Elementary School to Open Aug. 28 With Record Enrollment Expected

New Addition Houses 3 Grades, Office; 20 Teachers on Staff

PLAN OPEN HOUSE AT NEW BUILDING IN SEPTEMBER

The Kewaskum Elementary school will open on Friday, Aug. 28, at 9:00 o'clock, with a record enrollment expected.

The elementary and high school cafeterias will begin operating on Monday, Aug. 31, the second day of school. Lunches for the first week of school will be \$1.25 and must be ordered and paid for on Friday morning, the first day of school.

It is the hope of Mr. Zarling, the supervising principal, that parents will insist that their children be in regular attendance throughout the year. It is only through regular attendance that children maintain a high interest in school and school activities. Regular attendance usually reflects a higher degree of performance.

Parents of children who will be attending kindergarten and who have not registered for them are asked to do so at the elementary school office during the week of Aug. 17. To be eligible for kindergarten, a child must have reached his or her 5th birthday on or before Aug. 31, 1964. Parents of kindergarten youngsters will be informed by mail which session children will be assigned to attend.

Children who will be attending first grade must have reached their 6th birthday on or before Aug. 31, 1964 unless they have satisfactorily completed kindergarten this past school year.

The kindergarten and grades one and two will be housed in the former primary building as in the past. Grades three, four and five, plus the office and vocal music will be in the new addition. The departmentalized grades six, seven and eight as well as the special education class will be held in the main building. This year there will be two sections of kindergarten, two of grade one, two of grade two, two of grade three, two of grade four, two of grade five, two of grade six, one of grade seven, one composed of grade seven and grade eight, one of grade eight, and one class of special education.

There was a total enrollment of 478 in the elementary school the past year and indications are that it will be larger during the 1964-65 year. The elementary staff for the year is as follows:

New teachers in the elementary school are Dale Squier, a graduate of Oshkosh State college; Delores Carr, a graduate of Barron County Teachers college, and Gary Gerhartz, a graduate of Oshkosh State college. Mr. Squier taught in Mount Morris, Mich. the past year. Mrs. Carr comes to the school from the Cameron Elementary and High school and has taken additional training at Eau Claire State college. Mr. Gerhartz, who is hired jointly by the elementary and high schools, is a beginning teacher.

An open house will be held sometime during the first part of September so that parents and friends may look over the new addition as well as other changes that have been made to the school. The building has not been completed at this writing, however, it appears there will be no delay in getting the new school year underway.

Firemen Answer Four Calls in Four Days

Members of the Kewaskum Fire Department answered four calls this week on four successive days.

On Sunday morning several firemen put out a fire at the village dump in the town of Auburn northwest of Kewaskum. The fire siren was not sounded but Chief Armin Oppermann called several volunteers to extinguish the blaze.

On Monday evening about 7:20 the firemen and rescue squad were called to Mauthe lake with the ambulance and equipment truck to help save the life of a Port Washington boy, Kevin Johnson, 9, a near drowning victim. Details will be found in a separate item on the front page.

At 3:35 p. m. Tuesday the firemen were summoned to extinguish a grass fire on state owned land on Kettle Moraine drive about two miles east of Kewaskum. The blaze was snuffed out hurriedly and there was no damage.

At 3:45 p. m. Wednesday the alarm sounded again, the firemen answering another call to the village dump, which started burning once more. The blaze was extinguished and the village front loader was put to use in spreading out the rubbish and pushing it ahead into the hole. This fourth call in four days got firemen "down in the dumps."

Boy Saved From Near Drowning At Mauthe Lake

KEWASKUM FIREMEN'S RESCUE SQUAD AIDS; BOY FOUND IN LAKE, REVIVED

Excellent cooperation and work by park visitors, park employees and members of the Kewaskum fire department rescue squad were credited with saving the life of a nine-year-old boy Monday evening at the Mauthe lake beach when the boy was found, limp and already turning blue in the water at the beach.

The youngster, Kevin Johnston, 9, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Johnston of 306 Monroe st., Port Washington, was reported to have been picnicking with his mother at the lake when he "went under." An unidentified man bather happened to discover him under water and brought the boy to shore.

It was reported that one or two youths or men, also unidentified, said to be from Milwaukee, and a member of a rescue squad in that city, gave the boy mouth-to-mouth resuscitation while Camp Master Walt Bade of Kewaskum was notified. Bade immediately had the Kewaskum fire department rescue squad called while he took over in administering mouth-to-mouth resuscitation to the boy. Another park employee, Patrolman Walter Ketter, assisted.

In order to round up the Kewaskum rescue squad as quickly as possible in the emergency, the fire siren was sounded in the village about 7:20 p. m. Rescue squad members and other firemen rushed to the lake with their ambulance and equipment truck, while another, an experienced skin diver, sped home to get his equipment.

The boy, who had been "limp and blue and full of water" had been brought back to consciousness, vomited out water, and resumed breathing when the local rescue squad arrived. Members immediately treated him for shock and wrapped the boy in blankets to keep his body warm. Rescue squad members then placed the boy in the ambulance and administered oxygen and rubbed his arms and legs constantly to keep up circulation all the way to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, where he was rushed. Four squad men accompanied the ambulance, two to work on the boy, one to drive, and the fourth to work the radio so that police escorts could be picked up in Kewaskum and West Bend. Just as the ambulance neared Kewaskum the youth again lapsed into a coma and the attendants had to slap his body to bring him around again. By the time he reached the hospital the boy was able to talk slightly again. He remained overnight at the hospital and was discharged Tuesday morning feeling well.

Dennis Konkel of Kewaskum, property manager for the Conservation Department in the Mauthe lake area, stated that the department was extremely grateful to the man who pulled the youth from the lake, the young men who administered mouth-to-mouth resuscitation, and the Kewaskum firemen's rescue squad for their

Crash Injuries Fatal to High School Senior

GEORGE JONES, 18, KEWASKUM STUDENT, DIES AT HOSPITAL

George Jones, 18, of St. Michaels, who would have been a senior at Kewaskum Community High school this fall, died on Friday afternoon, July 31, at the Plymouth Memorial hospital of injuries he suffered in an auto accident on Wednesday, July 29, shortly before midnight, near Silver Creek on Hwy. 141 in Sheboygan county, when the car he was driving struck a bridge.

The youth was born at San Antonio, Tex., on Jan. 1, 1946. The family had lived in the town of Barton before moving to St. Michaels.

Surviving are his parents, Frank and Augusta (Burrow) Caswin; two sisters, Lois and Sharon Jones, and a brother Frank Lee Caswin, all at home.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon, Aug. 4, at 2 o'clock at the Ohlrogge Funeral home, West Bend, the Rev. C. H. Meyer officiating. The body was in state at the funeral home after 4 p. m. Monday. Burial took place in Washington County Memorial Park, West Bend.

This near drowning proved again how extremely important it is to have trained personnel with a knowledge of mouth-to-mouth resuscitation, first aid and rescue work. This training saved a fine, nine-year-old boy's life in this case. Many, many more private citizens and individuals should take the responsibility upon themselves to take first aid training, in which speed and know-how are so very essential in the various injuries and sicknesses that occur to people such as near drownings, electric shock, heart attacks, burns, wounds, fractures and other injuries. It would be well for one member in each family to take this training.
