Installation services will be held on Sunday, July 5, at 8 p. m. at the Peace United Church of Christ, Kewaskum, for the Rev. Daniel Schowalter. Participants in the service will be Dr. Paul Kehle, Southeast Association minister, and the Rev. Edward Nuss, a retired pastor of Waukesha, who served as interim supply for Peace church from February-May of this year. The joint choirs, children's, junior high and adult, will sing "Fairest of Roses." The public is invited.

Pastor Schowalter was called to serve Peace church in February and began his pastorate in the community on June 1. He formerly served the Browntown charge, Browntown, Wis. Prior to that he served the Erdman charge, a mission church at R. 2, Sheboygan.

An event always looked forward to, Kewaskum's annual firemen's picnic, will be held in the village park on Saturday evening, July 11, and Sunday, July 12. This year's picnic promises to be among the best ever held and an excellent parade is being lined up for Sunday.

Music by The Modernaires will be the attraction on Saturday evening and is sure to please those attending. All of the rides, refreshment, concession and amusement stands will be in operation.

As usual the main feature of the picnic will be the huge parade on Sunday starting off the festivities at 12:30 p. m. sharp. The parade will be a long and very colorful one with many, many units participating. Highlighting it will be the famous Milwaukee Continental Cadette band, an excellent organization. The Kewaskum Community High school band, four other bands and other musical units will also participate. Co-operating merchants have again promised to enter numerous, beautiful floats in the parade and all are urged to do so.

Other attractions in the parade will include visiting fire departments and American Legion posts, comedy entries, old cars, many horses, children's specialties, scouts, 4-H clubs, organizations, and other individuals and groups. Over \$100 in prize money will be awarded to the best floats, children's specialties and other units. All children entering will be given tickets good in trade in the park. The Kewaskum picnic is noted for its fine parades for a town of its size and this will be no exception. The Milwaukee Cadette band and others will play in the park immediately following the parade.

Free entertainment acts will be provided Sunday afternoon and again in the evening. They will feature Bill King and Jackie, comedians and jugglers, a featured act with the "Spike Jones Show" for 10 years. If it's comedy and skilled juggling you want, this is the act, one of the most outstanding and unique in the entertainment world today. The juggling will be with battle axes, stick and ball, 7 way combination, top hat and three balls, 2 balls while eating apple, and a finale of juggling 13 pieces and live fire. Another act will be the Bakers with artistry in puppetry, who will present lifelike marionettes on their portable stage with scenery and special lighting. The puppets will include can-can girls, Charleston dancers, hula-hula girls, a trained elephant, girl contortionist, girl on the trapeze, 2 dancing skeletons, do-do ballerina, line of 8 harem dancers and burlesque queen (for adults).

The first candidate to file for the one vacancy on the board was John Tessar of Kewaskum. Tuesday, June 30, was the deadline for filing applications for the position.

Mrs. Panzer and Tessar will be candidates to succeed Paula Petri on the school board, whose

term expires this year. Miss Petri has not indicated that she will be a candidate for re-election. Voters of the school district may cast their ballots for either Mrs. Panzer or Tessar or can vote for a write-in candidate.

This year under the new method of electing school board members, they will be elected at an election at the polls on the day of the annual meeting. The meeting will be held Monday, July 20, and candidates were required to file a written declaration of candidacy at least 20 days before the annual meeting. The polling place will be at the high school and the polls will be open from 1 to 8 p. m.

"Droopy" is getting his attractive little "cookie duster" all slicked up to make a hit in his old home town. It will be a two-day affair with bands, a parade and all sorts of amusements.

A middle aged former WPA worker and a youth of 19 were brought from Milwaukee to West Bend to answer charges growing out of the slugging of Carl Degnitz, 63, town of Wayne farmer, last week. Full confessions were made by Reinhold Fonslow, 51, and George Joyce, 19. In a plot to clear the way for Fonslow to "marry money" they admitted the beating. Fonslow bought a baseball bat on the way to Wayne and gave it to Joyce, promising him money. R. Bast to Have Lead In Milwaukee 4th of July Circus Parade

On the Fourth of July, 1963, Wisconsin witnessed one of its most spectacular celebrations in its history. Approximately 425,000 people witnessed the first authentic circus parade over a 3 1/2 mile route over the downtown area of Milwaukee.

The parade had something to please every spectator, marching bands, clowns, 25 beautiful authentic wagons pulled by Percheron, Belgian and Clydesdale horses. Lions, elephants, tigers and beautiful girls beside the other elements which were used in the original parades more than fifty years ago, completed the colorful parade.

Washington county residents can be very proud of this parade since some county people played an active part in the last one as they will in this year's second annual circus parade. One of these

people from the county is Ray H. Bast of R. 1, Richfield.

Bast is the owner of the four black registered Percherons which pull the lead or introductory wagon of the entire parade. These big draft horses, averaging 2,000 pounds each, all have foals this year. Besides being in this parade, the horses are also shown at the Washington county fair, the Wisconsin and the Minnesota state fairs. At these various fairs, the mares have won grand champion, reserve grand champion and other first place ribbons.

Since the parade is to be as authentic as possible, the rules of the original parades are sent to each unit and these rules are for both the horses and drivers involved. The clock is turned back 50 years and we find in the rules:

1. No dogs, no children and no ladies allowed on the wagons;
2. No signs or advertising banners will be permitted on the horses or the wagons;
3. No assistants may walk alongside any team;
4. No foals may follow along in the parade;
5. No braided manes or tails on the horses, each horse will carry a 12 inch plume on top of the head;
6. Drivers are not allowed to wave to people on the streets;
7. Drivers may not chew gum or tobacco or smoke and they must be clean shaven;
8. The parade will start promptly at 2:30 p. m. rain or shine. All drivers must keep their coats buttoned regardless of the temperature. (The men are dressed in red suits with a trim of gold braid).

This year's parade will be even bigger and better than last year's

since it will be five miles long and it will have 35 four, six and eight horse hitches and four multiple pony hitches pulling the colorful restored wagons plus the 150 riding horse units. Half a million people are expected to witness this event.

The 1964 Fourth of July circus parade will be even more elaborate, more colorful and more exciting than the first celebration.

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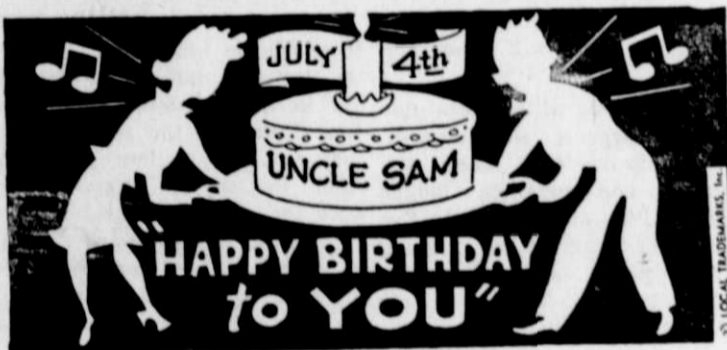
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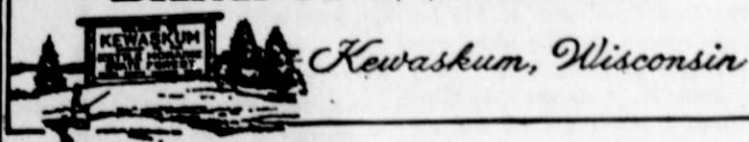
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John Reinders, Others Pass On

John C. Reinders, 73, a retired farmer who resided at St. Bridgets, R. 2, Kewaskum, for the past 44 years, passed away early Tuesday morning, June 30, at St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, where he had been a patient four days.

Engaged in farming most of his life, Mr. Reinders was employed in Milwaukee for several years before coming to his present home. He was born Oct. 6, 1890, in the town of Barton, a son of the late John and Kathryn Dellman Reinders. His marriage to the former Florence B. Schreck took place in St. Francis church, Milwaukee, Sept. 4, 1917. She preceded him in death on Nov. 1, 1960.

At a special meeting of the congregation on Sunday, June 28, the resignation terminating thirteen years of service of the Rev. L. Riesch was accepted by members of St. John's United Church of Christ, Kohlsville. Rev. Riesch was called to the Kohlsville church on Aug. 15, 1951, from his pastorate at First Church, Watertown.

He will complete his ministry to St. John's on Sept. 15. His last Sunday in the pulpit will be on Aug. 9. In the evening, on Aug. 9, the choir and interpretive dance group will present their last old-fashioned summer musicale under Rev. Riesch's direction. The public is invited to attend this inspirational and entertaining event.

In 1953 the congregation of St. John's began a relationship of sharing their pastor with the Benevolent Society of the South Wisconsin Synod. Rev. Riesch was appointed to supervise the Cedar Lake retreat area. In 1957 the Cedar Lake Home for the Aged opened to serve the public and Rev. Riesch was installed as superintendent of both the Cedar Lake

Home and retreat grounds. The home is now in the midst of its fourth expansion and the retreat area now operates on a year-around basis serving between three to five thousand people a year.

Because of the increased responsibility at the Cedar Lake jobs, and because of the growing amount of work at St. John's as the congregation grows and is looking toward expanded building facilities, the Rev. Riesch has relinquished his role as pator of St. John's to assume the full-time responsibility of serving the aged at Cedar Lake Home and retreat area.

Name Mrs. Martin Director at Red Cross Meet Here

SPEAKER BERNARD ZIEGLER TRACES 50 YEAR HISTORY OF WATER SAFETY PROGRAM

The growing interest in water sports on the lakes and streams of the Kettle Moraine area points up the importance of the Red Cross water safety program here, according to Bernard C. Ziegler in a talk in Kewaskum Thursday evening.

The 50 year history of the program was traced by Ziegler, director of public relations for The West Bend Company, at the 29th annual meeting of the West Bend chapter of American Red Cross. Representatives from the town of Kewaskum were hosts for the session held in the church hall at Holy Trinity Catholic church.

Ziegler told how the Red Cross water safety program evolved from an effort by Commodore W. E. Longfellow that originated at the turn of the century. Alarmed by the staggering number of drownings and accidents, Longfellow sought to implement a swimming and life saving program. His early efforts centered in the east through the U. S. Life Saving Service. When his program became national in scope he turned to the American Red Cross. In 1914 the Red Cross adopted Longfellow's goal to "waterproof America" and the nationwide program was born.

Fifty years later, the national drowning rate has been reduced by two-thirds, although the number of water sports participants has grown to 100 million and the number of boaters to 40 million.

"The first formal water safety program in the area began at West Bend in 1926. It was interrupted with the closing of the waterfront beach in 1930 but resumed with the opening of the Regner park pool in 1935," Ziegler recalled. "Today, instructions are provided at the Kewaskum park pool for persons from as far away as Campbellsport. There also are classes at the Regner park pool and the high school pool and the Awana 4-H club camp."

Ziegler said 931 persons received Red Cross swimming certificates at Kewaskum and West Bend in 1963. Twenty years ago,

the total was only 69. "Already this year there are more than 300 youngsters enrolled in the beginning swimming classes at Regner park alone."

The Red Cross water safety program has inspired a coordinated effort by the U. S. Coast Guard, the U. S. Power Squadron, the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and the marine industry, Ziegler noted.

"The majority of accidents and drownings result from lack of knowledge rather than carelessness. It is important that persons know and understand the rudiments of seamanship, boat handling, swimming, water skiing and life saving along with all other aspects of proper conduct in and on the water."

Ziegler explained the "three E's" of the outboard industry—engineering, education and enforcement. "The outboard industry first engineers for safety, developing particular engines for particular uses. Then we combine education with enforcement so boat owners understand and apply the principles of proper boat handling and water safety."

With the thousands of persons who participate in water sports in the Kettle Moraine area, "We owe a debt of gratitude to Commodore Longfellow for his foresight some 60 years ago, to the Red Cross for formally adopting Longfellow's program 50 years ago and for the pioneers right here who first originated life saving and instructions some 40 years ago," Ziegler concluded.

During the business phase of the 29th annual Red Cross meeting conducted by Gerald F. Marine, chapter chairman, Mrs. Marvin Martin of Kewaskum was one of 10 new members elected to the board of directors. Mrs. Martin will serve a three year term.

Miss Clara B. Jaehnig, executive secretary, told of some of the major accomplishments of the West Bend chapter program this past year:

* 78 families received home service aid.

* 277 individuals earned Red Cross first aid certificates.

* 50 students at Kewaskum high school received certificates for training in Red Cross home care for the sick.

* Disaster aid was rendered one family.
