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Training Course Completed by 23 Local Firemen

TAKE 7 LESSON STANDARD COURSE IN LATEST FIRE FIGHTING TECHNIQUES

Twenty-three members of the Kewaskum Fire Department recently completed the standard firemanship course of the Wisconsin State Board of Vocational and Adult Education, according to Chief Armin Oppermann.

The members who completed the course in the latest firefighting techniques and have now been awarded fire service training certificates are: Richard Boden, Aloysius Staehler, Jr., Robert Ours, William Martin, Walter Giese, Leander Fellenz, Donald Ehnert, Frank Krueger, Jr., Alex Laubach, Joseph Miller, Edward Miller, Jr., Bruce Petri, Roger Reindl, Hugo Straub, Harold Ruppinger, August Bilgo, Jr., John Geidel, Harry Heinecke, Donald Koerble, Harold Perkins, Robert Staehler, Clayton Stautz and Chief Oppermann. Several other firemen took part of the course but were unable to complete all of the lessons.

Walt Roelse of Sheboygan was the instructor for the 17½-hour, seven lesson course of 2½ hours each evening. The course was given from May 11 through July 6. The firemen were given instruction and practice with their own equipment.

The standard course was divided into two series. The first, known as Series "S" was designed to be given indoors and consisted of four class sessions of 2½ hours each given one evening weekly or every other week. The classes and subjects were as follows:

Class 1. Introduction, orientation, fire department equipment, the nature of fire.

Class 2. The elements of fire and methods of extinguishment, firefighting principals and practices.

Class 3. Forcible entry and ventilation.

Class 4. Overhauling operations and salvage.

Series "SP" involved the firemen's participation and use of equipment. Subjects for each session were:

Class 1. Hose and fire stream practices.

Class 2. Ladder practices.

Class 3. Rescue and gas mask practices.

Firemen taking the course were divided into two smaller groups so that each individual could receive the actual training and practice.

William E. Clark, supervisor of fire training service for the State Board of Vocational and Adult Education, said, "The firemen of Kewaskum are to be congratulated for completion of our standard firemanship course. Firefighting is becoming a technical field that demands constant training to keep up with the latest development."

Railway Company Plans to Remove Kewaskum Depot

Chicago and North Western Railway Co. depots at Kewaskum and Campbellsport will be removed if an application of the railway before the Wisconsin Public Service commission is approved. The application would also eliminate passenger service at these points.

A hearing on the application has been set for Tuesday, Oct. 27, at 9 a. m. in Room 404, Hill Farms State Office Building, 4802 Sheboygan ave., Madison, by the public service commission. If necessary, the hearing will be continued on Oct. 28 and 29, the order states.

West Bend would then become the central station of the railway to serve Jackson, Kewaskum, Rockfield, Campbellsport and Eden for less than carload freight shipments. The application also requests the elimination of passenger tariffs (service) at Kewaskum, Campbellsport, Elcho, Rosendale, Princeton and Wild Rose.

The petition requests that depot buildings and less-than-carload service be eliminated at Deerfield, Dousman, Oak Creek, Ashippun, Kewaskum, Campbellsport, Rosendale, Princeton, Wild Rose, Hortonville, Tigerton, Elcho, Mason, Cable, Minong, Cheatek, Mondovi, Osseo, Granton, Millston, Trempealeau, West Salem, Onalaska, Fennimore, Cuba City, Montfort, Platteville and Lodi.

Central stations would be established in various other communities to serve points where depots are being eliminated in addition to West Bend. The depots at Jackson and Rockfield were removed previously.

North Western officials point out that they have been operating certain stations in Wisconsin under a central agency program which has the effect of increasing its operating efficiency and enhancing its service to the public. The applicant states that such changes are justified since they will result in efficiencies and savings of operating estimated at \$150,000.

Man Stricken on Mushroom Hunt Near Here, Dies

Walter John Michols, 66, of 4628 N. Woodruff ave., Whitefish Bay, was fatally stricken and died of an apparent heart attack while on a mushroom picking hunt near Kewaskum Saturday.

Michols was stricken about 12:35 p. m. as he was preparing to leave after picking mushrooms about one-half mile south of the Wunderberg Ski Hill a short distance south of the village. He was accompanied by Stanley Stoltman, Frank Biernat and Leo Pallisch, all of Milwaukee. The man slumped to the ground and died before medical assistance could be summoned.

Michols was first pronounced dead by Dr. Casey, a physician, one of the owners of the ski hill. He was removed in the Kewaskum firemen's ambulance to the St. Joseph's Community hospital morgue West Bend, where he was also pronounced dead by an attending physician and Coroner Matt Goeden, Jr.

Funeral services were held at 9:45 a. m. Tuesday at the Schramka Funeral home, 612 E. Burleigh st., Milwaukee, and at 10:30 a. m. at St. Monica's church with burial taking place in Holy Cross cemetery.

Immediate survivors include his widow, Rose (nee Lepak), a son, Dr. Raymond Michols, M. C., Tulsa, Okla., three sisters and a brother.

DOROTHY ROWE ENROLLED AS NEW STUDENT AT LAWRENCE

Dorothy Rowe, 1091 Second st., Kewaskum, is among a group of more than 425 new students who arrived at Lawrence university, Appleton, on Sept. 23 for the beginning of the institution's 116th year. 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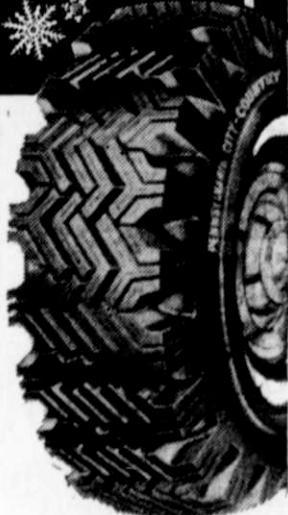

"Planning ahead for fire emergencies would save the majority of lives lost yearly in home fires," says Chief Oppermann. "And home fire cause over 6,000 deaths annually, National Fire Protection association records show."

He urges every family to follow these rules to avoid being trapped by fire:

1. Carefully figure out at least two routes to the outside from every room in the house and be sure the youngsters know these routes by heart.

2. Rehearse exit plans with every member of the family. Make sure the entire family, including the youngest children, knows what to do.

3. Always keep exit routes clear. Don't place stoves or space heaters near doors, or tall furniture in front of windows. Make sure bedroom windows are large enough and low enough to serve as emergency exits.

4. Be sure everyone, especially the children, understands that "once out—stay out." Re-entering a house where there is fire is extremely dangerous.

5. When the house is clear of people, notify the fire department. Know how to do it quickly and correctly, from a neighbor's phone or a street alarm box.

6. Make sure baby sitters have specific instructions in case of fire. These include orders to get the children out of the house the instant smoke or gas is noted, the location of at least two escape routes from every room, and how to get in touch with the fire department, parents, doctor and police.

7. Keep young children—two and under—in constant sight and mind.

8. Teach older children how to use and respect fire. They learn best by your example.

9. Keep your home free of fire hazards by regular check-ups. The fire department will help in this.

Kewaskum didn't belong on the same football field with Grafton Friday. The clean, sharp, bruising, hard-hitting, well coached, powerful Blackhawks came here to play football. And they annihilated the undermanned, unaggressive Indians.

The Blackhawks hit Kewaskum with an electrifying scoring play on the first play from scrimmage as Dennis Gall dashed 81 yards through the entire Indian defense. With the precision of an adding machine operator Gary Rogahn pitched touchdown passes to Tom Kanios and John Gleason from 51 and 30 yards out. Rogahn also hit the end zone on a 23-yard keeper and Dan Meinert made the halftime score 32-0 in the clobbering.

Like a squadron of army tanks

chasing tricycles, Grafton continued their methodical carnage to run roughshod over the Indians in the second half. They continued their madcap scoring pace with second stringers and sophomores handling the offensive chores, adding 20 more points to the one-sided score.

Kewaskum, with two regulars lost to other schools this season and others out with injuries, had more mainstays hurt by Grafton's bulldozers due partly to fundamentally insecure tackling, blocking and falling. Some of the injured remained in the game, risking more serious injuries.

On Friday afternoon of this week the Indians played at Campbellsport. The Bells, who had not won a game since the 1961 season, upset highly-favored North Fondy last week, 27-14. The 27 points were more than the Bells had scored in two seasons previously. They were blanked in 1962 and scored only 14 all season last year. So the outcome could be rated a tossup.

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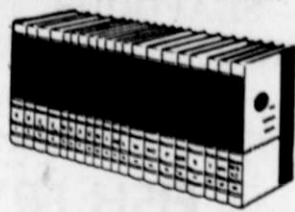
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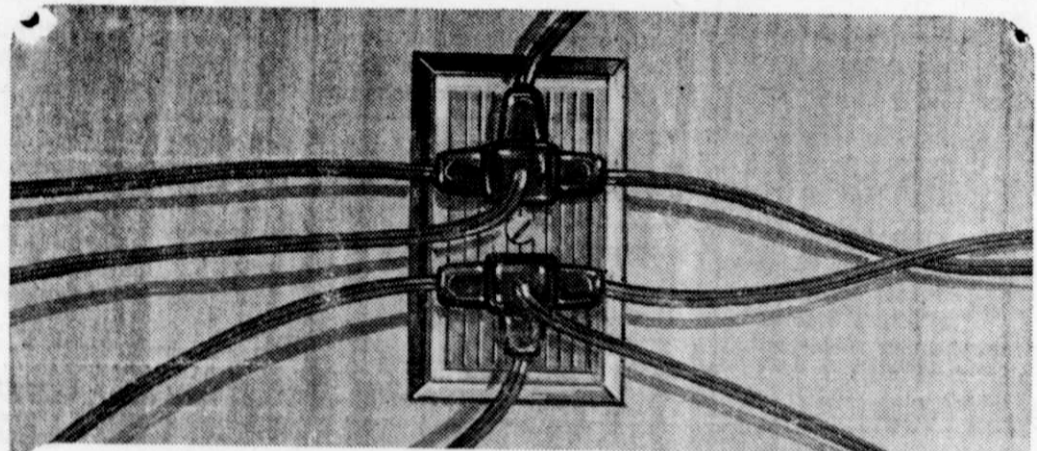
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
