Bids on New Post Office Site In Kewaskum to Be Received

SEN. WILLIAM PROXIMIRE MAKES ANNOUNCEMENT IN TELEGRAM TO STATESMAN

Shortly before going to press the Statesman was informed in a telegram Friday, from Sen. William Proxmire in Washington, D. C. that the Post Office Department will advertise for bids on a new post office location in Kewaskum. The telegram reads as follows:

"Washington, D. C. — William Proxmire (Dem., Wis.) today announced that the Post Office Department will advertise for bids on a new post office location at Kewaskum on Nov. 9. Proxmire said the department prefers a site on Main st. between West Water st. and Fond du Lac ave., on Fond du Lac ave. between First st. and a point approximately 100 yards north of Prospect st., or on First st. between Fond du Lac ave. and a point midway to Water st.

The specifications for the Kewaskum post office are: interior, 3,081 square feet; platform, 216 square feet; and paved area, 4,500 square feet. Bids will be opened on Dec. 4.

Further details are available from R. W. Van Sickle, Box 2673, Milwaukee."

In June the village board petitioned the United States Postal Department for house to house mail delivery in Kewaskum as the village has had a first class post office since 1948. The Statesman contacted Postmaster Harry E. Koch, who informed the writer that the postal department would require a new post office location before house to house mail delivery would be in force here. A larger interior, platform and paved area for the mail delivery trucks would be necessary.

PHEASANT HUNTING OPENS AT NOON THIS SATURDAY

Pheasant hunting starts in Wisconsin at noon on Saturday, Oct. 17. The natural hatch has been sweetened by about 130,000 stocked roosters from game farms. The season will run for 37 days and close on Sunday, Nov. 22. Daily limit for the first weekend is one bird with two per day allowed afterwards. Last year Wisconsin hunters bagged about 345,500 cocks.

Saturday also marks the opening on Hungarian partridge and squirrels in eastern Wisconsin and rabbits and raccoon in the southern part of the states.

Boy Injured in Hunting Mishap

The Washington county sheriff's department reported that a 13 year old boy was accidentally shot in the right elbow while "duck hunting" with a 14 year old companion last Sunday north of Kewaskum.

The accident occurred as the older boy apparently took aim at a chipmunk with a .410 shotgun and swung the weapon to follow the animal's progress and accidentally shot his companion.

Sheriff Bill Johnson and members of the department warned area residents that persons between the ages of 12 and 16 years are not allowed to hunt unless accompanied by a parent or guardian or by a person over 21 years of age who has been designated by a parent or guardian.

Training Sessions On Kettle Moraine Area Are Scheduled

TEACHERS, OTHER COUNTY RESIDENTS ARE INVITED

Teachers and any others of Washington county who are interested are invited to attend four training sessions concerning a better understanding of the Kettle Moraine area in the county.

County Agent Maurice Hovland reports that a staff including Harold Ryan and Keith Schmude of the Soil Conservation Service, and Hugh Hayes of the Wisconsin Conservation Department, have arranged this program. They will give the discussions and guide the field trips.

The first meeting will be held Tuesday, Oct. 20, at 7:30 p. m. in the extension office, courthouse annex, West Bend. This will emphasize the origin of the Kettle Moraine, including a look at the geological history. Saturday, Oct. 24, at 9:00 a. m. there will be a field trip to trace patterns of the glacier, see formations of soil layers, and look at rock formations. Another field trip on Oct. 31 at 9:00 a. m. will show the drainage patterns and problems, and the relationships between soil and water. The final program, for which a date has not been set, will point out the geological, botanical and agricultural relationships of the Kettle Moraine.

All the meetings will originate at the courthouse annex, West Bend, and are open to any person interested in the Kettle Moraine phenomenon. There is no charge.

While this program is directed primarily to those who teach, and to those who need the information in their regular line of work, the committee emphasized that all persons interested in the Kettle Moraine are welcome. The committee has asked that any person who will attend should contact the extension office at once. The address is Box 116, West Bend; telephone FE 4-3491, extension 63.

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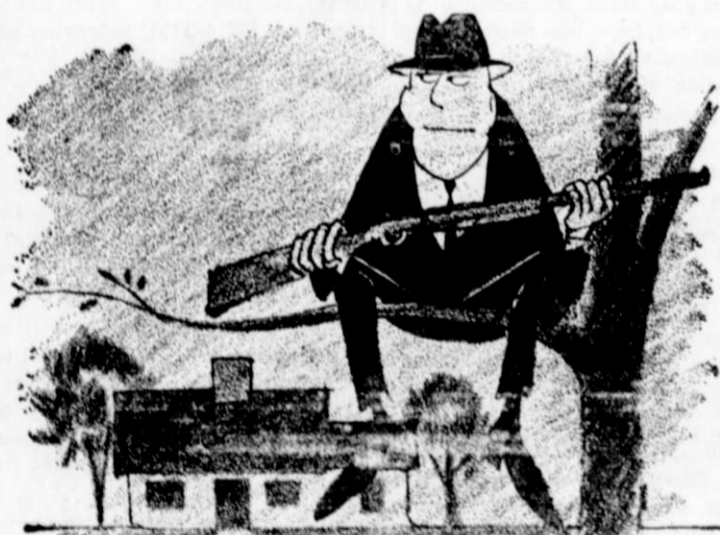
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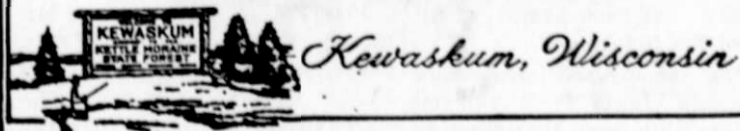
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4-H Club News

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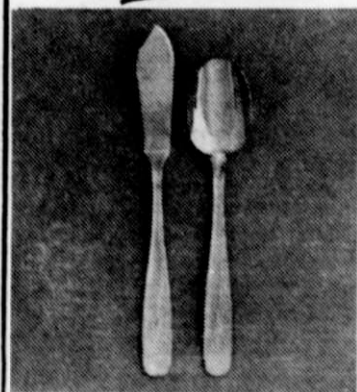

**Area TB Cattle
Testing Program
Is Now Underway**

The annual cattle tuberculosis test got underway in Wisconsin Oct. 1, the Wisconsin State Department of Agriculture said today. Testing will be conducted in Barton and Jackson townships of Washington County.

Under a procedure adopted in 1960, townships containing approx-

imately one-sixth of each county's cattle population are tested each year. All cattle 2 years of age and older are required to be tested once every six years to maintain Wisconsin's modified accredited status. This status is necessary to qualify milk producers for their markets and cattle for interstate movement.

"In addition to TB testing all of the herds in these townships, all

beef and non-BRT herds will have a brucellosis blood test at the same time," Dr. A. A. Erdmann, state-federal veterinarian said. "This combination test for both brucellosis and tuberculosis saves considerable time and expense for both farmers and animal health officials."

Local practicing veterinarians are now being assigned townships where they will be responsible for

the testing. These assignments will be completed within the next several weeks so that all TB testing under the area program will be finished by about March 1, 1965.

"In order to expedite the testing as efficiently and as effectively as possible, we solicit the cooperation of all herd owners in the townships designed as test areas," Dr. Erdmann said.

Ask Permission to Hunt

Most hunters will agree that using good judgment is one of the most important attributes of a good sportsman.

Asking the farmer for permission to hunt on his land is simply exercising good judgment and sportsmanship. Most farmers are glad to grant such permission as long as you identify yourself and respect his instructions concerning restrictions from certain fields, etc.

With the tremendous increase in our hunting population the trespass problem increased greatly the past few years. Abuses such as careless use of a firearm, complete disregard for standing crops, cutting fences, leaving gates open and the deliberate or accidental shooting of livestock, and even theft of crops and farm property are now common.

These acts are committed by a few hunters, but all sportsmen suffer because of them.

When you see such acts being committed, it is to your advantage to report them to the warden or sheriff and help in the prosecution.

The least we can do is ask permission to hunt from the land-

owner. If we obtain it, be sure and conduct ourselves as sportsmen because we might want to return another day. Without the farmer and landowner providing the place to hunt and the game, we would not be able to enjoy it as we know it today.

County Club Agent Stodola Receives 4-H Special Award

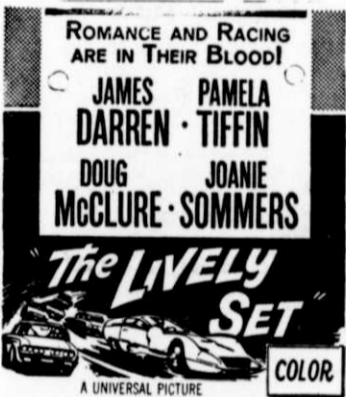

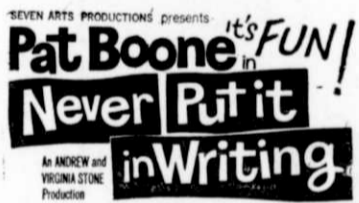
