AFS Student Mary Kroncke Returns From Spain, Tells of Experiences

Mary Kroncke, Kewaskum's first participant in the AFS Americans Abroad program, has recently arrived home from Spain. In previous issues of the Statesman we have shared in Mary's experiences while living with her Spanish family in Mallorca.

On Aug. 27, Mary's stay in Mallorca ended and she boarded a plane for Madrid, Spain. Here she completed the educational activities arranged by the American Field Service for American students abroad.

Mary tells us briefly of these experiences:

"I left Mallorca by plane at nine o'clock on Thursday morning, Aug. 27. I flew directly to Madrid, the capitol of Spain, to join the other twenty 'AFS'ers who had spent the summer in Spain. We had just three short days to spend in the beautiful capitol of the country we had grown to understand and love over the past seven weeks.

"The day we arrived we were allowed to go shopping in the modern downtown section of Madrid. The next day our tours began. We left on an excursion to the Valley of the Fallen, located near Madrid. This is a huge church constructed by Franco, the Spanish dictator, in memory of the dead of the Civil War. Carved 285 feet into the solid rock of the mountain, it is longer than St. Peter's church in Rome. The church was started in 1949 and not completed until 1959. During that time an average of 700 men, many of them political prisoners, labored daily. A gigantic cross rises from the center of the altar. The cost of this cross alone was roughly one million dollars.

"From there we went to Segovia, a village near Madrid. There we visited the cathedral and an old castle overlooking the village. We also saw the old Roman Aqueduct, built without mortar or clamps nearly two thousand years ago. Today it still supplies the village with water from the nearby hills.

"The next morning we visited El Prado, the famous art museum where many of the paintings of El Greco, Velazquez and Goya are kept. In the afternoon we visited the Royal Palace, which is now empty, awaiting the coming of the next king. Spain is technically a kingdom without a king.

"That night we had our goodby party to our chaperones, Spanish friends in Madrid, and to Spain. The next morning we left for Rotterdam, Netherlands, by train. We slept on the train that night and changed trains in Paris the next morning. By 4 o'clock we had reached our boat in the Rotterdam Harbor.

"During the 10 day boat trip we had forums discussing our experiences and what we were going to do when we returned home. On the morning of September 10th we saw the United States for the first time in 2½ months."

Ray Bast to Run For Assembly on Independent Ticket

PLACED 2ND IN PRIMARY; WILL OPPOSE SCHROEDER, JOHNSON IN NOV. 3 RACE

Ray H. Bast of R. 1, Richfield, this week formally announced his candidacy on the Independent ticket for the office of assemblyman for Washington county in the 1964 November election.

(Editor's note—Bast finished second in the Sept. 8 primary election for county assemblyman, losing out to Frederick C. Schroeder for the GOP nomination, out of nine candidates. He will oppose Schroeder and Charles A. Johnson, the Democratic winner, in the Nov. 3 election.)

Born and raised in Washington county, Ray is the son of Mrs. Val Bast and the late Val Bast. He has two brothers, Arthur of Hartford and Roland of the town of Germantown. He has one sister Mabel (Mrs. Robert Fuge) of West Bend.

Ray graduated from public school in the town of Germantown, Menomonee Falls high school and Dodge County Teachers college. He taught school in the public schools of Washington county for five years. He was active in 4-H club work for 10 years.

After five years of teaching farming, he went back to active farming and has been actively engaged in this occupation since his marriage in 1941. He has maintained a registered herd of Holstein cattle, testing them for production on H.I.R. and has consistently maintained a top herd average.

Ray is also widely known as a breeder of registered Percheron horses and has exhibited each year at the Washington county fair, the Wisconsin and Minnesota state fairs and has always shown some of the champions.

Ray was local school clerk for eight years and was the first president of the Washington County School Board association.

In 1947 he was awarded one of the Outstanding Future Farmers awards at the Wisconsin State Fair. He has been a director of the Washington County Holstein Breeders association for twenty years and also served as secretary and president for several years. He has also been a director and presi-

Silo on Enright Farm Collapses

A silo on the farm of Kenneth Enright, R. 1, Kewaskum, located south of Boltonville in the town of Farmington, collapsed last Wednesday shortly after Enright completed filling the structure.

The silo, 12 by 38 feet, reportedly had a slight crack. It was filled about 2 p. m. Wednesday when two more loads of silage were placed in the structure, which had been almost filled in previous haulings. The last silage filled in may have over-taxed the structure with the additional weight being too much.

About 4:30 p. m. the Enright's son, Michael, 7, ran into the house and told his father that the silo "was cracking open." The Enright's investigated and as they watched, the building slowly collapsed, spilling silage and broken concrete about the barn area. Enright estimated that the silage in the structure weighed about 90 tons.

Enright operates two farms in the area with a total acreage of 160. He said that the spilled silage would be placed in the silo at the neighboring farm across the roadway and hauled to his base farm to feed his herd of 30 cows and 30 heifers. The high moisture content of the corn crop this year may have been responsible for the destruction of the silo.

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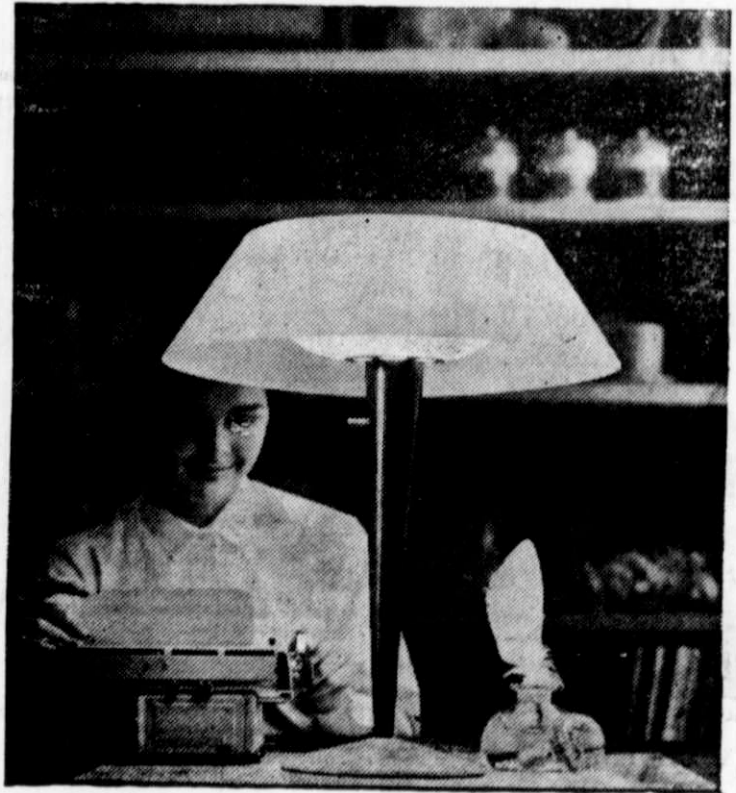
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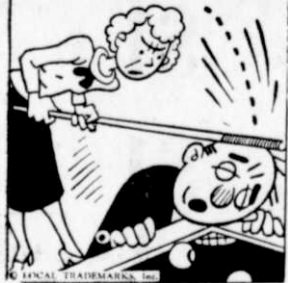

Grafton and North Fondy had played successive tie games for the past three seasons and it looked like they would end up the same way this year but Grafton scored with only 20 seconds to play to win. The loss was the first since 1962 for the Orioles, who were unbeaten in 1963.

The Indians are at home again this Friday night and run into strong opposition with Grafton.
