Firemen's Picnic One of Biggest, Best Ever Held

THOUSANDS JAM STREETS
TO SEE FINE, HOUR-LONG
PARADE; WINNERS NAMED

Despite cool, windy and at times threatening weather, the annual firemen's picnic held over the weekend in the village park attracted one of the largest crowds and was one of the most successful ever held.

The event set some records as each year's picnic grows bigger. A new high gross was reached when the receipts totaled about \$10,000 with all of the receipts not yet in. This total figure would have been quite a bit higher were it not that four state agents closed several of the most profitable games early in the afternoon Sunday. A total of 1,000 pounds of hamburger sold also set a new high. The parade and the crowd witnessing it were also estimated as the largest ever.

The firemen maintained their tradition for putting on wonderful parades. Without a doubt this year's parade was the longest, lasting very close to an hour, and among the best held. There were seven bands and drum and bugle corps, highlighted by the famous Milwaukee Continental Cadette band, in the parade and numerous beautiful and comical floats, children's specialties, old cars, horses, visiting Legionnaires and firemen, Watertown baton twirlers, 4-H'ers, and many, many other units. Following the parade before thousands of people lining the streets, the Milwaukee band gave a concert and precision demonstration in the park.

The mass of people in the park enjoyed the free entertainment acts both afternoon and evening, as well as the water fights at 6:30 p. m. The Modernaires band entertained in the park Saturday evening.

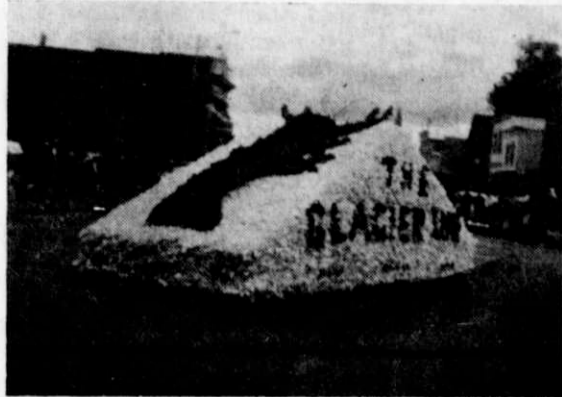

Jimmy Miller, Local Tavern Keeper, Dies

SUCCUMBS UNEXPECTEDLY
AT HOME MONDAY MORNING

Roman (Jimmy) Miller, 53, widely known Kewaskum tavern keeper at 215 Main st., passed away unexpectedly at his home Monday morning, July 13, of a coronary occlusion. Though ailing for several years, his death was unexpected.

Mr. Miller came to Kewaskum from West Bend 19 years ago and entered the tavern business after having completed four years of duty with the United States army, three of which were spent in Germany with the 2nd Armored Division during World War II.

He was born in West Bend on July 27, 1911, and married the former Rose E. Schmitt at Holy Angels church, West Bend, on July 24, 1946. She survives him together with five children, Robert, 17, Michael, 15, Catherine, 10, Linda, 8, and Janet, 6, all at home. He also leaves his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edwin G. Miller, of West Bend; two sisters, Marcella (Mrs. Robert Michels), of West Bend and Lucille (Mrs. Charles Palt) R. R., West Bend; three brothers, Leroy, Edwin, Jr. and Harvey, all of West Bend; his mother-in-law, Mrs. Catherine Schmitt, and many other relatives and friends.

"Jim" was a member of the Knights of Columbus, West Bend Council 1964, the Loyal Order of Moose, West Bend, the Holy Name society of Holy Trinity church, Kewaskum, and the Robert G. Romaine Post 384, American Legion, Kewaskum.

Funeral services were conducted at the Miller Funeral home at 9:30 a. m. Thursday, July 16, and at Holy Trinity church at 10 a. m. with the Rev. John T. Budde, pastor, officiating. County GOP Honors Assemblyman Elmer Schowalter's Memory

In a formal resolution of commendation passed unanimously at a recent meeting of the Washington county executive board of the Republican organization, the memory of the late Assemblyman Elmer J. Schowalter was honored by long-time friends and co-workers. The resolution, drawn by Anton Staral, county clerk, and chairman of the group's resolutions committee, praised the assemblyman for his job in the legislature where he served ten years.

Less formally but with genuine sincerity the group reminisced about the assemblyman who was so well known and popular that many citizens were on "first name" terms with Elmer. While the assemblyman joked about having no talent as an orator, the group recalled that his ability to listen to his constituents and support their interests in the state government was an accomplishment of merit.

The resolution and following discussion led to an appraisal of the most important qualifications for any who chose to follow Schowalter to the assembly from Washington county. The two most frequently mentioned items were: A candidate should be able to represent the interests of both rural and urban voters and be able to follow the dictates of his own conscience without being influenced by lobbyists or bullied by pressure groups. Sorrow at the loss of a good friend was evident among the Republicans who remember Assemblyman Schowalter's many unpublicized acts of charity and his devotion to the principles of his party.

Hearing Clinic Held in County

The hearing clinic or otologic examinations were held last Tuesday and Friday at the Washington county court house. Eighty-three Washington county children were eligible for this otologic clinic which is jointly sponsored by the Washington County Medical Society and the Bureau for Handicapped Children. The diagnostic screening was done by an ear specialist who made recommendations to the family physicians. The fourth phase, medical and ed-

ucational follow-up, will now begin.

The Wisconsin Hearing Conservation program is a community function. The school authorities, public health nurses, family physicians, otologists, parents and volunteers work together in the community as well as with the special services provided within the state and within the Bureau for Handicapped Children. The total result is aimed at satisfying the needs of hearing handicapped children in Wisconsin.

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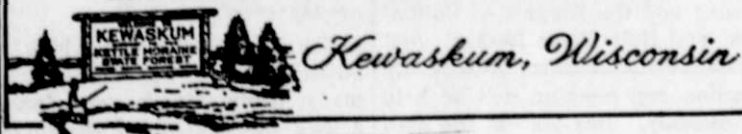

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Vicar Seefeldt Terminates Lutheran Internship

Fredric A. Seefeldt, vicar of First Lutheran church at Freeport, Ill. since June, 1963, terminated his 13-month internship here recently and returned to his home at Kewaskum for the summer to assist his father, Alfred H. Seefeldt, in the latter's honey and insurance business.

Vicar Seefeldt was assigned as intern to First Lutheran church by Chicago Lutheran School of Theology at Maywood, Ill. The internship year, he said, is part of a student's four-year course at the seminary. His first two years are spent there. During the third year he is an intern, and then he returns for his senior year at the seminary, readying himself for ordination and for serving a parish. Seefeldt will return to Maywood Sept. 14 for his senior year.

"The internship program," the vicar explained, "is designed to provide the student with guided experience in the work of the ordained ministry. Direct responsibility for this guidance is delegated by the seminary to a supervising pastor. Until March of this year I was under the supervision of Rev. Charles F. Landwere. When he left for a Tallahassee, Fla. pastorate, I was reassigned to Rev. Dr. K. E. Irvin, now interim pastor of First Lutheran church."

While at the church Seefeldt's responsibilities included visiting members, prospective members, parents of children in the church school, and the sick and shut-ins. He also assisted in services by reading the liturgy or preaching.

"I had a wide experience in the church's educational program," Vicar Seefeldt said, "teaching the senior high class, a seventh grade class in vacation church school, a teacher-training course, the confirmation class, and a sixth grade class each Sunday. I was a member of the senior choir and participated in carrying out the church's stewardship and evangelism programs, in fact, I participated in all areas of church and parish life."

In addition, he was adviser to junior high and senior high Lutheran leagues, was a member of

Freeport Council of Churches, conducted devotions at nursing homes and appeared on the Strength for the Day devotional broadcasts over WFRL.

The vicar preached his final sermon at Freeport on Sunday, June 28. Various organizations of the church, families and individuals presented him with gifts.

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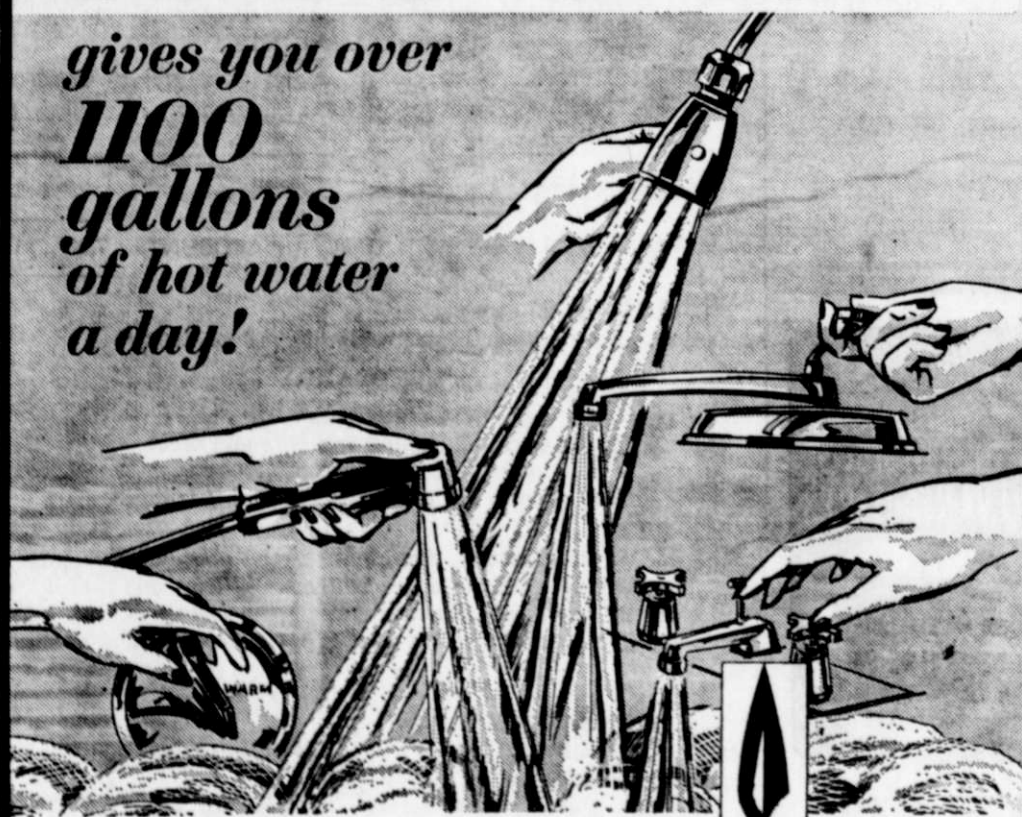
