AFS Student Mary Kroncke Returns From Spain, Tells of Experiences

Mary Kroncke, Kewaskum's first participant in the AFS Americans Abroad program, has recently arrived home from Spain. In previous issues of the Statesman we have shared in Mary's experiences while living with her Spanish family in Mallorca.

On Aug. 27, Mary's stay in Mallorca ended and she boarded a plane for Madrid, Spain. Here she completed the educational activities arranged by the American Field Service for American students abroad.

Mary tells us briefly of these experiences:

"I left Mallorca by plane at nine o'clock on Thursday morning, Aug. 27. I flew directly to Madrid, the capitol of Spain, to join the other twenty 'AFS'ers' who had spent the summer in Spain. We had just three short days to spend in the beautiful capitol of the ing 11,000,000 members in the country we had grown to understand and love over the past seven weeks.

"The day we arrived we were allowed to go shopping in the modern downtown section of Madrid. The next day our tours be-We left on an excursion to gan. the Valley of the Fallen, located near Madrid. Silo on Enright Farm Collapses

A silo on the farm of Kenneth Enright, R. 1, Kewaskum, located south of Boltonville in the town of Farmington, collapsed last Wednesday shortly after Enright completed filling the structure.

The silo, 12 by 38 feet, reportedly had a slight crack. It was when two more loads of silage were placed in the structure. which had been almost filled in previous haulings. The last silage filled in may have over-taxed the structure with the additional weight being too much.

About 4:30 p. m. the Enrights' sen, Michael, 7, ran into the house and told his father that the silo "was cracking open." The Enrights investigated and as they watched, the building slowly collapsed, spilling silage and broken concrete about the barn area. Enright estimated that the silage in the structure weighed about 90 tons
