. He mounted his present chopper wagon on the truck in such a way that it is completely versatile—it eliminates an extra tractor, saves a lot of time and certainly investment. For the other unit, he used the hydraulic system of his plow, mounting it on the necessary frame so that he could split fence posts with his tractor, saving many hours of hard labor. Once more this is proof to me that our farmers are inventive and ingenious.


