Training Sessions On Kettle Moraine Area Are Scheduled TEACHERS, OTHER COUNTY **RESIDENTS ARE INVITED**

Teachers and any others of Washington county who are inter-

ested are invited to attend four training sessions concerning a better understanding of the Kettle Moraine area in the county.

County Agent Maurice Hovland reports that a staff including Harold Ryan and Keith Schmude of the Soil Conservation Service, and Hugh Hayes of the Wisconsin Conservation Department, have arranged this program. They will give the discussions and guide the field trips.

The first meeting will be held Tuesday, Oct. 20, at 7:30 p.m. in the extension office, courthouse annex, West Bend. This will emphasize the origin of the Kettle Moraine, including a look at the geological history. Saturday, Oct. 24, at 9:00 a.m. there will be a field trip to trace patterns of the glacier, see formations of soil layers, and look at rock formations. Another field trip on Oct. 31 at 9:00 a. m. will show the drainage patterns and problems, and the relationships between soil and water. The final program, for which a date has not been set, will point out the geological, botanical and agricultural relationships of the Kettle Moraine.

All the meetings will originate at the courthouse annex, West Bend, and are open to any person interested in the Kettle Moraine phenomenon. There is no charge While this program is directed primarily to those who teach, and to those who need the information in their regular line of work, the heart attack on Friday, Oct. 9. committee emphasized that all per-
