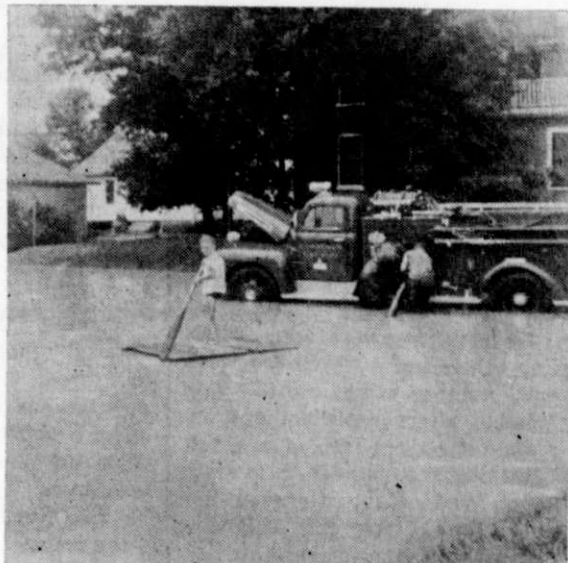

Record 7 to 8 Inch Downpour Floods Streets, Yards, Basements, Causes Heavy Damage Here



Heaviest Rain Since '24; Firemen, Workers Pump Water All Day

The Kewaskum area was deluged with a record rainfall of between seven and eight inches that fell within a period of 17 hours from about 5:30 p. m. Friday to 10:30 a. m. Saturday. The torrential downpour, coming in a series of heavy showers and severe thunder storms, caused considerable damage, flooded streets, yards and basements. This area was the hardest hit in the entire state with some surrounding cities reporting only ordinary rain.

The seven to eight inches of rain was the heaviest since Aug. 3-4, 1924, 30 years ago, when an all-time record 7.9 inches fell but this was during a 24-hour period. The weekend total can be compared with that figure. Since 1924, the heaviest 24-hour rainfall on record was 4.4 inches on July 19, 1950 in this area.

The rain began late Friday afternoon, between 5:30 and 5:45 p. m., when there was a heavy downpour which lasted several hours. The rain diminished later but was followed by two more torrential rains early Saturday morning, about 6 and 8:30 a. m. The rain was accompanied by strong gusts of wind, hail, severe lightning and thunder. During the Friday evening storm it lightened and thundered almost steadily for several hours as the storm hovered and circled over the area. According to the weather bureau the storm stalled over the southeastern corner of the state when warm, moist air clashed with cooler northern air. The warmer air rose, cooled and the moisture dropped as rain.

Hail the size of golf balls was reported in the Jackson area and caused damage to crops. The hail was not heavy and was the size of marbles in Kewaskum but west of here farmers reported more hail and considerable damage to corn, tomato, grain and other crops with leaves stripped and grain flattened.

Storm sewers and other outlets were able to handle most of Friday evening's water but the two more deluges Saturday morn-

ing caused them to fill up and backup as there was no more place for the water to go. Some local streets were under water and stretches of highway and streets were temporarily closed because of flooded conditions. On Main st. west of the railroad tracks the water was across the sidewalks and even ran under some doors.

Scores of basements were flooded and filled with water and sewage as the water ran through foundations and windows and sewers backed up. Some basements were filled almost to the basement ceiling. At Jack's Appliance, TV sets, radios and accessories were floating in the basement with barely enough space to clear the ceiling. At Heisler's tavern and the Fair store the water was up near the top of the basement stairway. There was much washoff and the low ground at the rear of these properties was a lake of water.

The water caused hundreds and hundreds of dollars in damage in various basements throughout the village. Washers, dryers, freezers containing meat, and numerous other appliances, furniture, etc. were damaged or made unusable by the sewage backing up into the basements. Toys, wood, boxes, clothing, appliances, playthings, furniture and many, many other items were floating or soaked with water. Many residents spent most of this week cleaning and drying basements and their contents. In one basement we cleaned out, a large plastic Santa Claus was floating on his back.

Members of the fire department and village crews spent from morning until evening pumping water off streets and out of basements with two fire engines and portable pumps. Crews and individuals busily moved from one place to another with their equipment and many lengths of hoses, eating and drinking on the run as lunch and refreshments were supplied them. Learning of the great amount of water and emergency in the village, several members of the Beechwood fire department came with their equipment truck and portable pump in the afternoon and volunteered their services and help. They were put to work immediately and remained until about 8 p. m. Saturday, greatly assisting local firemen and crews in pumping out basements. Their assistance was much appreciated. Many other volunteers

helped with the cleanup work in the village.

One of the spots hardest hit by flooding was an alley and back yards between Riverview dr. and Kewaskum st. This "lake" which formed is shown in the two photos above. The left photo shows the rear of the home owned by Myron Belger on Kewaskum st. and occupied by the Norman Heberer and Donald Ritger families. The water in the double garage was about five feet deep and only a foot from the top of the garage doors. The photos were taken several hours after firemen had been at work pumping out water and after the water line had gone down about two feet. The high water mark can be seen on the garage walls two to 2½ feet higher than the level shown. All appliances and other household furnishings were under water. Heberer had his car in one of the garages overnight and the water rose to the height of the seats before he got it removed early in the morning and the water got higher.

The photo on the right shows fire engine No. 2 up to the axles and firemen up to their knees in water pumping it out. This picture also was taken after noon when the water had receded a great deal. When firemen first entered the pond the water was up to their hips and the top of the wheels of the truck. The water was pumped through four hoses across Riverview dr. into the river. One fire engine pumped water from the pool steadily throughout the day and at times both engines were busy pumping. A neighbor boy, Tommy Timblin, is seen rowing about on a homemade raft. Youngsters of the neighborhood had a grand time swimming and wading in the pond. In the morning Ritger's boat, with fishermen and poles, added a "lake touch" to the scene.

The village park also was a "lake" with most of it under water. Other kids swam there and were seen diving off the band stand. Much of Hon-E-Kor golf course contained pools of water and part of No. 9 fairway along the river was completely under water. The Milwaukee river and creeks overflowed their banks. The water rose many feet and residents along the river stated water was the highest they have ever seen it. Boats along the riv-

Record High School Enrollment of 537 Students Expected

BUILDING COMMITTEE IS SELECTED; 132 ELECTORS ATTEND SESSION MONDAY

The school board of the Kewaskum High School Joint District No. 2, at its annual meeting Monday evening, adopted a budget which calls for a tax levy of \$214,837, a slight increase over last year. There were 132 electors of the school district in attendance at the meeting.

The increase of \$15,376 over the tax levy last year is due to the increase in enrollment, salaries, maintenance and materials. Estimated expenditures for the new year are \$263,680 and estimated receipts \$48,843.

Out of surplus, the board earmarked \$10,000 to be in a special building fund and the board decided to seek the services of an architect for future building needs.

It was reported by Melvin Riley, board director, that enrollment last year was 497 and the anticipated enrollment this fall is a record 537. The school was originally designed for a capacity of 500 students.

Selected on an eventual seven-member building committee were Ed. Bunkelman, Henry Rosenheimer, L. N. Peterson, Ed. Ferber and Harold Westerman. Two others are to be named.

Board members present were Riley, Leo Bingen, treasurer, and Fred Spoerl, clerk. Mrs. Eugene (Anne) Panzer was elected to the board to fill the vacancy left by Miss Paula Petri, who did not seek re-election. Under a new method this year, board members are selected at an election at the polls on the day of the annual meeting. A total of 158 votes were cast in this election held from 1 to 8 p. m. Monday. Mrs. Panzer received 85 votes, defeating the other candidate, John Tessar, who received 72 votes, by a narrow margin. Miss Petri was given one write-in vote.

Minutes of the annual budget hearing and school meeting are as follows:

The budget hearing was called to order by Melvin Riley, Director of the Board of Education, with 64 electors present.

The proposed budget for the 1964-1965 school year was read and explained to the electors.

A motion was made by John Battaglia, seconded by Clifford Stautz, to present the budget as proposed for \$214,837.00 for operating expenses at the annual meeting. Carried.

Cyril Wietor moved that the budget hearing adjourn. Lloyd Bremser seconded. Carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 2—Be it resolved by the electors of School District No. 2 of the Kewaskum Community High School that the school year be set at nine and one-fourth months or 185 days.

Richard Zarling moved to accept Resolution No. 2, C. N. Wietor seconded. Motion carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 3—Be it resolved that a tax be levied on all the taxable property of the District for operating expenses for the year commencing in 1964 and ending in 1965 in the amount of \$214,837.00.

O. E. Behnke moved to accept Resolution No. 3, Linda R. Kroncke seconded. Motion carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 4—Be it resolved that the school board of

this district be and they hereby are authorized to make such temporary loans as may be necessary to pay the operating expenses until funds for the payment thereof are realized from the current tax levy.

Merlin Degnitz moved to accept Resolution No. 4, R. R. Edwards seconded. Motion carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 5—Be it resolved that the salaries of the members of the school board of this district be fixed at \$200.00 per annum.

Francis Gilboy moved to accept Resolution No. 5, Robert Gavin seconded. Motion carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 6—Be it resolved by the electors of School District No. 2 or the Kewaskum Community High School that there be furnished free text books to all high school students for the ensuing year, 1964-1965.

Ray Schaefer moved that Resolution No. 6 be accepted, Howard Backus seconded. Motion carried.

Mr. Riley reported that Mr. Ed Bunkelman, Mr. Ed Ferber, Mr. L. N. Peterson, Mr. Henry Rosenheimer and Mr. Harold Westerman had agreed to serve on a Building Committee and opened a discussion on whether or not to hire the services of an architect.

John Battaglia made a motion that \$10,000.00 of the cash balance in the Jt. District No. 2 General Fund at the close of the 1963-1964 school year be earmarked for a future Building Program and that the Board of Education be authorized to hire an architect to aid them and the Building Committee on the preliminary exploratory sketches for a building addition. Clifford Stautz seconded. Motion carried.

Results of the election for a school board member to replace Paula Petri were read.

John Tessar 72; Anne Panzer 85; Paula Petri 1; Anne Panzer was elected to the office.

Ray Schaefer moved to adjourn, John Battaglia seconded. Motion carried.

er were filled with water. Much debris which floated down the swollen river was wedged against the park dam. Boys were seen leaping off the south end of the dam and floating down the river about half a mile in the strong current.

Puddles and small ponds were everywhere. Much ground and gravel washed away on hills, lawns, gardens and driveways. The entire work force of the Wisconsin Electric Co. of West Bend was on duty Saturday, in addition to extra help, answering calls of damage caused by fallen trees, limbs, wind and lightning. It is reported that lightning struck at the Norbert Broecker property just north of the village and a dog on a chain was killed.

No residents were seen sprinkling their lawns over the weekend. Another storm hit this area Monday afternoon when approximately one more inch of rain fell. Lightning and thunder also arrived on Wednesday afternoon but only drops of rain fell. Following all this rain the temperature remained very hot and humid all week with the thermometer soaring over the 90 degree mark daily. All this water and not a drop to drink.

Cancer Crusade in County Tops Quota

COLLECT \$405 IN VILLAGE; LOCAL RESIDENTS SERVE AS CO-CHAIRMEN IN DRIVE

Guido Schroeder, chairman, American Cancer society, Washington county unit, has announced that the 1964 Crusade reached 114% of its quota with total contributions of \$9,547.34.

In addition, Schroeder added, thousands of people were reached in the educational phase of the Crusade with informational literature stressing cancer's seven danger signals and the importance of an annual check-up.

In townships the Crusade was carried on by means of direct mail and total contributions reached \$1,578.

Business, industry and professional contacts were also on the direct mail basis bringing contributions of \$1,731.50.

The Neighbor to Neighbor campaign in West Bend, Hartford, Kewaskum, Germantown, Jackson and Slinger added \$5,248.51 to the cause. In Kewaskum \$405.75 was collected.

In addition, memorials of \$438.63 and other contributions of \$550.70 were received.

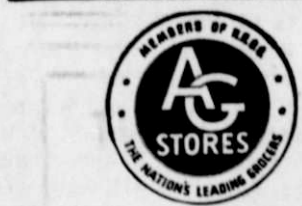

County Petroleum Council Meets, Butz Named to Committee

Wisconsin motorists pay \$14,969 per hour every day of the year in federal and state gasoline taxes, explained F. M. Elliott to the Washington County Petroleum Council meeting Tuesday night at the courthouse in West Bend.

"That is why the State Highway Commission has maintained a cash and receivable balance in excess of \$100 million every month," stated Elliott, executive secretary, Wisconsin Petroleum Council, Madison. "As further proof that these balances exist, an attempt was made last year to introduce legislation to transfer highway funds to balance the state budget. The move failed."

Officers elected to head the local council are: Chairman, K. M. Anderson of West Bend; vice-chairman, LaVerne Schaezel of Germantown; secretary, Gregg Hall of West Bend.

Other committee assignments:

Public relations: V. W. Butz, Kewaskum; W. O. Reickert, Hartford, and Harold Eisen, West Bend. Legislation: V. H. Haas, Erwin Kaehny and Tom Weidemann, all of West Bend. Local affairs: E. E. Kurth, Hartford; Roy Wolf, Slinger, and Joe Eichenseer, West Bend Schools; J. P. Faust, Slinger; Russ Fritz, West Bend, and Wm. E. O'Neil, Hartford.

Attempts to divert more federal highway user taxes to non-highway purposes were revealed by Elliott who added that Wisconsin in 1963 received only 40 cents for every highway user dollar paid into the federal government by Wisconsin motorists.

The speaker explained that Wisconsin has sufficient funds to build highways without increasing the gasoline tax, and he read a letter from the Federal Bureau of Public Roads complimenting Wisconsin for the excellent construction progress—best in the nation—on the Interstate system.

The Council adopted a resolution opposing increases of any highway user taxes.

Elliott warned that highway promoters will continue to propose increased highway user taxes to build highways "whether we need them or not." He urged gasoline dealers to attach 10 cent decals to remind the public that 10 cents in taxes are paid on every gallon of gasoline purchased.

He criticized proposals to allow local governments to tax cars, at-

tempts to raid the State Highway Fund, and the pending billboard, signing and interchange control program.

GOP Candidates Visit County Fair

Republican candidates for office are visiting the GOP organization's hospitality tent during the county fair now being held at Slinger through July 26. The public is invited to meet the office-holders and candidates in person and join in the fun and fellowship at the tent headquarters.

Secretary of State Robert Zimmerman was at the fair on Friday, July 24, from 11 a. m. to 1 p. m. Wisconsin's Attorney General, George Thompson, will visit at the event with Lt. Gov. Jack Olson during the Friday evening hours. Also scheduled for Friday evening is candidate for congress, District Attorney Jack Steinhilber of Winnebago county.

Candidate for reelection to congress, Rep. William K. Van Pelt, will arrive at the fair during Saturday afternoon hours on Saturday, the 25th. Wilbur Renk, candidate for the U. S. Senate, will be on hand to greet the public from 11 a. m. to 1 p. m. on Saturday. State Senator Frank Panzer will also attend the fair on Saturday afternoon.

A team of volunteers from the county Republican organization staff the hospitality tent each day and evening for the fair's duration, from 10 a. m. to 10 p. m.
