

# Jimmy Miller, Local Tavern Keeper, Dies

#### SUCCUMBS UNEXPECTEDLY AT HOME MONDAY MORNING

Roman (Jimmy) Miller, 53, wideknown Kewaskum tavern keeper at 215 Main st., passed away unexpectedly at his home Monday morning, July 13, of a coronary occlusion. Though ailing for several years, his death was unexpected.

Mr. Miller came to Kewaskum from West Bend 19 years ago and entered the tavern business after having completed four years of duty with the United States army. three of which were spent in Germany with the 2nd Armored Division during World War II.

He was born in West Bend on July 27, 1911,, and married the former Rose E. Schmitt at Holy Angels church, West Bend, on July 24, 1946. She survives him together with five children, Robert, 17, Michael, 15, Catherine, 10, Linda, 8, and Janet, 6, all at home. He also leaves his parents. Mr. and Mrs. Edwin G. Miller, of West Bend; two sisters, Marcella (Mrs. Robert Michels), of West Bend and Lucille (Mrs. Charles Palt) R. R., West Bend; three brothers, Leroy, Edwin, Jr. and Harvey, all of West Bend; his motherin-law, Mrs. Catherine Schmitt, and many other relatives and friends.

#### TRIPLE PLAY IN 13TH INNING COSTS GAME


