District Governor-Designate Williams Speaker; 98 Attend

On Monday night, Oct. 12, 98 Kiwanis members and wives, Kewaskum teachers and wives or husbands enjoyed a delicious chicken and ham family style dinner at Hon-E-Kor Country club at the annual Kiwanis Teacher Appreciation Night. Honored guests were the teachers and wives or husbands, and the main speaker of the evening, Russell F. Williams, 1965 governor-designate for the Wisconsin-Upper Michigan District of Kiwanis International, and his wife, Jeannette.

Albert Hron, vice-president of the Kiwanis club, presented Mrs. Williams, wife of the main speaker, with a beautiful coffee maker made in Kewaskum by Regal Ware, Inc. Williams, an attorney in Oshkosh, gave a very inspiring talk in regard to "Teachers Have a Tremendous Personal Responsibility." "In your hands rests the future of America because in your hands rests the responsibility of educating the youth of today. They have grown up in a wonderworld of gadgets and gimmicks, a fabulous Garden of Eden. They have cars, television, telephones, Sting Rays, and all of the worldly things they could possibly want. Perhaps symbolic of this mid-twentieth century Heaven on Earth is the New York World's Fair. Here General Motors, Chrysler, Ford, IBM, Sinclair have on display a creation of wealth and power and glory that would have made the temples of ancient Rome tremble in disbelief. The generation which you are now teaching is characterized by affluence which has created problems. Solving these problems is a matter of personal responsibility for parents, teachers, and Kiwanians. We need Vision, Understanding and Responsibility," he said.

"Most of the trouble arises from misunderstanding" Williams continued. "There is an old Indian adage, 'Never condemn a man

until you have walked a full day's journey in his moccasins.' We either decide in our own minds that we are going to understand the person with whom we differ, or else in our pride and arrogance we shut off all communication by our determination not to understand. Understanding is always rooted in humility."

Williams congratulated the Kewaskum Kiwanis club on its Achievement Award presented to the club by Kiwanis International at Los Angeles, Calif. during the 49th annual convention of Kiwanis International. He indicated that Kewaskum was the only club in the Wisconsin-Upper Michigan District to receive this award in many years, in fact not since Ripon won an award in 1947. He also stated that the Kewaskum Kiwanis Turkey Shoot has now received International recognition.

Governor Williams announced that he had appointed President Robert W. Schmidt to be South-East chairman, Wisconsin-Upper Michigan District Boys and Girls Committee, and Past-President Orval Behnke to be South-East zone chairman, Wisconsin-Upper Michigan Public Relations Committee. He indicated that he hoped that a Kiwanis Key Club would be soon organized at Kewaskum High school.

AFS Chili Supper And Dance Nov. 4

These are Walborg Pettersen from Oslo, Norway, who resided with Mr. and Mrs. Charles Miller; Georgia Malamaki from Volos, Greece, who lived with the Ralph Erdmann family; Laura Laghi from Forli, Italy, who resided with the Gregor Nigh family and our present AFS'er is Marion Evans from Gisborne, New Zealand, who is staying with the Marvin Martin family.

Kewaskum has sent only one student abroad but hopes to send another this year. Mary Kroncke was our representative to a foreign country the past summer. She stayed at Mallorca, Spain, for six weeks with the Juan Pros Peris family.

Lost in Woods, Man Found By Search Party

A search party Sunday afternoon found a town of Auburn young man who had become lost while walking to his home Saturday night and spent the night in the woods.

According to Sheriff Ray Howard of Fond du Lac county, Edward Kirsch, 25, of R. 1, Campbelsport, was found by searchers at 1:43 p. m. Sunday in a woods between his home and New Fane.

Kirsch related that he had been in New Fane Saturday, where he was last seen at 10 p. m., and got lost in a woods while walking home. He said he built a fire and slept there.

His mother, Mrs. Arthur Kirsch, reported her son missing at 9:10 a. m. Sunday and Undersheriff Harry Rozek organized the first searching party Sunday morning.

The group found Kirsch's cap and tobacco pouch near New Fane, but were unable to locate him. Later, Sheriff Howard searched the area by plane. Kirsch finally was found when his fire was spotted.

Kirsch was taken to St. Agnes hospital, Fond du Lac, where he was a patient until Thursday submitting to medical treatment for exposure and possible pneumonia.
